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Title 128 - Department of Environmental Quality

Chapter 1 - GENERAL

- <u>001</u> Purpose, scope, and applicability. This Chapter provides definitions of terms, general standards and information applicable to this Title.
- 002 Availability of information; confidentiality of information.
  - <u>002.01</u> Any information provided to the Department under this Title will be made available to the public to the extent and in the manner authorized by Title 115, <u>Rules of Practice</u> and Procedures, Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality.
  - <u>002.02</u> Any person who submits information to the Department in accordance with this Title may assert a claim of business confidentiality covering part or all of that information in accordance with Title 115, <u>Rules of Practice and Procedures</u>, Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality.
- <u>003</u> References. Publications and testing methods used in this Title are defined in 40 CFR 260.11, which is hereby adopted and incorporated by reference herein.
  - <u>003.01</u> General provisions pertaining to the adoption of regulations by reference are provided in Chapter 26.
- <u>004</u> When used in this Title, the following terms have the meaning given in Sections <u>005</u> through 154 of this Chapter.
- <u>005</u> "Aboveground tank" means a device meeting the definition of "tank" in this Chapter, and that is situated in such a way that the entire surface area of the tank is completely above the plane of the adjacent surrounding ground surface and the entire surface area of the tank (including the tank bottom) is able to be visually inspected.
- <u>006</u> "Active life" of a facility means the period from the initial receipt of hazardous waste at the facility until the Director receives certification of final closure.
- <u>007</u> "Active portion" means that portion of a facility where treatment, storage, or disposal operations are being or have been conducted after the effective date of regulations causing these operations to be regulated and which is not a closed portion. (See also "closed portion" and "inactive portion.")
- <u>008</u> "Acute Hazardous Waste" means waste listed with the code "H" in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>016</u>. This waste is regulated at 1 kilogram.

- <u>009</u> "Ancillary equipment" means any device including, but not limited to, such devices as piping, fittings, flanges, valves, and pumps that is used to distribute, meter, or control the flow of hazardous waste from its point of generation to a storage or treatment tank(s), between hazardous waste storage and treatment tanks to a point of disposal onsite, or to a point of shipment for disposal off-site.
- <u>010</u> "Aquifer" means a geologic formation, group of formations, or part of a formation that is capable of yielding usable amounts of water to a well, spring, or other point of discharge.
- 011 "ASTM" means the American Society for Testing and Materials.
- <u>012</u> "Authorized representative" means the person responsible for the overall operation of a facility or an operational unit (i.e., part of a facility), e.g., the plant manager, superintendent or person of equivalent responsibility.
- <u>013</u> "Boiler" means an enclosed device using controlled flame combustion and having the following characteristics:
  - <u>013.01</u> The unit must have physical provisions for recovering and exporting thermal energy in the form of steam, heated fluids, or heated gases; and
  - <u>013.02</u> The unit's combustion chamber and primary energy recovery section(s) must be of integral design. To be of integral design, the combustion chamber and the primary energy recovery section(s) (such as waterwalls and superheaters) must be physically formed into one manufactured or assembled unit. A unit in which the combustion chamber and the primary energy recovery section(s) are joined only by ducts or connections carrying flue gas is not integrally designed; however, secondary energy recovery equipment (such as economizers or air preheaters) need not be physically formed into the same unit as the combustion chamber and the primary energy recovery section. The following units are not precluded from being boilers solely because they are not of integral design: process heaters (units that transfer energy directly to a process stream), and fluidized bed combustion units; and
  - <u>013.03</u> While in operation, the unit must maintain a thermal energy recovery efficiency of at least 60 percent, calculated in terms of the recovered energy compared with the thermal value of the fuel; and
  - <u>013.04</u> The unit must export and utilize at least 75 percent of the recovered energy, calculated on an annual basis. In this calculation, no credit shall be given for recovered heat used internally in the same unit. (Examples of internal use are the preheating of fuel or combustion air, and the driving of induced or forced draft fans or feedwater pumps); or

- <u>013.05</u> The unit is one which the Director has determined, on a case-by-case basis, to be a boiler, after considering the standards in Chapter 5, 002.
- <u>014</u> "Carbon regeneration unit" means any enclosed thermal treatment device used to regenerate spent activated carbon.
- <u>015</u> "Cathode ray tube" or "CRT" shall mean a vacuum tube, composed primarily of glass, which is the visual or video display component of an electronic device. A used, intact CRT means a CRT whose vacuum has not been released. A used, broken CRT means glass removed from its housing or casing whose vacuum has been released.
- 016 "Certification" means a statement of professional opinion based upon knowledge and belief.
- <u>017</u> "CFR" means the Code of Federal Regulations published by the Office of the Federal Register.
- <u>018</u> "Closed portion" means that portion of a facility which an owner or operator has closed in accordance with the approved facility closure plan and all applicable closure requirements. (See also "active portion" and "inactive portion.")
- <u>019</u> "Commercial Hazardous Waste Management Facility" means a facility which accepts hazardous waste for treatment, storage or disposal which is generated by any person other than the person who owns or operates such facility.
- 020 "Component" means either the tank or ancillary equipment of a tank system.
- <u>021</u> "Conditionally exempt small quantity generator" means a generator who generates no more than 100 kilograms of hazardous waste in a month, and accumulates no more than a total of 1,000 kilograms of hazardous waste. If a conditionally exempt small quantity generator also generates acute hazardous waste, those acute hazardous wastes are subject to the exemptions and regulations of Chapter 8.
- <u>022</u> "Confined aquifer" means an aquifer bounded above and below by impermeable beds or by beds of distinctly lower permeability than that of the aquifer itself; an aquifer containing confined groundwater.
- <u>023</u> "Contained" means held in a unit (including a land-based unit as defined in this Chapter) that meets the following criteria:
  - <u>023.01</u> The unit is in good condition, with no leaks or other continuing or intermittent unpermitted releases of the hazardous secondary materials to the environment, and is designed, as appropriate for the hazardous secondary materials, to prevent releases of hazardous secondary materials to the environment. Unpermitted releases are releases that are not covered by a permit (such as a permit to discharge to water or air) and may include, but are not limited to, releases through surface transport by precipitation runoff,

- releases to soil and groundwater, wind-blown dust, fugitive air emissions, and catastrophic unit failures;
- <u>023.02</u> The unit is properly labeled or otherwise has a system (such as a log) to immediately identify the hazardous secondary materials in the unit; and
- <u>023.03</u> The unit holds hazardous secondary materials that are compatible with other hazardous secondary materials placed in the unit and is compatible with the materials used to construct the unit and addresses any potential risks of fires or explosions.
- <u>023.04</u> Hazardous secondary materials in units that meet the applicable requirements of Chapters 21 and 22 of this Title are presumptively contained.
- <u>024</u> "Container" means any portable device in which a material is stored, transported, treated, disposed of, or otherwise handled.
- <u>025</u> "Containment Building" means a hazardous waste management unit that is used to store or treat hazardous waste under the provisions of Chapter 21, <u>022</u>, or Chapter 22, <u>022</u>.
- <u>026</u> "Contingency plan" means a document setting out an organized, planned, and coordinated course of action to be followed in case of a fire, explosion, or release of hazardous waste or hazardous waste constituents which could threaten human health or the environment.
- <u>027</u> "Corrective action management unit" or "CAMU" means an area within a facility that is designated by the Director under Chapter 21, <u>016</u>, for the purpose of implementing corrective action requirements under 40 CFR 264.101, which is incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, <u>006</u>, and RCRA Section 3008(h). A CAMU shall only be used for the management of remediation wastes pursuant to implementing such corrective action requirements at the facility.
- <u>028</u> "Corrosion expert" means a person who, by reason of his or her knowledge of the physical sciences and the principles of engineering and mathematics, acquired by a professional education and related practical experience, is qualified to engage in the practice of corrosion control on buried or submerged metal piping systems and metal tanks. Such a person must be certified as being qualified by the National Association of Corrosion Engineers (NACE) or be a registered professional engineer who has certification or licensing that includes education and experience in corrosion control on buried or submerged metal piping systems and metal tanks.
- 029 "Council" means the Nebraska Environmental Quality Council.
- <u>030</u> "CRT collector" shall mean a person who receives used, intact CRT's for recycling, repair, resale, or donation.
- <u>031</u> "CRT exporter" means any person in the United States who initiates a transaction to send used CRTs outside the United States or its territories for recycling or reuse, or any intermediary in the United States arranging for such export.

- <u>032</u> "CRT glass manufacturer" shall mean an operation or part of an operation that uses a furnace to manufacture CRT glass.
- 033 "CRT processing" shall mean conducting all of the following activities:
  - 033.01 Receiving broken or intact CRT's; and
  - <u>033.02</u> Intentionally breaking intact CRT's or further breaking or separating broken CRT's; and
  - 033.03 Sorting or otherwise managing glass removed from CRT monitors.
- <u>034</u> "DEQ/EPA hazardous waste number" or "waste code" means the number assigned by the Council to each hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, <u>011</u> through <u>016</u> and to each characteristic identified in Chapter 3, 005 through 010.
- <u>035</u> "DEQ/EPA identification number" means the number assigned by DEQ to each generator, transporter, and treatment, storage, or disposal facility.
- 036 "Department" or "DEQ" means the Department of Environmental Quality.
- <u>037</u> "Designated facility" means a hazardous waste treatment, storage, or disposal facility which: (1) has received a permit or interim status in accordance with the requirements of 40 CFR Part 270 and 124, (2) has received a permit or interim status under Chapters 12 through 15, and, 22 of this Title or from a State authorized in accordance with 40 CFR Part 271, or (3) is regulated under Chapter 7, <u>006</u> or <u>011</u> and (4) that has been designated on the manifest by the generator pursuant to Chapter 10, 002.
  - <u>037.01</u> "Designated facility" also means a generator site designated on the manifest to receive its waste as a return shipment from a facility that has rejected the waste in accordance with 40 CFR Part 264.72(f) or Part 265.72(f), which is incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, <u>005</u>, and Chapter 22, <u>005</u>, respectively.
  - <u>037.02</u> If a waste is destined for a facility in an authorized State which has not yet obtained authorization to regulate that particular waste as hazardous, then the designated facility must be a facility allowed by the receiving State to accept such waste.
- <u>038</u> "Dike" means an embankment or ridge of either natural or man-made materials used to prevent the movement of liquids, sludges, solids, or other materials.
- <u>039</u> "Dioxins and furans (D/F) " means tetra, penta, hexa, hepta, and octa-chlorinated dibenzo dioxins and furans.

- <u>040</u> "Director" means the Director of the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality or the Director's designated representative.
- <u>041</u> "Discharge" or "hazardous waste discharge" means the accidental or intentional spilling, leaking, pumping, pouring, emitting, emptying, or dumping of hazardous waste into or on any land, water, or air.
- <u>042</u> "Disposal" means the discharge, deposit, injection, dumping, spilling, leaking, or placing of any solid waste or hazardous waste into or on any land or water so that such solid waste or hazardous waste or any constituent, decomposition by-product, or reaction by-product thereof may enter the environment or be emitted into the air or discharged into any waters, including groundwater.
- <u>043</u> "Disposal facility" means a facility or part of a facility at which hazardous waste is intentionally placed into or on any land or water, and at which waste will remain after closure. The term "disposal facility" does not include a corrective action management unit into which remediation wastes are placed.
- 044 "DOT" means the United States Department of Transportation.
- <u>045</u> "Drip pad" means an engineered structure consisting of a curbed, free-draining base, constructed of non-earthen materials and designed to convey preservative kick-back or drippage from treated wood, precipitation, and surface water run-on to an associated collection system at wood preserving plants.
- 046 "Elementary neutralization unit" means a device which:
  - $\underline{046.01}$  Is used for neutralizing wastes that are hazardous only because they exhibit the corrosivity characteristic defined in Chapter 3,  $\underline{008}$  or are listed in Chapter 3,  $\underline{011}$  through  $\underline{016}$  only for this reason; and
  - <u>046.02</u> Meets the definition of tank, tank system, container, transport vehicle or vessel in this Chapter.
- 047 "EPA" means the United States Environmental Protection Agency.
- <u>048</u> "Equivalent method" means any testing or analytical method approved by the Council in accordance with Chapter 6, 001 and 002.
- <u>049</u> "Existing hazardous waste management (HWM) facility" or "existing facility" means a facility which was in operation or for which construction commenced on or before November 19, 1980. A facility has commenced construction if the owner or operator has obtained the Federal, State, and local approvals or permits necessary to begin physical construction; and either:
  - 049.01 A continuous on-site, physical construction program has begun; or

<u>049.02</u> The owner or operator has entered into contractual obligations, which cannot be canceled or modified without substantial loss, for physical construction of the facility to be completed within a reasonable time.

<u>050</u> "Existing portion" means that land surface area of an existing hazardous waste management unit, included in the original Part A permit application, on which wastes have been placed prior to the issuance of a permit.

<u>051</u> "Existing tank system" or "existing component" means a tank system or component that is used for the storage or treatment of hazardous waste and that is in operation, or for which installation is commenced on or prior to July 14, 1986. Installation will be considered to have commenced if the owner or operator has obtained all Federal, State, and local approvals or permits necessary to begin physical construction of the site or installation of the tank system and if either (1) a continuous on-site physical construction or installation program has begun, or (2) the owner or operator has entered into contractual obligations - which cannot be canceled or modified without substantial loss - for physical construction of the site or installation of the tank system to be completed within a reasonable time.

#### 052 "Facility" means:

<u>052.01</u> All contiguous land, and structures, other appurtenances, and improvements on the land, used for treating, storing, or disposing of hazardous waste, or for managing hazardous secondary materials prior to reclamation. A facility may consist of several treatment, storage, or disposal operational units (e.g., one or more landfills, surface impoundments, or combinations of them).

<u>052.02</u> For the purpose of implementing corrective action under 40 CFR 264.101, which is incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, <u>006</u>, all contiguous property under the control of the owner or operator seeking a permit under subtitle C of RCRA. This definition also applies to facilities implementing corrective action under RCRA section 3008(h).

<u>052.03</u> Notwithstanding <u>050.02</u> of this definition, a remediation waste management site is not a facility that is subject to 40 CFR 264.101, which is incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, <u>006</u>, but is subject to corrective action requirements if the site is located within such a facility.

<u>053</u> "Federal Act" or "RCRA" means the Solid Waste Disposal Act, as amended by the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act of 1976, as amended, 42 U.S.C. §6901 et. seg.

<u>054</u> "Federal agency" means any department, agency, or other instrumentality of the Federal Government, any independent agency or establishment of the Federal Government including any government corporation, and the Government Printing Office.

- <u>055</u> "Federal, State and local approvals or permits necessary to begin physical construction" means permits and approvals required under Federal, State or local hazardous waste control statutes, regulations or ordinances.
- <u>056</u> "Final closure" means the closure of all hazardous waste management units at the facility in accordance with all applicable closure requirements so that hazardous waste management activities under Chapters 21 and 22 are no longer conducted at the facility unless subject to the provisions for accumulation time in Chapters 8 through 10.
- <u>057</u> "Food-chain crops" means tobacco, crops grown for human consumption, and crops grown for feed for animals whose products are consumed by humans.
- <u>058</u> "Free liquids" means liquids which readily separate from the solid portion of a waste under ambient temperature and pressure.
- <u>059</u> "Freeboard" means the vertical distance between the top of a tank or surface impoundment dike, and the surface of the waste contained therein.
- <u>060</u> "Generator" means any person, by site, whose act or process produces hazardous waste identified or listed in Chapter 3 or whose act first causes a hazardous waste to become subject to regulation.
- <u>061</u> "Groundwater" means water which occurs, moves, seeps, filters or percolates through the ground beneath the land surface in a zone of saturation.
- 062 "Hazardous waste" means a hazardous waste as defined in Chapters 2 and 3.
- <u>063</u> "Hazardous secondary material" means a secondary material (e.g., spent material, by-product, or sludge) that, when discarded, would be a hazardous waste as defined in Chapters 2 and 3.
- <u>064</u> "Hazardous secondary material generator" means any person whose act or process produces hazardous secondary materials at the generating facility. For purposes of this paragraph, "generating facility" means all contiguous property owned, leased, or otherwise controlled by the hazardous secondary material generator. For the purposes of Chapter 2, Section 008.25, a facility that collects hazardous secondary materials from other persons is not the hazardous secondary material generator.
- <u>065</u> "Hazardous waste constituent" means a constituent that caused the Council to list the hazardous waste in Chapters 3, <u>011</u> through <u>016</u> or a constituent listed in Table 3 of Chapter 3, <u>010</u>.
- <u>066</u> "Hazardous waste management" means the systematic control of the collection, source separation, storage, transportation, processing, treatment, recovery, and disposal of hazardous waste.

<u>067</u> "Hazardous waste management unit" is a contiguous area of land on or in which hazardous waste is placed, or the largest area in which there is significant likelihood of mixing hazardous waste constituents in the same area. Examples of hazardous waste management units include a surface impoundment, a waste pile, a land treatment area, a landfill cell, an incinerator, a tank and its associated piping and underlying containment system and a container storage area. A container alone does not constitute a unit; the unit includes containers and the land or pad upon which they are placed.

<u>068</u> "In operation" refers to a facility which is treating, storing, or disposing of hazardous waste.

<u>069</u> "Inactive portion" means that portion of a facility which is not operated after May 19, 1980. (See also "active portion" and "closed portion.")

070 "Incinerator" means any enclosed device that:

<u>070.01</u> Uses controlled flame combustion and neither meets the criteria for classification as a boiler, sludge dryer, or carbon regeneration unit, nor is listed as an industrial furnace; or

<u>070.02</u> Meets the definition of infrared incinerator or plasma arc incinerator.

<u>071</u> "Incompatible waste" means a hazardous waste which is unsuitable for:

<u>071.01</u> Placement in a particular device or facility because it may cause corrosion or decay of containment materials (e.g., container inner liners or tank walls); or

<u>071.02</u> Commingling with another waste or material under uncontrolled conditions because the commingling might produce heat or pressure, fire or explosion, violent reaction, toxic dusts, mists, fumes, or gases, or flammable fumes or gases.

<u>072</u> "Individual generation site" means the contiguous site at or on which one or more hazardous wastes are generated. An individual generation site, such as a large manufacturing plant, may have one or more sources of hazardous waste but is considered a single or individual generation site if the site or property is contiguous.

<u>073</u> "Industrial furnace" means any of the following enclosed devices that are integral components of manufacturing processes and that use thermal treatment to accomplish recovery of materials or energy, including:

073.01 Cement kilns;

073.02 Lime kilns;

073.03 Aggregate kilns;

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073.04 Phosphate kilns;

073.05 Coke ovens;

073.06 Blast furnaces;

<u>073.07</u> Smelting, melting and refining furnaces (including pyrometallurgical devices such as cupolas, reverberator furnaces, sintering machine, roasters, and foundry furnaces);

073.08 Titanium dioxide chloride process oxidation reactors;

073.09 Methane reforming furnaces;

073.10 Pulping liquor recovery furnaces;

<u>073.11</u> Combustion devices used in the recovery of sulfur values from spent sulfuric acid;

<u>073.12</u> Halogen acid furnaces (HAFs) for the production of acid from halogenated hazardous waste generated by chemical production facilities where the furnace is located on the site of a chemical production facility, the acid product has a halogen acid content of at least 3%, the acid product is used in a manufacturing process, and, except for hazardous waste burned as fuel, hazardous waste fed to the furnace has a minimum halogen content of 20% as-generated;

<u>073.13</u> Such other devices as the Council may, after notice and comment, add to this list on the basis of one or more of the following factors:

 $\underline{073.13A}$  The design and use of the device primarily to accomplish recovery of material products;

<u>073.13B</u> The use of the device to burn or reduce raw materials to make a material product;

<u>073.13C</u> The use of the device to burn or reduce secondary materials as effective substitutes for raw materials, in processes using raw materials as principal feedstocks;

<u>073.13D</u> The use of the device to burn or reduce secondary materials as ingredients in an industrial process to make a material product;

<u>073.13E</u> The use of the device in common industrial practice to produce a material product; and

073.13F Other factors, as appropriate.

- <u>074</u> "Infrared incinerator" means any enclosed device that uses electric powered resistance heaters as a source of radiant heat followed by an\_afterburner using controlled flame combustion and which is not listed as an industrial furnace.
- <u>075</u> "Inground tank" means a device meeting the definition of "tank" in this Chapter, whereby a portion of the tank wall is situated to any degree within the ground, thereby preventing visual inspection of that external surface area of the tank that is in the ground.
- <u>076</u> "Injection well" means a well into which fluids are injected. (See also "underground injection.")
- <u>077</u> "Inner liner" means a continuous layer of material placed inside a tank or container which protects the construction materials of the tank or container from the contained waste or reagents used to treat the waste.
- <u>078</u> "Installation inspector" means a person who, by reason of knowledge of the physical sciences and the principles of engineering acquired by a professional education and related practical experience, is qualified to supervise the installation of tank systems.
- <u>079</u> "Intermediate facility" means any facility that stores hazardous secondary materials for more than 10 days, other than a hazardous secondary material generator or reclaimer of such material.
- <u>080</u> "International shipment" means the transportation of hazardous waste into or out of the jurisdiction of the United States.
- <u>081</u> "Land-based unit" means an area where hazardous secondary materials are placed in or on the land before recycling. This definition does not include land-based production units.
- <u>082</u> "Landfill" means a disposal facility or part of a facility where hazardous waste is placed in or on land and which is not a pile, a land treatment facility, a surface impoundment, an underground injection well, a salt dome formation, a salt bed formation, an underground mine, a cave, or a corrective action management unit.
- <u>083</u> "Landfill cell" means a discrete volume of a hazardous waste landfill which uses a liner to provide isolation of wastes from adjacent cells or wastes. Examples of landfill cells are trenches and pits.
- <u>084</u> "Land treatment facility" means a facility or part of a facility at which hazardous waste is applied onto or incorporated into the soil surface; such facilities are disposal facilities if the waste will remain after closure.
- <u>085</u> "Large quantity generator" means a generator who generates in a calendar month, a total quantity of hazardous waste that is greater than or equal to 1000 kilograms. If a large quantity

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generator also generates acute hazardous waste, those acute hazardous wastes are subject to the exemptions and regulations of Chapter 10.

<u>086</u> "Leachate" means any liquid, including any suspended components in the liquid, that has percolated through or drained from hazardous waste.

<u>087</u> "Leak-detection system" means a system capable of detecting the failure of either the primary or secondary containment structure or the presence of a release of hazardous waste or accumulated liquid in the secondary containment structure. Such a system must employ operational controls (e.g., daily visual inspections for releases into the secondary containment system of aboveground tanks) or consist of an interstitial monitoring device designed to detect, continuously and automatically, the failure of the primary or secondary containment structure or the presence of a release of hazardous waste into the secondary containment structure.

<u>088</u> "Liner" means a continuous layer of natural or man-made materials, beneath or on the sides of a surface impoundment, landfill, or landfill cell, which restricts the downward or lateral escape of hazardous waste, hazardous waste constituents, or leachate.

<u>089</u> "Manifest" shall mean the form used for identifying the quantity, composition, origin, routing, and destination of hazardous waste during its transportation from the point of generation to the point of disposal, treatment, or storage. Under these regulations, form means the shipping document EPA form 8700-22 (including, if necessary, EPA form 8700-22A), originated and signed by the generator or offeror in accordance with the instructions included in the Appendix to 40 CFR Part 262, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 10, <u>002</u>, and the applicable requirements of this Title.

<u>090</u> "Manifest tracking number" means: The alphanumeric identification number (i.e., a unique three letter suffix preceded by nine numerical digits), which is pre-printed in Item 4 of the Manifest by a registered source.

<u>091</u> "Mining overburden returned to the mine site" means any material overlying an economic mineral deposit which is removed to gain access to that deposit and is then used for reclamation of a surface mine.

<u>092</u> "Miscellaneous unit" means a hazardous waste management unit where hazardous waste is treated, stored, or disposed of and that is not a container, tank, surface impoundment, pile, land treatment unit, landfill, incinerator, boiler, industrial furnace, underground injection well with appropriate technical standards under Title 122, <u>Rules and Regulations for Underground Injection and Mineral Production Wells</u>, containment building, corrective action management unit, unit eligible for a research, development, and demonstration permit under Chapter 12, <u>001.04E</u>, or staging pile.

093 "Movement" means that hazardous waste transported to a facility in an individual vehicle.

- <u>094</u> "New hazardous waste management facility" or "new facility" means a facility which began operation, or for which construction commenced after October 21, 1976. (See also "Existing hazardous waste management facility.")
- <u>095</u> "New tank system" or "new tank component" means a tank system or component that will be used for the storage or treatment of hazardous waste and for which installation has commenced after July 14, 1986; except, however, for purposes of 40 CFR 264.193(g)(2) and 40 CFR 265.193(g)(2) as incorporated by reference in Chapters 21 and 22 respectively, a new tank system is one for which construction commences after July 14, 1986. (See also "existing tank system.")
- <u>096</u> "No free liquids" means the definition in 40 CFR 260.10, revised as of July 1, 2014, which is adopted and incorporated by this reference.
- <u>097</u> "On ground tank" means a device meeting the definition of "tank" in this Chapter, and that is situated in such a way that the bottom of the tank is on the same level as the adjacent surrounding surface so that the external tank bottom cannot be visually inspected.
- <u>098</u> "On-site" means the same or geographically contiguous property which may be divided by public or private right-of-way, provided the entrance and exit between the properties is at a cross-roads intersection, and access is by crossing as opposed to going along, the right-of-way. Non-contiguous properties owned by the same person but connected by a right-of-way which he controls and to which the public does not have access, is also considered on-site property.
- <u>099</u> "Open burning" means the combustion of any material without utilizing the following characteristics:
  - <u>099.01</u> Control of combustion air to maintain adequate temperature for efficient combustion:
  - <u>099.02</u> Containment of the combustion-reaction in an enclosed device to provide sufficient residence time and mixing for complete combustion; and
  - <u>099.03</u> Control of emissions of the gaseous combustion products. (See also "incineration" and "thermal treatment.")
- 100 "Operator" means the person responsible for the overall operation of a facility.
- 101 "Owner" means the person who owns a facility or part of a facility.
- <u>102</u> "Partial closure" means the closure of a hazardous waste management unit in accordance with the applicable closure requirements of 40 CFR Parts 264 and 265, as incorporated by reference in Chapters 21 and 22, respectively, at a facility that contains other active hazardous waste management units. For example, partial closure may include the closure of a tank (including its associated piping and underlying containment systems), landfill cell, surface

impoundment, waste pile, or other hazardous waste management unit, while other units of the same facility continue to operate.

- <u>103</u> "Person" shall mean any: Individual; partnership; limited liability company; association; public or private corporation; trustee; receiver; assignee; agent; municipality or other governmental subdivision; public agency; other legal entity; or any officer or governing or managing body of any public or private corporation, municipality, governmental subdivision, public agency, or other legal entity.
- <u>104</u> "Personnel" or "facility personnel" means all persons who work at, or oversee the operation of, a hazardous waste facility, and whose actions or failure to act may result in noncompliance with the requirements of 40 CFR Part 264 or 265, as incorporated by reference in Chapters 21 and 22, respectively.
- <u>105</u> "Pile" means any non-containerized accumulation of solid, nonflowing hazardous waste that is used for treatment or storage and that is not a containment building.
- <u>106</u> "Plasma arc incinerator" means any enclosed device using a high intensity electrical discharge or arc as a source of heat followed by an afterburner using controlled flame combustion and which is not listed as an industrial furnace.
- <u>107</u> "Point source" means any discernible, confined, and discrete conveyance, including, but not limited to any pipe, ditch, channel, tunnel, conduit, well, discrete fissure, container, rolling stock, concentrated animal feeding operation, or vessel or other floating craft, from which pollutants are or may be discharged. This term does not include return flows from irrigated agriculture.
- 108 "Publicly owned treatment works" or "POTW" means any device or system used in the treatment (including recycling and reclamation) of municipal sewage or industrial wastes of a liquid nature which is owned by a state or municipality as defined by Section 212(2)(A) of the Clean Water Act, 33 U.S.C. §1292(2)(A). This definition includes sewers, pipes, or other conveyances only if they convey wastewater to a POTW providing treatment.
- 109 "Qualified Ground-Water Scientist" means a scientist or engineer who has received a baccalaureate or post-graduate degree in the natural sciences or engineering, and has sufficient training and experience in ground-water hydrology and related fields as may be demonstrated by state registration, professional certifications, or completion of accredited university courses that enable that individual to make sound professional judgements regarding ground-water monitoring and contaminant fate and transport.
- 110 "Remanufacturing" means processing a higher-value hazardous secondary material in order to manufacture a product that serves a similar functional purpose as the original commercial-grade material. For the purpose of this definition, a hazardous secondary material is considered higher-value if it was generated from the use of a commercial-grade material in a manufacturing process and can be remanufactured into a similar commercial-grade material.

- <u>111</u> "Remediation waste" means all solid and hazardous wastes, and all media (including ground water, surface water, soils, and sediments) and debris, that are managed for implementing cleanup.
- 112 "Remediation waste management site" means a facility where an owner or operator is or will be treating, storing or disposing of hazardous remediation wastes. A remediation waste management site is not a facility that is subject to corrective action under 40 CFR 264.101, which is incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, 006, but is subject to corrective action requirements if the site is located in such a facility.
- <u>113</u> "Replacement unit" means a landfill, surface impoundment, or waste pile unit (1) from which all or substantially all of the waste is removed, and (2) that is subsequently reused to treat, store, or dispose of hazardous waste. "Replacement unit" does not apply to a unit from which waste is removed during closure, if the subsequent reuse solely involves the disposal of waste from that unit and other closing units or corrective action areas at the facility, in accordance with an approved closure plan or EPA or State approved corrective action.
- <u>114</u> "Representative sample" means a sample of a whole (e.g., waste pile, lagoon, groundwater) which can be expected to exhibit the average properties of the whole.
- 115 "Run-off" means any precipitation, leachate, or other liquid that drains over land from a facility.
- 116 "Run-on" means any precipitation, leachate, or other liquid that drains over land onto any part of a facility.
- 117 "Saturated zone" or "zone of saturation" means that part of the earth's crust in which all voids are filled with water.
- <u>118</u> "Sludge" means any solid, semi-solid, or liquid waste generated from a municipal, commercial, or industrial wastewater treatment plant, water supply treatment plant, or air pollution control facility exclusive of the treated effluent from a wastewater treatment plant.
- <u>119</u> "Sludge dryer" means any enclosed thermal treatment device that is used to dehydrate sludge and that has a maximum total thermal input, excluding the heating value of the sludge itself, of 2,500 Btu/lb of sludge treated on a wet-weight basis.
- <u>120</u> "Small quantity generator" means a generator who generates in a calendar month a total quantity of hazardous waste greater than 100 kilograms and less than 1,000 kilograms, and accumulates no more than 6,000 kilograms of hazardous waste at any one time. If a small quantity generator also generates acute hazardous waste those acute hazardous wastes are subject to the exemptions and regulations of Chapter 9.
- <u>121</u> "Solvent-contaminated wipe" means the definition in 40 CFR 260.10, revised as of July 1, 2014, which is adopted and incorporated by this reference.

- <u>122</u> "Sorbent" means a material that is used to soak up free liquids by either adsorption or absorption, or both. "Sorb" means to either adsorb or absorb, or both.
- <u>123</u> "Staging pile" means an accumulation of solid, non-flowing remediation waste (as defined in this section) that is not a containment building and that is used only during remedial operations for temporary storage at a facility. Staging piles must be designated by the Director according to the requirements of 40 CFR 264.554.
- <u>124</u> "State Act" means the Nebraska Environmental Protection Act, Neb. Rev. Stat. §81-1501 through 81-1533, as amended.
- <u>125</u> "Storage" when used in conjunction with hazardous waste, shall mean the containment of hazardous waste, either on a temporary basis or for a period of years, in such manner as not to constitute disposal of such hazardous waste. Under these regulations, storage means the holding of hazardous waste for a temporary period, at the end of which the hazardous waste is treated, disposed of, or stored elsewhere.
- <u>126</u> "Sump" means any pit or reservoir that meets the definition of tank and those troughs/trenches connected to it that serves to collect hazardous waste for transport to hazardous waste storage, treatment, or disposal facilities except that as used in the landfill, surface impoundment, and waste pile rules, "sump" means any lined pit or reservoir that serves to collect liquids drained from a leachate collection and removal system or leak detection system for subsequent removal from the system.
- 127 "Surface impoundment" or "impoundment" means a facility or part of a facility which is a natural topographic depression, man-made excavation, or diked area formed primarily of earthen materials (although it may be lined with man-made materials), which is designed to hold an accumulation of liquid wastes or wastes containing free liquids, and which is not an injection well. Examples of surface impoundments are holding, storage, settling, and aeration pits, ponds, and lagoons.
- <u>128</u> "Tank" means a stationary device, designed to contain an accumulation of hazardous waste which is constructed primarily of non-earthen materials (e.g., wood, concrete, steel, plastic) which provides structural support.
- <u>129</u> "Tank system" means a hazardous waste storage or treatment tank and its associated ancillary equipment and containment systems.
- 130 "TEQ" means toxicity equivalence, the international method of relating the toxicity of various dioxin/furan congeners to the toxicity of 2,3,7,8-tetrachlorodibenzo-p-dioxin.
- <u>131</u> "Thermal treatment" means the treatment of hazardous waste in a device which uses elevated temperatures as the primary means to change the chemical, physical, or biological character or composition of the hazardous waste. Examples of thermal treatment processes

are incineration, molten salt, pyrolysis, calcination, wet air oxidation, and microwave discharge. (See also "incinerator" and "open burning.")

- 132 "Totally enclosed treatment facility" means a facility for the treatment of hazardous waste which is directly connected to an industrial production process and which is constructed and operated in a manner which prevents the release of any hazardous waste or any constituent thereof into the environment during treatment. An example is a pipe in which waste acid is neutralized.
- <u>133</u> "Transfer facility" means any transportation related facility including loading docks, parking areas, storage areas and other similar areas where shipments of hazardous waste or hazardous secondary materials are held during the normal course of transportation.
- <u>134</u> "Transport vehicle" means a motor vehicle or rail car used for the transportation of cargo by any mode. Each cargo-carrying body (trailer, railroad freight car, etc.) is a separate transport vehicle.
- 135 "Transportation" means the movement of hazardous waste by air, rail, highway, or water.
- 136 "Transporter" means a person engaged in the off-site transportation of hazardous waste by air, rail, highway or water.
- 137 "Treatability study" means a study, other than a means to commercially treat or dispose of hazardous waste, in which a hazardous waste is subjected to a treatment process to determine:
  - 137.01 Whether the waste is amenable to the treatment process:
  - 137.02 What pre-treatment (if any) is required;
  - 137.03 The optimal process conditions needed to achieve the desired treatment;
  - 137.04 The efficiency of a treatment process for a specific waste or wastes; or
  - 137.05 The characteristics and volumes of residuals from a particular treatment process;
  - <u>137.06</u> For the purposes of Chapter 2, <u>012</u> and <u>013</u> to determine liner compatibility, corrosion, and other material compatibility studies and toxicological and health effect studies.
- 138 "Treatment" means any method, technique, or process, including neutralization, designed to change the physical, chemical, or biological character or composition of any hazardous waste so as to neutralize such waste, or so as to recover energy or material resources from the waste, or so as to render such waste non-hazardous, or less hazardous; safer to transport, store, or dispose of; or amenable for recovery, amenable for storage, or reduced in volume.

- 139 "Treatment zone" means a soil area of the unsaturated zone of a land treatment unit within which hazardous constituents are degraded, transformed, or immobilized.
- <u>140</u> "Underground injection" means the subsurface emplacement of fluids through a bored, drilled, or driven well; or through a dug well, where the depth of the dug well is greater than the largest surface dimension. (See also "injection well.")
- 141 "Underground tank" means a device meeting the definition of "Tank" in this Chapter, whose entire surface area is totally below the surface of and covered by the ground.
- <u>142</u> "Unfit-for-use tank system" means a tank system that has been determined through an integrity assessment or other inspection to be no longer capable of storing or treating hazardous waste without posing a threat of release of hazardous waste to the environment.
- <u>143</u> "United States" means the 50 states, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, Guam, American Samoa, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.
- <u>144</u> "Universal waste" means certain hazardous wastes that are defined and managed under the universal waste requirements of Title 128, Chapter 25.
- <u>145</u> "Unsaturated zone" or "zone of aeration" means the zone between the land surface and the water table.
- <u>146</u> "Uppermost aquifer" means the geologic formation nearest the natural ground surface that is an aquifer, as well as lower aquifers that are hydraulically interconnected with this aquifer within the facility's property boundary.
- 147 "Used oil" means any oil that has been refined from crude oil, or any synthetic oil, that has been used and as a result of such use is contaminated by physical or chemical impurities.
- <u>148</u> "Vessel" includes every description of watercraft, used or capable of being used as a means of transportation on the water.
- 149 "Wastewater treatment unit" means a device which:
  - 149.01 Is part of a wastewater treatment facility which is subject to regulations under either Section 307(B) of the Clean Water Act or Title 119, Rules and Regulations
    Pertaining to the Issuance of Permits Under the National Pollutant Discharge Elimination
    System, Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality; and
  - <u>149.02</u> Receives and treats or stores an influent wastewater that is a hazardous waste as defined in Chapter 2, or that generates and accumulates a wastewater treatment sludge

which is a hazardous waste as defined in Chapter 2, or treats or stores a wastewater treatment sludge which is a hazardous waste as defined in Chapter 2; and

149.03 Meets the definition of a tank or tank system as defined in this Chapter.

150 "Water (bulk shipment)" means the bulk transportation of hazardous waste which is loaded or carried on board a vessel without containers or labels.

151 "Water Table" means an imaginary surface within an unconfined aquifer at which the pressure is at atmosphere (Lohman, 1972) U. S. Geological Survey.

<u>152</u> "Well" means any excavation that is drilled, cored, bored, washed, driven, dug, jetted, or otherwise constructed for the purpose of exploring for ground water, monitoring ground water, utilizing the geothermal properties of the ground, or extracting water from or injecting water into the underground water reservoir. Well shall not include any excavation made for obtaining or prospecting for oil, natural gas, minerals, or products mined or quarried or for inserting media to repressure oil or natural gas bearing formations.

153 "Wipe" means the definition in 40 CFR 260.10, revised as of July 1, 2014, which is adopted and incorporated by this reference.

<u>154</u> "Zone of engineering control" means an area under the control of the owner/operator that, upon detection of a hazardous waste release, can be readily cleaned up prior to the release of hazardous waste or hazardous constituents to ground water or surface water.

Title 128

Chapter 1

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- Title 128 Department of Environmental Quality
- Chapter 2 DEFINITION OF SOLID WASTE AND HAZARDOUS WASTE
- <u>001</u> Purpose and scope. This Chapter and Chapter 3 identify those solid wastes which are subject to regulation as hazardous waste under this Title:
  - 001.01 Section 003 of this Chapter defines the term "solid waste."
  - 001.02 Sections 004 through 007 of this Chapter define the term "hazardous waste."
  - <u>001.03</u> Sections <u>008</u> through <u>016</u> of this Chapter identify those wastes which are excluded from regulation under this Title.
  - <u>001.04</u> Chapter 3, <u>001</u> through <u>004</u> set forth the criteria used by the Council to identify characteristics of hazardous waste and to list particular hazardous wastes.
  - <u>001.05</u> Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u> identify characteristics of hazardous wastes.
  - 001.06 Chapter 3, 011 through 016 list particular hazardous wastes.
  - <u>001.07</u> Chapter 25 identifies universal wastes and the standards for universal waste management.
- <u>002</u> For the purposes of defining solid waste pursuant to Section <u>003</u> of this Chapter and Chapter 7, 001 through 006:
  - <u>002.01</u> A "spent material" is any material that has been used and as a result of contamination can no longer serve the purpose for which it was produced without processing.
  - <u>002.02</u> A "by-product" is a material that is not one of the primary products of a production process and is not solely or separately produced by the production process. Examples are process residues such as slags or distillation column bottoms. The term does not include a co-product that is produced for the general public's use and is ordinarily used in the form it is produced by the process.
  - <u>002.03</u> A material is "reclaimed" if it is processed to recover a usable product, or if it is regenerated. Examples are recovery of lead from spent batteries and regeneration of spent solvents. In addition, for purposes of Sections <u>008.25</u> and <u>008.26</u> of this Chapter, smelting, melting, and refining furnaces are considered to be solely engaged in metals reclamation if the metal recovery from the hazardous secondary materials meets the

same requirements as those specified for metals recovery from hazardous waste found in 40 CFR 266.100(d)(1) through (3), as adopted and incorporated by reference in Chapter 7, Section <u>008.01C</u> of this Title, and if the residuals meet the requirements specified in 40 CFR 266.112, as adopted and incorporated by reference in Chapter 7, Section <u>008.03</u> of this Title.

002.04 A material is "used or reused" if it is either:

<u>002.04A</u> Employed as an ingredient (including use as an intermediate) in an industrial process to make a product (for example, distillation bottoms from one process used as feedstock in another process.) However, a material will not satisfy this condition if distinct components of the material are recovered as separate end products (as when metals are recovered from metal containing secondary materials); or

<u>002.04B</u> Employed in a particular function or application as an effective substitute for a commercial product (for example, spent pickle liquor used as phosphorous precipitant and sludge conditioner in wastewater treatment).

<u>002.05</u> "Scrap metal" is bits and pieces of metal parts (e.g., bars, turnings, rods, sheets, wire) or metal pieces that may be combined together with bolts or soldering (e.g., radiators, scrap automobiles, railroad box cars), which when worn or superfluous can be recycled.

<u>002.06</u> A material is "recycled" if it is used, reused, or reclaimed.

002.07 A material is "accumulated speculatively" if it is accumulated before being recycled. A material is not accumulated speculatively, however, if the person accumulating it can show that the material is potentially recyclable and has a feasible means of being recycled; and that -- during the calendar year (commencing on January 1) -- the amount of material that is recycled, or transferred to a different site for recycling, equals at least 75 percent by weight or volume of the amount of that material accumulated at the beginning of the period. Materials must be placed in a storage unit with a label indicating the first date that the material began to be accumulated. If placing a label on the storage unit is not practicable, the accumulation period must be documented through an inventory log or other appropriate method. In calculating the percentage of turnover, the 75 percent requirement is to be applied to each material of the same type (e.g., slags from a single smelting process) that is recycled in the same way (i.e., from which the same material is recovered or that is used in the same way). Materials accumulating in units that would be exempt from regulations under Section 010 of this Chapter are not to be included in making the calculation. (Materials that are already defined as solid wastes also are not to be included in making the calculation.) However, materials are no longer in this category once they are removed from accumulation for recycling.

<u>002.08</u> "Excluded scrap metal" is processed scrap metal, unprocessed home scrap metal, and unprocessed prompt scrap metal.

<u>002.09</u> "Processed scrap metal" is scrap metal which has been manually or physically altered to either separate it into distinct materials to enhance economic value or to improve the handling of materials. Processed scrap metal includes, but is not limited to scrap metal which has been baled, shredded, sheared, chopped, crushed, flattened, cut, melted, or separated by metal type (i.e., sorted), and, fines, drosses and related materials which have been agglomerated. (Note: shredded circuit boards being sent for recycling are not considered processed scrap metal. They are covered under the exclusion from the definition of solid waste for shredded circuit boards being recycled (Section 008.15)).

<u>002.10</u> "Home scrap metal" is scrap metal as generated by steel mills, foundries, and refineries such as turnings, cuttings, punchings, and borings.

<u>002.11</u> "Prompt scrap metal" is scrap metal as generated by the metal working/fabrication industries and includes such scrap metal as turnings, cuttings, punchings, and borings. Prompt scrap is also known as industrial or new scrap metal.

003 Definition of solid waste.

<u>003.01</u> A solid waste is any discarded material that is not excluded by Section <u>008</u> of this Chapter or that is not excluded by variance granted under Chapter 5, <u>001</u>.

003.02 A discarded material is any material which is:

003.02A Abandoned, by being:

003.02A1 Disposed of; or

003.02A2 Burned or incinerated; or

<u>003.02A3</u> Accumulated, stored, or treated (but not recycled) before or in lieu of being abandoned by being disposed of, burned, or incinerated; or

003.02A4 Sham recycled, as described in Section 003.07 of this Chapter.

003.02B Recycled, as explained in Section 003.03 of this Chapter; or

<u>003.02C</u> Considered inherently waste-like, as explained in Section <u>003.04</u> of this Chapter.

<u>003.03</u> Materials are solid wastes if they are recycled - or accumulated, stored, or treated before recycling - as specified in Sections 003.03A through 003.03D of this Chapter.

<u>003.03A</u> Used in a manner constituting disposal. Materials noted with a "\*" in Column 1 of Table 1 of this Title are solid wastes when they are:

<u>003.03A1</u> Applied to or placed on the land in a manner that constitutes disposal; or

<u>003.03A2</u> Used to produce products that are applied to or placed on the land or are otherwise contained in products that are applied to or placed on the land (in which cases the product itself remains a solid waste)

<u>003.03A3</u> However, commercial chemical products listed in Chapter 3, <u>015</u> and <u>016</u> are not solid wastes if they are applied to the land and that is their ordinary manner of use.

 $\underline{003.03B}$  Burning for energy recovery. Materials noted with a "\*" in Column 2 of Table 1 of this Title are solid wastes when they are:

003.03B1 Burned to recover energy; or,

<u>003.03B2</u> Used to produce a fuel or are otherwise contained in fuels (in which case the fuel itself remains a solid waste).

<u>003.03B3</u> However, commercial chemical products listed in Chapter 3, <u>015</u> and <u>016</u> are not solid wastes if they are themselves fuels.

<u>003.03C</u> Reclaimed. Materials noted with a "......" in Column 3 of Table 1 of this Title are not solid wastes when reclaimed. Materials noted with a "\*" in Column 3 of Table 1 of this Title are solid wastes when reclaimed unless they meet the requirements of Sections 008.25, 008.26, or 008.27.

<u>003.03D</u> Accumulated speculatively. Materials noted with a "\*" in Column 4 of Table 1 of this Title are solid wastes when accumulated speculatively.

 $\underline{003.04}$  Inherently waste-like materials. The following materials are solid wastes when they are recycled in any manner:

<u>003.04A</u> Hazardous Waste Nos. F020, F021 (unless used as an ingredient to make a product at the site of generation), F022, F023, F026, and F028 as listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u>.

 $\underline{003.04B}$  Secondary materials fed to a halogen acid furnace that exhibit a characteristic of a hazardous waste as defined in Chapter 3,  $\underline{005}$  through  $\underline{010}$ , or are listed hazardous waste as defined in Chapter 3,  $\underline{011}$  through  $\underline{018}$  except for brominated material that meets the following criteria:

<u>003.04B1</u> The material must contain a bromine concentration of at least 45%; and

<u>003.04B2</u> The material must contain less than a total of 1% of toxic organic compounds listed in Appendix I of Title 128; and

<u>003.04B3</u> The material is processed continually on-site in the halogen acid furnace via direct conveyance (hard piping).

003.04C The Council will use the following criteria to add wastes to that list:

<u>003.04C1</u> The materials are ordinarily disposed of, burned, or incinerated; or the materials contain toxic constituents listed in Appendix I and these constituents are not ordinarily found in raw materials or products for which the materials substitute (or are found in raw materials or products in smaller concentrations) and are not used or reused during the recycling process; and

<u>003.04C2</u> The material may pose a substantial hazard to human health and the environment when recycled.

003.05 Materials that are not solid waste when recycled.

<u>003.05A</u> Materials are not solid wastes when they can be shown to be recycled by being:

<u>003.05A1</u> Used or reused as ingredients in an industrial process to make a product, provided the materials are not being reclaimed; or

<u>003.05A2</u> Used or reused as effective substitutes for commercial products; or

<u>003.05A3</u> Returned to the original process from which they are generated, without first being reclaimed or land disposed. The material must be returned as a substitute for feedstock materials. In cases where the original process to which the material is returned is a secondary process, the materials must be managed such that there is no placement on the land.

<u>003.05B</u> The following materials are solid wastes, even if the recycling involves use, reuse, or return to the original process (described in Section <u>003.05A</u> of this Chapter).

<u>003.05B1</u> Materials used in a manner constituting disposal, or used to produce products that are applied to the land; or

<u>003.05B2</u> Materials burned for energy recovery, used to produce a fuel, or contained in fuels; or

003.05B3 Materials accumulated speculatively; or

<u>003.05B4</u> Materials listed in Sections <u>003.04A</u> and <u>003.04B</u> of this Chapter.

<u>003.05C</u> Material removed from a container or other device used to store a substance which was manufactured or formulated for commercial or manufacturing use, provided the recycled material is used for the same purpose as the substance being stored.

<u>003.06</u> Documentation of claims that materials are not solid wastes or are conditionally exempt from regulation. Respondents in actions to enforce these regulations who raise a claim that a certain material is not a solid waste, or is conditionally exempt from regulation, must demonstrate that there is a known market or disposition for the material, and that they meet the terms of the exclusion or exemption. In doing so, they must provide appropriate documentation (such as contracts showing that a second person uses the material as an ingredient in a production process) to demonstrate that the material is not a waste, or is exempt from regulation. In addition, owners or operators of facilities claiming that they actually are recycling materials must show that they have the necessary equipment to do so.

<u>003.07</u> Sham recycling. A hazardous secondary material found to be sham recycled is considered discarded and a solid waste. Sham recycling is recycling that is not legitimate recycling as defined in Chapter 5, Section <u>009</u>.

004 Solid waste, as defined in Section 003 of this Chapter is a hazardous waste if:

 $\underline{004.01}$  It is not excluded from regulation as a hazardous waste under Section  $\underline{009}$  of this Chapter; and

004.02 It meets any of the following:

<u>004.02A</u> It exhibits any of the characteristics of hazardous waste identified in Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>. However, any mixture of a waste from the extraction, beneficiation, and processing of ores and minerals excluded under Section <u>009.05</u> of this Chapter and any other solid waste exhibiting a characteristic of hazardous waste under Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u> is a hazardous waste only if it exhibits a characteristic that would not have been exhibited by the excluded waste alone if such mixture had not occurred, or if it continues to exhibit any of the characteristics exhibited by the non-excluded wastes prior to mixture. Further, for the purposes of applying the Toxicity Characteristic to such mixtures, the mixture is also a hazardous waste if it exceeds the maximum concentration for any contaminant listed in Table 3 of Chapter 3, <u>010</u> that would not have been exceeded by the excluded waste alone if the mixture had not occurred or if it continues to exceed the

maximum concentration for any contaminant exceeded by the nonexempt waste prior to mixture.

<u>004.02B</u> It is listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>018</u> and has not been excluded from Chapters 3, <u>013</u> through <u>018</u> under Chapter 6, <u>001</u> and <u>003</u>.

<u>004.02C</u> It is a mixture of solid waste and one or more hazardous wastes listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>018</u> and has not been excluded from <u>004.02</u> of this Section under Chapter 6, <u>001</u> and <u>003</u>, <u>007.03</u> of this Chapter, or <u>007.04</u> of this Chapter; however, the following mixtures of solid wastes and hazardous wastes listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>018</u> are not hazardous wastes (except by application of Section <u>004.02A</u> or <u>004.02B</u> of this Chapter) if the generator can demonstrate that the mixture consists of wastewater the discharge of which is subject to regulation under either Section 402 or Section 307(b) of the Clean Water Act (including wastewater at facilities which have eliminated the discharge of wastewater) and;

<u>004.02C1</u> One or more of the following solvents listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> - carbon tetrachloride, tetrachloroethylene, trichloroethylene -- Provided, That the maximum total weekly usage of these solvents (other than the amounts that can be demonstrated not to be discharged to wastewater) divided by the average weekly flow of wastewater into the headworks of the facility's wastewater treatment or pretreatment system does not exceed 1 part per million; or

<u>004.02C2</u> One or more of the following spent solvents listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> - methylene chloride, 1,1,1-trichloroethane, chlorobenzene, odichlorobenzene, cresols, cresylic acid, nitrobenzene, toluene, methyl ethyl ketone, carbon disulfide, isobutanol, pyridine, spent chlorofluorocarbon solvents-provided that the maximum total weekly usage of these solvents (other than the amounts that can be demonstrated not to be discharged to wastewater) divided by the average weekly flow of wastewater into the headworks of the facility's wastewater treatment or pretreatment system does not exceed 25 parts per million; or

<u>004.02C3</u> One of the following wastes listed in Chapter 3, <u>014</u>, provided that the wastes are discharged to the refinery oil recovery sewer before primary oil/water/solids separation-heat exchanger bundle cleaning sludge from the petroleum refining industry (EPA Hazardous Waste No. K050), crude oil storage tank sediment from petroleum refining operations (EPA Hazardous Waste No. K169), clarified slurry oil tank sediment and/or in-line filter/separation solids from petroleum refining operations(EPA Hazardous Waste No. K170), spent hydrotreating catalyst (EPA Hazardous Waste No. K171), and spent hydrorefining catalyst (EPA Hazardous Waste No. K172); or

#### Chapter 2

<u>004.02C4</u> A discarded commercial chemical product, or chemical intermediate listed in Chapter 3, <u>015</u> through <u>016</u>, arising from de minimis losses of these materials from manufacturing operations in which these materials are used as raw materials or are produced in the manufacturing process. For purposes of this section, "de minimis" losses include those from normal material handling operations (e.g., spills from the unloading or transfer of materials from bins or other containers, leaks from pipes, valves or other devices used to transfer materials); minor leaks of process equipment, storage tanks or containers; leaks from well maintained pump packings and seals; sample purgings; relief device discharges; discharges from safety showers and rinsing and cleaning of personal safety equipment; and rinsate from empty containers or from containers that are rendered empty by that rinsing; or

<u>004.02C5</u> Wastewater resulting from laboratory operations containing toxic (T) wastes listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>018</u>, of this part, Provided, That the annualized average flow of laboratory wastewater does not exceed one percent of total wastewater flow into the headworks of the facility's wastewater treatment or pre-treatment system or provided the wastes, combined annualized average concentration does not exceed one part per million in the headworks of the facility's wastewater treatment or pre-treatment facility. Toxic (T) wastes used in laboratories that are demonstrated not to be discharged to wastewater are not to be included in this calculation; or

<u>004.02C6</u> One or more of the following wastes listed in Chapter 3, <u>014</u> - wastewaters from the production of carbamates and carbamoyl oximes (EPA Hazardous Waste No. K157)-Provided that the maximum weekly usage of formaldehyde, methyl chloride, methylene chloride, and triethylamine (including all amounts that can not be demonstrated to be reacted in the process, destroyed through treatment, or is recovered, i.e., what is discharged or volatilized) divided by the average weekly flow of process wastewater prior to any dilutions into the headworks of the facility's wastewater treatment system does not exceed a total of 5 parts per million by weight; or

<u>004.02C7</u> Wastewaters derived from the treatment of one or more of the following wastes listed in Chapter 3, <u>014</u> - organic waste (including heavy ends, still bottoms, light ends, spent solvents, filtrates, and decantates) from the production of carbamates and carbamoyl oximes (EPA Hazardous Waste No. K156).-Provided, that the maximum concentration of formaldehyde, methyl chloride, methylene chloride, and triethylamine prior to any dilutions into the headworks of the facility's wastewater treatment system does not exceed a total of 5 milligrams per liter.

<u>005</u> A solid waste which is not excluded from regulation under Section <u>004</u> of this Chapter becomes a hazardous waste when any of the following events occur:

<u>005.01</u> In the case of a waste listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>018</u> when the waste first meets the listing description specified in Chapter 3, 011 through 018.

<u>005.02</u> In the case of a mixture of solid waste and one or more listed hazardous wastes, when a hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>018</u> is first added to the solid waste.

<u>005.03</u> In the case of any other waste (including a waste mixture), when the waste exhibits any of the characteristics identified in Chapter 3, 005 through 010.

006 Unless and until it meets the criteria of Section 007 of this Chapter:

006.01 A hazardous waste will remain a hazardous waste.

<u>006.02</u> Except as otherwise provided in Section <u>006.03</u>, <u>007.03</u> or <u>007.04</u> of this Chapter, any solid waste generated from the treatment, storage, or disposal of a hazardous waste, including any sludge, spill residue, ash, emission control dust or leachate (but not including precipitation runoff) is a hazardous waste. (However, materials that are reclaimed from solid wastes and that are used beneficially are not solid wastes and hence are not hazardous wastes under this provision unless the reclaimed material is burned for energy recovery or used in a manner constituting disposal.)

<u>006.03</u> The following solid wastes are not hazardous even though they are generated from the treatment, storage, or disposal of a hazardous waste, unless they exhibit one or more of the characteristics of hazardous waste:

<u>006.03A</u> Waste pickle liquor sludge generated by lime stabilization of spent pickle liquor from the iron and steel industry (SIC codes 331 and 332).

<u>006.03B</u> Waste from burning any of the materials exempted from regulation by Chapter 7, <u>002.04</u> and <u>002.06</u> through <u>002.08</u> <u>002.07</u>.

<u>006.03C</u> Nonwastewater residues, such as slag, resulting from high temperature metals recovery (HTMR) processing of K061, K062 or F006 waste, in units identified as rotary kilns, flame reactors, electric furnaces, plasma arc furnaces, slag reactors, rotary hearth furnace/electric furnace combinations or industrial furnaces (as defined in Chapter 1, <u>069.06</u>, <u>069.07</u>, and <u>069.13</u>), that are disposed in subtitle D or state equivalent units, provided that these residues meet the generic exclusion levels identified in Table 2 of this Title for all constituents, and exhibit no characteristics of hazardous waste. Testing requirements must be incorporated in a facility's waste analysis plan or a generator's self-implementing waste analysis

plan; at a minimum, composite samples of residues must be collected and analyzed quarterly and/or when the process or operation generating the waste changes. Persons claiming this exclusion in an enforcement action will have the burden of proving by clear and convincing evidence that the material meets all of the exclusion requirements.

006.03C1 A one-time notification and certification must be placed in the facility's files and sent to the EPA region or authorized state for K061, K062 or F006 HTMR residues that meet the generic exclusion levels for all constituents and do not exhibit any characteristics that are sent to subtitle D or state equivalent units. The notification and certification that is placed in the generators or treaters files must be updated if the process or operation generating the waste changes and/or if the subtitle D or state equivalent unit receiving the waste changes. However, the generator or treater need only notify the EPA region or an authorized state on an annual basis if such changes occur. Such notification and certification should be sent to the EPA region or authorized state by the end of the calendar year, but no later than December 31. The notification must include the following information: The name and address of the subtitle D or state equivalent unit receiving the waste shipments; the EPA Hazardous Waste Number(s) and treatability group(s) at the initial point of generation; and, the treatment standards applicable to the waste at the initial point of generation. The certification must be signed by an authorized representative and must state as follows: "I certify under penalty of law that the generic exclusion levels for all constituents have been met without impermissible dilution and that no characteristic of hazardous waste is exhibited. I am aware that there are significant penalties for submitting a false certification, including the possibility of fine and imprisonment."

<u>006.03D</u> Biological treatment sludge from the treatment of one of the following wastes listed in Chapter 3, <u>014</u> - Organic waste (including heavy ends, still bottoms, light ends, spent solvents, filtrates, and decantates) from the production of carbamates and carbamoyl oximes (K156) and wastewaters from the production of carbamates and carbamoyl oximes (K157).

<u>006.03E</u> Catalyst inert support media separated from one of the following wastes listed in Chapter 3, <u>014</u> – Spent hydrotreating catalyst (EPA Hazardous Waste No. K171), and Spent hydrorefining catalyst (EPA Hazardous Waste No. K172).

### 007 Exclusions.

<u>007.01</u> Any solid waste described in Section <u>006</u> is not a hazardous waste if it meets the following criteria:

<u>007.01A</u> In the case of solid waste, it does not exhibit any of the characteristics identified in Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>.(However, wastes that exhibit a characteristic at the point of generation may still be subject to the requirements of Chapter 20, even if they no longer exhibit a characteristic at the point of land disposal.)

<u>007.01B</u> In the case of a waste listed in Chapter 3, <u>011</u> through <u>018</u>, contains a waste listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>018</u> or is derived from a waste listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>018</u>, it also has been excluded from Section <u>006</u> of this Chapter under Chapter 6, <u>001</u> and <u>003</u>.

<u>007.02</u> Notwithstanding Sections <u>004</u> through <u>007.01B</u> of this Chapter and provided the debris as defined in Chapter 20 does not exhibit a characteristic identified at Chapter 3, 005 through 010, the following materials are not subject to regulation under this Title:

<u>007.02A</u> Hazardous debris as defined in Chapter 20 that has been treated using one of the required extraction or destruction technologies specified in Chapter 20, <u>011</u>, Table 11; persons claiming this exclusion in an enforcement action will have the burden of proving by clear and convincing evidence that the material meets all of the exclusion requirements; or

<u>007.02B</u> Debris as defined in Chapter 20 that the Director, considering the extent of contamination, has determined is no longer contaminated with hazardous waste.

<u>007.03</u> A hazardous waste that is listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>018</u> of this Title solely because it exhibits one or more characteristics of ignitability as defined under Chapter 3, <u>007</u>, corrosivity as defined under Chapter 3, <u>008</u>, or reactivity as defined under Chapter 3, <u>009</u> is not a hazardous waste, if the waste no longer exhibits any characteristic of hazazardous waste identified in Chapter 3, <u>006</u> through <u>010</u> of this Title.

007.03A The exclusion described in 007.03 of this Section also pertains to:

<u>007.03A1</u> Any mixture of a solid waste and a hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>018</u> of this Title solely because it exhibits the characteristics of ignitability, corrosivity, or reactivity as regulated under <u>004.02C</u> of this Chapter; and

<u>007.03A2</u> Any solid waste generated from treating, storing, or disposing of a hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, <u>006</u> through <u>010</u> of this Title solely because it exhibits the characteristics of ignitability, corrosivity, or reactivity as regulated under <u>006.02</u> of this Chapter.

<u>007.03B</u> Wastes excluded under this section are subject to Chapter 20 of this Title (as applicable), even if they no longer exhibit a characteristic at the point of land disposal.

<u>007.03C</u> Any mixture of a solid waste excluded from regulation under Section <u>009.05</u> of this chapter, and a hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, Sections <u>011</u> through <u>018</u>, solely because it exhibits one or more of the characteristics of ignitability, corrosivity, or reactivity as regulated under Section <u>004.02C</u> of this chapter, is not a hazardous waste, if the mixture no longer exhibits any characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Chapter 3, Sections <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>, for which the hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, Sections <u>011</u> through <u>018</u>, was listed.

<u>007.04</u> Hazardous waste containing radioactive waste is no longer a hazardous waste when it meets the eligibility criteria and conditions of 40 CFR Part 266, Subpart N ("eligible radioactive mixed waste") as incorporated by reference in Chapter 7, 013.

<u>007.04A</u> The exemption described in <u>007.04</u> of this Section also pertains to:

<u>007.04A1</u> Any mixture of a solid waste and an eligible radioactive mixed waste; and

<u>007.04A2</u> Any solid waste generated from treating, storing, or disposing of an eligible radioactive mixed waste.

<u>007.04B</u> Waste exempted under this section must meet the eligibility criteria and specified conditions in 40 CFR 266.225 and 40 CFR 266.230 (for storage and treatment) and in 40 CFR 266.310 and 40 CFR 266.315 (for transportation and disposal) as incorporated by reference in Chapter 7, <u>013</u>. Waste that fails to satisfy these eligibility criteria and conditions is regulated as hazardous waste.

<u>008</u> Exclusions. The following materials are not solid wastes for the purposes of this Chapter, Chapter 3, Chapter 7, <u>001</u> through <u>006</u> and Chapter 6:

<u>008.01</u> Any sewage which is exclusively domestic and any mixture of domestic sewage and other wastes that pass through a sewer system to a publicly owned treatment works for treatment. "Domestic sewage" means untreated sanitary wastes that pass through a sewer system.

<u>008.02</u> Industrial wastewater discharges that are point source discharges subject to regulation under Neb. Rev. Stat. §81-1505(3), (4), and (11).

008.03 Irrigation return flows.

<u>008.04</u> Source, special nuclear or by-product material as defined by the Atomic Energy Act of 1954, as amended, 42 U.S.C. 2011 et. seq. unless the material is mixed with hazardous waste as defined in Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>016</u>.

<u>008.05</u> Materials subjected to in-situ mining techniques which are not removed from the ground as part of the extraction process.

<u>008.06</u> Pulping liquors (i.e., black liquor) that are reclaimed in a pulping liquor recovery furnace and then reused in the pulping process, unless it is accumulated speculatively as defined in Section <u>002</u> of this Chapter.

<u>008.07</u> Spent sulfuric acid used to produce virgin sulfuric acid, unless it is accumulated speculatively as defined in Section 002 of this Chapter.

<u>008.08</u> Secondary materials that are reclaimed and returned to the original process or processes in which they were generated where they are reused in the production process provided:

<u>008.08A</u> Only tank storage is involved, and the entire process through completion of reclamation is closed by being entirely connected with pipes or other comparable enclosed means of conveyance;

<u>008.08B</u> Reclamation does not involve controlled flame combustion (such as occurs in boilers, industrial furnaces, or incinerators);

<u>008.08C</u> The secondary materials are never accumulated in such tanks for over twelve months without being reclaimed; and

<u>008.08D</u> The reclaimed material is not used to produce a fuel, or used to produce products that are used in a manner constituting disposal.

<u>008.09</u> Spent wood preserving solutions that have been reclaimed and are reused for their original intended purpose; and

<u>008.09A</u> Wastewaters from the wood preserving process that have been reclaimed and are reused to treat wood.

<u>008.09B</u> Prior to reuse, the wood preserving wastewaters and spent wood preserving solutions described in Sections <u>008.09</u> and <u>008.09A</u> of this Chapter, so long as they meet all of the following conditions:

<u>008.09B1</u> The wood preserving wastewaters and spent wood preserving solutions are reused on-site at water borne plants in the production process for their original intended purpose;

<u>008.09B2</u> Prior to reuse, the wastewaters and spent wood preserving solutions are managed to prevent release to either land or groundwater or both;

<u>008.09B3</u> Any unit used to manage wastewaters and/or spent wood preserving solutions prior to reuse can be visually or otherwise determined to prevent such releases:

<u>008.09B4</u> Any drip pad used to manage the wastewaters and/or spent wood preserving solutions prior to reuse complies with the standards in Chapter 22, Section <u>018</u> of this Title, regardless of whether the plant generates a total of less than 100 kg/month of hazardous waste; and

<u>008.09B5</u> Prior to operating pursuant to this exclusion, the plant owner or operator submits to the State Director a one-time notification stating that the plant intends to claim the exclusion, giving the date on which the plant intends to begin operating under the exclusion, and containing the following language:

I have read the applicable regulation establishing an exclusion for wood preserving wastewaters and spent wood preserving solutions and understand it requires me to comply at all times with the conditions set out in the regulation.

The plant must maintain a copy of that document in its on-site records for a period of no less than 3 years from the date specified in the notice. The exclusion applies only so long as the plant meets all of the conditions. If the plant goes out of compliance with any condition, it may apply to the State Director for reinstatement. The State Director may reinstate the exclusion upon finding that the plant has returned to compliance with all conditions and that violations are not likely to recur.

<u>008.10</u> EPA Hazardous Waste Nos. K060, K087, K141, K142, K143, K144, K145, K147, and K148, and any wastes from the coke by-products processes that are hazardous only because they exhibit the Toxicity Characteristic (TC) specified in section Chapter 3, <u>010</u> when, subsequent to generation, these materials are recycled to coke ovens, to the tar recovery process as a feedstock to produce coal tar, or mixed with coal tar prior to the tar's sale or refining. This exclusion is conditioned on there being no land disposal of the wastes from the point they are generated to the point they are recycled to coke ovens or tar recovery or refining processes, or mixed with coal tar.

<u>008.11</u> Nonwastewater splash condenser dross residue from the treatment of K061 in high temperature metals recovery units, provided it is shipped in drums (if shipped) and not land disposed before recovery.

008.12 Oil-bearing hazardous secondary materials (i.e., sludges, byproducts, or spent materials) that are generated at a petroleum refinery (SIC code 2911) and are inserted into the petroleum refining process (SIC code 2911-including but not limited to, distillation, catalytic cracking, fractionation, or thermal cracking units (i.e., cokers)) unless material is placed on the land, or speculatively accumulated before being so recycled. Materials inserted into thermal cracking units are excluded under this section, provided that the coke product also does not exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste. Oil-bearing hazardous secondary materials may be inserted into the same petroleum refinery where they are generated, or sent directly to another petroleum refinery, and still be excluded under this provision. Except as provided in Section 008.12A of this Chapter, oil-bearing hazardous secondary materials generated elsewhere in the petroleum industry (i.e., from sources other than petroleum refineries) are not excluded under this section. Residuals generated from processing or recycling materials excluded under Section 008.012, where such materials as generated would have otherwise met a listing under Chapter 3, 011 though 018, are designated as F037 listed wastes when disposed of or intended for disposal.

<u>008.12A</u> Recovered oil that is recycled in the same manner and with the same conditions as described in Section <u>008.12</u>. Recovered oil is oil that has been reclaimed from secondary materials (including wastewater) generated from normal petroleum industry practices, including refining, exploration and production, bulk storage, and transportation including thereto(SIC codes 1311, 1321, 1381, 1382, 1389, 2911, 4612, 4613, 4922, 4923, 4789, 5171, and 5172.) Recovered oil does not include oil-bearing hazardous wastes listed in Chapter 3, <u>011</u> through <u>018</u>; however, oil recovered from such wastes may be considered recovered oil. Recovered oil does not include used oil as defined in Chapter 1.

<u>008.13</u> When used as a fuel, coke and coal tar from the iron and steel industry that contains or is produced from decanter tank tar sludge, Hazardous Waste K087. The process of producing coke and coal tar from such decanter tank tar sludge in a coke oven is likewise excluded from regulation.

- <u>008.14</u> Excluded scrap metal (processed scrap metal, unprocessed home scrap metal, and unprocessed prompt scrap metal) being recycled.
- 008.15 Shredded circuit boards being recycled provided that they are:
  - <u>008.15A</u> Stored in containers sufficient to prevent a release to the environment prior to recovery; and
  - <u>008.15B</u> Free of mercury switches, mercury relays and nickel-cadmium batteries and lithium batteries.
- <u>008.16</u> Condensates derived from the overhead gases from kraft mill steam strippers that are used to comply with 40 CFR 63.446(e), as incorporated by reference in <u>Title 129 Nebraska Air Regulations</u>, Chapter 28. The exemption applies only to combustion at the mill generating the condensates.
- <u>008.17</u> Comparable fuels or comparable syngas fuels (i.e., comparable/syngas fuels) that meet the requirements of Chapter 3, Section <u>018</u>.
- <u>008.18</u> Petrochemical recovered oil from an associated organic chemical manufacturing facility, where the oil is to be inserted into the petroleum refining process (SIC code 2911) along with normal petroleum refinery process streams, provided:
  - <u>008.18A</u> The oil is hazardous only because it exhibits the characteristic of ignitability (as defined in Chapter 3, <u>007</u>) and/or toxicity for benzene (Chapter 3, 010, waste code D018); and
  - <u>008.18B</u> The oil generated by the organic chemical manufacturing facility is not placed on the land, or speculatively accumulated before being recycled into the petroleum refining process. An "associated organic chemical manufacturing facility" is a facility where the primary SIC code is 2869, but where operations may also include SIC codes 2821, 2822, and 2865; and is physically co-located with a petroleum refinery; and where the petroleum refinery to which the oil being recycled is returned also provides hydrocarbon feedstocks to the organic chemical manufacturing facility. "Petrochemical recovered oil" is oil that has been reclaimed from secondary materials (i.e., sludges, by-products, or spent materials, including watewater) from normal organic chemical manufacturing operations, as well as oil recovered from organic chemical manufacturing processes.
- <u>008.19</u> Spent caustic solutions from petroleum refining liquid treating processes used as a feedstock to produce cresylic or napthenic acid unless the material is placed on the land, or accumulated speculatively as defined in Section <u>002.07</u>.
- <u>008.20</u> Hazardous secondary materials used to make zinc fertilizers, provided that the following conditions specified are satisfied:

<u>008.20A</u> Hazardous secondary materials used to make zinc micronutrient fertilizers must not be accumulated speculatively, as defined in Section <u>002.07</u> of this chapter.

<u>008.20B</u> Generators and intermediate handlers of zinc-bearing hazardous secondary materials that are to be incorporated into zinc fertilizers must:

<u>008.20B1</u> Submit a one-time notice to the State Director in whose jurisdiction the exclusion is being claimed, which contains the name, address and EPA ID number of the generator or intermediate handler facility, provides a brief description of the secondary material that will be subject to the exclusion, and identifies when the manufacturer intends to begin managing excluded, zinc-bearing hazardous secondary materials under the conditions specified in Section <u>008.20</u> of this chapter.

<u>008.20B2</u> Store the excluded secondary material in tanks, containers, or buildings that are constructed and maintained in a way that prevents releases of the secondary materials into the environment. At a minimum, any building used for this purpose must be an engineered structure made of non-earthen materials that provide structural support, and must have a floor, walls and a roof that prevent wind dispersal and contact with rainwater. Tanks used for this purpose must be structurally sound and, if outdoors, must have roofs or covers that prevent contact with wind and rain. Containers used for this purpose must be kept closed except when it is necessary to add or remove material, and must be in sound condition. Containers that are stored outdoors must be managed within storage areas that:

<u>008.20B2(a)</u> Have containment structures or systems sufficiently impervious to contain leaks, spills and accumulated precipitation; and

<u>008.20B2(b)</u> Provide for effective drainage and removal of leaks, spills and accumulated precipitation; and

008.20B2(c) Prevent run-on into the containment system.

<u>008.20B3</u> With each off-site shipment of excluded hazardous secondary materials, provide written notice to the receiving facility that the material is subject to the conditions of Section 008.20 of this chapter.

<u>008.20B4</u> Maintain at the generator's or intermediate handler's facility for no less than three years records of all shipments of excluded hazardous secondary materials. For each shipment these records must at a minimum contain the following information:

<u>008.20B4(1)</u> Name of the transporter and date of the shipment;

<u>008.20B4(2)</u> Name and address of the facility that received the excluded material, and documentation confirming receipt of the shipment; and

<u>008.20B4(3)</u> Type and quantity of excluded secondary material in each shipment.

<u>008.20C</u> Manufacturers of zinc fertilizers or zinc fertilizer ingredients made from excluded hazardous secondary materials must:

<u>008.20C1</u> Store excluded hazardous secondary materials in accordance with the storage requirements for generators and intermediate handlers, as specified in Section 008.20B2 of this chapter.

<u>008.20C2</u> Submit a one-time notification to the State Director that, at a minimum, specifies the name, address and EPA ID number of the manufacturing facility, and identifies when the manufacturer intends to begin managing excluded, zinc-bearing hazardous secondary materials under the conditions specified in Section <u>008.20</u> of this chapter.

<u>008.20C3</u> Maintain for a minimum of three years records of all shipments of excluded hazardous secondary materials received by the manufacturer, which must at a minimum identify for each shipment the name and address of the generating facility, name of transporter and date the materials were received, the quantity received, and a brief description of the industrial process that generated the material.

<u>008.20C4</u> Submit to the State Director an annual report that identifies the total quantities of all excluded hazardous secondary materials that were used to manufacture zinc fertilizers or zinc fertilizer ingredients in the previous year, the name and address of each generating facility, and the industrial process(s) from which they were generated.

<u>008.20D</u> Nothing in this section preempts, overrides or otherwise negates the provision in Chapter 4, Section <u>002</u>, which requires any person who generates a solid waste to determine if that waste is a hazardous waste.

<u>008.20E</u> Interim status and permitted storage units that have been used to store only zinc-bearing hazardous wastes prior to the submission of the one-time notice described in Section 008.20B1 of this chapter, and that afterward will be used only to store hazardous secondary materials excluded under this section, are not subject to the closure requirements of Chapters 21 and 22.

<u>008.21</u> Zinc fertilizers made from hazardous wastes, or hazardous secondary materials that are excluded under Section <u>008.20</u> of this chapter, provided that:

<u>008.21A</u> The fertilizers meet the following contaminant limits:

### 008.21A1 For metal contaminants:

Constituent	Maximum Allowable Total Concentration in Fertilizer, per Unit (1%) of Zinc (ppm)
Arsenic	0.3
Cadmium	1.4
Chromium	0.6
Lead	2.8
Mercury	0.3

<u>008.21A2</u> For dioxin contaminants the fertilizer must contain no more than eight (8) parts per trillion of dioxin, measured as toxic equivalent (TEQ).

<u>008.21B</u> The manufacturer performs sampling and analysis of the fertilizer product to determine compliance with the contaminant limits for metals no less than every six months, and for dioxins no less than every twelve months. Testing must also be performed whenever changes occur to manufacturing processes or ingredients that could significantly affect the amounts of contaminants in the fertilizer product. The manufacturer may use any reliable analytical method to demonstrate that no constituent of concern is present in the product at concentrations above the applicable limits. It is the responsibility of the manufacturer to ensure that the sampling and analysis are unbiased, precise, and representative of the product(s) introduced into commerce.

<u>008.21C</u> The manufacturer maintains for no less than three years records of all sampling and analysis performed for purposes of determining compliance with the requirements of Section <u>008.21B</u> of this chapter. Such records must at a minimum include:

<u>008.21C1</u> The dates and times product samples were taken, and the dates the samples were analyzed;

<u>008.21C2</u> The names and qualifications of the person(s) taking the samples;

<u>008.21C3</u> A description of the methods and equipment used to take the samples;

<u>008.21C4</u> The name and address of the laboratory facility at which analyses of the samples were performed;

<u>008.21C5</u> A description of the analytical methods used, including any cleanup and sample preparation methods; and

<u>008.21C6</u> All laboratory analytical results used to determine compliance with the contaminant limits specified in Section 008.21 of this chapter.

# 008.22 Used cathode ray tubes (CRTs)

<u>008.22A</u> Used, intact CRTs as defined in Chapter 1 of this Title are not solid wastes within the United States unless they are disposed, or unless they are speculatively accumulated as defined in Chapter 2, Section <u>002.07</u>, by CRT collectors or glass processors.

<u>008.22B</u> Used, intact CRTs as defined in Chapter 1 of this Title are not solid wastes when exported for recycling provided that they meet the requirements of Chapter 3, Section <u>020</u>.

<u>008.22C</u> Used, broken CRTs as defined in Chapter 1 of this Title are not solid wastes provided that they meet the requirements of Chapter 3, Section <u>019</u>.

<u>008.22D</u> Glass removed from CRTs is not a solid waste provided that it meets the requirements of Chapter 3, Section <u>019.03</u>.

<u>008.23</u> Slag, a product that is a result of the steel manufacturing process and is managed as an item of value in a controlled manner and not as a discarded material.

<u>008.24</u> Solvent-contaminated wipes that are sent for cleaning and reuse, provided they meet one or more of the eligibility criteria in 40 CFR 260.10 and all of the specified conditions in 40 CFR 261.4(a)(26), revised as of July 1, 2014, which is adopted and incorporated by this reference.

<u>008.25</u> Hazardous secondary material generated and legitimately reclaimed within the United States or its territories and under the control of the generator is not a solid waste, provided that the conditions and requirements in 40 CFR Part 261.4(a)(23)(i) and (ii), issued at 80 Fed. Reg. 1774 (January 13, 2015) which are adopted and incorporated by this reference, are met.

<u>008.26</u> Hazardous secondary material that is generated and then transferred to a verified reclamation facility for the purpose of reclamation is not a solid waste, provided that the conditions and requirements in 40 CFR Part 261.4(a)(24)(i) through (vii), issued at 80 Fed. Reg. 1775 (January 13, 2015) which are adopted and incorporated by this reference, are met.

<u>008.27</u> Hazardous secondary material that is generated and then transferred to another person for the purpose of remanufacturing is not a solid waste, provided that the conditions and requirements in 40 CFR Part 261.4(a)(27)(i) through (vi), issued at 80 Fed. Reg. 1776 (January 13, 2015) which are adopted and incorporated by this reference, are met.

009 The following solid wastes are not hazardous wastes:

<u>009.01</u> Household waste, including household waste that has been collected, transported, stored, treated, disposed, recovered, (e.g., refuse-derived fuel) or reused. "Household waste" means any material (including garbage, trash and sanitary wastes in septic tanks) derived from households (including single and multiple residences, hotels and motels, bunkhouses, ranger stations, crew quarters, campgrounds, picnic grounds, and day-use recreation areas). A facility managing municipal solid waste shall not be deemed to be treating, storing, disposing of, or otherwise managing hazardous wastes for the purposes of these regulations if such facility:

009.01A Receives and burns only:

<u>009.01A1</u> Household waste (from single and multiple dwellings, hotels, motels, and other residential sources); and

<u>009.01A2</u> Solid waste from commercial or industrial sources that does not contain hazardous waste; and

<u>009.01B</u> Such facility does not accept hazardous wastes and the owner or operator of such facility has established contractual requirements or other appropriate notification or inspection procedures to assure that hazardous wastes are not received at or burned in such facility.

<u>009.02</u> Solid wastes generated by any of the following and which are returned to the soils as fertilizers:

<u>009.02A</u> The growing and harvesting of agricultural crops.

009.02B The raising of animals, including animal manures.

<u>009.03</u> Fly ash waste, bottom ash waste, slag waste and flue gas emission control waste generated primarily from the combustion of coal or other fossil fuels, except as provided by 40 CFR 266.112, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 7, <u>008.03</u>, for facilities that burn or process hazardous waste.

<u>009.04</u> Drilling fluids, produced waters, and other wastes associated with the exploration, development, or production of crude oil, natural gas or geothermal energy.

<u>009.05</u> Solid waste from the extraction, beneficiation and processing of ores and minerals (including coal, phosphate rock and overburden from the mining of uranium ore), as described in 40 CFR 261.4(b)(7), which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>009.06</u> Cement kiln dust waste, except as provided by 40 CFR 266.112, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 7, 008.03 for facilities that burn or process hazardous waste.

<u>009.07</u> Solid waste which consists of discarded arsenical-treated wood or wood products which fails the test for the Toxicity Characteristic for hazardous waste codes D004 through D017 and which is not a hazardous waste for any other reason, if the waste is generated by persons who utilize the arsenical-treated wood and wood products for these materials' intended end use.

009.08 Mining overburden returned to the mine site.

<u>009.09</u> Wastes which fail the test for the Toxicity Characteristic because chromium is present or are listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>018</u> due to the presence of chromium, which do not fail the test for the Toxicity Characteristic for any other constituent or are not listed due to the presence of any other constituent, and which do not fail the test for any other characteristic, if it is shown by a waste generator or by waste generators that:

<u>009.09A</u> The chromium in the waste is exclusively (or nearly exclusively) trivalent chromium; and

<u>009.09B</u> The waste is generated from an industrial process which uses trivalent chromium exclusively (or nearly exclusively) and the process does not generate hexavalent chromium; and

<u>009.09C</u> The waste is typically and frequently managed in non-oxidizing environments.

<u>009.09D</u> Specific wastes which meet the conditions of Sections <u>009.09A</u> through <u>009.09C</u> of this Chapter (so long as they do not fail the test for Toxicity Characteristic for any other constituent, and do not fail the test for any other characteristics) are:

<u>009.09D1</u> Chrome (blue) trimmings generated by the following subcategories of the leather tanning and finishing industry; hair pulp/chrome tan/retan/wet finish; hair save/chrome tan/retan/wet finish; retan/wet finish; no beamhouse; through-the-blue; and shearling.

<u>009.09D2</u> Chrome (blue) shavings generated by the following subcategories of the leather tanning and finishing industry: Hair pulp/chrome tan/retan/wet

finish; hair save/chrome tan/retan/wet finish; retan/wet finish; no beamhouse; through-the-blue; and shearling.

<u>009.09D3</u> Buffing dust generated by the following subcategories of the leather tanning and finishing industry; hair pulp/chrome tan/retan/wet finish; hair save/chrome tan/retan/wet finish; retan/wet finish; no beamhouse; through-the-blue.

<u>009.09D4</u> Sewer screenings generated by the following subcategories of the leather tanning and finishing industry: Hair pulp/chrome tan/retan/wet finish; hair save/chrome tan/retan/wet finish; retan/wet finish; no beamhouse; through-the-blue; and shearling.

<u>009.09D5</u> Wastewater treatment sludges generated by the following subcategories of the leather tanning and finishing industry: Hair pulp/chrome tan/retan/wet finish; hair save/chrome tan/retan/wet finish; retan/wet finish; no beamhouse; through-the-blue; and shearling.

<u>009.09D6</u> Wastewater treatment sludges generated by the following subcategories of the leather tanning and finishing industry: Hair pulp/chrome tan/retan/wet finish; hair save/chrome tan/retan/wet finish; and through-the-blue.

<u>009.09D7</u> Waste scrap leather from the leather tanning industry, the shoe manufacturing industry, and other leather product manufacturing industries.

<u>009.09D8</u> Wastewater treatment sludges from the production of titanium dioxide pigment using chromium-bearing ores by the chloride process.

<u>009.10</u> Petroleum-contaminated media and debris that fail the test for the Toxicity Characteristic (Hazardous waste codes D018 through D043, only) and are subject to the corrective action regulations under 40 CFR Part 280 (RCRA Subtitle I - regulated underground storage tanks).

<u>009.11</u> Used chlorofluorocarbon refrigerants from totally enclosed heat transfer equipment, including mobile air conditioning systems, mobile refrigeration, and commercial and industrial air conditioning and refrigeration systems that use chlorofluorocarbons as the heat transfer fluid in a refrigeration cycle, provided the refrigerant is reclaimed for further use.

<u>009.12</u> Non-terne plated used oil filters that are not mixed with wastes listed in Chapter 3, <u>011</u> through <u>016</u> if these filters have been gravity hot-drained using one of the following methods:

- <u>009.12A</u> Puncturing the filter anti-drain back valve or the filter dome end and hot-draining;
- 009.12B Hot-draining and crushing;
- 009.12C Dismantling and hot-draining; or
- 009.12D Any other equivalent hot-draining method which will remove used oil.
- <u>009.12E</u> "Hot-drained" means that the oil filter is drained near engine operating temperature and above room temperature.
- <u>009.13</u> Leachate or gas condensate collected from landfills where certain solid wastes have been disposed, provided that:
  - <u>009.13A</u> The solid wastes disposed would meet one or more of the listing descriptions for Hazardous Waste Codes K169, K170, K171, K172, K174, K175, K176, K177, K178, and K181 if these wastes had been generated after the effective date of the listing;
  - <u>009.13B</u> The solid wastes described in Section <u>009.13A</u> were disposed prior to the effective date of this listing;
  - <u>009.13C</u> The leachate or gas condensate do not exhibit any characteristic of hazardous waste nor are derived from any other listed hazardous waste;
  - <u>009.13D</u> Discharge of the leachate or gas condensate, including leachate or gas condensate transferred from the landfill to a POTW by truck, rail, or dedicated pipe, is subject to regulation under sections 307(b) or 402 of the Clean Water Act.
  - <u>009.13E</u> As of February 13, 2001, leachate or gas condensate derived from K169-K172 is no longer exempt if it is stored or managed in a surface impoundment prior to discharge. As of November 21, 2003, leachate or gas condensate derived from K176, K177, and K178 is no longer exempt if it is stored or managed in a surface impoundment prior to discharge. After February 26, 2007, leachate or gas condensate derived from K181 will no longer be exempt if it is stored or managed in a surface impoundment prior to discharge. There is one exception: if the surface impoundment is used to temporarily store leachate or gas condensate in response to an emergency situation (e.g., shutdown of wastewater treatment system), provided the impoundment has a double liner, and provided the leachate or gas condensate is removed from the impoundment and continues to be managed in compliance with the conditions of this section after the emergency ends.
- <u>009.14</u> Solvent-contaminated wipes, except for wipes that are hazardous waste due to the presence of trichloroethylene, that are sent for disposal, provided they meet one or

more of the eligibility criteria in 40 CFR 260.10 and all of the specified conditions in 40 CFR 261.4(b)(18), revised as of July 1, 2014, which is adopted and incorporated by this reference.

<u>010</u> The following hazardous wastes are exempted from certain regulations:

<u>010.01</u> A hazardous waste which is generated in a product or raw material storage tank, a product or raw material transport vehicle or vessel, a product or raw material pipeline or in a manufacturing process unit or an associated non-waste-treatment manufacturing unit is not subject to this Title until it exits the unit in which it was generated, unless the unit is a surface impoundment, or unless the hazardous waste remains in the unit more than 90 days after the unit ceases to be operated for manufacturing, or for storage or transportation of product or raw materials.

# 011 Samples.

<u>011.01</u> Except as provided in Section <u>011.02</u> of this Chapter, a sample of solid waste or a sample of water, soil, or air, which is collected for the sole purpose of testing to determine its characteristics or composition, is not subject to any requirements of this Title when:

<u>011.01A</u> The sample is being transported to a laboratory for the purpose of testing; or

011.01B The sample is being transported to the sample collector after testing; or

<u>011.01C</u> The sample is being stored by the sample collector before transport to a laboratory for testing; or

011.01D The sample is being stored in a laboratory before testing; or

<u>011.01E</u> The sample is being stored in a laboratory after testing but before it is returned to the sample collector; or

<u>011.01F</u> The sample is being stored temporarily in a laboratory after testing for a specific purpose (for example, until conclusion of a court case or enforcement action where further testing of the sample may be necessary).

<u>011.02</u> In order to qualify for the exemption in Section <u>011.01A</u> and <u>011.01B</u> of this Chapter, a sample collector shipping samples to a laboratory and a laboratory returning samples to a sample collector must:

<u>011.02A</u> Comply with DOT, U. S. Postal Service (USPS), or any other applicable shipping requirements; or

<u>011.02B</u> Comply with the following requirements if the sample collector determines that DOT, USPS, and other shipping requirements do not apply to the shipment of the sample:

<u>011.02B1</u> Assure that the following information accompanies the sample:

<u>011.02B1(a)</u> The sample collector's name, mailing address, and telephone number;

<u>011.02B1(b)</u> The laboratory's name, mailing address and telephone number:

011.02B1(c) The quantity of the sample;

011.02B1(d) The date of the shipment; and

<u>011.02B1(e)</u> A description of the sample.

<u>011.02B2</u> Package the sample so that it does not leak, spill, or vaporize from its package.

<u>011.03</u> This exemption does not apply if the laboratory determines that the waste is hazardous but the laboratory is no longer meeting any of the conditions stated in Section <u>011.01</u> of this Chapter.

### 012 Treatability study samples.

<u>012.01</u> If the conditions and requirements of Section <u>012.02</u> of this Chapter, and of 40 CFR 261.4(e)(2) which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference, are met, persons who generate or collect samples for the purpose of conducting treatability studies as defined in Chapter 1, are not subject to the requirements of this Title, nor are such samples included in the quantity determinations of Chapters 8 through 10, when:

<u>012.01A</u> The sample is being collected and prepared for transportation by the generator or sample collector; or

<u>012.01B</u> The sample is being accumulated or stored by the generator or sample collector prior to transportation to a laboratory or testing facility; or

<u>012.01C</u> The sample is being transported to the laboratory or testing facility for the purpose of conducting a treatability study.

<u>012.02</u> The generator must report the information required under 40 CFR 261.4(e)(2)(v)(C), as incorporated by reference in Section <u>012.01</u> of this Chapter, in its biennial report.

<u>012.03</u> The Director may grant requests, on a case-by-case basis, for quantity limits in excess of those specified in 40 CFR 261.4(e)(2), as incorporated by reference in Section <u>012.01</u> of this Chapter, in accordance with the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 261.4(e)(3) which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

013 Samples undergoing treatability studies at laboratories and testing facilities.

<u>013.01</u> Samples undergoing treatability studies and the laboratory or testing facility conducting such treatability studies (to the extent such facilities are not otherwise subject to the requirements of this Title or the Federal Act) are not subject to any requirement of this Title provided that Sections <u>013.02</u> and <u>013.03</u> of this Chapter are met. A mobile treatment unit (MTU) may qualify as a testing facility subject to Section <u>013.02</u> and <u>013.03</u> of this Chapter. Where a group of MTUs are located at the same site, the limitations specified in Sections <u>013.02</u> and <u>013.03</u> of this Chapter apply to the entire group of MTUs collectively as if the group were one MTU.

<u>013.02</u> The facility must comply with the requirements of 40 CFR 261.4(f)(1) through (9) and (11) which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>013.03</u> The facility must determine whether any unused sample or residues generated by the treatability study are hazardous waste under Sections <u>004</u> through <u>007</u> of this Chapter and, if so, are subject to the requirements of this Title, unless the residues and unused samples are returned to the sample originator under the exemption of Section <u>012</u> of this Chapter.

014 Dredged material that is not a hazardous waste.

<u>014.01</u> Dredged material that is subject to the requirements of a permit that has been issued under 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1344) or section 103 of the Marine Protection, Research, and Sanctuaries Act of 1972 (33 U.S.C. 1413) is not a hazardous waste. For this section (014), the following definitions apply:

<u>014.01A</u> The term "dredged material" has the same meaning as defined in 40 CFR 232.2.

014.01B The term "permit" means:

<u>014.01B1</u> A permit issued by the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) or an approved State under section 404 of the Federal Water Pollution Control Act (33 U.S.C. 1344);

<u>014.01B2</u> A permit issued by the Corps under section 103 of the Marine Protection, Research, and Sanctuaries Act of 1972 (33 U.S.C. 1413); or

<u>014.01B3</u> In the case of Corps civil works projects, the administrative equivalent of the permits referred to in 014.01B1 and <u>014.01B2</u> of this section, as provided for in Corps regulations (for example, see 33 CFR 336.1, 336.2, and 337.6).

015 Residues of hazardous waste in empty containers.

<u>015.01</u> Any hazardous waste remaining in either an empty container or an inner liner removed from an empty container, as defined in Sections <u>015.03</u> through <u>015.05</u> of this Chapter, is not subject to this Title.

<u>015.02</u> Any hazardous waste in either a container that is not empty or an inner liner removed from a container that is not empty, as defined in Sections <u>015.03</u> through <u>015.05</u> of this Chapter, is subject to this Title.

<u>015.03</u> A container or an inner liner removed from a container that has held any hazardous waste, except a waste that is a compressed gas or that is identified as an acute hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, <u>012</u> or <u>016</u> is empty if:

<u>015.03A</u> All wastes have been removed that can be removed using the practices commonly employed to remove materials from that type of container, e.g., pouring, pumping, and aspirating; and

<u>015.03B</u> No more than 2.5 centimeters (one inch) of residue remain on the bottom of the container or inner liner; or

<u>015.03C</u> No more than 3 percent by weight of the total capacity of the container remains in the container or inner liner if the container is less than or equal to 119 gallons in size; or

<u>015.03D</u> No more than 0.3 percent by weight of the total capacity of the container remains in the container or inner liner if the container is greater than 119 gallons in size.

<u>015.04</u> A container that has held a hazardous waste that is a compressed gas is empty when the pressure in the container approaches atmospheric.

<u>015.05</u> A container or an inner liner removed from a container that has held an acute hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, 013 through 016 is empty if:

<u>015.05A</u> The container or inner liner has been triple rinsed using a solvent capable of removing the commercial chemical product or manufacturing chemical intermediate;

<u>015.05B</u> The container or inner liner has been cleaned by another method that has been shown in the scientific literature, or by tests conducted by the generator, to achieve equivalent removal; or

<u>015.05C</u> In the case of a container, the inner liner that prevented contact of the commercial chemical product or manufacturing chemical intermediate with the container, has been removed.

<u>016</u> The disposal of PCB-containing dielectric fluid and electrical equipment containing such fluid authorized for use and regulated under 40 CFR Part 761 and that are hazardous only because they fail the test for the Toxicity Characteristic (Hazardous waste codes D018 through D043, only) are exempt from this Title.

### Chapter 3 - IDENTIFICATION AND LISTING OF HAZARDOUS WASTE

<u>001</u> Criteria for identifying the characteristics of hazardous waste. The Council shall identify and define a characteristic of hazardous waste in Sections <u>005</u> through <u>010</u> of this Chapter upon determining that:

<u>001.01</u> A solid waste that exhibits the characteristic may:

<u>001.01A</u> Cause, or significantly contribute to, an increase in mortality or an increase in serious irreversible, or incapacitating reversible illness; or

<u>001.01B</u> Pose a substantial present or potential hazard to human or animal health or the environment when it is improperly treated, stored, transported, disposed of or otherwise managed; and

## 001.02 The characteristic can be:

<u>001.02A</u> Measured by an available standardized test method which is reasonably within the capability of generators of solid waste or private sector laboratories that are available to serve generators of solid waste; or

 $\underline{001.02B}$  Reasonably detected by generators of solid waste through their knowledge of their waste.

<u>002</u> The Council shall list a solid waste as a hazardous waste in Sections <u>011</u> through <u>016</u> of this Chapter only upon determining that the solid waste meets one of the following criteria:

<u>002.01</u> It exhibits any of the characteristics of hazardous waste identified in Sections <u>005</u> through 010 of this Chapter.

<u>002.02</u> It has been found to be fatal to humans in low doses or, in the absence of data on human toxicity, it has been shown in studies to have an oral lethal dose fifty percent (LD50) toxicity (rat) of less than 50 milligrams per kilogram, an inhalation lethal concentration fifty percent (LC50) toxicity (rat) of less than 2 milligrams per liter, or a dermal LD50 toxicity (rabbit) of less than 200 milligrams per kilogram or is otherwise capable of causing or significantly contributing to an increase in serious irreversible, or incapacitating reversible, illness. (Waste listed in accordance with the criteria herein shall be designated acute hazardous waste.)

<u>002.03</u> It contains any of the toxic constituents listed in Appendix I of this Title, and after considering the following factors, the Council concludes that the waste is capable of posing a substantial present or potential hazard to human health or the environment when improperly treated, stored, transported or disposed of, or otherwise managed:

- <u>002.03A</u> The nature of the toxicity presented by the constituent.
- 002.03B The concentration of the constituent in the waste.
- <u>002.03C</u> The potential of the constituent or any toxic degradation product of the constituent to migrate from the waste into the environment under the types of improper management considered in Section <u>002.03G</u> of this Chapter.
- <u>002.03D</u> The persistence of the constituent or any toxic degradation product of the constituent.
- <u>002.03E</u> The potential for the constituent or any toxic degradation product of the constituent to degrade into harmless constituents and the rate of degradation.
- <u>002.03F</u> The degree to which the constituent or any degradation product of the constituent bio-accumulates in ecosystems.
- <u>002.03G</u> The plausible types of improper management to which the wastes could be subjected.
- <u>002.03H</u> The quantities of the waste generated at individual generation sites.
- <u>002.031</u> The nature and severity of the human health and environmental damage that has occurred as a result of the improper management of wastes containing the constituent.
- <u>002.03J</u> Action taken by other governmental agencies or regulatory programs based on the health or environmental hazard posed by the waste or waste constituent.
- <u>002.03K</u> Such other factors as may be appropriate.
- <u>002.04</u> Substances will be listed in Appendix I only if they have been shown in scientific studies to have toxic, carcinogenic, mutagenic or teratogenic effects on humans or other life forms. (Wastes listed in accordance with the criteria of Sections <u>002.03</u> and <u>002.04</u> of this Chapter will be designated Toxic wastes.)
- <u>003</u> The Council may list classes or types of solid waste as hazardous waste if it has reason to believe that individual wastes, within the class or type of waste, typically or frequently are hazardous under the definition of hazardous waste found in the State Act.
- <u>004</u> The Council will use the criteria for listing specified in Section <u>002</u> of this Chapter to establish the exclusion limits referred to in Chapter 6.
- $\underline{005}$  A solid waste, as defined in Chapter 2,  $\underline{003}$  which is not excluded from regulation as hazardous waste under Chapter 2,  $\underline{009}$ , is a hazardous waste if it exhibits any of the characteristics identified in Sections  $\underline{006}$  through  $\underline{010}$  of this Chapter.

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<u>006</u> A hazardous waste which is identified by a characteristic in Sections <u>007</u> through <u>010</u> of this Chapter is assigned every DEQ/EPA Hazardous Waste Number that is applicable as set forth in Sections <u>007</u> through <u>010</u> of this Chapter. This number must be used in complying with Chapter 4, and recordkeeping and reporting requirements under this Title.

<u>006.01</u> For the purposes of Sections <u>005</u> through <u>010</u> of this Chapter, the Director will consider a sample obtained using any of the applicable sampling methods specified in Appendix I of 40 CFR Part 261, which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference, to be a representative sample within the meaning of Chapter 1.

## 007 Characteristic of ignitability.

<u>007.01</u> A solid waste exhibits the characteristic of ignitability if a representative sample of the waste has any of the following properties:

<u>007.01A</u> It is a liquid, other than an aqueous solution containing less than 24 percent alcohol by volume and has a flashpoint less than 60°C (140°F), as determined by a Pensky-Martens Closed Cup Tester, using the test method specified in ASTM Standard D-93-79, or D-93-80, as referenced in Chapter 1, <u>003</u> or a Setaflash Closed Cup Tester, using the test method specified in ASTM Standard D-3278-78, as referenced in Chapter 1, <u>003</u>.

<u>007.01B</u> It is not a liquid and is capable, under standard temperature and pressure, of causing fire through friction, absorption of moisture or spontaneous chemical changes and, when ignited, burns so vigorously and persistently that it creates a hazard.

<u>007.01C</u> It is an ignitable compressed gas, as defined in 49 CFR Part 173 and as determined by the test methods determined in that regulation (i.e., any material or mixture having in the container an absolute pressure exceeding 40 p.s.i. at 70°F or, regardless of the pressure at 70°F having an absolute pressure exceeding 104 p.s.i. at 130°F; or any liquid flammable material having a vapor pressure exceeding 40 p.s.i. absolute at 100°F as determined by ASTM Test D-323) or equivalent test methods as approved in accordance with Chapter 6.

<u>007.01D</u> An oxidizer is a substance such as a chlorate, permanganate, inorganic peroxide, or a nitrate, that yields oxygen readily to stimulate the combustion of organic matter.

<u>007.02</u> A solid waste that exhibits the characteristic of ignitability has the DEQ/EPA Hazardous Waste Number of D001.

### 008 Characteristic of corrosivity.

<u>008.01</u> A solid waste exhibits the characteristic of corrosivity if a representative sample of the waste has either of the following properties:

<u>008.01A</u> It is aqueous and has a pH less than or equal to 2 or greater than or equal to 12.5, as determined by a pH meter using Method 9040C in "Test Methods for

Evaluating Solid Waste, Physical/Chemical Methods" EPA Publication SW-846 as incorporated by reference in Chapter 1, <u>003</u>.

<u>008.01B</u> It is a liquid and corrodes steel (SAE 1020) at a rate greater than 6.35 mm (0.250 inch) per year at a test temperature of 55°C (130°F) as determined by Method 1110A in "Test Methods for Evaluating Solid Waste, Physical/Chemical Methods", EPA Publication SW-846 as incorporated by reference in Chapter 1, <u>003</u>.

<u>008.02</u> A solid waste that exhibits the characteristic of corrosivity has the DEQ/EPA Hazardous Waste Number of D002.

### 009 Characteristic of reactivity.

<u>009.01</u> A solid waste exhibits the characteristic of reactivity if a representative sample of the waste has any of the following properties:

<u>009.01A</u> It is normally unstable and readily undergoes violent change without detonating.

009.01B It reacts violently with water.

<u>009.01C</u> It forms potentially explosive mixtures with water.

<u>009.01D</u> When mixed with water, it generates toxic gases, vapors or fumes in a quantity sufficient to present a danger to human health or the environment.

<u>009.01E</u> It is a cyanide or sulfide bearing waste which, when exposed to pH conditions between 2 and 12.5 can generate toxic gases, vapors or fumes in a quantity sufficient to present a danger to human health or the environment.

<u>009.01F</u> It is capable of detonation or explosive reaction if it is subjected to a strong initiating source or it is heated under confinement.

<u>009.01G</u> It is readily capable of detonation or explosive decomposition or reaction at standard temperature and pressure.

<u>009.01H</u> It is a forbidden explosive or Class 1.1, 1.2, or 1.3 explosive as defined in 49 CFR Part 173.

<u>009.02</u> A solid waste that exhibits the characteristic of reactivity has the DEQ/EPA Hazardous Waste Number of D003.

### 010 Toxicity characteristic.

010.01 A solid waste (except manufactured gas plant waste) exhibits the characteristic of toxicity if, using the Toxicity Characteristic Leaching Procedure, Test Method 1311 in "Test Methods for Evaluating Solid Waste, Physical/Chemical Methods," EPA Publication SW-846, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 1, 003, the extract from a representative sample of the waste contains any of the contaminants listed in Table 3 of this Title which

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follows at concentrations equal to or greater than the respective value given in that Table. Where the waste contains less than 0.5 percent filterable solids, the waste itself, after filtering using the methodology outlined in Method 1311, is considered to be the extract for the purpose of this Chapter.

<u>010.02</u> A solid waste that exhibits the characteristic of toxicity, has the DEQ/EPA Hazardous Waste Number specified in Table 3 of this Title which follows and corresponds to the toxic contaminant causing it to be hazardous.

### 011 Lists of hazardous wastes.

<u>011.01</u> A solid waste is a hazardous waste if it is listed in Sections <u>011</u> through <u>016</u> of this Chapter unless it has been excluded from these lists under Chapter 6, <u>001</u> and <u>003</u>.

<u>011.02</u> The Council will indicate its basis for listing the classes or types of waste listed in Sections <u>013</u> through <u>016</u> of this Chapter by employing one or more of the following Hazard Codes:

Ignitable Waste	(I)
Corrosive Waste	(C)
Reactive Waste	(R)
Toxicity Characteristic Wastes	(E)
Acute Hazardous Waste	(H)
Toxic Waste	(T)

<u>011.03</u> Appendix II of this Title identifies the constituent which caused the Council to list the waste as a Toxicity Characteristic Waste (E) or Toxic Waste (T) in Sections <u>013</u> and <u>014</u> in this Chapter.

<u>012</u> Each hazardous waste listed in Sections <u>013</u> through <u>016</u> of this Chapter is assigned a DEQ/EPA Hazardous Waste Number which precedes the name of the waste. This number must be used in complying with the notification requirements of Chapter 4 and recordkeeping and reporting requirements under this Title. The following hazardous wastes listed in Sections <u>013</u> or <u>014</u> of this Chapter are subject to the exclusion limits for acute hazardous wastes established in Chapters 8, 9 and 10: DEQ/EPA Hazardous Wastes Nos. F020, F021, F022, F023, F026, and F027.

013 Hazardous waste from nonspecific sources.

<u>013.01</u> The following solid wastes are listed hazardous wastes from non-specific sources unless they are excluded under Chapter 6, and listed in Appendix III or Appendix IV.

High-rate aeration is a system of surface impoundments or tanks, in which intense mechanical aeration is used to completely mix the wastes, enhance biological activity, and (A) the units employ a minimum of 6 horsepower per million gallons of treatment volume; and either (B) the hydraulic retention time of the unit is no longer than 5 days; or (C) the hydraulic retention time is no longer than 30 days and the unit does not generate a sludge that is a hazardous waste by the Toxicity Characteristic.

<u>013.02B2</u> Generators and treatment, storage and disposal facilities have the burden of proving that their sludges are exempt from listing as F037 and F038 wastes under this definition. Generators and treatment, storage and disposal facilities must maintain, in their operating or other onsite records, documents and data sufficient to prove that: (A) the unit is an aggressive biological treatment unit as defined in Section <u>013.02B1</u> of this Chapter; and (B) the sludges sought to be exempted from the definitions of F037 and/or F038 were actually generated in the aggressive biological treatment unit.

<u>013.02C</u> For the purposes of the F037 listing, sludges are considered to be generated at the moment of deposition in the unit, where deposition is defined as at least a temporary cessation of lateral particle movement.

013.02D For the purposes of the F038 listing:

<u>013.02D1</u> Sludges are considered to be generated at the moment of deposition in the unit, where deposition is defined as at least a temporary cessation of lateral particle movement and:

<u>013.02D2</u> Floats are considered to be generated at the moment they are formed in the top of the unit.

<u>015.06</u> The phrase "commercial chemical product or manufacturing chemical intermediate having the generic name listed in ..." refers to a chemical substance which is manufactured or formulated for commercial or manufacturing use which consists of the commercially pure grade of the chemical, any technical grades of the chemical that are produced or marketed and all formulations in which the chemical is the sole active ingredient. It does not refer to a material, such as a manufacturing process waste, that contains any of the substances listed in paragraph <u>015</u> or <u>016</u>. Where a manufacturing process waste is deemed to be a hazardous waste because it contains a substance listed in paragraph <u>015</u> or <u>016</u>, such waste will be listed in either <u>013</u> or <u>014</u> or will be identified as a hazardous waste by the characteristics set forth in this Chapter.

<u>016</u> The commercial chemical products, manufacturing chemical intermediates or off-specification commercial chemical products referred to in Sections <u>015.01</u> through <u>015.04</u> of this Chapter, are identified as toxic wastes (T) unless otherwise designated and are subject to the small quantity generator exclusion defined in Chapter 8. These wastes and their corresponding DEQ/EPA Hazardous Waste Numbers are:

<u>017</u> Deletion of certain hazardous waste codes following equipment cleaning and replacement. The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 261.35, pertaining to wood preserving processes, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>018</u> Comparable/syngas fuel exclusion. Wastes that meet the comparable/syngas fuel requirements of 40 CFR 261.38 are not solid wastes. The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 261.38 are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>019</u> Conditional Exclusion for Used, Broken Cathode Ray Tubes (CRTs) and Processed CRT Glass Undergoing Recycling. Used, broken CRTs are not solid waste if they meet the following conditions:

<u>019.01</u> Prior to processing: These materials are not solid wastes if they are destined for recycling and if they meet the following requirements:

019.01A Storage. The broken CRTs must be either:

019.01A1 Stored in a building with a roof, floor, and walls, or

<u>019.01A2</u> Placed in a container (i.e., a package or a vehicle) that is constructed, filled, and closed to minimize releases to the environment of CRT glass (including fine solid materials).

<u>019.01B</u> Labeling. Each container in which the used, broken CRT is contained must be labeled or marked clearly with one of the following phrases: "Used cathode ray tube(s)-contains leaded glass" or "Leaded glass from televisions or computers." It must also be labeled: "Do not mix with other glass materials."

 $\underline{019.01C}$  Transportation. The used, broken CRTs must be transported in a container meeting the requirements of Sections  $\underline{019.01A2}$  and  $\underline{019.01B}$ , of this chapter.

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<u>019.01D</u> Speculative accumulation and use constituting disposal. The used, broken CRTs are subject to the limitations on speculative accumulation as defined in Chapter 2, Section <u>002.07</u>. If they are used in a manner constituting disposal, they must comply with the applicable requirements of Chapter 7, Section <u>007</u>, instead of the requirements of this section.

<u>019.01E</u> The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 261.39(a)(5) through 261.39(a)(5)(xi) pertaining to exports, revised as of July 1, 2015, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>019.02</u> Requirements for used CRT processing: Used, broken CRTs undergoing CRT processing as defined in Chapter 1 of this Title are not solid wastes if they meet the following requirements:

<u>019.02A</u> Storage. Used, broken CRTs undergoing processing are subject to the requirement of Section <u>019.01D</u> of this chapter.

### 019.02B Processing.

<u>019.02B1</u> All activities specified in Chapter 1, of the definition of "CRT processing" must be performed within a building with a roof, floor, and walls; and

<u>019.02B2</u> No activities may be performed that use temperatures high enough to volatilize lead from CRTs.

O19.03 Processed CRT glass sent to CRT glass making or lead smelting: Glass from used CRTs that is destined for recycling at a CRT glass manufacturer or a lead smelter after processing is not a solid waste unless speculatively accumulated as defined in Chapter 1 of this title.

<u>019.04</u> Use constituting disposal: Glass from used CRTs that is used in a manner constituting disposal must comply with the requirements of Chapter 7, Section <u>007</u>, instead of the requirements of this section.

- <u>020</u> Conditional exclusion for used, intact Cathode Ray Tubes (CRTs) exported for recycling. Used, intact CRTs exported for recycling are not solid wastes if they meet the notice and consent conditions incorporated by reference under Section <u>019.01E</u> of this chapter, and if they are not speculatively accumulated as defined in Chapter 2, Section <u>002.07</u> of this Title.
- <u>021</u> Notification and recordkeeping for used, intact Cathode Ray Tubes (CRTs) exported for reuse. The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 261.41, revised as of July 1, 2015, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- <u>022</u> Financial Requirements for Management of Excluded Hazardous Secondary Materials. The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 261, Subpart H, 261.140 through 261.151, revised as of July 1, 2009, are adopted and incorporated by this reference.

- Title 128 Department of Environmental Quality
- Chapter 4 DETERMINATION, NOTIFICATION, REPORTING AND RECORDKEEPING
- <u>001</u> Purpose, scope, and applicability. This Chapter establishes determinations, notifications, and reporting requirements for generators of hazardous waste. Chapter 9 establishes further requirements for small quantity generators. Chapter 10 establishes further requirements for large quantity generators. Section <u>003</u> of this Chapter also applies to transporters of hazardous waste and owners and operators of facilities for the treatment, storage or disposal of hazardous waste. Chapter 11 establishes further requirements for transporters. Chapters 21 (Permitted Facilities) and 22 Interim Status Facilities) establish further requirements for owners and operators of facilities for the treatment, storage, or disposal of hazardous waste. Chapter 25 establishes standards for universal waste management.
- $\underline{002}$  Hazardous waste determination. A person who generates a solid waste, as defined in Chapter 2,  $\underline{003}$  must determine if that waste is a hazardous waste using the following method:
  - $\underline{002.01}$  Determine if the waste is excluded from regulation by Chapter 2,  $\underline{008}$  through 014; then
  - $\underline{002.02}$  Determine if the waste is listed as a hazardous waste in Chapter 3,  $\overline{013}$  through 016.
  - $\underline{002.03}$  For the purposes of compliance with Chapter 20, or if the waste is not listed as a hazardous waste under Chapter 3,  $\underline{013}$  through  $\underline{016}$ , determine whether the waste is identified in Chapter 3, 005 through 010 by either:
    - $\underline{002.03A}$  Testing the waste according to the methods set forth in Chapter 3,  $\underline{005}$  through  $\underline{010}$ , or equivalent methods as approved in accordance with Chapter 6; or
    - $\frac{002.03B}{\text{in light}}$  Applying knowledge of the hazard characteristic of the waste
  - $\underline{002.04}$  If the waste is determined to be hazardous, the generator must refer to Chapters 2, 3, 7, 20 through 22, and 25 for possible exclusions or restrictions pertaining to management of the specific waste.
- <u>003</u> Notification of regulated waste activity. Not later than ninety days after the effective date of regulations promulgated under the State Act identifying by its characteristics or listing any substance as hazardous waste subject to these regulations, any person generating or transporting such hazardous waste, as defined in Chapter 2 and Chapter 3, or the owner or operator of a facility for treatment, storage or disposal of such hazardous waste shall file with the Department, on forms furnished by the Department, a notification stating the location and general description of such activity and the identified or listed hazardous wastes handled by such person, unless such person has already so filed such notification with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.
  - $\underline{003.01}$  A person filing with the Department shall obtain a DEQ/EPA Identification Number. Upon receiving the notification, the Director will assign such a number. A number previously assigned by EPA will satisfy this

requirement, and such number shall be known as DEQ/EPA Identification number.

 $\underline{003.02}$  Not later than thirty days after any change in the information or status of any person as described to the Department or EPA in Section  $\underline{003}$  of this Chapter, such person shall file an amended notification with the Department, except that generators voluntarily complying with all hazardous waste management requirements of a higher generator status are not required to renotify when their status drops to a lower level. If such change includes conducting activities at a location other than on-site, as defined in Chapter 1, the person shall obtain a new identification number as described in Section  $\underline{003.01}$  of this Chapter. Changes in hazardous waste codes are not subject to the renotification requirement.

#### 004 DEQ/EPA identification numbers and restrictions.

- $\underline{004.01}$  A generator must not treat, store, dispose of, transport, or offer for transportation, hazardous waste without having complied with Section  $\underline{003}$  of this Chapter.
- $\underline{004.02}$  A generator must not offer hazardous waste to transporters or to treatment, storage, or disposal facilities that have not notified in accordance with Section  $\underline{003}$  of this Chapter and received a DEQ/EPA identification number, or fulfilled an equivalent requirement of the EPA or an authorized state.
- $\underline{004.03}$  The owner or operator of a facility for the treatment, storage, or disposal of hazardous waste shall not accept waste without having complied with Section 003 of this Chapter.
- $\underline{004.04}$  A transporter of hazardous waste shall not accept hazardous waste for transport without having complied with Section 003 of this Chapter.
- 005 Reporting and recordkeeping.
  - 005.01 Biennial reports.
    - $\underline{005.01A}$  A generator who ships any hazardous waste off-site to a treatment, storage, or disposal facility within the United States and is subject to the requirements of Chapter 10 at any time during a calendar year must prepare and submit a Biennial Report for that Biennial reporting cycle, using forms furnished by DEQ, to the Director no later than March 1 of each even numbered year, and must include the following information:
      - $\underline{005.01A1}$  The EPA identification number, name, and address of the generator;
      - 005.01A2 The calendar year covered by the report;
      - $\frac{005.01 \text{A3}}{\text{each off-site}}$  The EPA identification number, name, and address for each off-site treatment, storage, or disposal facility in the United States to which waste was shipped during the year;
      - $\underline{005.01A4}$  The name and EPA identification number of each transporter used during the reporting year for shipments to a treatment, storage or disposal facility within the United States;

- $\underline{005.01A5}$  A description, EPA hazardous waste number (from 40 CFR part 261, subpart C or D), DOT hazard class, and quantity of each hazardous waste shipped off-site for shipments to a treatment, storage or disposal facility within the United States. This information must be listed by EPA identification number of each such off-site facility to which waste was shipped.
- $\frac{005.01\text{A6}}{\text{year}}$  A description of the efforts undertaken during the year to reduce the volume and toxicity of waste generated.
- $\frac{005.01\text{A7}}{\text{waste}}$  A description of the changes in volume and toxicity of waste actually achieved during the year in comparison to previous years to the extent such information is available for years prior to 1984.
- $\frac{005.01 \text{A8}}{\text{authorized}}$  The certification signed by the generator or authorized representative.
- $\frac{005.01B}{\text{waste}}$  Any generator who treats, stores, or disposes of hazardous waste on-site must submit a biennial report covering those wastes in accordance with the provisions of Chapters 7, 12, 14, 21, and 22.
- $\underline{005.01C}$  Reporting for exports of hazardous waste is not required on the generator biennial report form. A separate annual report requirement is set forth in 40 CFR 262.56.

#### 005.02 Exception reporting.

- $\underline{005.02A}$  A generator subject to the requirements of Chapter 10 who does not receive a copy of the manifest with the handwritten signature of the owner or operator of the designated facility within 35 days of the date the waste was accepted by the initial transporter must contact the transporter and/or the owner or operator of the designated facility to determine the status of the hazardous waste.
- $\underline{005.02B}$  A generator subject to the requirements of Chapter 10 must submit an Exception Report to the Director if a copy of the manifest with the handwritten signature of the owner or operator of the designated facility has not been received by the generator within 45 days of the date the waste was accepted by the initial transporter. The Exception Report must include:
  - $\frac{005.02B1}{does\ not}$  A legible copy of the manifest for which the generator does not have confirmation of delivery; and
  - $\frac{005.02B2}{\text{representative explaining the efforts taken to locate the hazardous waste and the results of those efforts.}$
- $\frac{005.02C}{1000}$  A generator subject to the requirements of Chapter 9 who does not receive a copy of the manifest with the handwritten signature of the owner or operator of the designated facility within 60 days of the date the waste was accepted by the initial transporter must submit a legible copy of the manifest, with some indication that the generator has not received confirmation of delivery, to the Director.

005.03 Recordkeeping. Generators must:

 $\underline{005.03 \text{A}}$  Keep a copy of each manifest signed in accordance with Chapter  $\overline{9}$ ,  $\underline{007.06}$  or Chapter 10,  $\underline{002}$  for three years or until the generator has received a signed copy from the designated facility which received the waste. This signed copy must be retained as a record for at least three years from the date the waste was accepted by the initial transporter.

 $\frac{005.03B}{\text{in accordance}}$  Keep a copy of each Biennial Report and Exception Report made in accordance with Sections  $\frac{005.01}{\text{s}}$  and  $\frac{005.02}{\text{d}}$  of this Chapter for a period of at least three years from the due date of the report.

 $\underline{005.03C}$  Keep records of any test results, waste analyses, or other determinations made in accordance with Section  $\underline{002}$  of this Chapter for at least three years from the date that the waste was last sent for onsite or off-site treatment, storage or disposal.

 $\frac{005.04}{\text{Chapter}}$  The periods of retention referred to in Section  $\frac{005.03}{\text{an unresolved}}$  of this Chapter are extended automatically during the course of an unresolved enforcement action regarding the regulated activity or as requested by the Director.

 $\frac{005.05}{\text{State}}$  Additional reporting. The Director, as deemed necessary under the State Act, may require generators to furnish reports concerning the quantities and disposition of wastes identified in Chapter 3,  $\frac{005}{100}$  through 010 or listed in Chapter 3, 013 through 016.

Title 128 - Department of Environmental Quality

Chapter 5 - VARIANCES

- 001 Non-waste determinations and variances from classification as a solid waste.
  - <u>001.01</u> In accordance with the standards and criteria in Sections <u>001.02</u> and <u>004</u> and the procedures in Section <u>003</u> of this Chapter, the Director may determine on a case-by-case basis that the following recycled materials are not solid wastes:
    - <u>001.01A</u> Materials that are accumulated speculatively without sufficient amounts being recycled (as defined in Chapter 2, <u>002.07</u>);
    - <u>001.01B</u> Materials that are reclaimed and then reused within the original production process in which they were generated;
    - <u>001.01C</u> Materials that have been reclaimed but must be reclaimed further before the materials are completely recovered.
    - <u>001.01D</u> Hazardous secondary materials that are reclaimed in a continuous industrial process; and
    - $\underline{001.01E}$  Hazardous secondary materials that are indistinguishable in all relevant aspects from a product or intermediate.
    - <u>001.01F</u> Hazardous secondary materials that are transferred for reclamation under Chapter 2, Section <u>008.26</u> and are managed at a verified reclamation facility or intermediate facility where the management of the hazardous secondary materials is not addressed under a RCRA Part B permit or interim status standards.
  - 001.02 Standards and criteria for variance from classification as a solid waste.
    - <u>001.02A</u> The Director may grant requests for a variance from classifying as a solid waste those materials that are accumulated speculatively without sufficient amounts being recycled if the applicant demonstrates that sufficient amounts of the material will be recycled or transferred for recycling in the following year. If a variance is granted, it is valid only for the following year, but can be renewed, on an annual basis, by filing a new application. The Director's decision will be based on the following criteria:
      - <u>001.02A1</u> The manner in which the material is expected to be recycled, when the material is expected to be recycled, and whether this expected disposition is likely to occur (for example, because of past practice, market factors, the nature of the material, or contractual arrangements for recycling);

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- <u>001.02A2</u> The reason that the applicant has accumulated the material for one or more years without recycling 75 percent of the volume accumulated at the beginning of the year;
- <u>001.02A3</u> The quantity of material already accumulated and the quantity expected to be generated and accumulated before the material is recycled;
- 001.02A4 The extent to which the material is handled to minimize loss; and
- 001.02A5 Other relevant factors.
- <u>001.03</u> The Director may grant requests for a variance from classifying as a solid waste those materials that are reclaimed and then reused as feedstock within the original primary production process in which the materials were generated if the reclamation operation is an essential part of the production process. This determination will be based on the following criteria:
  - <u>001.03A</u> How economically viable the production process would be if it were to use virgin materials, rather than reclaimed materials;
  - <u>001.03B</u> The prevalence of the practice on an industry-wide basis;
  - <u>001.03C</u> The extent to which the material is handled before reclamation to minimize loss;
  - <u>001.03D</u> The time periods between generating the material and its reclamation, and between reclamation and return to the original primary production process;
  - <u>001.03E</u> The location of the reclamation operation in relation to the production process;
  - <u>001.03F</u> Whether the reclaimed material is used for the purpose for which it was originally produced when it is returned to the original process, and whether it is returned to the process in substantially its original form;
  - 001.03G Whether the person who generates the material also reclaims it; and
  - 001.03H Other relevant factors.
- <u>001.04</u> The Director may grant requests for a variance from classifying as a solid waste those hazardous secondary materials that have been partially reclaimed but must be reclaimed further before recovery is completed, if the partial reclamation has produced a commodity-like material. A determination that a partially-reclaimed material for which the variance is sought is commodity-like will be based on whether the hazardous secondary material is legitimately recycled as specified in Section <u>009</u> of this Chapter and on whether all of the following decision criteria are satisfied:

- <u>001.04A</u> Whether the degree of partial reclamation the material has undergone is substantial as demonstrated by using a partial reclamation process other than the process that generated the hazardous waste;
- <u>001.04B</u> Whether the partially-reclaimed material has sufficient economic value that it will be purchased for further reclamation;
- <u>001.04C</u> Whether the partially-reclaimed material is a viable substitute for a product or intermediate produced from virgin or raw materials which is used in subsequent production steps;
- <u>001.04D</u> Whether there is a market for the partially-reclaimed material as demonstrated by known customer(s) who are further reclaiming the material (e.g., records of sales and/or contracts and evidence of subsequent use, such as bills of lading);
- <u>001.04E</u> Whether the partially-reclaimed material is handled to minimize loss.
- <u>001.05</u> The Director may grant requests for a variance from classifying as a solid waste those hazardous secondary materials that are transferred for reclamation under Chapter 2, Section 008.26 and are managed at a verified reclamation facility or intermediate facility where the management of the hazardous secondary materials is not addressed under a RCRA Part B permit or interim status standards. The Director's decision will be based on the following criteria:
  - <u>001.05A</u> The reclamation facility or intermediate facility must demonstrate that the reclamation process for the hazardous secondary materials is legitimate pursuant to Section 009 of this Chapter;
  - <u>001.05B</u> The reclamation facility or intermediate facility must satisfy the financial assurance condition in 40 CFR § 261.4(a)(24)(vi)(F), as adopted and incorporated by reference in Chapter 2, Section <u>008.26</u> of this Title;
  - <u>001.05C</u> The reclamation facility or intermediate facility must not be subject to a formal enforcement action in the previous three years and not be classified as a significant non-complier under RCRA Subtitle C, or must provide credible evidence that the facility will manage the hazardous secondary materials properly. Credible evidence may include a demonstration that the facility has taken remedial steps to address the violations and prevent future violations, or that the violations are not relevant to the proper management of the hazardous secondary materials;
  - <u>001.05D</u> The intermediate or reclamation facility must have the equipment and trained personnel needed to safely manage the hazardous secondary material and must meet emergency preparedness and response requirements under 40 CFR part 261 subpart M, as adopted and incorporated by reference in Chapter 3, Section <u>025</u> of this Title;
  - <u>001.05E</u> If residuals are generated from the reclamation of the excluded hazardous secondary materials, the reclamation facility must have the permits required (if any) to manage the residuals, have a contract with an appropriately permitted facility to

dispose of the residuals or present credible evidence that the residuals will be managed in a manner that is protective of human health and the environment, and

<u>001.05F</u> The intermediate or reclamation facility must address the potential for risk to proximate populations from unpermitted releases of the hazardous secondary material to the environment (i.e., releases that are not covered by a permit, such as a permit to discharge to water or air), which may include, but are not limited to, potential releases through surface transport by precipitation runoff, releases to soil and groundwater, wind-blown dust, fugitive air emissions, and catastrophic unit failures), and must include consideration of potential cumulative risks from other nearby potential stressors.

<u>002</u> Variance to be classified as a boiler. In accordance with the standards and criteria in Chapter 1, <u>013</u> and the procedures in Section <u>003</u> of this Chapter, the Director may determine on a case-by-case basis that certain enclosed devices using controlled flame combustion are boilers, even though they do not otherwise meet the definition of boiler contained in Chapter 1, <u>013</u> after considering the following criteria:

- <u>002.01</u> The extent to which the unit has provisions for recovering and exporting thermal energy in the form of steam, heated fluids, or heated gases;
- <u>002.02</u> The extent to which the combustion chamber and energy recovery equipment are of integral design;
- <u>002.03</u> The efficiency of energy recovery, calculated in terms of the recovered energy compared with the thermal value of the fuel;
- <u>002.04</u> The extent to which exported energy is utilized;
- <u>002.05</u> The extent to which the device is in common and customary use as a "boiler" functioning primarily to produce steam, heated fluids, or heated gases; and
- 002.06 Other factors, as appropriate.
- OO3 Procedures for variances from classification as a solid waste or to be classified as a boiler or for non-waste determinations. The Director will use the following procedures in evaluating applications for variances from classification as a solid waste, applications to classify particular enclosed controlled flame combustion devices as boilers, or applications for non-waste determinations:
  - <u>003.01</u> The applicant must apply to the Director for the variance or non-waste determination. The application must address the relevant criteria contained in Sections <u>001.02</u>, <u>002</u>, or <u>004</u> of this Chapter.
  - <u>003.02</u> The Director will evaluate the application and issue a draft notice tentatively granting or denying the application. Notification of this tentative decision will be provided by newspaper advertisement and radio broadcast in the locality where the recycler or boiler is located. The Director will accept comment on the tentative decision for 30 days, and may

also hold a public hearing upon request or at the Director's discretion. The Director will issue a final decision after receipt of comments and after the hearing (if any).

<u>003.03</u> In the event of a change in circumstances that affect how a hazardous secondary material meets the relevant criteria contained in Sections <u>001.02</u>, <u>002</u>, or <u>004</u> of this Chapter upon which a variance or non-waste determination has been based, the applicant must send a description of the change in circumstances to the Director. The Director may issue a determination that the hazardous secondary material continues to meet the relevant criteria of the variance or non-waste determination or may require the facility to re-apply for the variance or non-waste determination.

<u>003.04</u> Variances and non-waste determinations shall be effective for a fixed term not to exceed ten years. No later than six months prior to the end of this term, facilities must reapply for a variance or non-waste determination. If a facility re-applies for a variance or non-waste determination within six months, the facility may continue to operate under an expired variance or non-waste determination until receiving a decision on their re-application from the Director.

<u>003.05</u> Facilities receiving a variance or non-waste determination must provide notification as required by Section <u>008</u> of this Chapter.

004 Standards and criteria for non-waste determinations.

<u>004.01</u> An applicant may apply to the Director for a formal determination that a hazardous secondary material is not discarded and therefore not a solid waste. The determinations will be based on the criteria contained in Sections <u>004.02</u> and <u>004.03</u>, as applicable. If an application is denied, the hazardous secondary material might still be eligible for a solid waste variance or exclusion (for example, one of the solid waste variances under Section <u>001.02</u> of this Chapter). Determinations may also be granted by the State if the State is either authorized for this provision or if the following conditions are met:

<u>004.01A</u> The State determines the hazardous secondary material meets the criteria in Sections <u>004.02</u> and <u>004.03</u>, as applicable;

004.01B The State requests that EPA review its determination; and

004.01C EPA approves the State determination.

<u>004.02</u> The Director may grant a non-waste determination for hazardous secondary material which is reclaimed in a continuous industrial process if the applicant demonstrates that the hazardous secondary material is a part of the production process and is not discarded. The determination will be based on whether the hazardous secondary material is legitimately recycled as specified in Section <u>009</u> of this Chapter and on the following criteria:

<u>004.02A</u> The extent that the management of the hazardous secondary material is part of the continuous primary production process and is not waste treatment;

<u>004.02B</u> Whether the capacity of the production process would use the hazardous secondary material in a reasonable time frame and ensure that the hazardous

secondary material will not be abandoned (for example, based on past practices, market factors, the nature of the hazardous secondary material, or any contractual arrangements);

<u>004.02C</u> Whether the hazardous constituents in the hazardous secondary material are reclaimed rather than released to the air, water or land at significantly higher levels from either a statistical or from a health and environmental risk perspective than would otherwise be released by the production process; and

<u>004.02D</u> Other relevant factors that demonstrate the hazardous secondary material is not discarded, including why the hazardous secondary material cannot meet, or should not have to meet, the conditions of an exclusion under Chapter 2, Sections <u>003</u> or <u>008</u> of this Title.

<u>004.03</u> The Director may grant a non-waste determination for hazardous secondary material which is indistinguishable in all relevant aspects from a product or intermediate if the applicant demonstrates that the hazardous secondary material is comparable to a product or intermediate and is not discarded. The determination will be based on whether the hazardous secondary material is legitimately recycled as specified in Section <u>009</u> of this Chapter and on the following criteria:

<u>004.03A</u> Whether market participants treat the hazardous secondary material as a product or intermediate rather than a waste (for example, based on the current positive value of the hazardous secondary material, stability of demand, or any contractual arrangements);

<u>004.03B</u> Whether the chemical and physical identity of the hazardous secondary material is comparable to commercial products or intermediates;

<u>004.03C</u> Whether the capacity of the market would use the hazardous secondary material in a reasonable time frame and ensure that the hazardous secondary material will not be abandoned (for example, based on past practices, market factors, the nature of the hazardous secondary material, or any contractual arrangements);

<u>004.03D</u> Whether the hazardous constituents in the hazardous secondary material are reclaimed rather than released to the air, water or land at significantly higher levels from either a statistical or from a health and environmental risk perspective than would otherwise be released by the production process; and

<u>004.03E</u> Other relevant factors that demonstrate the hazardous secondary material is not discarded, including why the hazardous secondary material cannot meet, or should not have to meet, the conditions of an exclusion under Chapter 2, Sections <u>003</u> or <u>008</u> of this Title.

005 Additional regulation of certain hazardous waste recycling activities on a case-by-case basis.

<u>005.01</u> The Director may decide on a case-by-case basis that persons accumulating or storing the recyclable materials described in Chapter 7, <u>003.04</u> should be regulated under Chapter 7, <u>004</u> through <u>006</u>. The basis for this decision is that the materials are being

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accumulated or stored in a manner that does not protect human health and the environment because the materials or their toxic constituents have not been adequately contained, or because the materials being accumulated or stored together are incompatible. In making this decision the Director will consider the following factors:

<u>005.01A</u> The types of materials accumulated or stored and the amount accumulated or stored:

005.01B The method of accumulation or storage;

<u>005.01C</u> The length of time the materials have been accumulated or stored before being reclaimed;

<u>005.01D</u> Whether any contaminants are being released into the environment, or are likely to be so released; and

005.01E Other relevant factors.

<u>005.02</u> The procedures for this decision are set forth in Section <u>006</u> of this Chapter.

<u>006</u> Procedures for case-by-case regulation of hazardous waste recycling activities. The Director will use the following procedures when determining whether to regulate hazardous waste recycling activities described in Chapter 7, <u>003.04</u> under the provisions of Chapter 7, <u>004</u> through <u>006</u> rather than under the provisions of Chapter 7, <u>011</u>:

<u>006.01</u> If a generator is accumulating the waste, the Director will issue a notice setting forth the factual basis for the decision and stating that the person must comply with the applicable requirements of Chapters 4, 9, and 10. The notice will become final in 30 days, unless the person served requests a public hearing to challenge the decision. Upon receiving such a request, the Director will hold a public hearing. The Director will provide notice of the hearing to the public and allow public participation at the hearing. The Director will issue a final order after the hearing stating whether or not compliance with Chapters 4, 9, and 10 is required. The order becomes effective 30 days after service of the decision unless the Director specifies a later date.

<u>006.02</u> If the person is accumulating the recyclable material as a storage facility, the notice will state that the person must obtain a permit in accordance with all applicable provisions of Chapters 12 through 15. The owner or operator of the facility must apply for a permit within no less than 60 days and no more than six months of notice, as specified in the notice. If the owner or operator of the facility wishes to challenge the Director's decision, the challenge may be stated in the permit application, in a public hearing held on the draft permit, or in comments filed on the draft permit or on the notice of intent to deny the permit. The fact sheet accompanying the permit will specify the reasons for the Director's determination. The question of whether the Director's decision was proper will remain open for consideration during the public comment period and in any subsequent hearing.

<u>007</u> Variances from a treatment standard specified in Chapter 20.

<u>007.01</u> Based on a petition filed by a generator or treater of hazardous waste, the Director may approve a site-specific variance from an applicable treatment standard specified in Chapter 20 if:

<u>007.01A</u> It is not physically possible to treat the waste to the level specified in the treatment standard, or by the method specified as the treatment standard. To show that this is the case, the petitioner must demonstrate that because the physical or chemical properties of the waste differ significantly from waste analyzed in developing the treatment standard, the waste cannot be treated to the specified level or by the specified method; or

<u>007.01B</u> It is inappropriate to require the waste to be treated to the level specified in the treatment standard or by the method specified as the treatment standard, even though such treatment is technically possible. To show that this is the case, the petitioner must either demonstrate that:

<u>007.01B1</u> Treatment to the specified level or by the specified method is technically inappropriate (for example, resulting in combustion of large amounts of mildly contaminated environmental media where the treatment standard is not based on combustion of such media); or

<u>007.01B2</u> For remediation waste only, treatment to the specified level or by the specified method is environmentally inappropriate because it would likely discourage aggressive remediation.

<u>007.01C</u> For contaminated soil only, treatment to the level or by the method specified in the soil treatment standards would result in concentrations of hazardous constituents that are below (i.e., lower than) the concentrations necessary to minimize short- and long-term threats to human health and the environment. Treatment variances approved under this paragraph must:

<u>007.01C1</u> At a minimum, impose alternative land disposal restriction treatment standards that, using a reasonable maximum exposure scenario:

<u>007.01C1(a)</u> For carcinogens, achieve constituent concentrations that result in the total excess risk to an individual exposed over a lifetime generally falling within a range from 10<sup>-4</sup> to 10<sup>-6</sup>; and

<u>007.01C1(b)</u> For constituents with non-carcinogenic effects, achieve constituent concentrations that an individual could be exposed to on a daily basis without appreciable risk of deleterious effect during a lifetime.

007.01C2 Not consider post-land-disposal controls.

<u>007.01D</u> For contaminated soil only, treatment to the level or by the method specified in the soil treatment standards would result in concentrations of hazardous constituents that are below (i.e., lower than) natural background concentrations at the site where the contaminated soil will land disposed.

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- <u>007.01E</u> Public notice and a reasonable opportunity for public comment must be provided before granting or denying a petition.
- <u>007.02</u> Each application for a site-specific variance from a treatment standard must include the information in Chapter 6, <u>001.02A</u> through <u>001.02D</u>.
- <u>007.03</u> After receiving an application for a site-specific variance from a treatment standard, the Director may request any additional information or samples which may be required to evaluate the application.
- <u>007.04</u> A generator, treatment facility, or disposal facility that is managing a waste covered by a site-specific variance from a treatment standard must comply with the waste analysis requirements for restricted wastes found under Chapter 20, 005.
- <u>007.05</u> During the application review process, the applicant for a site-specific variance must comply with all restrictions on land disposal under Chapter 20 once the effective date for the waste has been reached.
- <u>007.06</u> For all variances, the petitioner must also demonstrate that compliance with any given treatment variance is sufficient to minimize threats to human health and the environment posed by land disposal of the waste. In evaluating this demonstration, the Department may take into account whether a treatment variance should be approved if the subject waste is to be used in a manner constituting disposal pursuant to Chapter 7, <u>007.01</u> through <u>007.04</u>.
- <u>008</u> Notification requirement for hazardous secondary materials.
  - <u>008.01</u> Hazardous secondary material generators, tolling contractors, toll manufacturers, reclaimers, and intermediate facilities managing hazardous secondary materials which are excluded from regulation under Chapter 2, Sections <u>008.25</u> and <u>008.26</u>, must send a notification prior to operating under the exclusion(s) and by March 1 of each even numbered year thereafter to the Director using EPA Form 8700-12 that includes the following information:
    - 008.01A The name, address, and EPA ID number (if applicable) of the facility;
    - 008.01B The name and telephone number of a contact person:
    - 008.01C The NAICS code of the facility;
    - <u>008.01D</u> The regulation under which the hazardous secondary materials will be managed;
    - <u>008.01E</u> When the facility began or expects to begin managing the hazardous secondary materials in accordance with the regulation;
    - <u>008.01F</u> A list of hazardous secondary materials that will be managed according to the regulation (reported as the EPA hazardous waste numbers that would apply if the hazardous secondary materials were managed as hazardous wastes);

<u>008.01G</u> For each hazardous secondary material, whether the hazardous secondary material, or any portion thereof, will be managed in a land-based unit;

<u>008.01H</u> The quantity of each hazardous secondary material to be managed annually; and

<u>008.011</u> The certification (included in EPA Form 8700-12) signed and dated by an authorized representative of the facility.

<u>008.02</u> If a facility managing hazardous secondary materials has submitted a notification, but then subsequently stops managing hazardous secondary materials in accordance with the regulation(s) listed above, the facility must notify the Director within thirty (30) days using EPA Form 8700-12. For purposes of this section, a facility has stopped managing hazardous secondary materials if the facility no longer generates, manages and/or reclaims hazardous secondary materials under the regulation(s) above and does not expect to manage any amount of hazardous secondary materials for at least 1 year.

<u>009</u> Legitimate recycling of hazardous secondary materials.

<u>009.01</u> Recycling of hazardous secondary materials for the purpose of the exclusions or exemptions from the hazardous waste regulations must be legitimate. Hazardous secondary material that is not legitimately recycled is discarded material and is a solid waste. In determining if their recycling is legitimate, persons must address all the requirements of this paragraph.

<u>009.01A</u> Legitimate recycling must involve a hazardous secondary material that provides a useful contribution to the recycling process or to a product or intermediate of the recycling process. The hazardous secondary material provides a useful contribution if it:

009.01A1 Contributes valuable ingredients to a product or intermediate; or

009.01A2 Replaces a catalyst or carrier in the recycling process; or

 $\underline{009.01A3}\,$  Is the source of a valuable constituent recovered in the recycling process; or

009.01A4 Is recovered or regenerated by the recycling process; or

<u>009.01A5</u> Is used as an effective substitute for a commercial product.

<u>009.01B</u> The recycling process must produce a valuable product or intermediate. The product or intermediate is valuable if it is:

009.01B1 Sold to a third party; or

<u>009.01B2</u> Used by the recycler or the generator as an effective substitute for a commercial product or as an ingredient or intermediate in an industrial process.

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<u>009.01C</u> The generator and the recycler must manage the hazardous secondary material as a valuable commodity when it is under their control. Where there is an analogous raw material, the hazardous secondary material must be managed, at a minimum, in a manner consistent with the management of the raw material or in an equally protective manner. Where there is no analogous raw material, the hazardous secondary material must be contained. Hazardous secondary materials that are released to the environment and are not recovered immediately are discarded.

<u>009.01D</u> The product of the recycling process must be comparable to a legitimate product or intermediate:

<u>009.01D1</u> Where there is an analogous product or intermediate, the product of the recycling process is comparable to a legitimate product or intermediate if:

<u>009.01D1(a)</u> The product of the recycling process does not exhibit a hazardous characteristic (as defined in Chapter 3, Sections 005 through 010) that analogous products do not exhibit, and

<u>009.01D1(b)</u> The concentrations of any hazardous constituents found in Appendix I of this Title that are in the product or intermediate are at levels that are comparable to or lower than those found in analogous products or at levels that meet widely-recognized commodity standards and specifications, in the case where the commodity standards and specifications include levels that specifically address those hazardous constituents.

<u>009.01D2</u> Where there is no analogous product, the product of the recycling process is comparable to a legitimate product or intermediate if:

<u>009.01D2(a)</u> The product of the recycling process is a commodity that meets widely recognized commodity standards and specifications (e.g., commodity specification grades for common metals), or

<u>009.01D2(b)</u> The hazardous secondary materials being recycled are returned to the original process or processes from which they were generated to be reused (e.g., closed loop recycling).

<u>009.01D3</u> If the product of the recycling process has levels of hazardous constituents that are not comparable to or unable to be compared to a legitimate product or intermediate per paragraph <u>009.01D1</u> or <u>009.01D2</u> of this section, the recycling still may be shown to be legitimate, if it meets the following specified requirements. The person performing the recycling must conduct the necessary assessment and prepare documentation showing why the recycling is, in fact, still legitimate. The recycling can be shown to be legitimate based on lack of exposure from toxics in the product, lack of the bioavailability of the toxics in the product, or other relevant considerations which show that the recycled product does not contain levels of hazardous constituents that pose a significant human health or environmental risk. The documentation must include a certification

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statement that the recycling is legitimate and must be maintained on-site for three years after the recycling operation has ceased. The person performing the recycling must notify the Director of this activity using EPA Form 8700-12.

### 001 General.

- $\underline{001.01}$  Any person may petition the Council to modify or revoke any provision of this Title. Title 115, Rules of Practice and Procedure, Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality, sets forth general requirements which apply to all such petitions. Section  $\underline{002}$  of this Chapter sets forth additional requirements to add a testing or analytical method to this Title. Section  $\underline{003}$  sets forth additional requirements for petitions to exclude a waste at a particular facility from Chapter 2,  $\underline{004}$  through  $\underline{007}$  or the lists of hazardous wastes in Chapter 3, 011 through  $\underline{016}$ .
- $\underline{001.02}$  Each petition must be submitted to the Council through the Director by certified mail and must include:
  - 001.02A The petitioner's name and address;
  - $\frac{001.02B}{action;}$  A statement of the petitioner's interest in the proposed
  - $\underline{001.02C}$  A description of the proposed action, including (where appropriate) suggested regulatory language; and
  - $\frac{001.02D}{action}$  A statement of the need and justification for the proposed action, including supporting tests, studies, or other information.
- $\frac{001.03}{\text{accordance}}$  Decisions, hearings and notices regarding such petitions will be in
- 002 Petitions for equivalent testing or analytical methods.
  - $\underline{002.01}$  Any person seeking to add a testing or analytical method different from those authorized in this Title may petition the Council for a regulatory amendment under Section  $\underline{001.01}$  of this Chapter. To be successful, the person must demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Council, that the proposed method is equal to or superior to the corresponding method prescribed in this Title, in terms of its sensitivity, accuracy and precision (i.e., reproducibility).
  - $\underline{002.02}$  Each petition must include, in addition to the information required by Section  $\underline{001.02}$  of this Chapter:
    - $\underline{002.02A}$  A full description of the proposed method, including all procedural steps and equipment used in the method;
    - $\underline{002.02B}$  A description of the types of wastes or waste matrices for which the proposed method may be used;
    - $\underline{002.02C}$  Comparative results obtained from using the proposed method with those obtained from using the relevant or corresponding methods prescribed in these regulations;

- $\frac{002.02D}{\text{limit}}$  An assessment of any factors which may interfere with, or  $\frac{1}{1}$  which was of, the proposed method; and
- $\underline{002.02E}$  A description of the quality control procedures necessary to ensure the sensitivity, accuracy and precision of the proposed method.
- $\underline{002.03}$  After receiving a petition for an equivalent method, the Director or the Council may request any additional information on the proposed method which may reasonably be required to evaluate the method.
- $\frac{003}{fac}$  Petition to amend Chapter 3 to exclude a waste at a particular generating
  - $\underline{003.01}$  Any person seeking to exclude a waste at a particular generating facility from Chapter 3,  $\underline{011}$  through  $\underline{016}$  may petition for a regulatory amendment under Section  $\underline{001.01}$  of this Chapter. To be successful:
    - $\underline{003.01A}$  The petitioner must demonstrate to the satisfaction of the  $\underline{\text{Council}}$  that the waste produced by a particular generating facility does not meet any of the criteria under which the waste was listed as a hazardous or an acutely hazardous waste; and
    - 003.01B The procedures in this Chapter may also be used to petition the Council for a regulatory amendment to exclude a waste which is described in these Sections and is either a waste listed in Chapter 3, 011 through 016, or is derived from a waste listed in Chapter 3, 011 through 016. This exclusion may only be issued for a particular generating, storage, treatment, or disposal facility. The petitioner must make the same demonstration as required by 003.01A of this section. Where the waste is a mixture of solid waste and one or more listed hazardous wastes or is derived from one or more hazardous wastes, the demonstration must be made with respect to the waste mixture as a whole; analyses must be conducted for not only those constituents for which the listed waste contained in the mixture was listed as hazardous, but also for factors (including additional constituents) that could cause the waste mixture to be a hazardous waste. A waste which is also excluded may still be a hazardous waste by operation of Chapter 3, 007 through 010.
  - $\underline{003.02}$  If the waste is listed with codes "I", "C", "R", or "E" in Chapter 3, 013 through 016:
    - $\underline{003.02A}$  The petitioner must show that the waste does not exhibit the relevant characteristic for which the waste was listed as defined in Chapter 3,  $\underline{007}$  through  $\underline{010}$ , using any applicable methods prescribed therein. The petitioner also must show that the waste does not exhibit any of the other characteristics defined in Chapter 3,  $\underline{007}$  through  $\underline{010}$ , using any applicable methods prescribed therein.
    - $\underline{003.02B}$  Based on a complete application the Council must determine where it has a reasonable basis to believe that factors (including additional constituents) other than those for which the waste was listed could cause the waste to be hazardous waste, that such factors do not warrant retaining the waste as a hazardous waste. A waste which is so excluded, however, still may be a hazardous waste by operation of Chapter 3, 005 through 010.

- 003.03 If the waste is listed with code "T" in Chapter 3, 013 through 016
  - 003.03A The petitioner must demonstrate that the waste:
    - $\frac{003.03 \text{Al}}{\text{defined}}$  Does not contain the constituent or constituents (as  $\frac{1}{1}$  defined in Appendix II of this Title) that caused the Council to list the waste; or
    - $\underline{003.03A2}$  Although containing one or more of the hazardous constituents as defined in Appendix II that caused the Council to list the waste, does not meet the criterion of Chapter 3,  $\underline{002.03}$  when considering the factors used by the Council in Chapter 3,  $\underline{002.03}$  through  $\underline{002.03K}$  under which the waste was listed as hazardous.
  - $\frac{003.03B}{\text{where it}}$  Based on a complete application, the Council must determine, where it has a reasonable basis to believe that factors (including additional constituents) other than those for which the waste was listed could cause the waste to be a hazardous waste, that such factors do not warrant retaining the waste as a hazardous waste.
  - $\frac{003.03C}{\text{exhibit}}$  The petitioner must demonstrate that the waste does not  $\frac{1}{1000}$  exhibit any of the characteristics defined in Chapter 3,  $\frac{1}{1000}$  through 010, using any applicable methods prescribed therein; and
  - $\underline{003.03D}$  A waste which is so excluded, however, still may be a hazardous waste by operation of Chapter 3,  $\underline{005}$  through  $\underline{010}$ .
- $\frac{003.04}{016}$  If the waste is listed with the code "H" in Chapter 3,  $\frac{013}{}$  through
  - $\underline{003.04A}$  The petitioner must demonstrate that the waste does not meet the criterion of Chapter 3, 002.03;
  - $\frac{003.04B}{\text{where it}}$  Based on a complete application, the Council must determine, where it has a reasonable basis to believe that additional factors (including additional constituents) other than those for which the waste was listed could cause the waste to be a hazardous waste, that such factors do not warrant retaining the waste as a hazardous waste;
  - $\underline{003.04C}$  The petitioner must demonstrate that the waste does not exhibit any of the characteristics defined in Chapter 3,  $\underline{007}$  through  $\underline{010}$ , using any applicable methods prescribed therein; and
  - $\underline{003.04D}$  A waste which is so excluded, however, still may be a hazardous waste by operation of Chapter 3,  $\underline{005}$  through  $\underline{010}$ .

- Title 128 Department of Environmental Quality
- Chapter 7 REQUIREMENTS FOR RECYCLABLE MATERIALS AND STANDARDS FOR MANAGEMENT OF SPECIFIC HAZARDOUS WASTES AND SPECIFIC TYPES OF HAZARDOUS WASTE MANAGEMENT FACILITIES
- <u>001</u> Hazardous wastes that are recycled are subject to the requirements for generators, transporters, and storage facilities of Sections <u>004</u> through <u>006</u> of this Chapter except for the materials listed in Sections <u>002</u> and <u>003</u> of this Chapter. Hazardous wastes that are recycled will be known as "recyclable materials." Certain hazardous wastes as defined by Title 128, Chapter 25 may be managed under the universal waste requirements of Chapter 25.
- 002 The following materials are exempt from Chapter 4 and Chapters 7 through 23:
  - <u>002.01</u> Industrial ethyl alcohol that is reclaimed except that, unless provided otherwise in an international agreement as specified in 40 CFR Part 262, Subpart E, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 10, <u>006</u>:
    - <u>002.01A</u> A person initiating a shipment for reclamation in a foreign country, and any intermediary arranging for the shipment, must comply with the requirements applicable to a primary exporter in 40 CFR 262.53, 262.56(a)(1)-(4), (6), and (b), and 262.57, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 10, <u>006</u> export such materials only upon consent of the receiving country and in conformance with the EPA Acknowledgment of Consent for defined in Subpart E of 40 CFR Part 262, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 10, <u>006</u> and provide a copy of the EPA Acknowledgment of Consent to the shipment to the transporter transporting the shipment for export;
    - <u>002.01B</u> Transporters transporting a shipment for export may not accept a shipment if the transporter knows the shipment does not conform to the EPA Acknowledgment of Consent, must ensure that a copy of the EPA Acknowledgment of Consent accompanies the shipment and must ensure that it is delivered to the facility designated by the person initiating the shipment.
  - <u>002.02</u> Used oil that exhibits one or more of the characteristics of hazardous waste but is recycled in some manner that meets the requirements under Sections <u>009</u> and <u>010</u> of this Chapter;
  - <u>002.03</u> Scrap metal that is not excluded under Chapter 2, <u>008.14</u>;
  - <u>002.04</u> Fuels produced from the refining of oil-bearing hazardous wastes along with normal process streams at a petroleum refining facility if such wastes result from normal petroleum refining, production, and transportation practices (this exemption does not apply to fuels produced from oil recovered from oil-bearing hazardous waste, where such recovered oil is already excluded under Chapter 2, <u>008.12</u>);

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- <u>002.05</u> Hazardous waste fuel produced from oil-bearing hazardous wastes from petroleum refining, production, or transportation practices, or produced from oil reclaimed from such hazardous wastes, where such hazardous wastes are reintroduced into a process that does not use distillation or does not produce products from crude oil so long as the resulting fuel meets the used oil specification under Section <u>010.01E</u> of this Chapter and so long as no other hazardous wastes are used to produce the hazardous waste fuel.
- <u>002.06</u> Hazardous waste fuel produced from oil-bearing hazardous waste from petroleum refining, production, and transportation practices, where such hazardous wastes are reintroduced into a refining process after a point at which contaminants are removed so long as the fuel meets the used oil fuel specification under Section <u>010.01E</u> of this Chapter.
- <u>002.07</u> Oil reclaimed from oil-bearing hazardous wastes from petroleum refining, production, and transportation practices, which reclaimed oil is burned as a fuel without reintroduction to a refining process, so long as the reclaimed oil meets the used oil fuel specification under Section 010.01E of this Chapter.
- <u>003</u> The following recyclable materials are regulated under Sections <u>007</u> through <u>012</u> of this Chapter and all applicable provisions in Chapters 12 through 15:
  - <u>003.01</u> A recyclable material used in a manner constituting disposal;
  - <u>003.02</u> Hazardous wastes burned for energy recovery in boilers and industrial furnaces that are not regulated as incinerators under Chapters 21 or 22;
  - <u>003.03</u> Used oil that exhibits one or more of the characteristics of hazardous waste and is burned for energy recovery in boilers and industrial furnaces that are not regulated under Chapters 21 or 22;
  - 003.04 Recyclable materials from which precious metals are reclaimed; and
  - 003.05 Spent lead-acid batteries that are being reclaimed.
- <u>004</u> Generators and transporters of recyclable materials are subject to the applicable requirements of Chapters 9 (Small Quantity Generators), 10 (Large Quantity Generators) and 11 (Transporters) and the notification requirements of Chapter 4 except as provided in Sections <u>002</u> and <u>003</u> of this Chapter.
- <u>005</u> Owners and operators of facilities that store recyclable materials before they are recycled are regulated under all applicable provisions of Chapters 12 through 15, Chapter 20, Sections <u>001</u> through <u>012</u> and Sections <u>019</u> through <u>020</u> of Chapters 21 and 22, and the notification requirements of Chapter 4 except as provided in Sections <u>002</u> and <u>003</u> of this Chapter. The recycling process itself is exempt from regulation except as provided in Section <u>005.01</u> of this Chapter.

<u>005.01</u> Owners or operators of facilities subject to RCRA permitting requirements with hazardous waste management units that recycle hazardous wastes are subject to the requirements of Sections <u>019</u> and <u>020</u> of Chapters 21 or 22.

<u>006</u> Owners or operators of facilities that recycle recyclable materials without storing them before they are recycled are subject to the following requirements, except as provided in Sections <u>002</u> and <u>003</u> of this Chapter:

006.01 Notification requirements of Chapter 4;

<u>006.02</u> Requirements dealing with the use of the manifest and manifest discrepancies 40 CFR 265.71 and 265.72, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, <u>005</u>; and

006.03 Section 005.01 of this Chapter.

<u>007</u> Recyclable materials used in a manner constituting disposal.

007.01 Applicability.

<u>007.01A</u> The regulations of Section <u>007</u> of this Chapter apply to recyclable materials that are applied to or placed on the land:

007.01A1 Without mixing with any other substance(s); or

<u>007.01A2</u> After mixing or combination with any other substance(s). These materials will be referred to as "materials used in a manner that constitutes disposal."

<u>007.01B</u> Products produced for the general public's use that are used in a manner that constitutes disposal and that contain recyclable materials are not presently subject to regulation if the recyclable materials have undergone a chemical reaction in the course of producing the products so as to become inseparable by physical means and if such products meet the applicable treatment standards in Chapter 20, Sections <u>009</u> through <u>013</u>, (or applicable prohibition levels in 40 CFR 268.32 as incorporated by reference in Chapter 20, or Section 3004(d) of the Federal Act, where no treatment standards have been established) for each recyclable material (i. e. hazardous waste) that they contain.

<u>007.01C</u> Anti-skid/deicing uses of slags, which are generated from high temperature metals recovery (HTMR) processing of hazardous waste K061, K062, and F006, in a manner constituting disposal are not covered by the exemption in Section 007.01B of this Chapter and remain subject to regulation.

<u>007.01D</u> Fertilizers that contain recyclable materials are not subject to regulation provided that:

<u>007.01D1</u> They are zinc fertilizers excluded from the definition of solid waste according to Chapter 2, Section <u>008.21</u>; or

<u>007.01D2</u> They meet the applicable treatment standards in Chapter 20 of this Title for each hazardous waste that they contain.

<u>007.02</u> Generators and transporters of materials that are used in a manner that constitutes disposal are subject to the applicable requirements of Chapters 9, 10, and 11 and the notification requirements of Chapter 4.

<u>007.03</u> Owners or operators of facilities that store recyclable materials that are to be used in a manner that constitutes disposal, but who are not the ultimate users of the materials, are regulated under all applicable provisions of Chapters 12 through 15 (Permitting), 21 (Permitted Facilities) or 22 (Interim Status Facilities) and the notification requirement under Chapter 4.

<u>007.04</u> Standards applicable to users of materials that are used in a manner that constitutes disposal.

<u>007.04A</u> Owners or operators of facilities that use recyclable materials in a manner that constitutes disposal are regulated under all applicable provisions of Chapters 12 through 15, 20, 21 and 22 and the notification requirement under Chapter 4. (These requirements do not apply to products which contain these recyclable materials under the provisions of Section <u>007.01B</u> of this Chapter.)

<u>007.04B</u> The use of waste or used oil or other material, which is contaminated with dioxin or any other hazardous waste (other than a waste identified solely on the basis of ignitability), for dust suppression or road treatment is prohibited.

<u>007.04C</u> The use of used oil as a dust suppressant is prohibited.

008 Hazardous waste burned in boilers and industrial furnaces.

008.01 Applicability.

<u>008.01A</u> The regulations of Sections <u>008</u> of this Chapter apply to hazardous waste burned or processed in a boiler or industrial furnace (as defined in Chapter 1), irrespective of the purpose of burning or processing, except as provided in Sections <u>008.01B</u> and <u>008.01C</u> of this Chapter. In Section <u>008</u> of this Chapter, the term "burn" means burning for energy recovery or destruction, or processing for materials recovery or as an ingredient. The emission standards of this Section apply to facilities operating under interim status or under a RCRA operating permit.

<u>008.01B</u> The following hazardous wastes and facilities are not subject to regulation in Section <u>008</u> of this Chapter:

<u>008.01B1</u> Used oil burned for energy recovery that is also a hazardous waste solely because it exhibits a characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>. Such used oil is subject to regulation under Section <u>009</u> <u>010</u> of this Chapter, rather than this Section;

<u>008.01B2</u> Gas recovered from hazardous or solid waste landfills when such gas is burned for energy recovery;

<u>008.01B3</u> Hazardous wastes that are exempt from regulation under Chapter 2, Sections <u>008</u> through <u>013</u>, and Sections <u>002.04</u> through <u>002.07</u> of this Chapter, and hazardous wastes that are subject to special requirements for conditionally exempt small quantity generators under Chapter 8 of this Title; and

<u>008.01B4</u> Coke ovens, if the only hazardous waste burned is DEQ/EPA Hazardous Waste No. K087, decanter tank tar sludge from coking operations.

<u>008.01C</u> The applicability and conditions of 40 CFR 266.100(b) and (d) through(h), pertaining to owners and operators, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

# 008.02 Management prior to burning.

<u>008.02A</u> Generators of hazardous waste that is burned in a boiler or industrial furnace are subject to Chapters 9 and 10.

<u>008.02B</u> Transporters of hazardous waste that is burned in a boiler or industrial furnace are subject to Chapter 11.

<u>008.02C</u> The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 266.101(c), pertaining to owners and operators of storage facilities, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>008.03</u> The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 266.102 through 266.112 and all of Part 266 Appendices are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>009</u> Used Oil Management. Used oil that is recycled includes any used oil which is reused, following its original use, for any purpose (including the purpose for which the oil was originally used). Such term includes, but is not limited to, oil which is re-refined, reclaimed, burned for energy recovery, or reprocessed.

<u>009.01</u> Materials containing or otherwise contaminated with used oil. Except as provided in Section <u>009.02</u> of this chapter, materials containing or otherwise contaminated with used oil from which the used oil has been properly drained or removed to the extent possible such that no visible signs of free-flowing oil remain in or on the material:

009.01A Are not used oil and are not subject to this chapter, and

009.01B If applicable, are subject to the hazardous waste regulations of this Title.

<u>009.02</u> Materials containing or otherwise contaminated with used oil that are burned for energy recovery are subject to regulation as used oil under this chapter.

<u>009.03</u> Used oil drained or removed from materials containing or otherwise contaminated with used oil is subject to regulation as used oil under this chapter.

<u>009.04</u> Used oil storage requirements for used oil generators.

<u>009.04A</u> Containers and aboveground tanks used to store used oil at generator facilities must be:

<u>009.04A1</u> In good condition (no severe rusting, apparent structural defects or deterioration); and

009.04A2 Not leaking (no visible leaks).

<u>009.04A3</u> For containers and aboveground tanks with a volume of 25 gallons or greater, they must be labeled or marked clearly with the words "Used Oil."

010 Used oil burned for energy recovery.

# 010.01 Applicability.

<u>010.01A</u> The regulations of Section <u>010</u> of this Chapter apply to used oil that is burned for energy recovery in any boiler or industrial furnace that is not regulated under Chapters 21 or 22 except as provided by Sections <u>010.01C</u> and <u>010.01E</u> of this Chapter. Such used oil is termed "used oil fuel." Used oil fuel includes any fuel produced from used oil by processing, blending, or other treatment.

010.01B "Used oil" is defined in Chapter 1.

<u>010.01C</u> Except as provided by Section <u>010.01D</u> of this Chapter, used oil that is mixed with hazardous waste and burned for energy recovery is subject to regulation as hazardous waste fuel under Section <u>008</u> of this Chapter. Used oil containing more than 1000 ppm of total halogens is presumed to be a hazardous waste because it has been mixed with halogenated hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>016</u>. Persons may rebut this presumption by demonstrating that the used oil does not contain hazardous waste (for example, by showing that the used oil does not contain significant concentrations of halogenated hazardous constituents listed in Appendix I).

 $\underline{010.01D}$  Used oil burned for energy recovery is subject to regulation under Section  $\underline{010}$  of this Chapter herein rather than as hazardous waste fuel under Section  $\underline{008}$  of this Chapter if it is a hazardous waste solely because it:

<u>010.01D1</u> Exhibits a characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>, provided that it is not mixed with a hazardous waste; or

<u>010.01D2</u> Contains hazardous waste generated only by a person subject to the special requirements for conditionally exempt small quantity generators under Chapter 8.

<u>010.01E</u> Except as provided by Section <u>010.01C</u> of this Chapter, used oil burned for energy recovery, and any fuel produced from used oil by processing, blending, or other treatment, is subject to regulation under Section <u>010</u> of this Chapter, unless it is shown not to exceed any of the allowable levels of the constituents and properties in the specification shown in the following table. Used oil fuel that meets the specification is subject only to the analysis and recordkeeping requirements under Sections <u>010.04B1</u> and <u>010.04B6</u>. Used oil fuel that exceeds any specification level is termed "off-specification used oil fuel."

# 010.02 Prohibitions.

<u>010.02A</u> A person may market off-specification used oil for energy recovery only:

<u>010.02A1</u> To burners or other marketers who have notified DEQ, EPA or an authorized state for the same purpose, of their used oil management activities stating the location and general description of such activities, and who have a DEQ/EPA identification number or identification number issued by EPA or an authorized state for the same purpose; and

<u>010.02A2</u> To burners who burn the used oil in an industrial furnace or boiler identified in Section <u>010.02B</u> of this Chapter.

<u>010.02B</u> Off-specification used oil may be burned for energy recovery in only the following devices:

010.02B1 Industrial furnaces identified in Chapter 1, and

010.02B2 Boilers as defined in Chapter 1, that are identified as follows:

<u>010.02B2(a)</u> Industrial boilers located on the site of a facility engaged in a manufacturing process where substances are transformed into new

<sup>&</sup>lt;sup>b</sup>Used oil containing more than 1,000 ppm total halogens is presumed to be a hazardous waste under the rebuttable presumption provided under Section <u>010.01C</u> of this Chapter. Such used oil is subject to Section <u>008</u> of this Chapter rather than Section <u>010</u> of this Chapter, when burned for energy recovery unless the presumption of mixing can be successfully rebutted.

products, including the component parts of products, by mechanical or chemical processes;

<u>010.02B2(b)</u> Utility boilers used to produce electric power, steam, or heated or cooled air or other gases or fluids for sale; or

<u>010.02B2(c)</u> Used oil-fired space heaters provided that the heater burns only used oil that the owner or operator generates or used oil received from do-it-yourself oil changers who generate used oil as household waste; the heater is designed to have a maximum capacity of not more than 0.5 million Btu per hour; and the combustion gases from the heater are vented to the ambient air in compliance with Title 129.

<u>010.03</u> Standards applicable to generators of used oil burned for energy recovery.

<u>010.03A</u> Except as provided in Sections <u>010.03B</u> and <u>010.03C</u> of this Chapter, generators of used oil are not subject to Section 010 of this Chapter.

<u>010.03B</u> Generators who market used oil directly to a burner are subject to Section <u>010.04</u> of this Chapter.

<u>010.03C</u> Generators who burn used oil are subject to Section <u>010.05</u> of this Chapter.

010.04 Standards applicable to marketers of used oil burned for energy recovery.

<u>010.04A</u> Persons who market used oil fuel are termed "marketers." Except as provided below, marketers include generators who market used oil fuel directly to a burner, persons who receive used oil from generators and produce, process, or blend used oil fuel from these used oils (including persons sending blended or processed used oil to brokers or other intermediaries), and persons who distribute but do not process or blend used oil fuel. The following persons are not marketers subject to Section 010 of this Chapter.

<u>010.04A1</u> Used oil generators, and collectors who transport used oil received only from generators, unless the generator or collector markets the used oil directly to a person who burns it for energy recovery. However, persons who burn some used oil fuel for purposes of processing or other treatment to produce used oil fuel for marketing are considered to be burning incidentally to processing. Thus, generators and collectors who market to such incidental burners are not marketers subject to Section <u>010</u> of this Chapter; and

<u>010.04A2</u> Persons who market only used oil fuel that meets the specification under Section <u>010.01E</u> of this Chapter and who are not the first person to claim the oil meets the specification (i.e., marketers who do not receive used oil from generators or initial transporters and marketers who neither receive nor market off-specification used oil fuel).

010.04B Marketers are subject to the following requirements:

<u>010.04B1</u> Analysis of used oil fuel. Used oil fuel is subject to regulation under Section <u>010</u> of this Chapter, unless the marketer obtains analyses or other information documenting that the used oil fuel meets the specification provided under Section <u>010.01E</u> of this Chapter.

 $\underline{010.04B2}$  Prohibitions. The prohibitions under Section  $\underline{010.02A}$  of this Chapter;

<u>010.04B3</u> Notification. Notification to DEQ stating the location and general description of used oil management activities. Even if a marketer has previously notified of hazardous waste management activities and obtained a DEQ/EPA Identification Number, the marketer must renotify to identify used oil management activities;

<u>010.04B4</u> Invoice system. When a marketer initiates a shipment of offspecification used oil, the marketer must prepare and send the receiving facility an invoice containing the following information:

010.04B4(a) An invoice number;

<u>010.04B4(b)</u> The marketer's DEQ/EPA identification number and the DEQ/EPA identification number, or identification number issued by EPA or an authorized state for the same purpose, of the receiving facility;

<u>010.04B4(c)</u> The names and addresses of the shipping and receiving facilities;

010.04B4(d) The quantity of off-specification used oil to be delivered;

010.04B4(e) The date(s) of shipment or delivery; and

<u>010.04B4(f)</u> The following statement: "This used oil is subject to DEQ regulation under Title 128, Chapter 7."

## 010.04B5 Required notices.

<u>010.04B5(a)</u> Before a marketer initiates the first shipment of off-specification used oil to a burner or other marketer, the marketer must obtain a one-time written and signed notice from the burner or other marketer certifying that the burner or other marketer has notified DEQ, another authorized state or EPA stating the location and general description of used oil management activities, and if the recipient is a burner, the burner will burn the off-specification used oil only in an industrial furnace or boiler identified in Section <u>010.02B</u> of this Chapter, or as identified in an equivalent regulation of EPA or an authorized state.

<u>010.4B5(b)</u> Before a marketer accepts the first shipment of offspecification used oil from another marketer subject to the requirements of Section <u>010.04</u> of this Chapter, the marketer must provide the other marketer with a one-time written and signed notice certifying that the marketer has notified DEQ of his used oil management activities; and

<u>010.04B6</u> Recordkeeping. Used oil fuel that meets the specification.

<u>010.04B6(a)</u> A marketer who first claims under Section <u>010.04B1</u> specification must keep copies of analysis (or other information used to make the determination) of used oil for three years. Such marketers must also record in an operating log and keep for three years information on each shipment of used oil fuel that meets the specification. Such information shall include the name and address of the facility receiving the shipment, the quantity of used oil fuel delivered, the date of shipment or delivery, and a cross-reference to the record of used oil analysis required herein. Such used oil fuel is not subject to further regulation, unless it is subsequently mixed with hazardous waste or unless it is mixed with used oil so that it no longer meets the specification.

<u>010.04B6(b)</u> Off-specification used oil fuel. A marketer who receives or initiates an invoice under the requirements of Section <u>010.04</u> of this Chapter, must keep a copy of each invoice for three years from the date the invoice is received or prepared. In addition, a marketer must keep a copy of each certification notice received or sent for three years from the date of last engaging in an off-specification used oil fuel marketing transaction with the person who sends or receives the certification notice.

<u>010.05</u> Standards applicable to burners of used oil burned for energy recovery. Owners and operators of facilities that burn used oil fuel are "burners" and are subject to the following requirements:

010.05A Prohibition. The prohibition under Section 010.02B of this Chapter.

<u>010.05B</u> Notification. Burners of off-specification used oil fuel, and burners of used oil fuel who are the first to claim that the oil meets the specification provided under Section <u>010.01E</u> of this Chapter, except burners who burn specification oil that they generate, must notify DEQ stating the location and general description of used oil management activities. Burners of used oil fuel that meets the specification who receive such oil from a marketer that previously notified DEQ, EPA or an authorized state are not required to notify. Owners and operators of used oil-fired space heaters that burn used oil fuel under the provisions of Section <u>010.02B2</u> are exempt from this notification requirement. Even if a burner has previously notified DEQ or EPA of hazardous waste management activities and obtained an identification number, the burner must renotify to identify used oil management activities.

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<u>010.05C</u> Required Notices. Before a burner accepts the first shipment of offspecification used oil fuel from a marketer, the burner must provide the marketer a one-time written and signed notice certifying that:

<u>010.05C1</u> The burner has notified DEQ stating the location and general description of used oil management activities; and

<u>010.05C2</u> The burner will burn the used oil only in an industrial furnace or boiler identified in Section <u>010.02B</u> of this Chapter.

010.05D Used oil fuel analysis.

<u>010.05D1</u> Used oil fuel burned by the generator is subject to regulation under Section 0<u>10</u> of this Chapter, unless the burner obtains analysis (or other information) documenting that the used oil meets the specification provided under Section <u>010.01E</u> of this Chapter.

<u>010.05D2</u> Burners who treat off-specification used oil fuel by processing, blending, or other treatment to meet the specification provided under Section <u>010.01E</u> of this Chapter must obtain analyses (or other information) documenting that the used oil meets the specification.

<u>010.05E</u> Recordkeeping. A burner who receives an invoice under the requirements of Section <u>010.05</u> of this Chapter, must keep a copy of each invoice for three years from the date the invoice is received. Burners must also keep for three years copies of analyses of used oil fuel as may be required by Section <u>010.05D</u> of this Chapter. In addition, the burner must keep a copy of each certification notice sent to a marketer for three years from the date of last receiving off-specification used oil from that marketer.

<u>011</u> Recyclable materials utilized for precious metal recovery.

<u>011.01</u> Applicability and scope. The regulations of Section <u>011</u> of this Chapter, apply to recyclable materials that are reclaimed to recover economically significant amounts of gold, silver, platinum, palladium, iridium, osmium, rhodium, ruthenium, or any combination of these.

<u>011.02</u> Persons who generate, transport, or store recyclable materials that are regulated in Section <u>011</u> of this Chapter are subject to the following requirements:

011.02A Notification requirements under Chapter 4; and

<u>011.02B</u> Applicable requirements of the manifest system in Chapters 9, 10, 11, or 15.

<u>011.03</u> Persons who store recycled materials that are regulated under Section <u>011</u> of this Chapter, must keep the following records to document that they are not accumulating these materials speculatively (as defined in Chapter 2, <u>002</u>):

<u>011.03A</u> Records showing the volume of these materials stored at the beginning of the calendar year;

<u>011.03B</u> The amount of these materials generated or received during the calendar year; and

<u>011.03C</u> The amount of materials remaining at the end of the calendar year.

<u>011.04</u> Recyclable materials that are regulated in Section <u>011</u> of this Chapter that are accumulated speculatively are subject to all applicable provisions of Chapters 4, 9 through 19, 21 and 22.

012 Spent lead-acid batteries being reclaimed.

<u>012.01</u> Are spent lead-acid batteries exempt from hazardous waste management requirements? If you generate, collect, transport, store, or regenerate lead-acid batteries for reclamation purposes, you may be exempt from certain hazardous waste management requirements. Use the following table to determine which requirements apply to you. Alternatively, you may choose to manage your spent lead-acid batteries under the "Universal Waste" provisions under Chapter 25.

<u>012.02</u> If I store spent lead-acid batteries before I reclaim them but not through regeneration, which requirements apply? The requirements of Section <u>012.02</u> apply to you if you store spent lead-acid batteries before you reclaim them, but you don't reclaim then through regeneration. The requirements are slightly different depending on your RCRA permit status.

<u>012.02A</u> For Interim Status Facilities, you must comply with:

012.02A1 Notification requirements under Chapter 4, Section 003.

012.02A2 All applicable provisions in Chapter 22, Section 001 of this Title.

<u>012.02A3</u> All applicable provisions in subpart B of part 265, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, Section <u>002</u> of this Title except 265.13 (waste analysis).

<u>012.02A4</u> All applicable provisions in Chapters 17 and 18 of this Title.

<u>012.02A5</u> All applicable provisions in subpart E of part 265, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, Section <u>005</u> of this Title except 265.71 and 265.72 (dealing with the use of the manifest and manifest discrepancies).

012.02A6 All applicable provisions in subparts F through L of part 265, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, Sections 006 through 012 of this Title.

012.02A7 All applicable provisions in Chapters 12 through 15 of this Title.

012.02B For Permitted Facilities.

012.02B1 Notification requirements under Chapter 4, Section 003 of this Title.

012.02B2 All applicable provisions in Chapter 21, Section 001 through 001.05 of this Title.

012.02B3 All applicable provisions in subpart B of part 264, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, Section 002 of this Title (but not 264.13 (waste analysis)).

012.02B4 All applicable provisions in Chapters 17 and 18 of this Title.

012.02B5 All applicable provisions in subpart E of part 264, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, Section 005 of this Title (but not 264.71 or 264.72 (dealing with the use of the manifest and manifest discrepancies).

013 Conditional exemption for low-level mixed waste storage, treatment, transportation and disposal.

013.01 The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 266, Subpart N, 266.210 through 266.360, pertaining to the conditional exemption for low-level mixed waste storage. treatment, transportation and disposal, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

- $\underline{002}$  Except for those wastes exceeding the exclusion level (as identified in Section  $\underline{005}$  of this Chapter) and wastes destined to be burned for energy recovery (as identified in Section  $\underline{006.036}$  of this Chapter), a conditionally exempt small quantity generator's hazardous wastes are not subject to regulation under this Title, provided the generator complies with the requirements of Sections  $\underline{006}$  and  $\underline{007}$  of this Chapter.
- $\frac{003}{\text{include}}$  When making the quantity determinations of this Title, the generator must  $\frac{1}{\text{include}}$  all hazardous waste that it generates, except hazardous waste that:
  - $\underline{003.01}$  Is exempt from regulation under Chapter 2, Sections  $\underline{010}$  through  $\overline{013},~\overline{015.01},~016,$  or Chapter 7, Section 002; or
  - $\underline{003.02}$  Is managed immediately upon generation only in on-site elementary  $\overline{\text{neutralization}}$  units, wastewater treatment units, or totally enclosed treatment facilities as defined in Chapter 1; or
  - $\frac{003.03}{\text{site process subject to regulation under Chapter 7, Section 006; or}$
  - $\frac{003.04}{002.02}$ ; or Section anaged under the requirements of Chapter 7, Section
  - $\underline{003.05}$  Is spent lead-acid batteries managed under the requirements of Chapter 7, Section 012; or
  - 003.06 Is universal waste managed under Chapter 25.
- $\frac{004}{\text{not}}$  In determining the quantity of hazardous waste generated, a generator need  $\frac{1}{100}$ 
  - $\frac{004.01}{\text{it was}}$  Hazardous waste when it is removed from on-site storage as long as
  - $\frac{004.02}{\text{reclamation}}$  Hazardous waste produced by on-site treatment (including reclamation) of the generator's hazardous waste, so long as the hazardous waste that is treated was counted once; or
  - $\frac{004.03}{\text{reused}}$  Spent materials that are generated, reclaimed, and subsequently reused on-site, so long as such spent materials have been counted once.
- $\underline{005}$  If a generator generates acute hazardous waste in a calendar month, in  $\overline{\text{quantities}}$  greater than set forth below, all quantities of that acute hazardous waste are subject to full regulation under Chapter 10 and the notification requirements of Chapter 4.

- $\underline{005.01}$  A total of one kilogram of acute hazardous wastes listed in Chapter  $\overline{3}$ ,  $\overline{013}$  through  $\overline{016}$  and
- $\underline{005.02}$  A total of 100 kilograms of any residue or contaminated soil, waste, or other debris resulting from the clean-up of a spill, into or on any land or water, of any acute hazardous wastes listed in Chapter 3,  $\underline{013}$  through 016.
- $\underline{006}$  In order for hazardous waste and acute hazardous waste generated by a conditionally exempt small quantity generator to be excluded from regulation under Chapters 9 and 10, the generator must comply with the following requirements:
  - 006.01 The hazardous waste determination requirement in Chapter 4, 002.
  - 006.02 The conditionally exempt small quantity generator may accumulate hazardous waste and acute hazardous waste on-site. If the generator accumulates, at any time, more than a total of 1,000 kilograms of hazardous waste, or acute hazardous waste in quantities greater than those set forth in 005.01 or 005.02 of this Chapter, all of those accumulated wastes are subject to regulation under Chapter 9 (or Chapter 10 for acute hazardous waste), and the notification requirements of Chapter 4. The time period of Chapter 9, 007.03 or Chapter 10, 004.01 begins when the accumulated wastes exceed the applicable exclusion limit.
  - $\frac{006.03}{\text{dispose}}$  A conditionally exempt small quantity generator may either treat or dispose of their excluded hazardous waste in an on-site facility, or ensure delivery to an off-site storage, treatment, or disposal facility, either of which, if located in the U.S., is:
    - $\underline{006.03A}$  Permitted under Chapters 12 through 15 or by the EPA or a state other than Nebraska with a hazardous waste management program approved by EPA; or,
    - $\frac{006.03B}{003}$  Authorized to operate with interim status under Chapter 12,  $\frac{003}{003}$  or by the EPA or a state other than Nebraska with a hazardous waste management program approved by EPA; or,
    - 006.03C Permitted, licensed or registered by DEQ to manage municipal solid waste and, if managed in a municipal solid waste landfill, the landfill is subject to Title 132 Integrated Solid Waste Management Regulations, if located in Nebraska, or 40 CFR Part 258 (pertaining to RCRA Subtitle D Landfills) if located outside of Nebraska or,
    - $\underline{006.03D}$  Permitted, licensed or registered by DEQ to manage non-municipal non-hazardous waste and, if managed in a non-municipal nonhazardous waste disposal unit, is subject to the requirements in 40 CFR 257.5 through 257.30 if located outside of Nebraska\*; or

## 006.03E A facility which:

- $\frac{006.03E1}{\text{or reclaims}}$  Beneficially uses or re-uses, or legitimately recycles
- $\frac{006.03E2}{legitima}$  Treats its waste prior to beneficial use or re-use, or  $\frac{legitima}{legitima}$  recycling or reclamation.

 $\frac{006.03F}{\text{waste handler}}$  For universal waste managed under Chapter 25, a universal waste handler or destination facility subject to the requirements of Chapter 25.

 $\underline{006.03G}$  If a conditionally exempt small quantity generator's hazardous waste is mixed with used oil, the mixture is subject to Chapter 7,  $\underline{010}$  if it is destined to be burned for energy recovery. Any material produced from such a mixture by processing, blending, or other treatment, is also so regulated if it is destined to be burned for energy recovery.

 $\underline{007}$  Hazardous waste subject to the reduced requirements of this Chapter may be mixed with non-hazardous waste and remain subject to these reduced requirements even though the resultant mixture exceeds the quantity limitations identified in this Chapter, unless the mixture meets any of the characteristics of hazardous wastes identified in Chapter 3,  $\underline{005}$  through  $\underline{010}$ .

 $\underline{008}$  If a person mixes a solid waste with a hazardous waste that exceeds a quantity exclusion level of this Chapter, the mixture is subject to Chapters 9 or 10.

\*Note: Pursuant to Title 132, hazardous waste from conditionally exempt small quantity generators may not be disposed in non-municipal, nonhazardous landfills located in Nebraska.

- Chapter 9 REQUIREMENTS FOR SMALL QUANTITY GENERATORS OF HAZARDOUS WASTE
- 001 Applicability.
  - $\frac{001.01}{\text{a total}}$  A small quantity generator is one who generates in a calendar month a total quantity of hazardous waste greater than 100 kilograms and less than 1,000 kilograms. Small quantity generators are subject to this Chapter.
  - $\underline{001.02}$  A generator who treats, stores or disposes of hazardous waste onsite must comply with Chapter 4,  $\underline{002}$  through  $\underline{004}$ ,  $\underline{005.03C}$ ,  $\underline{005.04}$ , and  $\underline{005.05}$ , Sections  $\underline{007.03}$  and  $\underline{007.04}$  of this Chapter, and, if applicable, Chapter 10,  $\underline{007}$ . A generator who treats, stores, or disposes hazardous waste onsite must also comply with all other applicable chapters of this Title.
- $\underline{002}$  When making the quantity determinations of this Title, the generator must include all hazardous waste that it generates, except hazardous waste that:
  - $\underline{002.01}$  Is exempt from regulation under Chapter 2, Sections  $\underline{010}$  through  $\underline{013}$ ,  $\underline{015.01}$ ,  $\underline{016}$ , or Chapter 7, Section  $\underline{002}$ ; or
  - $\underline{002.02}$  Is managed immediately upon generation only in on-site elementary neutralization units, wastewater treatment units, or totally enclosed treatment facilities as defined in Chapter 1; or
  - $\underline{002.03}$  Is recycled, without prior storage or accumulation, only in an onsite process subject to regulation under Chapter 7, Section  $\underline{006}$ ; or
  - $\frac{002.04}{002.02}$  Is used oil managed under the requirements of Chapter 7, Section 002.02; or
  - $\underline{002.05}$  Is spent lead-acid batteries managed under the requirements of Chapter 7, Section 012; or
  - 002.06 Is universal waste managed under Chapter 25.
- $\underline{003}$  In determining the quantity of hazardous waste generated, a generator need  $\overline{\text{not}}$  include:
  - $\frac{003.01}{\text{it is counted once;}}$  Hazardous waste when it is removed from on-site storage as long as
  - $\frac{003.02}{\text{reclamation}}$  Hazardous waste produced by on-site treatment (including reclamation) of hazardous waste, so long as the hazardous waste that is treated was counted once; or
  - $\underline{003.03}$  Spent materials that are generated, reclaimed, and subsequently reused on-site, so long as such spent materials have been counted once.
- $\underline{004}$  If a small quantity generator generates acute hazardous waste in a calendar month, in quantities greater than set forth below, all quantities of that acute hazardous waste are subject to full regulation under Chapter 10 and the notification requirements of Chapter 4.

- $\underline{004.01}$  A total of one kilogram of acute hazardous wastes listed in Chapter 3,  $\underline{013}$  through  $\underline{016}$ .
- $\underline{004.02}$  A total of 100 kilograms of any residue or contaminated soil, water or other debris resulting from the clean-up of a spill, into or on any land or water, of any acute hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, 013 through 016.
- 005 The small quantity generator may accumulate acute hazardous waste on-site. If he accumulates at any time acute hazardous waste in quantities greater than those set forth in 004.01 or 004.02 of this Chapter, all of those accumulated acute hazardous wastes are subject to regulation under Chapter 10 and the notification requirements of Chapter 4. The time period of Chapter 10, 004.01 for accumulation of wastes on-site, begins when the accumulated wastes exceed the exclusion limit.
- $\frac{006}{\text{waste}}$  A small quantity generator who generates and accumulates acute hazardous waste in a calendar month in quantities no greater than those specified in  $\frac{004.01}{\text{and}}$  and  $\frac{004.02}{\text{of}}$  of this Chapter is subject to the requirements of Chapter 8, 006.03 for all quantities of that acute hazardous waste.
- $\underline{007}$  A small quantity generator shall comply with the following regarding their hazardous waste (except as provided otherwise by Sections  $\underline{004}$  and  $\underline{005}$  of this Chapter).
  - 007.01 Chapter 4, 002 Hazardous Waste Determination.
  - 007.02 Chapter 4, 003 through 004 DEQ/EPA Identification Number.
  - $\frac{007.03}{\text{for }180}$  A small quantity generator may accumulate hazardous waste on-site for 180 days or less (or for 270 days if the generator must transport the waste, or offer that waste for transportation, over a distance of 200 miles or more) without a permit or without having interim status provided that:
    - 007.03A The quantity of waste never exceeds 6,000 kilograms and;
    - $\frac{007.03B}{009}$  The generator complies with the tank requirements of Section  $\frac{009}{009}$  of this Chapter and;
    - $\frac{007.03C}{\text{Section}}$  The generator complies with the container requirements of Section 004.01A of Chapter 10, except Section 004.01A6 and;
    - $\underline{007.03D}$  The generator complies with the dating and labeling requirements of Sections  $\underline{004.01F}$  and  $\underline{004.01G}$  of Chapter 10 and;
    - $\frac{007.03E}{\text{except}}$  The generator complies with the requirements of Chapter 16 except Section  $\frac{002.01A}{\text{except}}$  and;
    - $\frac{007.03F}{and;}$  The generator complies with the requirements of Chapter 17
    - $\underline{007.03G}$  The generator complies with the requirements of Section  $\underline{005.01E}$  of Chapter 20.
  - 007.04 Satellite accumulation.
    - $\underline{007.04A}$  A generator may accumulate as much as 55 gallons of hazardous waste, or one quart of acute hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3,  $\underline{015}$ ,

in containers at or near any point of generation where wastes initially accumulate, which is under the control of the operator of the process generating the waste, without a permit or interim status and without complying with Section 007.03 of this Chapter provided the generator:

- $\underline{007.04 A1}$  Complies with Sections  $\underline{004.01 A1}$  and  $\underline{004.01 A2}$  of Chapter 10 and Chapter 16, 002.01C and
- $\frac{007.04\text{A2}}{\text{with other words}}$  Marks the containers with the words "Hazardous Waste" or with other words that identify the contents of the containers.
- $\overline{007.04B}$  A generator who accumulates either hazardous waste or acute hazardous waste in excess of the amounts listed in Section  $\overline{007.04A}$  of this Chapter at or near any point of generation must, with respect to that amount of excess waste, comply within three days with Section  $\overline{004.01}$  of Chapter 10 or other applicable provisions of this Chapter. During the three day period the generator must continue to comply with Sections  $\overline{007.04A1}$  and  $\overline{007.04A2}$  of this Chapter. The generator must mark the container holding the excess accumulation of hazardous waste with the date the excess amount began accumulating.
- $\frac{007.05}{\text{Chapter}}$  40 CFR Part 262 Subparts E and F, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 10,  $\frac{006}{\text{Chapter}}$  International Shipments, except that 262.56(a)(5) need not be complied with.
- $\underline{007.06}$  The Manifest System. The generator must comply with the manifest requirements of Chapter 10,  $\underline{002}$  and  $\underline{004.06}$ , except if the waste is reclaimed under a contractual agreement pursuant to which:
  - $\underline{007.06A}$  The type of waste and frequency of shipments are specified in the agreement.
  - $\underline{007.06B}$  The vehicle used to transport the waste to the recycling  $\underline{facility}$  and to deliver regenerated material back to the small quantity generator is owned and operated by the reclaimer of the waste; and
  - $\frac{007.06C}{\text{reclamation}}$  The small quantity generator maintains a copy of the  $\frac{1}{\text{reclamation}}$  represent for a period of at least three years after termination or expiration of the agreement.
- $\underline{007.07}$  Furnish additional reports, and exception reports in accordance with Chapter 4.
- $\frac{007.08}{\text{premises}}$  At all times there must be at least one employee either on the premises or on call (i.e., available to respond to an emergency by reaching the facility within a short period of time) with the responsibility for coordinating all emergency response measures specified in Section  $\underline{007.11}$  of this Chapter. This employee is the emergency coordinator.
- $\frac{007.09}{\text{next to}}$  The small quantity generator must post the following information the telephone:
  - 007.09A The name and telephone number of the emergency coordinator;
  - $\frac{007.09B}{\text{and, if}}$  Location of fire extinguishers and spill control material, and, if present, fire alarm; and

- $\underline{007.09C}$  The telephone number of the fire department, unless the facility has a direct alarm.
- $\underline{007.10}$  The small quantity generator must ensure that all employees are thoroughly familiar with proper waste handling and emergency procedures, relevant to their responsibilities during normal facility operations and emergencies;
- $\frac{007.11}{\text{to any}}$  The emergency coordinator or the coordinator's designee must respond emergencies that arise. The applicable responses are as follows:
  - $\underline{007.11A}$  In the event of a fire, call the fire department or attempt to  $\underline{\text{extinguish}}$  it using a fire extinguisher;
  - $\underline{007.11B}$  In the event of a spill, contain the flow of hazardous waste to the extent possible, and as soon as is practicable, clean up the hazardous waste and any contaminated materials or soil;
  - $\underline{007.11C}$  In the event of a fire, explosion, or other release which  $\overline{\text{could}}$  threaten human health outside the facility or when the small quantity generator has knowledge that a spill has reached surface water, the small quantity generator must immediately notify the National Response Center. The report must include the following information:
    - $\underline{007.11C1}$  The name, address, and DEQ/EPA Identification Number of the small quantity generator;
    - 007.11C2 Date, time, and type of incident (e.g., spill or fire);
    - $\frac{007.11C3}{\text{incident}}$  Quantity and type of hazardous waste involved in the
    - 007.11C4 Extent of injuries, if any; and
    - $\frac{007.11C5}{\text{materials}}$  Estimated quantity and disposition of recovered materials, if any.

## 007.12 Pre-transport Requirements.

- $\underline{007.12A}$  Package the waste in accordance with the applicable U.S.  $\overline{\text{Department}}$  of Transportation regulations on packaging hazardous materials under 49 CFR Parts 173, 178, and 179.
- <u>007.12B</u> Label each package in accordance with the applicable U.S. Department of Transportation regulations on hazardous materials under 49 CFR Part 172;
- $\frac{007.12C}{\text{Department}}$  Mark each package in accordance with the applicable U.S. Department of Transportation regulations on hazardous materials under 49 CFR Part 172;
- $\underline{007.12D}$  Mark each container of 119 gallons or less used in such transportation with the following words and information displayed in accordance with requirements of 49 CFR 172.304: "Hazardous Waste Federal Law Prohibits Improper Disposal. If found, contact the nearest police or public safety authority or the U. S.

Environmental Protection Agency. Generator's Name and Address\_\_\_\_\_.

Generator's EPA Identification Number\_\_\_\_\_\_\_.

Manifest tracking Number \_\_\_\_\_\_\_"; and

<u>007.12E</u> Placard or offer the initial transporter the appropriate placards according to Department of Transportation regulations for hazardous materials under 49 CFR Part 172, Subpart F.

<u>008</u> A small quantity generator who accumulates hazardous waste in quantities exceeding 6,000 kilograms or accumulates hazardous waste for more than 180 days (or for more than 270 days if the generator must transport the waste, or offer the waste for transportation, over a distance of 200 miles or more) is an operator of a storage facility and is subject to the requirements of Chapters 12 through 15 and Chapters 21 or 22 unless the generator has been granted an extension to the 180-day (or 270 day, if applicable) period. Such extension may be granted by the Director if hazardous wastes must remain on-site for longer than 180-days (or 270 days if applicable) due to unforeseen, temporary, and uncontrollable circumstances. An extension of up to 30 days may be granted at the discretion of the Director on a case-by-case basis.

- 009 Small quantity generators that accumulate hazardous waste in tanks must:
  - 009.01 Comply with the following general operating requirements:
    - $\underline{009.01A}$  Treatment or storage of hazardous waste in tanks must comply with Chapter 16, 002.02.
    - $\underline{009.01B}$  Hazardous wastes or treatment reagents must not be placed in a  $\underline{tank}$  if they could cause the tank or its inner liner to rupture, leak, corrode, or otherwise fail before the end of its intended life.
    - $\underline{009.01C}$  Uncovered tanks must be operated to ensure at least 60  $\underline{\text{centimeters}}$  (2 feet) of freeboard, unless the tank is equipped with a containment structure (e.g., dike or trench), a drainage control system, or a diversion structure (e.g., standby tank) with a capacity that equals or exceeds the volume of the top 60 centimeters (2 feet) of the tank.
    - $\underline{009.01D}$  Where hazardous waste is continuously fed into a tank, the tank must be equipped with a means to stop this inflow (e.g., waste feed cutoff system or by-pass system to a stand-by tank).
    - 009.01E Remedy any deterioration or malfunction found.
  - 009.02 Inspect where present:
    - $\underline{009.02A}$  Discharge control equipment (e.g., waste feed cutoff systems, by-pass systems, and drainage systems) at least once each operating day, to ensure that it is in good working order.
    - $\underline{009.02B}$  Data gathered from monitoring equipment and leak detection  $\underline{\text{equipment}}$  (e.g., pressure and temperature gauges, and monitoring wells) at least once each operating day to ensure that the tank system is being operated according to its design.

 $\underline{009.02C}$  The level of waste in uncovered tanks at least once each operating day to ensure compliance with Section  $\underline{009.01C}$  of this Chapter.

 $\frac{009.02D}{\text{detect}}$  The construction materials of the tank at least weekly to  $\frac{1}{1000}$  detect corrosion or leaking of fixtures or seams; and

 $\underline{\tt 009.02E}$  The construction materials of, and the area immediately surrounding the externally accessible portion of the tank system including discharge confinement structures (e.g., dikes) at least weekly to detect erosion or signs of releases of hazardous waste (e.g., wet spots or dead vegetation).

 $\underline{009.03}$  Upon closure of the facility, remove all hazardous waste from tanks, discharge control equipment, and discharge confinement structures. (Hazardous waste removed from the tank system is subject to the requirements of this Title.)

 $\frac{009.04}{\text{reactive}}$  Comply with the following special requirements for ignitable or

 $\frac{009.04A}{unless}$ : Ignitable or reactive waste must not be placed in a tank,

 $\underline{009.04A1}$  The waste is treated, rendered, or mixed before or immediately after placement in a tank so that the resulting waste, mixture, or dissolution of material no longer meets the definition of ignitable or reactive waste under Chapters 3,  $\underline{007}$  and  $\underline{009}$  and Chapter 16, 001.02 is complied with; or

 $\frac{009.04\text{A2}}{\text{with.}}$  The requirements in Chapter 16,  $\frac{002.02}{\text{are complied}}$ 

 $\underline{009.05}$  Comply with the special requirements for incompatible wastes in Chapter 16, 001.03 and 001.04.

- Title 128 Department of Environmental Quality
- Chapter 10 REQUIREMENTS FOR LARGE QUANTITY GENERATORS OF HAZARDOUS WASTE
- <u>001</u> Applicability. All of the requirements of this chapter apply to large quantity generators. As specified in Chapter 8 and 9, certain provisions of this chapter apply to small quantity generators and conditionally exempt generators. A large quantity generator is a generator who generates in a calendar month 1,000 kilograms or more of hazardous waste.
  - <u>001.01</u> If a large quantity generator, small quantity generator or conditionally exempt generator generates or accumulates acute hazardous waste in quantities greater than those set out below, all quantities of the acute hazardous waste are subject to this Chapter.
    - $\underline{001.01A}$  A total of one kilogram of acute hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3,  $\underline{013}$ , through  $\underline{016}$ .
    - <u>001.01B</u> A total of 100 kilograms of any residue or contaminated soil, water or other debris resulting from the clean-up of a spill, into or on any land or water, of any acute hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>016</u>.
  - <u>001.02</u> A large quantity generator who generates and accumulates acute hazardous waste in a calendar month in quantities no greater than those specified in <u>001.01A</u> and <u>001.01B</u> of this Chapter is subject to the requirements of Chapter 8, <u>006.03</u> for all quantities of that acute hazardous waste.
  - <u>001.03</u> When making the quantity determinations of this Title, the generator must include all hazardous waste that it generates, except hazardous waste that:
    - $\underline{001.03A}$  Is exempt from regulation under Chapter 2, Sections  $\underline{010}$  through  $\underline{013}$ ,  $\underline{015.01}$ ,  $\underline{016}$ , or Chapter 7, Section  $\underline{002}$ ; or
    - <u>001.03B</u> Is managed immediately upon generation only in on-site elementary neutralization units, wastewater treatment units, or totally enclosed treatment facilities as defined in Chapter 1; or
    - <u>001.03C</u> Is recycled, without prior storage or accumulation, only in an on-site process subject to regulation under Chapter 7, Section <u>006</u>; or
    - <u>001.03D</u> Is used oil managed under the requirements of Chapter 7, Section 002.02; or
    - <u>001.03E</u> Is spent lead-acid batteries managed under the requirements of Chapter 7, Section 012; or

001.03F Is universal waste managed under Chapter 25.

<u>001.04</u> In determining the quantity of hazardous waste generated, a generator need not include:

<u>001.04A</u> Hazardous waste when it is removed from on-site storage as long as it is counted once:

<u>001.04B</u> Hazardous waste produced by on-site treatment (including reclamation) of hazardous waste, so long as the hazardous waste that is treated was counted once; or

<u>001.04C</u> Spent materials that are generated, reclaimed, and subsequently reused on-site, so long as such spent materials have been counted once.

<u>001.05</u> Large quantity generators are also subject to all requirements pertaining to determinations, notifications, reporting and recordkeeping as set forth in Chapter 4.

<u>001.06</u> A generator who treats, stores, or disposes hazardous waste on-site must only comply with Chapter 4, <u>002</u> through <u>004</u>, <u>005.03C</u>, <u>005.04</u> and <u>005.05</u> and Sections <u>004</u>, <u>005</u>, and, if applicable, <u>007</u> of this Chapter. A generator who treats, stores, or disposes hazardous waste onsite must also comply with all other applicable chapters of this Title.

<u>001.07</u> A farmer who generates waste pesticides which are hazardous waste and complies with all of Section <u>007</u> of this Chapter, is not required to comply with other standards in this Title with respect to such pesticides.

# 002 Generator manifest procedures.

# 002.01 General Requirements

<u>002.01A</u> A generator who transports, or offers for transport a hazardous waste for offsite treatment, storage, or disposal, or a treatment, storage, and disposal facility who offers for transport a rejected hazardous waste load, must prepare a Manifest (OMB Control number 2050-0039) on EPA Form 8700-22, and if necessary, EPA Form 8700-22A, according to the instructions included in the Appendix to 40 CFR Part 262, which is hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>002.01A1</u> The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 262, Subpart B, 262.21 through 262.21(m)(2), pertaining to manifest tracking numbers, manifest printing, and obtaining manifests, are hereby incorporated herein by reference.

<u>002.01B</u> The requirements of Chapter 10, <u>002</u> and <u>003.01D</u> do not apply to the transport of hazardous wastes on a public or private right-of-way within or along the border of contiguous property under the control of the same person, even if such contiguous property is divided by a public or private right-of-way. Notwithstanding Chapter 11, <u>001</u>, the generator or transporter must comply with the requirements

- for transporters set forth in Chapter 11, <u>006.11</u> in the event of a discharge of hazardous waste on a public or private right-of-way.
- <u>002.02</u> A generator must determine whether the generator state or the consignment state for a shipment regulates any additional wastes (beyond those regulated Federally) as hazardous wastes under these states' authorized programs. Generators also must determine whether the consignment state or generator state requires the generator to submit copies of the manifest to these states. In cases where the generator must supply copies to either the generator's state or the consignment state, the generator is responsible for supplying legible photocopies of the manifest to these states.
- <u>002.03</u> The manifest shall consist of at least the number of copies which will provide the generator, each transporter, and the owner or operator of the designated facility with one copy each for their records and another copy to be returned to the generator.
- <u>002.04</u> The generator shall designate on the manifest one primary facility which is approved to handle waste described on the manifest. The generator may also designate on the manifest one alternate facility which is approved to handle the waste in the event an emergency prevents delivery of the waste to the primary designated facility.
- <u>002.05</u> The generator shall completely and legibly fill out all applicable sections and certify that the information provided on the manifest is correct by placing their signature on the manifest.
- $\underline{002.06}$  The generator shall obtain the signature of the initial transporter and date of acceptance on the manifest.
- <u>002.07</u> The generator shall retain one copy of the manifest and shall give the transporter the remaining copies.
- <u>002.08</u> If the transporter is unable to deliver the hazardous waste to the designated facility, or the alternate facility in accordance with Section <u>002.04</u> of this Chapter, the generator must either designate another facility or instruct the transporter to return the waste.
- <u>002.09</u> The generator shall maintain on file a copy of each manifest retained in accordance with Section <u>002.07</u> of this Chapter for 3 years or until a signed copy of the manifest is received from the designated storage, treatment, or disposal facility that received the waste.
- <u>002.10</u> The generator shall retain the signed copies of the manifests received from the owners or operators of the storage, treatment, or disposal facilities until three years after the date of shipment of the hazardous waste.
- <u>002.11</u> For hazardous wastes emanating from Nebraska to be shipped within the United States solely by water (bulk shipments only), the generator must send three copies of the manifest dated and signed in accordance with Sections <u>002.05</u> and <u>002.06</u> of this Chapter to the owner or operator of the designated facility or the last water (bulk shipment)

transporter to handle the waste in the United States if exported by water. Copies of the manifest are not required for each transporter.

- <u>002.12</u> For rail shipments of hazardous waste within the United States which originate at the site of generation, the generator must send at least three copies of the manifest dated and signed in accordance with Sections <u>002.05</u> and <u>002.06</u> of this Chapter to:
  - 002.12A The next non-rail transporter, if any; or
  - 002.12B The designated facility if transported solely by rail; or
  - <u>002.12C</u> The last rail transporter to handle the waste in the United States if exported by rail.
- <u>002.13</u> For shipments of hazardous waste to a designated facility in an authorized State which has not yet obtained authorization to regulate that particular waste as hazardous, the generator must assure that the designated facility agrees to sign and return the manifest to the generator, and that any out-of-state transporter signs and forwards the manifest to the designated facility.
- <u>002.14</u> A generator who initiates a shipment of hazardous waste must certify to one of the following statements in Item 15 of the uniform hazardous waste manifest:
  - <u>002.14A</u> "I am a large quantity generator. I have a program in place to reduce the volume and toxicity of waste generated to the degree I have determined to be economically practicable and I have selected the practicable method of treatment, storage, or disposal currently available to me which minimizes the present and future threat to human health and the environment;" or
  - <u>002.14B</u> "I am a small quantity generator. I have made a good faith effort to minimize my waste generation and select the best waste management method that is available to me and that I can afford."
- 003 Pre-transport requirements.
  - <u>003.01</u> Before transporting hazardous waste or offering hazardous waste for transportation off-site, a generator must:
    - <u>003.01A</u> Package the waste in accordance with the applicable U.S. Department of Transportation regulations on packaging hazardous materials under 49 CFR Parts 173, 178, and 179.
    - <u>003.01B</u> Label each package in accordance with the applicable U.S. Department of Transportation regulations on hazardous materials under 49 CFR Part 172;
    - <u>003.01C</u> Mark each package in accordance with the applicable U.S. Department of Transportation regulations on hazardous materials under 49 CFR Part 172;

003.01D Mark each container of 119 gallons or less used in such transportation
with the following words and information displayed in accordance with requirements
of 49 CFR 172.304: "Hazardous Waste - Federal Law Prohibits Improper Disposal.
If found, contact the nearest police or public safety authority or the U. S.
Environmental Protection Agency. Generator's Name and
Address
Generator's EPA Identification Number
Manifest Tracking Number"; and

<u>003.01E</u> Placard or offer the initial transporter the appropriate placards according to Department of Transportation regulations for hazardous materials under 49 CFR Part 172, Subpart F.

## 004 Accumulation time.

<u>004.01</u> A generator may accumulate hazardous waste on-site for 90 days or less without a permit or without having interim status, provided that:

<u>004.01A</u> The waste is placed in containers and the generator complies with the following:

<u>004.01A1</u> If a container holding hazardous waste is not in good condition, or if it begins to leak, the generator must transfer the hazardous waste from this container to a container that is in good condition, or manage the waste in some other way that complies with the requirements of this chapter;

<u>004.01A2</u> A container holding hazardous waste must always be closed during storage, except when it is necessary to add or remove waste;

<u>004.01A3</u> A container holding hazardous waste must not be opened, handled or stored in a manner which may rupture a container or cause it to leak;

<u>004.01A4</u> The generator must inspect areas where containers are stored, at least weekly, looking for leaks and for deterioration caused by corrosion and other factors; and

<u>004.01A5</u> The generator must comply with Chapter 16 pertaining to requirements for ignitable, incompatible or reactive wastes.

<u>004.01A6</u> The generator must comply with Chapter 22, Sections <u>019</u> and <u>020</u>, and <u>021</u> pertaining to organic air emissions.

<u>004.01B</u> The waste is placed in tanks and the generator complies with the applicable requirements of Chapters 16 and 40 CFR Part 265 subparts J, AA, BB, and CC, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, Sections <u>010</u>, <u>019</u>, <u>020</u> and <u>021</u> respectively, except that the generator need not comply with 40 CFR 265.197(c) and 265.200 of Subpart J.

<u>004.01C</u> The waste is placed on drip pads and the generator complies with Chapter 22, <u>018</u>, and with the requirements of 40 CFR 262.34(a)(1)(iii), which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>004.01D</u> The waste is placed in containment buildings and the generator complies with Chapter 22, <u>022</u>, and the requirements of 40 CFR 262.34(a)(1)(iv), which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>004.01E</u> If the waste is placed in tanks or containers, the generator complies with 40 CFR 265.111 and 265.114, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, <u>007</u>. In addition, the generator is exempt from all other requirements in Subparts G and H of 40 CFR Part 265, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, 007 and 008.

<u>004.01F</u> The date upon which each period of accumulation begins must be clearly marked and visible for inspection on each container;

<u>004.01G</u> While being accumulated on-site, each container and tank must be labeled or marked clearly with the words "Hazardous Waste."

<u>004.01H</u> The generator must comply with the requirements for owners or operators in Chapter 17 (Preparedness and Prevention), Chapter 18 (Contingency Plan and Emergency Procedures), Chapter 19 (Personnel Training) and the applicable requirements in Chapter 20, 005.01E.

004.02 A generator who accumulates hazardous waste for more than 90 days is an operator of a storage facility and is subject to the requirements of Chapters 12 through 15, 21 and 22, unless granted an extension to the 90 day period by the Director. The extension may be granted due to unforeseen, temporary, and uncontrollable circumstances for up to 30 days on a case-by-case basis.

<u>004.03</u> A generator who generates 1,000 kilograms or greater of hazardous waste per calendar month who also generates wastewater treatment sludges from electroplating operations that meet the listing description for the RCRA hazardous waste code F006, may accumulate F006 waste on-site for more than 90 days, but not more than 180 days without a permit or without having interim status provided that:

 $\underline{004.03A}$  The generator has implemented pollution prevention practices that reduce the amount of any hazardous substances, pollutants or contaminants entering F006 or otherwise released to the environment prior to its recycling;

<u>004.03B</u> The F006 waste is legitimately recycled through metals recovery;

<u>004.03C</u> No more than 20,000 kilograms of F006 waste is accumulated on-site at any one time; and

004.03D The F006 waste is managed in accordance with the following:

004.03D1 The F006 waste is placed:

<u>004.03D1(a)</u> In containers and the generator complies with the applicable requirements of subparts I, AA, BB, and CC of 40 CFR part 265, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, Sections <u>009</u>, <u>019</u>, <u>020</u> and <u>021</u>; and/or

<u>004.03D1(b)</u> In tanks and the generator complies with the applicable requirements of subparts J, AA, BB, and CC of 40 CFR part 265, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, Sections <u>010</u>, <u>019</u>, <u>020</u> and <u>021</u>, except 40 CFR 265.197(c) and 265.200; and/or

<u>004.03D1(c)</u> In containment buildings and the generator complies with subpart DD of 40 CFR part 265, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, Section <u>022</u> and has placed its professional engineer certification that the building complies with the design standards specified in 40 CFR 265.1101 in the facilities operating record prior to operation of the unit. The owner or operator must maintain the following records at the facility:

<u>004.03D1(c)(1)</u> A written description of procedures to ensure that the F006 waste remains in the unit for no more than 180 days, a written description of the waste generation and management practices for the facility showing that they are consistent with the 180-day limit, and documentation that the generator is complying with the procedures; or

<u>004.03D1(c)(2)</u> Documentation that the unit is emptied at least once every 180 days.

<u>004.03D2</u> In addition, such a generator is exempt from all the requirements in subparts G and H of 40 CFR part 265, except for 265.111 and 265.114, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, Sections <u>007</u> and <u>008</u>.

<u>004.03D3</u> The date upon which each period of accumulation begins is clearly marked and visible for inspection on each container;

<u>004.03D4</u> While being accumulated on-site, each container and tank is labeled or marked clearly with the words, "Hazardous Waste;" and

<u>004.03D5</u> The generator complies with the requirements for owners or operators in Chapters 17, 18, 19 and Chapter 20, Section <u>005.01E</u>.

<u>004.04</u> A generator who generates 1,000 kilograms or greater of hazardous waste per calendar month who also generates wastewater treatment sludges from electroplating operations that meet the listing description for the RCRA hazardous waste code F006, and who must transport this waste, or offer this waste for transportation, over a distance of 200 miles or more for off-site metals recovery, may accumulate F006 waste on-site for more than 90 days, but not more than 270 days without a permit or without having interim status if the

generator complies with the requirements of Sections <u>004.03A</u> through <u>004.03D</u> of this Chapter.

<u>004.05</u> A generator accumulating F006 in accordance with Sections <u>004.03</u> and <u>004.04</u> of this Chapter who accumulates F006 waste on-site for more than 180 days (or more than 270 days if the generator must transport this waste, or offer this waste for transportation, over a distance of 200 miles or more), or who accumulates more than 20,000 kilograms of F006 waste on-site is an operator of a storage facility and is subject to the requirements of Chapters 21 and 22 and the permit requirements of Chapters 12 through 15 unless the generator has been granted an extension to the 180-day (or 270-day if applicable) period or an exception to the 20,000 kilogram accumulation limit. Such extensions and exceptions may be granted by the Director if F006 waste remain on-site for longer than 180 days (or 270 days if applicable) or if more than 20,000 kilograms of F006 waste must remain on-site due to unforeseen, temporary, and uncontrollable circumstances. An extension of up to 30 days or an exception to the accumulation limit may be granted at the discretion of the Director on a case-by-case basis.

<u>004.06</u> a generator who sends a shipment of hazardous waste to a designated facility with the understanding that the designated facility can accept and manage the waste and later receives that shipment back as a rejected load or residue in accordance with the manifest discrepancy provisions of 40 CFR Part 264.72 or Part 265.72, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, <u>005</u>, and Chapter 22, <u>005</u>, respectively, may accumulate the returned waste on-site in accordance with Chapter 10, <u>004</u>, or Chapter 9, <u>007</u> and <u>008</u>, depending on the amount of hazardous waste on-site in that calendar month. Upon receipt of the returned shipment, the generator must:

<u>004.06A</u> Sign Item 18c of the manifest, if the transporter returned the shipment using the original manifest; or

<u>004.06B</u> Sign Item 20 of the manifest, if the transporter returned the shipment using a new manifest.

# 005 Satellite accumulation.

<u>005.01</u> A generator may accumulate as much as 55 gallons of hazardous waste, or one quart of acute hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, <u>015</u>, in containers at or near any point of generation where wastes initially accumulate, which is under the control of the operator of the process generating the waste, without a permit or interim status and without complying with Section <u>004.01</u> of this Chapter provided the generator:

<u>005.01A</u> Complies with Sections <u>004.01A1.</u> and <u>004.01A2.</u> of this Chapter and Chapter 16, <u>002.01C</u>, and

<u>005.01B</u> Marks the containers with the words "Hazardous Waste" or with other words that identify the contents of the containers.

<u>005.02</u> A generator who accumulates either hazardous waste or acute hazardous waste in excess of the amounts listed in Section <u>005.01</u> of this Chapter at or near any point of generation must, with respect to that amount of excess waste, comply within three days

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with Section <u>004.01</u> of this Chapter or other applicable provisions of this Chapter. During the three day period the generator must continue to comply with Sections <u>005.01A</u> and <u>005.01B</u> of this Chapter. The generator must mark the container holding the excess accumulation of hazardous waste with the date the excess amount began accumulating.

<u>006</u> International Shipments. Any person who exports hazardous waste to a foreign country or imports hazardous waste from a foreign country into the United States must comply with the requirements of 40 CFR Part 262 Subparts E and F.

<u>007</u> Farmers. Farmers disposing of waste pesticide containers or residues from their own use which are hazardous wastes are not required to comply with the standards in this Chapter, and Chapters 12 through 15 (Permitting), and 20 (Permitted Facilities), provided, they triple rinse each empty pesticide container in accordance with Chapter 2, <u>015.05</u> and dispose of the pesticide residues on their own farm in a manner consistent with the disposal instructions on the pesticide label.

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## NEBRASKA ADMINISTRATIVE CODE

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## Chapter 11 - REQUIREMENTS FOR TRANSPORTERS OF HAZARDOUS WASTE

- <u>001</u> These hazardous waste transporter requirements establish standards which apply to persons transporting hazardous waste within or through the State of Nebraska if such transportation requires a manifest as specified under this Chapter and Chapters 9 (Small Quantity Generators) and 10 (Large Quantity Generators) of these regulations. Certain hazardous wastes defined as and managed as universal wastes are transported according to Title 128, Chapter 25.
- <u>002</u> These regulations do not apply to on-site transportation of hazardous waste by generators or by owners or operators of permitted hazardous waste management facilities.
- <u>003</u> A transporter shall also comply with Chapters 9 and 10, if the transporter:
  - 003.01 Transports hazardous waste into Nebraska from outside the United States; or
  - <u>003.02</u> Mixes hazardous wastes of different DOT shipping descriptions by placing them in a single container.
- <u>004</u> Prior to transporting hazardous waste, a transporter shall comply with Chapter 4, <u>003</u> through <u>004</u> notification and identification number).
- <u>005</u> A transporter who stores manifested shipments of hazardous waste in containers meeting the requirements of Chapter 10, <u>003.01A</u> for a period of ten days or less is not subject to regulation with respect to the storage of those wastes. A transporter who stores hazardous waste for more than ten days must comply with the permit requirements of Chapters 12 through 15.
- 006 Transporter manifest procedures.
  - <u>006.01</u> Manifest requirement. A transporter may not accept hazardous waste from a generator unless the transporter is also provided with a manifest signed in accordance with the requirements of Chapter 10, <u>002</u>.
    - <u>006.01A</u> Exports. In the case of exports other than those subject to subpart H of 40 CFR Part 262, a transporter may not accept such waste from a primary exporter or other person if he knows the shipment does not conform to the EPA Acknowledgement of Consent; and unless, in addition to a manifest signed by the generator as provided in this section, the transporter shall also be provided with an EPA Acknowledgement of Consent which, except for shipments by rail, is attached to the manifest (or shipping paper for exports by water (bulk shipment)). For exports of hazardous waste subject to the requirements of subpart H of 40 CFR part 262, a transporter may not accept hazardous waste without a tracking document that includes all information required by 40 CFR 262.84.

<u>006.02</u> Before transporting the hazardous waste, the transporter shall sign and date the manifest acknowledging acceptance of the hazardous waste from the generator. The transporter shall return a signed copy to the generator before leaving the generator's property.

<u>006.03</u> The transporter must ensure that the manifest accompanies the hazardous waste. In the case of exports, the transporter must ensure that a copy of the EPA Acknowledgment of Consent also accompanies the hazardous waste.

<u>006.04</u> A transporter who delivers a hazardous waste to another transporter or to the designated facility shall obtain the date of delivery and the hand written signature of that transporter or of the owner or operator of the designated facility on the manifest, shall retain one copy of the manifest in accordance with Section <u>007</u> of this Chapter, and shall give the remaining copies of the manifest to the accepting transporter or designated facility.

<u>006.05</u> The requirements of Sections <u>006.03</u>, <u>006.04</u>, and <u>006.06</u>, of this Chapter do not apply to water (bulk shipment) transporters if:

<u>006.05A</u> The hazardous waste is delivered by water (bulk shipment) to the designated facility; and

<u>006.05B</u> A shipping paper containing all the information required on the manifest (excluding the DEQ/EPA Identification Numbers, generator certification and signatures) and, for exports, an EPA Acknowledgment of Consent accompanies the hazardous waste; and

<u>006.05C</u> The delivering transporter obtains the date of delivery and hand written signature of the owner or operator of the designated facility on either the manifest or the shipping paper; and

<u>006.05D</u> The person delivering the hazardous waste to the initial water (bulk shipment) transporter obtains the date of delivery and signature of the water (bulk shipment) transporter on the manifest and forwards it to the designated facility; and

<u>006.05E</u> A copy of the shipping paper or manifest is retained by each water (bulk shipment) transporter in accordance with Section <u>007</u> of this Chapter.

<u>006.06</u> For shipments involving rail transportation, the following requirements apply instead of Sections <u>006.03</u>, <u>006.04</u> and <u>006.05</u>:

<u>006.06A</u> When accepting hazardous waste from a non-rail transporter, the initial rail transporter must:

<u>006.06A1</u> Sign and date the manifest acknowledging acceptance of the hazardous waste;

006.06A2 Return a signed copy of the manifest to the non-rail transporter;

006.06A3 Forward at least three copies of the manifest to:

006.06A3(a) The next non-rail transporter, if any; or

<u>006.06A3(b)</u> The designated facility, if the shipment is delivered to that facility by rail; or

<u>006.06A3(c)</u> The last rail transporter designated to handle the waste in the United States.

<u>006.06A3(d)</u> Retain one copy of the manifest and rail shipping paper in accordance with Section <u>007</u> of this Chapter.

<u>006.06B</u> Rail transporters must ensure that a shipping paper containing all the information required on the manifest (excluding the DEQ/EPA Identification Numbers, generator certification, and signatures) and for exports, an EPA Acknowledgment of Consent, accompanies the hazardous waste at all times.

<u>006.06C</u> When delivering hazardous waste to the designated facility, a rail transporter must:

<u>006.06C1</u> Obtain the date of delivery and hand written signature of the owner or operator of the designated facility on the manifest or the shipping paper (if the manifest has not been received by the facility); and

<u>006.06C2</u> Retain a copy of the manifest or signed shipping paper in accordance with Section <u>007</u> of this Chapter.

<u>006.06D</u> When delivering hazardous waste to a non-rail transporter, a rail transporter must:

<u>006.06D1</u> Obtain the date of delivery and the signature of the next non-rail transporter on the manifest; and

<u>006.06D2</u> Retain a copy of the manifest in accordance with Section <u>007</u> of this Chapter.

<u>006.06E</u> Before accepting hazardous waste from a rail transporter, a non-rail transporter must sign and date the manifest and provide a copy to the rail transporter.

<u>006.07</u> Transporters who transport hazardous waste out of the United States must:

<u>006.07A</u> Sign and date the manifest in the International Shipments block to indicate the date that the shipment left the United States;

006.07B Retain one copy in accordance with Section 007.01 of this chapter.

006.07C Return a signed copy of the manifest to the generator; and

<u>006.07D</u> Give a copy of the manifest to a U.S. Customs official at the point of departure from the United States.

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<u>006.08</u> A transporter must not transport hazardous waste not properly labeled or hazardous waste containers which are leaking or appear to be damaged, since this material becomes the transporter's responsibility during transport.

<u>006.09</u> The transporter shall deliver the entire quantity of hazardous waste accepted from a generator or a transporter to the designated facility listed on the manifest; or the alternate designated facility, if the hazardous waste cannot be delivered to the designated facility because an emergency prevents delivery; or the next designated transporter; or the place outside the United States designated by the generator.

<u>006.10</u> If the hazardous waste cannot be delivered in accordance with Section <u>006.09</u> of this chapter, because of an emergency condition other than rejection of the waste by the designated facility, then the transporter must contact the generator for further directions and must revise the manifest according to the generator's instructions.

<u>006.10A</u> If hazardous waste is rejected by the designated facility while the transporter is on the facility's premises, then the transporter must obtain the following:

<u>006.10A1</u> For a partial load rejection or for regulated quantities of container residues, a copy of the original manifest that includes the facility's date and signature, and the Manifest Tracking Number of the new manifest that will accompany the shipment, and a description of the partial rejection or container residue in the discrepancy block of the original manifest. The transporter must retain a copy of this manifest in accordance with Section <u>007</u> of this chapter, and give the remaining copies of the original manifest to the rejecting designated facility. If the transporter is forwarding the rejected part of the shipment or a regulated container residue to an alternate facility or returning it to the generator, the transporter must obtain a new manifest to accompany the shipment, and the new manifest must include all of the required information in 40 CFR Part 264.72(e)(1) through (6) or (f)(1) through (6), as incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, <u>005</u>, or Part 265.72(e)(1) through (6) or (f)(1) through (6), as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, <u>005</u>.

<u>006.10A2</u> For a full load rejection that will be taken back by the transporter, a copy of the original manifest that includes the rejecting facility's signature and date attesting to the rejection, the description of the rejection in the discrepancy block of the manifest, and the name, address, phone number, and Identification Number for the alternate facility or generator to whom the shipment must be delivered. The transporter must retain a copy of the manifest in accordance with Section <u>007</u> of this chapter, and give a copy of the manifest containing this information to the rejecting designated facility. If the original manifest is not used, then the transporter must obtain a new manifest for the shipment and comply with 40 CFR Part 264.72(e)(1) through (6), as incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, 005, or Part 265.72(e)(1) through (6), as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, <u>005</u>.

<u>006.11</u> If a transporter has a discharge of hazardous waste the transporter will comply with Chapter 23 of these regulations and all other applicable laws and regulations.

<u>006.12</u> A transporter transporting hazardous waste from a small quantity generator need not comply with the requirements of this Chapter provided that:

<u>006.12A</u> The waste is being transported pursuant to a reclamation agreement as provided for in Chapter 9, <u>007.06</u>.

<u>006.12B</u> The transporter records, on a log or shipping paper, the following information for each shipment:

<u>006.12B1</u> The name, address, and DEQ/EPA Identification Number of the generator of the waste;

006.12B2 The quantity of waste accepted;

006.12B3 All DOT required shipping information;

006.12B4 The date the waste is accepted; and

<u>006.12C</u> The transporter carries this record when transporting waste to the reclamation facility; and

<u>006.12D</u> The transporter retains these records for a period of at least three years after termination or expiration of the agreement.

## 007 Recordkeeping.

<u>007.01</u> A transporter of hazardous waste must keep a copy of the manifest signed by the generator, the transporter, and the next designated transporter or the owner or operator of the designated facility for a period of three years from the date the hazardous waste was accepted by the initial transporter.

<u>007.02</u> For shipments delivered to the designated facility by water (bulk shipment), each water (bulk shipment) transporter must retain a copy of a shipping paper containing all the information required in Section <u>006.05B</u> of this Chapter, for a period of three years from the date the hazardous waste was accepted by the initial transporter.

007.03 For shipments of hazardous waste by rail within the United States:

<u>007.03A</u> The initial rail transporter must keep a copy of the manifest and shipping paper with all the information required in Section <u>006.06B</u> of this Chapter, for a period of three years from the date the hazardous waste was accepted by the initial transporter; and

<u>007.03B</u> The final rail transporter must keep a copy of the signed manifest (or the shipping paper if signed by the designated facility in lieu of the manifest) for a period of three years from the date the hazardous waste was accepted by the initial transporter.

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# NEBRASKA ADMINISTRATIVE CODE

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Chapter 12 - PERMIT REQUIRED

## 001 Applicability.

<u>001.01</u> A permit is required for the treatment, storage, or disposal of any hazardous waste identified or listed in Chapters 2 and 3. Owners or operators of hazardous waste management units must have permits during the active life (including the closure period) of the unit.

<u>001.02</u> A post-closure permit is required by owners or operators of surface impoundments, landfills, land treatment units, and waste pile units that received wastes after July 26, 1982, or that certified closure (according to 40 CFR 265.115, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, <u>007</u>) after January 26, 1983, unless they demonstrate closure by removal or decontamination as provided in Section <u>001.08</u> of this Chapter, or obtain an enforceable document in lieu of a post-closure permit, as provided under Section <u>001.09</u>. If a post-closure permit is required, the permit must address the applicable requirements of Chapter 21. The denial of, or failure to, obtain a permit for the active life of a facility or unit does not affect the requirement to obtain a post-closure permit.

<u>001.03</u> Specific exclusions. The following persons are not required to obtain a permit under these regulations:

<u>001.03A</u> Small quantity generators and large quantity generators who accumulate hazardous waste on-site for less than the time periods provided in Chapter 9, <u>008</u> and in Chapter 10, <u>004.02</u>, respectively;

<u>001.03B</u> Farmers who dispose of hazardous waste pesticides from their own use on their own land, as provided in Chapter 10, <u>007</u>;

<u>001.03C</u> Persons who own or operate facilities solely for the treatment, storage, or disposal of hazardous waste excluded from regulations by Chapter 2, <u>008</u>, <u>009</u>, and 011 through 013 or Chapter 8;

<u>001.03D</u> Owners or operators of totally enclosed treatment facilities as defined in Chapter 1;

<u>001.03E</u> Owners or operators of an elementary neutralization unit or a wastewater treatment unit as defined in Chapter 1;

<u>001.03F</u> Transporters storing manifested shipments of hazardous waste in containers meeting the requirements of Chapter 10, <u>003</u> at a transfer facility for a period of 10 days or less; and

 $\underline{001.03G}$  Persons combining absorbent material and waste in a container provided that these actions occur at the time waste is first placed in the container, and 40 CFR 264.17(b), 264.171, and 264.172 as incorporated by reference in Chapter 21,  $\underline{002}$  and  $\underline{009}$  are complied with.

<u>001.03H</u> Universal waste handlers and universal waste transporters managing the wastes described in Chapter 25. These handlers are subject to regulation under Chapter 25.

001.03l For the purposes of this Chapter and Chapter 15 (Permit Issuance):

<u>001.03I(1)</u> A component means any constituent part of a unit or any group of constituent parts of a unit which are assembled to perform a specific function (e.g. a pump seal, pump, kiln liner, kiln thermocouple).

<u>001.03I(2)</u> A facility or activity means any HWM facility or any other facility or activity (including land or appurtenances thereto) that is subject to regulation under the RCRA program).

<u>001.03I(3)</u> A functionally equivalent component means a component which performs the same function or measurement and which meets or exceeds the performance specifications of another component.

<u>001.03I(4)</u> A major facility means any RCRA facility or activity classified as such by the EPA Regional Administrator in conjunction with the Director.

<u>001.03I(5)</u> Remedial Action Plan (RAP) means a special form of RCRA permit that a facility owner or operator may obtain instead of a permit issued under 40 CFR 270.3 through 270.66, to authorize the treatment, storage or disposal of hazardous remediation waste (as defined in Chapter 1 of this Title) at a remediation waste management site.

001.04 Special forms of permits.

001.04A Permits by rule.

<u>001.04A1</u> The owner or operator of a POTW which accepts for treatment hazardous waste shall be deemed to have a hazardous waste treatment permit if the owner or operator:

<u>001.04A1(a)</u> Has an NPDES permit and complies with its permit conditions;

<u>001.04A1(b)</u> Maintains a written operating record on the wastes received, complies with Chapter 4 (Identification Number), Chapter 14, <u>002</u> (use of manifest and discrepancies), Chapter 14 (biennial report, unmanifested waste report) and for NPDES permits issued after November 8, 1984, 40 CFR 264.101 (corrective action for solid waste management units), as required by 40 CFR 270.60(c)(3); and

<u>001.04A1(c)</u> Meets local, State and Federal pretreatment requirements which would be applicable to the waste if it were being discharged into the POTW through a sewer, pipe, or similar conveyance.

<u>001.04B</u> Emergency permits. In the event the Director finds an imminent and substantial endangerment to human health or the environment, the Director may issue a temporary emergency permit to a facility to allow treatment, storage, or disposal of hazardous waste. This emergency permit may be issued to a non-permitted facility or one whose existing permit does not cover the activity for which application for the emergency permit is made. This emergency permit:

<u>001.04B1</u> May be oral or written. If oral, it shall be followed in 5 five days by a written emergency permit;

001.04B2 Shall not exceed 90 days in duration;

<u>001.04B3</u> Shall clearly specify the hazardous wastes to be received, and the manner and location of their treatment, storage, or disposal;

<u>001.04B4</u> May be terminated by the Director at any time without process if the Director determines that termination is appropriate to protect human health and the environment;

<u>001.04B5</u> Shall be accompanied by a public notice which shall include:

001.04B5(a) Name and address of the Department;

<u>001.04B5(b)</u> Name and location of the permitted hazardous waste management facility;

<u>001.04B5(c)</u> A brief description of the wastes involved;

<u>001.04B5(d)</u> A brief description of the action authorized and reasons for authorizing it; and

# 001.04B5(e) Duration of the emergency permit; and

<u>001.04B6</u> Shall incorporate, to the extent possible, and not inconsistent with the emergency situations, all applicable requirements of this Chapter, Chapter 7, <u>008</u> through <u>012</u>, Chapters 13 through 15, and Chapter 21.

<u>001.04C</u> Incinerator permits. For the purposes of determining feasibility of compliance with the incinerator performance standard and determining adequate incinerator operating conditions in Chapter 21, the Director may establish requirements, give approvals or issue trial burn permits pursuant to the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.62 which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>001.04D</u> Permits for Land Treatment demonstrations using the field test or laboratory analyses may be issued pursuant to the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.63, which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>001.04E</u> Permits for Research, Development and Demonstration Facilities may be issued pursuant to the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.65, which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>001.04F</u> Permits for Boilers and Industrial Furnaces burning hazardous waste may be issued pursuant to the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.66, which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>001.04G</u> Remedial Action Plans (RAPs) are special forms of permits that are regulated under Section <u>004</u> of this Chapter.

## 001.05 Emergency response.

<u>001.05A</u> A person is not required to obtain a permit under these regulations for treatment or containment activities taken during immediate response to any of the following situations:

001.05A1 A discharge of a hazardous waste;

<u>001.05A2</u> An imminent and substantial threat of a discharge of hazardous waste:

<u>001.05A3</u> A discharge of a material which, when discharged, becomes a hazardous waste.

- <u>001.05B</u> Any person who continues or initiates hazardous waste treatment or containment activities after the immediate response is over is subject to all applicable permit requirements under these regulations.
- <u>001.06</u> After November 19, 1980, no person shall own or operate a hazardous waste treatment, storage, or disposal facility without first obtaining a permit from the Director except for existing hazardous waste treatment, storage or disposal facilities which have received interim status.
- <u>001.07</u> The Director may issue or deny a permit for one or more units at a facility without simultaneously issuing or denying a permit to all of the units at the facility. The interim status of any unit for which a permit has not been issued or denied is not affected by the issuance or denial of a permit to any other unit at the facility.
- <u>001.08</u> Closure by removal. Owners/operators of surface impoundments, land treatment units, and waste piles closing by removal or decontamination under 40 CFR Part 265 standards, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, must obtain a post-closure permit unless they can demonstrate to the Director that the closure met the standards for closure by removal or decontamination as in 40 CFR 264.228, 264.280(e), or 264.258, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, Sections <u>011</u> through <u>013</u>. The demonstration must be made in accordance with the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.1(c)(5) and (6), which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- <u>001.09</u> Enforceable documents for post-closure care. At the discretion of the Director, an owner or operator may obtain, in lieu of a post-closure permit, an enforceable document imposing the requirements of 40 CFR 265.121, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, Section <u>007</u>. "Enforceable document" means an order, a plan, or other document issued by EPA or by an authorized State under an authority that meets the requirements of 40 CFR 271.16(e), which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference, including, but not limited to, a corrective action order issued by EPA under section 3008(h), a CERCLA remedial action, or a closure or post-closure plan.

## 002 Effect of a permit.

- <u>002.01</u> Compliance with a permit during its term constitutes compliance for purposes of enforcement of the State Act except for those requirements not included in the permit which:
  - <u>002.01A</u> Become effective by state or federal statute;
  - <u>002.01B</u> Are promulgated under Chapter 20, restricting the placement of hazardous wastes in or on the land;
  - <u>002.01C</u> Are promulgated under Chapter 21 regarding leak detection systems for new and replacement surface impoundment, waste pile, and landfill units, and

lateral expansions of surface impoundment, waste pile, and landfill units. The leak detection system requirements include double liners, CQA programs, monitoring, action leakage rates, and response action plans, and will be implemented through the procedures of Chapter 15 Class 1 permit modifications; or

<u>002.01D</u> Are promulgated under Chapter 22, Sections <u>019</u> through <u>021</u> limiting air emissions.

<u>002.01E</u> However, a permit may be modified, revoked and reissued, or terminated for cause during its term as set forth in Chapter 15, <u>012.</u>

<u>002.02</u> The issuance of a permit does not convey any property rights of any sort, or any exclusive privilege.

<u>002.03</u> The issuance of a permit does not authorize any injury to persons or property or invasion of other private rights, or any infringement of Federal, State or local law or regulations.

### 003 Interim status.

<u>003.01</u> Qualifying for interim status.

<u>003.01A</u> Any person who owns or operates an "existing HWM facility" or a facility in existence on the effective date of statutory or regulatory amendments under the State Act that render the facility subject to the requirement to have a permit under these regulations shall have interim status and shall be treated as having been issued a permit to the extent he or she has:

<u>003.01A1</u> Complied with the requirements of Chapter 4 pertaining to notification of hazardous waste activity; and

<u>003.01A2</u> Complied with the requirements of Chapter 13, <u>001</u> and <u>005</u>, governing the submission of a Part A application.

<u>003.01B</u> Failure to qualify for interim status. If the Director has reason to believe upon examination of a Part A application that it fails to meet the requirements of Chapter 13, <u>012</u> the owner or operator shall be notified in writing of the apparent deficiency. Such notice shall specify the grounds for the Director's belief that the application is deficient. The owner or operator shall have 30 days from receipt to respond to such notification and to explain or cure the alleged deficiency in the Part A application. If, after such notification and opportunity for response, the Director determines that the application is deficient, appropriate enforcement action may be taken.

<u>003.01C</u> Section <u>003.01A</u> of this Chapter shall not apply to any facility which has been previously denied a hazardous waste permit or if authority to operate the hazardous waste facility has been previously terminated.

003.02 Operation during interim status.

<u>003.02A</u> During the interim status period the facility shall not:

<u>003.02A1</u> Treat, store, or dispose of hazardous waste not specified in Part A of the permit application;

<u>003.02A2</u> Employ processes not specified in Part A of the permit application; or

<u>003.02A3</u> Exceed the design capacities specified in Part A of the permit application.

<u>003.02B</u> Interim status standards. During interim status, owners or operators shall comply with the Interim Status Standards for Owners and Operators of Hazardous Waste Treatment, Storage, and Disposal Facilities in Chapter 22.

<u>003.03</u> Changes during interim status.

<u>003.03A</u> New hazardous wastes not previously identified in Part A of the permit application (and, in the case of newly listed or identified wastes, addition of the units being used to treat, store, or dispose of the hazardous wastes on the effective date of the listing or identification) may be treated, stored, or disposed of at a facility if the owner or operator submits a revised Part A permit application prior to such a change, and the Director approves the change.

<u>003.03B</u> Increases in the design capacity of processes used at a facility may be made if the owner or operator submits a revised Part A permit application prior to such a change (along with a justification explaining the need for the change) and the Director approves the change because of a lack of available treatment, storage, or disposal capacity at other hazardous waste management facilities, or the change is necessary to comply with Federal, State, or local requirements.

<u>003.03C</u> Changes in the processes for the treatment, storage, or disposal of hazardous waste may be made at a facility or additional processes may be added if the owner or operator submits a revised Part A permit application prior to such a change (along with a justification explaining the need for the change) and the Director approves the change because:

<u>003.03C1</u> It is necessary to prevent a threat to human health or the environment because of an emergency situation; or

<u>003.03C2</u> The change is necessary to comply with a Federal, State, or local requirement.

<u>003.03D</u> Changes in the ownership or operational control of a facility may be made if the new owner or operator submits a revised Part A permit application no later than 90 days prior to the scheduled change. When a transfer of ownership or operational control of a facility occurs, the old owner or operator shall comply with the requirements of 40 CFR Part 265, Subpart H (financial requirements) as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22, <u>008</u>, until the new owner or operator has demonstrated to the Director compliance with the requirements of Subpart H. The new owner or operator must demonstrate compliance with Subpart H requirements within six months of the date of the change in the ownership or operational control of the facility. Upon demonstration to the Director by the new owner or operator of compliance with Subpart H, the Director shall notify the old owner or operator in writing that compliance with Subpart H is no longer necessary as of the date of the demonstration. All other interim status duties are transferred effective immediately upon the date of the change of ownership or operational control of the facility.

<u>003.03E</u> Changes made in accordance with an interim status corrective action order issued by EPA under Section 3008(h) or other Federal authority, by an authorized State under comparable State authority, or by a court in a judicial action brought by EPA or by an authorized State. Changes under this section are limited to the treatment, storage, or disposal of solid waste from releases that originate within the boundary of the facility.

<u>003.03F</u> Addition of newly regulated units for the treatment, storage, or disposal of hazardous waste if the owner or operator submits a revised part A permit application on or before the date on which the unit becomes subject to the new requirements.

<u>003.03G</u> In no event shall changes be made to a facility during interim status which amount to reconstruction of the facility. Reconstruction occurs when the capital investment in the changes to the facility exceeds fifty percent of the capital cost of a comparable entirely new facility. Changes prohibited under this paragraph do not include changes:

 $\underline{003.03G1}$  Made solely for the purpose of complying with requirements of 40 CFR 265.193, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22,  $\underline{010}$  for tanks and ancillary equipment.

<u>003.03G2</u> If necessary to comply with Federal, State, or local requirements, changes to an existing unit, changes solely involving tanks or containers, or addition of replacement surface impoundments that satisfy the standards of Section 3004(o).

<u>003.03G3</u> Changes that are necessary to allow owners or operators to continue handling newly listed or identified hazardous wastes that have been treated, stored, or disposed of at the facility prior to the effective date of the rule establishing the new listing or identification.

<u>003.03G4</u> Changes necessary to comply with an interim status corrective action order issued by EPA under Section 3008(h) or other Federal authority, by an authorized State under comparable State authority, or by a court in a judicial proceeding brought by EPA or an authorized State, provided that such changes are limited to the treatment, storage, or disposal of solid waste from releases that originate within the boundary of the facility.

<u>003.03G5</u> To treat or store in containers, tanks or containment buildings, hazardous waste subject to land disposal restrictions imposed by Chapter 20 of this Title or RCRA section 3004, provided that such changes are made solely for the purpose of complying with Chapter 20 of this Title or RCRA section 3004.

<u>003.03G6</u> Addition of newly regulated units under Section <u>003.03F</u> of this chapter.

<u>003.03G7</u> Changes during closure of a facility or a unit within a facility made in accordance with an approved closure plan.

<u>003.03G8</u> Changes necessary to comply with standards under 40 CFR part 63, Subpart EEE-National Emission Standards for Hazardous Air Pollutants from Hazardous Waste Combustors.

003.04 Termination of interim status. Interim status terminates when:

<u>003.04A</u> Final administrative disposition of a permit application, except an application for a remedial action plan (RAP) under Section <u>004</u> of this Chapter, is made.

<u>003.04B</u> Interim status is terminated as provided in 40 CFR 270.10(e)(5) as incorporated by reference in Chapter 13, 005.

<u>003.04C</u> For owners or operators of each land disposal facility which is in existence on the effective date of statutory or regulatory amendments under the State Act that render the facility subject to the requirement to have a hazardous waste permit and which is granted interim status, twelve months after the date on which the facility first becomes subject to such permit requirement unless the owner or operator of such facility:

<u>003.04C1</u> Submits a Part B application for a hazardous waste permit for such facility within 12 months of the date on which the facility first becomes subject to such permit requirement; and

<u>003.04C2</u> Certifies that such facility is in compliance with all applicable ground water monitoring and financial responsibility requirements.

<u>003.04D</u> For owners or operators of any land disposal unit that is granted authority to operate under Sections <u>003.03A</u> through <u>003.03C</u>, on the date 12 months after the effective date of such requirement, unless the owner or operator certifies that such unit is in compliance with all applicable ground water monitoring and financial responsibility requirements.

<u>003.04E</u> For owners or operators of each incinerator facility interim status terminates on November 8, 1989, unless the owner or operator of the facility submits a Part B application for a hazardous waste permit for an incinerator facility by November 8, 1986.

<u>003.04F</u> For owners or operators of any facility (other than a land disposal or an incinerator facility) which has achieved interim status prior to November 8, 1984, interim status terminates on November 8, 1992, unless the owner or operator of the facility submits a Part B application for a RCRA permit for the facility by November 8, 1988.

## 004 Remedial Action Plans (RAPs)

<u>004.01</u> The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 270, Subpart H, 270.79 through 270.230, pertaining to remedial action plans, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>005</u> The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 270, Subpart I, 270.235, pertaining to integration with maximum achievable control technology (MACT) standards, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

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#### NEBRASKA ADMINISTRATIVE CODE

Title 128 - Department of Environmental Quality

Chapter 13 - PERMIT APPLICATION

- <u>001</u> Any person who is required to have a permit (including new applicants and permittees with expiring permits) shall complete, sign, and submit an application to the Director in accordance with the conditions and requirements of this Chapter. Persons currently authorized with interim status shall apply for permits when required by the Director. Persons covered by permits by rule need not apply. Procedures for applications, issuance and administration of emergency permits are found in Chapter 12, <u>001.04B</u>.
  - <u>001.01</u> Procedures for application, issuance and administration of research, development and demonstration permits are found in Chapter 12, 001.04E.
  - <u>001.02</u> Any person who intends to apply for a new commercial hazardous waste management facility permit must file a "Notice of Intent" form with the Director at least 180 days prior to making their application, in accordance with Neb. Rev. Stat. 81-1521.08, et seq.
  - <u>001.03</u> Persons seeking initial permits for hazardous waste management units, or seeking renewal of permits for such units, where the renewal application is proposing a significant change in facility operations, must comply with the pre-application public meeting and notice requirements in Section <u>016</u> of this Chapter. For the purpose of Section <u>016</u>, a "significant change" is any change that would qualify as a class 3 permit modification under Section 012.02 of Chapter 15.
  - <u>001.04</u> Persons seeking initial permits for hazardous waste management units, or seeking renewal of expiring permits for such units under Section <u>014.04</u> of Chapter 15, must comply with the requirements for public notice at the application stage in Section <u>017</u> of this Chapter.
  - <u>001.05</u> The requirements of Sections <u>016</u> and <u>017</u> do not apply to permit modifications under Section <u>012.02</u> of Chapter 15, or to applications that are submitted for the sole purpose of conducting post-closure activities and corrective action at a facility.
  - <u>001.06</u> All applicants seeking permits for hazardous waste management units must comply with the information repository requirements in Section <u>018</u> of this Chapter.
- <u>002</u> When a facility or activity is owned by one person but is operated by another person, it is the operator's duty to obtain a permit, except that all owners must also sign the permit application.

- <u>003</u> The Director shall not issue a permit before receiving a complete application for a permit except for permits by rule, or emergency permits. An application for a permit is complete when the Director receives an application form and any supplemental information which are completed to his or her satisfaction. An application for a permit is complete notwithstanding the failure of the owner or operator to submit the exposure information in accordance with the conditions and requirements of Section <u>010</u> of this Chapter. The Director may deny a permit for the active life of a hazardous waste management facility or unit before receiving a complete application for a permit.
- <u>004</u> All applicants for permits shall provide information to the Director as set forth in Sections <u>005</u> through <u>014</u> of this Chapter, using the application form provided by the Director.
- <u>005</u> Owners and operators of existing hazardous waste management facilities and hazardous waste management facilities qualifying for interim status in accordance with Chapter 12, <u>003.01</u>, are required to file permit applications in accordance with the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.10(e), which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- <u>006</u> Owners and operators of new hazardous waste management facilities are required to file permit applications in accordance with 40 CFR 270.10(f), which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- <u>007</u> Permit applications shall be updated in accordance with the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.10(g), which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- <u>008</u> Permit reapplications shall be submitted in accordance with the requirements of 40 CFR 270.10(h), which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- <u>009</u> Applicants shall keep records of all data used to complete permit applications and any supplemental information submitted for a period of at least three years from the date the permit expires.
- 010 Exposure information.
  - <u>010.01</u> Any Part B permit application submitted by an owner or operator of a facility that stores, treats, or disposes of hazardous waste must be accompanied by information, reasonably ascertainable by the owner or operator, on the potential for the public to be exposed to hazardous wastes or hazardous constituents through releases related to the regulated unit. At a minimum, such information must address:
    - <u>010.01A</u> Reasonably foreseeable potential releases from both normal operations and accidents at the regulated unit, including releases associated with transportation to or from the regulated unit;

<u>010.01B</u> The potential pathways of human exposure to hazardous wastes or constituents resulting from the releases described under Section <u>010.01A</u> of this Chapter; and

<u>010.01C</u> A health-based risk assessment addressing the potential magnitude and nature of the human exposure resulting from such releases.

010.01D Any additional information as required by the Director.

<u>010.02</u> If required by the Director, any Part B permit application submitted by an owner or operator of a facility for a post closure permit must be accompanied by information, reasonably ascertainable by the owner or operator, on the potential for the public to be exposed to hazardous wastes or hazardous constituents through releases related to the unit. At a minimum, such information must address the requirements of <u>010.01A</u> through 010.01D of this chapter.

<u>010.03</u> The Director may require a permittee or an applicant to submit additional information in order to establish permit conditions under Chapter 14.

# 011 Signatures.

<u>011.01</u> All permit applications shall be signed in accordance with the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.11(a), which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>011.02</u> All reports required by permits and other information requested by the Director shall be signed in accordance with the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.11(b) and (c), which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

<u>011.03</u> Any person signing a document under this Section must make the following certification:

"I certify under penalty of law that this document and all attachments were prepared under my direction or supervision according to a system designed to assure that qualified personnel properly gather and evaluate the information submitted. Based on my inquiry of the person or persons who manage the system, or those persons directly responsible for gathering the information, the information submitted is, to the best of my knowledge and belief, true, accurate, and complete. I am aware that there are significant penalties for submitting false information, including the possibility of fine and imprisonment for knowing violations."

<u>011.04</u> For remedial action plans (RAPs) under Chapter 12, Section <u>004</u> of this Title, if the operator certifies according to <u>011.03</u> of this Section, then the owner may choose to make the following certification instead of the certification in <u>011.03</u> of this Section:

"Based on my knowledge of the conditions of the property described in the RAP and my inquiry of the person or persons who manage the system referenced in the operator's certification, or those persons directly responsible for gathering the information, the information submitted is, upon information and belief, true, accurate, and complete. I am aware that there are significant penalties for submitting false information, including the possibility of fine and imprisonment for knowing violations."

## 012 Contents of the permit application.

- <u>012.01</u> Part A of the hazardous waste permit application shall be submitted in accordance with the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.13, which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- <u>012.02</u> Part B of the hazardous waste permit application shall be submitted in accordance with the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.14, which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
  - <u>012.02A</u> For post-closure permits, the owner or operator is required to submit only the information specified in 40 CFR 270.14(b)(1), (4), (5), (6), (11), (13), (14), (16), (18) and (19), (c), and (d), as incorporated by reference in Section <u>012.02</u>, unless the Director determines that additional information from 40 CFR 270.14, as incorporated by Section <u>012.02</u>, or from 40 CFR 270.16, 270.17, 270.18, 270.20, or 270.21, as incorporated by reference in Section <u>012.04</u>, is necessary.
- <u>012.03</u> Applications for new hazardous waste land disposal areas and surface impoundments shall include engineering plans and specifications prepared under the direction of and stamped by a professional engineer licensed to practice in Nebraska; and
- <u>012.04</u> Specific information must be submitted for certain types of hazardous waste facilities that are used for storage, treatment or disposal. A description of the specific information required is given in 40 CFR 270.15 through 270.27, which are hereby adopted and incorporated by reference herein.
- <u>012.05</u> All permit applications for hazardous waste treatment, storage, and disposal facilities shall include certification by the State Fire Marshal as to fire prevention and fire safety.
- <u>013</u> Additional information requests. No permit application submitted to the Department will be processed until all information necessary to complete the application or additional information as requested by the Department has been received.
- <u>014</u> If an applicant fails or refuses to correct deficiencies in the application, the permit may be denied.

- <u>015</u> The effective date of an application is the date on which the Director notifies the applicant that the application is complete.
- <u>016</u> Pre-application public meeting and notice for initial permits and permit renewals proposing a significant change in facility operations.
  - <u>016.01</u> Prior to the submission of a part B permit application for a facility, the applicant must hold at least one meeting with the public in order to solicit questions from the community and inform the community of proposed hazardous waste management activities. The applicant shall post a sign-in sheet or otherwise provide a voluntary opportunity for attendees to provide their names and addresses.
  - <u>016.02</u> The applicant shall submit a summary of the meeting, along with the list of attendees and their addresses developed under paragraph (b) of this section, and copies of any written comments or materials submitted at the meeting, to the Director as a part of the part B application, in accordance with 40 CFR 270.14(b), as adopted by reference at Section <u>012.02</u> of this Chapter.
  - <u>016.03</u> The applicant must provide public notice of the pre-application meeting at least 30 days prior to the meeting. The applicant must maintain, and provide to the Director upon request, documentation of the notice.
    - <u>016.03A</u> The applicant shall provide public notice in all of the following forms:

<u>016.03A1</u> A newspaper advertisement. The applicant shall publish a notice, fulfilling the requirements in Section <u>016.03B</u> of this Chapter, in a newspaper of general circulation in the county or equivalent jurisdiction that hosts the proposed location of the facility. In addition, the Director shall instruct the applicant to publish the notice in newspapers of general circulation in adjacent counties or equivalent jurisdictions, where the Director determines that such publication is necessary to inform the affected public. The notice must be published as a display advertisement.

<u>016.03A2</u> A visible and accessible sign. The applicant shall post a notice on a clearly marked sign at or near the facility, fulfilling the requirements in Section <u>016.03B</u> of this Chapter. If the applicant places the sign on the facility property, then the sign must be large enough to be readable from the nearest point where the public would pass by the site.

<u>016.03A3</u> A broadcast media announcement. The applicant shall broadcast a notice, fulfilling the requirements in Section <u>016.03B</u> of this Chapter, at least once on at least one local radio station or television station. The applicant may employ another medium with prior approval of the Director.

<u>016.03A4</u> A notice to the permitting agency. The applicant shall send a copy of the newspaper notice to the Director and to the appropriate units of State and local government, in accordance with Section <u>006.01</u> of Chapter 15.

<u>016.03B</u> The notices required under Section <u>016.03A</u> of this Chapter must include:

<u>016.03B1</u> The date, time, and location of the meeting;

016.03B2 A brief description of the purpose of the meeting;

<u>016.03B3</u> A brief description of the facility and proposed operations, including the address or a map (e.g., a sketched or copied street map) of the facility location:

<u>016.03B4</u> A statement encouraging people to contact the facility at least 72 hours before the meeting if they need special access to participate in the meeting; and

<u>016.03B5</u> The name, address, and telephone number of a contact person for the applicant.

<u>017</u> Public notice requirements at the application stage for initial permits and renewal of expiring permits.

017.01 Notification at application submittal.

<u>017.01A</u> The Director shall provide public notice as set forth in Section <u>006.01A</u> of Chapter 15, and notice to appropriate units of State and local government as set forth in Section <u>006.01</u> of Chapter 15, that a part B permit application has been submitted to the Director and is available for review.

<u>017.01B</u> The notice shall be published within a reasonable period of time after the application is received by the Director. The notice must include:

<u>017.01B1</u> The name and telephone number of the applicant's contact person;

<u>017.01B2</u> The name and telephone number of the Department's contact office, and a mailing address to which information, opinions, and inquiries may be directed throughout the permit review process:

<u>017.01B3</u> An address to which people can write in order to be put on the Department mailing list as defined in Section <u>006.01A</u> of Chapter 15;

<u>017.01B4</u> The location where copies of the permit application and any supporting documents can be viewed and copied;

<u>017.01B5</u> A brief description of the facility and proposed operations, including the address or a map (e.g., a sketched or copied street map) of the facility location on the front page of the notice; and

017.01B6 The date that the application was submitted.

<u>017.02</u> Concurrent with the notice required under Section <u>017.01</u> of this Chapter, the Director must place the permit application and any supporting documents in a location accessible to the public in the vicinity of the facility or at the permitting agency's office.

018 Information repository requirements for all permit applicants.

<u>018.01</u> The Director may assess the need, on a case-by-case basis, for an information repository. When assessing the need for an information repository, the Director shall consider a variety of factors, including: the level of public interest; the type of facility; the presence of an existing repository; and the proximity to the nearest copy of the administrative record. If the Director determines, at any time after submittal of a permit application, that there is a need for a repository, then the Director shall notify the facility that it must establish and maintain an information repository. (See Section <u>002.18</u> of Chapter 14, for similar provisions relating to the information repository during the life of a permit).

<u>018.02</u> The information repository shall contain all documents, reports, data, and information deemed necessary by the Director to fulfill the purposes for which the repository is established. The Director shall have the discretion to limit the contents of the repository.

<u>018.03</u> The information repository shall be located and maintained at a site chosen by the facility. If the Director finds the site unsuitable for the purposes and persons for which it was established, due to problems with the location, hours of availability, access, or other relevant considerations, then the Director shall specify a more appropriate site.

<u>018.04</u> The Director shall specify requirements for informing the public about the information repository. At a minimum, the Director shall require the facility to provide a written notice about the information repository to all individuals on the Department mailing list as defined in Section 006.01A of Chapter 15.

<u>018.05</u> The facility owner/operator shall be responsible for maintaining and updating the repository with appropriate information throughout a time period specified by the Director. The Director may close the repository at his or her discretion, based on the factors in Section <u>018.01</u> of this Chapter.

Chapter 14 - PERMIT CONDITIONS

- <u>001</u> This Chapter establishes provisions for hazardous waste permits (as required by Chapter 12) with respect to standard conditions applicable to all permits, general facility conditions, specific facility conditions, recordkeeping and reporting requirements for monitoring results, schedules of compliance, and restrictive covenants for disposal permits.
  - <u>001.01</u> All permit conditions shall be incorporated into the permit either expressly or by reference. If incorporated by reference, a specific citation to these regulations shall be stated in the permit.
- 002 Standard conditions applicable to all permits.
  - <u>002.01</u> The permittee must comply with all conditions and restrictions placed upon the permit, except that the permittee need not comply with the conditions of the permit to the extent and for the duration such non-compliance is authorized in an Emergency permit as described in Chapter 12, <u>001.04B</u>. Any permit non-compliance constitutes a violation of the State Act and is grounds for enforcement action; for permit termination, revocation and reissuance or modification; or for denial of a permit renewal.
  - <u>002.02</u> If the permittee wishes to continue an activity regulated by the permit after the expiration date of the permit, the permittee must apply for and obtain a new permit prior to the expiration date of the permit in effect subject to the provisions in Chapter 15, 014.04.
  - <u>002.03</u> It shall not be a defense for a permittee in an enforcement action that it would have been necessary to halt or reduce the permitted activity in order to maintain compliance with the conditions of the permit.
  - <u>002.04</u> In the event of noncompliance with the permit, the permittee shall take all reasonable steps to minimize releases to the environment, and shall carry out such measures as are reasonable to prevent significant adverse impacts on human health or the environment.
  - <u>002.05</u> The permittee shall at all times properly operate and maintain all facilities and systems of treatment and control (and related appurtenances) which are installed or used by the permittee to achieve compliance with the conditions of the permit. Proper operation and maintenance includes effective performance, adequate funding, adequate operator staffing and training, and adequate laboratory and process controls, including appropriate quality assurance procedures. This provision requires the operation of back-

up or auxiliary facilities or similar systems only when necessary to achieve compliance with the conditions of the permit.

<u>002.06</u> The permit may be modified, revoked and reissued, or terminated for cause. The filing of a request by the permittee for a permit modification, revocation and reissuance, or termination, or a notification of planned changes or anticipated noncompliance, does not stay any permit condition.

<u>002.07</u> The permit does not convey any property rights of any sort, or any exclusive privilege.

<u>002.08</u> The permittee shall furnish to the Director, within a reasonable time, any relevant information which the Director may request to determine whether cause exists for modifying, revoking and reissuing, or terminating the permit, or to determine compliance with the permit. The permittee shall also furnish to the Director, upon request, copies of records required to be kept by the permit.

<u>002.09</u> The permittee shall allow the Director, or an authorized representative, upon the presentation of credentials and other documents as may be required by law to:

<u>002.09A</u> Enter at reasonable times upon the permittee's premises where a regulated facility or activity is located or conducted, or where records must be kept under the conditions of the permit;

<u>002.09B</u> Have access to and copy, at reasonable times, any records that must be kept under the conditions of the permit;

<u>002.09C</u> Inspect at reasonable times any facilities, equipment (including monitoring and control equipment), practices, or operations regulated or required under the permit; and

<u>002.09D</u> Sample or monitor at reasonable times, for the purposes of assuring permit compliance any substances or parameters at any location.

# 002.10 Monitoring and records.

<u>002.10A</u> Samples and measurements taken for the purpose of monitoring shall be representative of the monitored activity.

<u>002.10B</u> The permittee shall retain records of all monitoring information, including all calibration and maintenance records and all original strip chart recordings for continuous monitoring instrumentation, copies of all reports required by the permit, the certification required by 40 CFR 264.73(b)(9), as incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, <u>005</u> and records of all data used to complete the application for the permit, for a period of at least three years from the date of the sample,

measurement, report or application. This period may be extended by request of the Director at any time. The permittee shall maintain records from all groundwater monitoring wells and associated groundwater surface elevations, for the active life of the facility, and for disposal facilities for the post-closure care period as well.

002.10C Records for monitoring information shall include:

002.10C1 The date, exact place, and time of sampling or measurements;

<u>002.10C2</u> The individual(s) who performed the sampling or measurements;

<u>002.10C3</u> The date(s) analyses were performed;

022.10C4 The individual(s) who performed the analyses;

002.10C5 The results of such analyses; and

<u>002.10C6</u> The analytical techniques or methods used.

<u>002.11</u> All applications, reports, or information submitted to the Director shall be signed and certified in accordance with Chapter 13, <u>011</u>.

### <u>002.12</u> Reporting requirements.

<u>002.12A</u> Planned changes. The permittee shall give notice to the Director as soon as possible of any planned physical alterations or additions to the permitted facility.

<u>002.12B</u> Anticipated noncompliance. The permittee shall give advance notice to the Director of any planned changes in the permitted facility or activity which may result in noncompliance with permit requirements. For a new facility, the permittee may not treat, store, or dispose of hazardous waste; and for a facility being modified, the permittee may not treat, store, or dispose of hazardous waste in the modified portion of the facility except as provided in Chapter 15, Section <u>012.02</u>, until:

<u>002.12B1</u> The permittee has submitted to the Director by certified mail or hand delivery a letter signed by the permittee and a registered professional engineer stating that the facility has been constructed or modified in compliance with the permit; and

<u>002.12B2</u> The Director has inspected the modified or newly constructed facility and finds it is in compliance with the conditions of the permit; or within 30 days of the date of submission of the letter in Section <u>002.12B1</u> of this Chapter, the permittee has not received notice from the Director of his or her

intent to inspect, prior inspection is waived and the permittee may commence treatment, storage, or disposal of hazardous waste.

<u>002.12C</u> Transfers. The permit is not transferable to any person except after notice to the Director. The Director may require modification or revocation and reissuance of the permit to change the name of the permittee and incorporate such other requirements as necessary.

<u>002.12D</u> Monitoring reports. Monitoring results shall be reported at the intervals specified elsewhere in the permit.

<u>002.12E</u> Compliance schedules. Reports of compliance or noncompliance with, or any progress reports on, interim and final requirements contained in any compliance schedule of the permit shall be submitted no later than 14 days following each schedule date.

<u>002.12F</u> Twenty-four hour reporting.

<u>002.12F1</u> The permittee shall orally report any information concerning the release of any hazardous waste or instances of noncompliance which may endanger health or the environment within 24 hours from the time the permittee knows or should have known the circumstances.

002.12F2 The description of the occurrence and its cause shall include:

<u>002.12F2(a)</u> Name, address, and telephone number of the owner or operator, and of the facility;

<u>002.12F2(b)</u> Type of incident, name and quantity of the material(s) involved, the duration of the occurrence including exact dates and times; and extent of injuries (if any);

<u>002.12F2(c)</u> An assessment of actual or potential hazards to the environment and human health both inside the facility, and outside the facility (where applicable);

<u>002.12F2(d)</u> If the noncompliance has not been corrected, an estimate of the time it is expected to continue; and steps taken or planned to reduce, eliminate; and prevent reoccurrence of the noncompliance;

<u>002.12F2(e)</u> The estimated quantity and disposition of the recovered material that resulted from the incident.

- <u>002.12F3</u> A written submission shall also be provided within 5 days of the time the permittee becomes aware of the circumstances. The written submission shall contain a description of the noncompliance and its cause; the period of noncompliance including the exact dates and times, and if the noncompliance has not been corrected, the anticipated time it is expected to continue; and steps taken or planned to reduce, eliminate, and prevent reoccurrence of the noncompliance. The Director may waive the five day written notice requirement in favor of a written report within fifteen days.
- <u>002.13</u> Manifest discrepancy report. If a discrepancy in a manifest is discovered, the permittee must attempt to reconcile the discrepancy. If not resolved within fifteen days, the permittee must submit a letter report, including a copy of the manifest, to the Director. (see 40 CFR Part 264.72, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, <u>005</u>).
- <u>002.14</u> Unmanifested waste report. This report must be submitted to the Director within fifteen days of receipt of unmanifested waste. (see 40 CFR Part 264.76, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, <u>005</u>).
- <u>002.15</u> Biennial report. A biennial report must be submitted covering facility activities during odd numbered calendar years. (see 40 CFR Part 264.75, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 21, <u>005</u>).
- <u>002.16</u> Other noncompliance. The permittee shall report all instances of noncompliance not reported under Sections <u>002.12D</u>, <u>002.12E</u> and <u>002.12F</u> of this Chapter, at the time monitoring reports are submitted, or at least quarterly.
- <u>002.17</u> Other information. Where the permittee becomes aware that they failed to submit any relevant facts in a permit application, or submitted incorrect information in a permit application or in any report to the Director, they shall promptly submit such facts or information.
- <u>002.18</u> Information repository. The Director may require the permittee to establish and maintain an information repository at any time, based on the factors set forth in Section <u>018.01</u> of Chapter 13. The information repository will be governed by the provisions in Sections <u>018.02</u> through <u>018.05</u> of Chapter 13.
- 003 Requirements for recording and reporting of monitoring results. All permits shall specify:
  - <u>003.01</u> Requirements concerning the proper use, maintenance and installation, when appropriate, of monitoring equipment or methods (including biological monitoring methods when appropriate);
  - <u>003.02</u> Required monitoring including type, intervals, and frequency sufficient to yield data which are representative of the monitored activity including, when appropriate, continuous monitoring; and

<u>003.03</u> Applicable reporting requirements based upon the impact of the regulated activity and as specified in Chapters 7 and 21. Reporting shall be no less frequent than specified in the above regulations.

## 004 Establishing permit conditions.

<u>004.01</u> In addition to conditions required in all permits (by Section <u>002</u> of this Chapter), the Director shall establish conditions, as required on a case-by-case basis, in permits under Chapter 15, <u>014</u> (duration of permits), Section <u>005</u> of this Chapter (schedules of compliance), and Section <u>003</u> of this Chapter (monitoring).

004.02 General facility conditions and specific facility conditions.

<u>004.02A</u> Each hazardous waste permit shall include permit conditions necessary to achieve compliance with the Act, including each of the applicable requirements of Chapters 7, 20, and 21. In satisfying this provision, the Director may incorporate applicable requirements of Chapter 7, 20, and 21 directly into the permit or establish other permit conditions that are based on the requirements of Chapters 7, 20, and 21.

<u>004.02B</u> Each permit issued under Title 128 shall contain terms and conditions as the Director determines necessary to protect human health and the environment.

<u>004.03</u> An applicable requirement is a State statutory or regulatory requirement which becomes effective prior to final administrative disposition of a permit. An applicable requirement is also any requirement which takes effect prior to the modification or revocation and reissuance of a permit, to the extent allowed by Chapter 15.

<u>004.04</u> New or reissued permits, and to the extent allowed under Chapter 15, modified or revoked and reissued permits, shall incorporate each of the applicable requirements referenced in this Section and Section <u>003</u> of this Chapter.

<u>005</u> Schedule of compliance. The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.33, pertaining to compliance schedules, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein.

<u>006</u> The permit shall include a list of the wastes or classes of wastes which will be treated, stored, or disposed of at the facility, and a description of the processes to be used for treating, storing, and disposing of these hazardous wastes at the facility including the design capacities of each storage, treatment, and disposal unit. Except in the case of containers, the description must identify the particular wastes or classes of wastes which will be treated, stored, or disposed of in particular equipment or locations (e.g. "Halogenated organics may be stored in Tank A", and "Metal hydroxide sludges may be disposed of in landfill cells B, C, and D").

<u>007</u> Restrictive covenant for disposal permit: Before allowing disposal operations to commence, the owner of the land to be used for disposal of hazardous wastes shall execute and file with the Department and the Register of Deeds of the county where such land is located the following Restrictive Covenants:

The undersigned (Owner) is the owner of the following described real estate:

These Restrictive Covenants are established upon the property.

- 1. The property will be used for the disposal of hazardous wastes.
- 2. (Insert regulations which govern operation of the site, which should be a matter of constructive notice to prospective purchasers during the operation of the facility.)
- 3. The future use of the property is restricted by applicable federal and state regulations governing hazardous waste disposal facilities, and any future use may not disturb the integrity of the final cover, liners or any other components of any containment system or the function of the monitoring systems of the facility, without the prior written approval of the Director of the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality.
- 4. A map of the type, location and quantity of hazardous wastes disposed of within the property will be filed within 60 days of closure with the Register of Deeds and with the Director of the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality.
- 5. These Restrictive Covenants shall run with the land and shall be binding upon and enforceable by the Owner, all persons claiming under the Owner and the Director of the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality. These Restrictive Covenants may be terminated or modified, in writing, by the Owner only with the written and recorded consent of the Director of the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality.
- 6. The enforcement of these Restrictive Covenants may be by proceedings at law or in equity against any person violating or attempting to violate any provision hereof. The proceedings may be to restrain the violation or to recover damages.
- 7. The invalidation of any one of these Restrictive Covenants shall not affect the validity of the remaining provisions hereof.

# NEBRASKA ADMINISTRATIVE CODE

- Title 128 Department of Environmental Quality
- Chapter 15 PERMIT ISSUANCE; CHANGES; RENEWAL; TERMINATION; CLOSURES; DURATION
- <u>001</u> Except as more expressly provided herein, the procedures set forth in Title 115 <u>Rules of Practice and Procedure</u>, Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality, shall apply to the following proceedings: Closure Plans; Post-Closure Plans; Post-Closure Permits; and, Operating Permits.
- 002 Preparation of a draft permit or denial of a hazardous waste facility permit.
  - <u>002.01</u> Once an application is complete and any local approval obtained as required in Neb. Rev. Stat. §81-1521.08 through §81-1521.23, the Director shall issue a preliminary decision approving or denying the permit.
  - <u>002.02</u> If the Director decides to prepare a draft permit, that draft permit shall contain the following information and follow the public notice and participation procedures outlined below:
    - <u>002.02A</u> Standards for treatment, storage and/or disposal and other permit conditions under Sections <u>001</u> and <u>002</u> of Chapter 14.
    - <u>002.02B</u> All conditions, compliance schedules, and monitoring requirements of Chapter 14.
  - <u>002.03</u> If the Director issues a preliminary decision denying the draft permit, a notice of intent to deny the permit shall be issued. A notice of intent to deny the permit application shall follow the same procedures as any draft permit prepared under this Chapter.

## 003 Fact sheet.

<u>003.01</u> A fact sheet shall be prepared for every draft permit for a major hazardous waste management facility or activity, as defined in Section <u>001.03I(4)</u> of Chapter 12. Following the issuance of public notice of preparation of a draft permit, the Director shall send a fact sheet to the applicant and, on request, to any other person. A fact sheet shall be prepared for a hazardous waste facility which the Director determines involves widespread public interest or where major issues are raised with respect to the application described in the public notice. The fact sheet shall briefly specify the principal facts and significant factual, legal, methodological and policy questions considered in preparing the draft permit.

## 003.02 Each fact sheet shall contain:

<u>003.02A</u> A brief description of the type of facility or activity which is the subject of the draft permit;

<u>003.02B</u> The type and quantity of wastes which are proposed to be or are being treated, stored or disposed of;

<u>003.02C</u> Reasons why any requested variances or alternatives to required standards do or do not appear to be justified;

<u>003.02D</u> The statutory or regulatory provisions on which permit requirements are based;

<u>003.02E</u> A description of the procedures for the formulation of final determination, including the beginning and ending dates of the 45-day comment period, address where comments should be sent, procedures for requesting a public hearing, and any other procedures by which the public may participate; and

<u>003.02F</u> Name and telephone number of a person to contact for additional information.

<u>004</u> Statement of basis. When a fact sheet is not prepared, a statement of basis will be prepared which shall briefly describe the conditions of the draft permit and the reasons for them, or in the case of a notice to deny a permit, the reasons supporting the preliminary decision. This statement shall be sent to the applicant and on request, to any other person.

## 005 Administrative record for draft permits.

<u>005.01</u> The provisions of a draft permit shall be based on the administrative record defined in Section 005.02 of this Chapter.

005.02 The administrative record shall consist of the following:

<u>005.02A</u> The permit application, and any supporting data furnished by the applicant;

<u>005.02B</u> The draft permit or notice of intent to deny the application or to terminate the permit;

<u>005.02C</u> The statement of basis defined in Section <u>004</u> of this Chapter, or fact sheet defined in Section <u>003</u> of this Chapter;

005.02D All documents cited in the statement of basis or fact sheet; and

<u>005.02E</u> Other documents contained in the supporting file for the draft permit including all correspondence, memoranda, and meeting notes that are related to the development of the draft permit.

006 Public notice of permit actions and public comment period.

006.01 A public notice of a draft permit, intent to deny, and public hearings shall be issued by circulating the notice in the geographical area of the proposed facility through publication in a daily or weekly newspaper with general circulation, and by broadcasting over local radio stations; and mailed to the applicant, any other agency which the Director knows has issued or is required to issue a Underground Injection Control, Prevention of Significant Deterioration (or other permit under the Clean Air Act), National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System, Clean Water Act Section 404 or sludge management permit for the same facility or activity, any unit of local government having jurisdiction over the area where the facility is proposed to be located, each state agency having any authority under state law with respect to the construction or operation of such facility, and to any other person or group, either upon request or whose names are on a Department mailing list as defined in Section <u>006.01A</u>, to receive public notices. Federal and State agencies with jurisdiction over fish, shellfish, and wildlife resources, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, the State Historic Preservation Officer, and other appropriate authorities; including any affected States (Indian Tribes) and EPA shall also be mailed a copy of the notice. Any person otherwise entitled to receive notice may waive his or her rights to receive notice for any classes and categories of permit.

006.01A Department mailing list is a list developed by:

006.01A1 Including those who request in writing to be on the list;

 $\underline{006.01A2}$  Soliciting persons for "area lists" from participants in past proceedings in that area; and

<u>006.01A3</u> Notifying the public of the opportunity to be put on the mailing list through periodic publication in the public press and in such publications as Regional and State funded newsletters, environmental bulletins, or State journals. (The Director may update the mailing list from time to time by requesting written indication of continued interest from those listed. The Director may delete from the list the name of any person who fails to respond to such a request.)

<u>006.02</u> The Department shall notify all municipalities within ten miles of a proposed hazardous waste disposal area of the application together with the Director's decision to approve or deny by publication in a newspaper as provided in Section <u>006.01</u> of this Chapter.

<u>006.03</u> Persons or groups will have 45 days from issuance of public notice to either provide the Director with any written comments concerning the proposed facility for which the public notice has been issued, or request a public hearing in writing or both. Such 45 day period may be extended by the Director. All comments shall be considered in making the final decision and shall be answered as provided in Section <u>009</u> of this Chapter.

<u>006.04</u> If any information or public comment is received during the comment period which appears to raise substantial issues concerning a permit, the Director may formulate a new draft permit which supersedes the original draft permit and republish the public notice. If no substantial issues are raised, and the Director issues the permit, the Director shall prepare a written response to each submitted comment.

006.05 Content of the public notice. The public notice of an application shall contain:

<u>006.05A</u> Name, address and phone number of the agency processing the permit action and issuing the public notice;

<u>006.05B</u> The name and address of the permittee or permit applicant, and if different, of the facility or activity regulated by the permit;

<u>006.05C</u> A brief description of the business conducted at the facility or activity described in the permit application or the draft permit;

<u>006.05D</u> A statement of the preliminary determination to issue or deny a permit for the activity described in the application and that where applicable, a draft permit has been prepared;

<u>006.05E</u> A brief description of the comment procedures and the time and place of any hearing that will be held, including a statement of procedures to request a hearing (unless a hearing has already been scheduled) and other procedures by which the public may participate in the final permit decision; and

<u>006.05F</u> The address, phone number and name of the person from whom interested persons may obtain further information (including copies of the draft permit, statement of basis or fact sheet, and the application), and inspect and copy forms and related documents.

<u>006.05G</u> The location of the administrative record, the times at which the record will be open for public inspection, and a statement that all data submitted by the applicant is available as part of the public record.

<u>006.06</u> In addition to the general public notice described in this Section, the applicant, any other agency which the Director knows has issued or is required to issue a Underground Injection Control, Prevention of Significant Deterioration (or other permit under the Clean Air Act), National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System, Clean Water

Act Section 404 or sludge management permit for the same facility or activity, Federal and State agencies with jurisdiction over fish, shellfish, and wildlife resources, the Advisory Council on Historic Preservation, the State Historic preservation Officers, and other appropriate government authorities including any affected States (Indian Tribes) and the EPA shall be mailed a copy of the fact sheet or statement of basis, the permit application (if any) and the draft permit (if any).

## 007 Public hearings; when required.

<u>007.01</u> The applicant, any affected state, any affected interstate agency, the Regional Administrator of EPA, or any interested agency, person or group of persons may request or petition the Director, in writing, within the 45-day comment period of the public notice, with respect to the application, for a public hearing, if no hearing has already been scheduled, and state the nature of the issues to be raised in the hearing.

<u>007.01A</u> The Director may hold an adjudicative hearing on the granting or denial of the permit if the Director determines that the circumstances justify it;

<u>007.01B</u> The Director shall hold an adjudicative hearing if it appears that the granting or denial of the permit interferes with or impairs or threatens to interfere with or impair the legal rights of the permit applicant or any person so that the situation falls within the Department's Title 115 - Rules of Practice and Procedure.

<u>007.01C</u> The Director may hold a public hearing if the comments, requests or petitions raise legal, policy or discretionary questions of general application not pertaining solely to a particular party and significant public interest exists with respect to the application; or

<u>007.01D</u> The Director shall hold a public hearing whenever he or she receives written notice of opposition to a draft permit and a request for a hearing within the 45 days public notice period.

<u>007.02</u> Public notice of any hearing held shall be issued, circulated, and mailed in the same manner as public notice of pending issuance or denial of hazardous waste facility permit, as specified in Section <u>006</u> of this Chapter, and shall be so issued, circulated, and mailed at least 30 days prior to the public hearing. Whenever possible the Director shall schedule a hearing at a location convenient to the nearest population center to the proposed facility.

<u>007.03</u> Content of public notice of hearing. In addition to the general public notice described in Section <u>006</u> of this Chapter, the public notice of hearing shall contain the following information:

007.03A Reference to the date of previous public notices relating to the permit;

007.03B Date, time, and place of hearing;

<u>007.03C</u> A brief description of the nature and purpose of the hearing, including the applicable rules and procedures;

007.03D A concise statement of the issues raised; and

<u>007.03E</u> A brief description of the permit term and conditions which have been contested and for which the hearing has been granted.

<u>008</u> Issuance and effective date of the permit. After the close of the public comment period as provided in Section <u>006</u> of this Chapter, the Director shall issue a final permit decision. The Director shall notify the applicant of the decision to issue, deny, modify, revoke and reissue, or terminate a permit and shall specify the effective date of the permit.

# 009 Response to comments.

<u>009.01</u> At the time that any final permit decision is issued, the Director shall issue a response to comments. This response shall:

<u>009.01A</u> Specify which provisions, if any, of the draft permit have been changed in the final permit decision, and the reasons for the change; and

<u>009.01B</u> Briefly describe and respond to all significant comments on the draft permit raised during the public comment period, or during any hearing.

009.02 The response to comments shall be available to the public.

## <u>010</u> Administrative record for final permits.

<u>010.01</u> The Director shall base final permit decisions under Section <u>008</u> of this Chapter on the Administrative record defined in Section <u>010.02</u> of this Chapter.

<u>010.02</u> The administrative record for the final permit shall consist of the administrative record for the draft permit and:

<u>010.02A</u> All comments received during the public comment period provided under Section 006 of this Chapter;

<u>010.02B</u> Any written materials submitted at a public hearing provided under Section <u>007</u> of this Chapter;

<u>010.02C</u> The response to comments required by Section <u>009</u> of this Chapter and any new material placed in the record under that Section; and

<u>010.02D</u> Other documents contained in the supporting file for the permit including all correspondence, memoranda, and meeting notes that are related to the development of the draft permit.

## 011 Permit transfer.

<u>011.01</u> A permit may be transferred by the permittee to a new owner or operator only if the permit has been modified or revoked and reissued under <u>011.02</u> or <u>012.01C2</u> to identify the new permittee and incorporate such other requirements as may be necessary.

O11.02 Changes in the ownership or operational control of a facility may be made as a Class 1 modification with prior written approval of the Director in accordance with O12.02. The new owner or operator must submit a revised permit application no later than 90 days prior to the scheduled change. A written agreement containing a specific date for transfer of permit responsibility between the current and new permittees must also be submitted to the Director. When a transfer of ownership or operational control occurs, the old owner or operator shall comply with the requirements of Chapter 21, O08 (Financial Requirements) until the new owner or operator has demonstrated that he or she is complying with the requirements of that chapter. The new owner or operator must demonstrate compliance with the financial requirements within six months of the date of the change of ownership or operator of compliance with the financial requirements, the Director by the new owner or operator that he or she no longer needs to comply with financial requirements as of the date of demonstration.

011.03 A permit for a land disposal facility may not be transferred.

012 Modification, revocation and reissuance, or termination of permits.

<u>012.01</u> A permit may be modified or revoked and reissued, or terminated under Section <u>015</u> of this chapter, either at the request of any interested person (including the permittee) or upon the Director's initiative. However, permits may only be modified, revoked and reissued, or terminated for the reasons specified in Sections <u>012.01</u> and <u>015</u> of this chapter. All requests shall be in writing and shall contain facts or reasons supporting the request. If the Director decides the request is not justified, he or she shall send the requester a brief written response giving a reason for the decision. Denials of requests for modification, revocation and reissuance, or termination are not subject to public notice, comment, or hearings. Class 1 and Class 2 modifications as defined in Section <u>012.02</u> of this chapter are not subject to the requirements of Section <u>012.01</u>.

<u>012.01A</u> When the Director receives any information (for example, inspects the facility, receives information submitted by the permittee as required in the permit, receives a request for revocation and reissuance from any interested person or the permittee or conducts a review of the permit file), he or she may determine whether one or more of the causes listed in <u>012.01B</u> and <u>012.01C</u> of this section for

modification, or revocation and reissuance or both exist. If cause exists, the Director may modify or revoke and reissue the permit accordingly, subject to the limitations of <u>012.01D</u> of this section, and may request an updated application if necessary. When a permit is modified, only the conditions subject to modification are reopened. All other aspects of the existing permit shall remain in effect for the duration of the unmodified permit. If a permit is revoked and reissued, the entire permit is reopened and subject to revision and the permit is reissued for a new term. During any revocation and reissuance proceeding, the permittee shall comply with all conditions of the existing permit until a new final permit is reissued. If cause does not exist under this section, the Director shall not modify or revoke and reissue the permit, except on request of the permittee. If a permit modification is requested by the permittee, the Director shall approve or deny the request according to the procedures of <u>012.02</u>.

<u>012.01B</u> Causes for modification. The following are causes for modification, but not revocation and reissuance, of permits; the following may be causes for revocation and reissuance, as well as modification, when the permittee requests or agrees.

<u>012.01B1</u> Alterations. There are material and substantial alterations or additions to the permitted facility or activity which occurred after permit issuance which justify the application of permit conditions that are different or absent in the existing permit.

<u>012.01B2</u> Information. The Director has received information. Permits may be modified during their terms for this cause only if the information was not available at the time of permit issuance (other than revised regulations, guidance, or test methods) and would have justified the application of different permit conditions at the time of issuance.

<u>012.01B3</u> New statutory requirements or regulations. The standards or regulations on which the permit was based have been changed by statute, through promulgation of new or amended standards or regulations, or by judicial decision after the permit was issued.

<u>012.01B4</u> Compliance schedules. The Director determines good cause exists for modification of a compliance schedule, such as an act of God, strike, flood, or materials shortage or other events over which the permittee has little or no control and for which there is no reasonably available remedy.

<u>012.01B5</u> Notwithstanding any other provision in this section, when a permit for a land disposal facility is reviewed by the Director under Section <u>014.03</u>, the Director shall modify the permit as necessary to assure that the facility continues to comply with the currently applicable requirements in Chapters 1 through 19 and 21 through 26.

<u>012.01C</u> Causes for modification or revocation and reissuance. The following are causes to modify or, alternatively, revoke and reissue a permit:

<u>012.01C1</u> Cause exists for termination under Chapter 15, <u>015</u>, and the Director determines that modification or revocation and reissuance is appropriate.

<u>012.01C2</u> The Director has received notification of a proposed transfer of the permit.

<u>012.01D</u> Facility siting. Suitability of the facility location will not be considered at the time of permit modification or revocation and reissuance unless new information or standards indicate that a threat to human health or the environment exists which was unknown at the time of permit issuance.

<u>012.02</u> A permit may be modified at the request of the permittee in accordance with the following conditions and requirements:

<u>012.02A</u> Class 1 modifications. The permittee may put into effect Class 1 modifications listed in Appendix V under the following conditions:

<u>012.02A1</u> Class 1 permit modifications identified in Appendix V by the footnote may be made only with the prior written approval of the Director.

<u>012.02A2</u> The permittee must notify the Director concerning the modification by certified mail or other means that establish proof of delivery within 7 calendar days after the change is put into effect. This notice must specify the changes being made to permit conditions or supporting documents referenced by the permit and must explain why they are necessary. Along with the notice, the permittee must provide the applicable information required by Chapter 13, 012 and Chapter 12, <u>001.04C</u> and <u>001.04D</u>.

<u>012.02A3</u> The permittee must send a notice of the modification to all persons on the facility mailing list, maintained by the Department in accordance with Chapter 15, <u>006.01</u>. This notification must be made within 90 calendar days after the change is put into effect. For the Class 1 modifications that require prior Director approval, the notification must be made within 90 calendar days after the Director approves the request.

<u>012.02A4</u> Any person may request the Director to review, and the Director may for cause reject, any Class 1 modification. The Director must inform the permittee by certified mail that a Class 1 modification has been rejected, explaining the reasons for the rejection. If a Class 1 modification has been rejected, the permittee must comply with the original permit conditions.

<u>012.02A5</u> The permittee may elect to follow the procedures for Class 2 modifications instead of the Class 1 procedures. The permittee must inform the Director of this decision in the notice required in <u>012.02B</u>.

<u>012.02B</u> For Class 2 modifications, listed in Appendix V, the permittee must:

<u>012.02B1</u> Submit a modification request to the Director that:

<u>012.02B1(a)</u> Describes the exact change to be made to the permit conditions and supporting documents referenced by the permit;

<u>012.02B1(b)</u> Identifies that the modification is a Class 2 modification;

012.02B1(c) Explains why the modification is needed; and

<u>012.02B1(d)</u> Provides the applicable information required by Chapter 13, <u>012</u> and Chapter 12, <u>001.04C</u> and <u>001.04D</u>.

<u>012.02B2</u> Send a notice of the modification request to all persons on the facility mailing list maintained by the Department in accordance with Chapter 15, <u>006.01</u> and must publish this notice in a major local newspaper of general circulation. This notice must be mailed and published within 7 days before or after the date of submission of the modification request, and the permittee must provide to the Director evidence of the mailing and publication. The notice must include:

<u>012.02B2(a)</u> Announcement of a 60-day comment period, in accordance with <u>012.02B5</u>, and the name and address of the Department contact to whom comments must be sent:

<u>012.02B2(b)</u> Announcement of the date, time, and place for a public meeting held in accordance with <u>012.02B4</u>;

<u>012.02B2(c)</u> Name and telephone number of the permittee's contact person;

<u>012.02B2(d)</u> Name and telephone number of a Department contact person;

<u>012.02B2(e)</u> Location where copies of the modification request and any supporting documents can be viewed and copied; and

<u>012.02B2(f)</u> The following statement: "The permittee's compliance history during the life of the permit being modified is available from the Department contact person."

<u>012.02B3</u> Place a copy of the permit modification request and supporting documents in a location accessible to the public in the vicinity of the permitted facility.

<u>012.02B4</u> Hold a public meeting no earlier than 15 days after the publication of the notice required in paragraph <u>012.02B2</u> of this section and no later than 15 days before the close of the 60-day comment period. The meeting must be held to the extent practicable in the vicinity of the permitted facility.

<u>012.02B5</u> Provide the public 60 days to comment on the modification request. The comment period will begin on the date the permittee publishes the notice in the local newspaper. Comments should be submitted to the Department contact identified in the public notice.

012.02C For Class 2 modifications listed in Appendix V the Director must:

<u>012.02C1</u> No later than 90 days after receipt of the notification request, unless extended in accordance with 012.02C2:

<u>012.02C1(a)</u> Approve the modification request, with or without changes, and modify the permit accordingly;

<u>012.02C1(b)</u> Deny the request because the modification request is incomplete or the requested modification does not comply with the appropriate requirements of Chapter 21 or other applicable requirements or the conditions of the modifications fail to protect human health and the environment.

<u>012.02C1(c)</u> Determine that the modification request must follow the procedures in <u>012.02K</u> for Class 3 modifications for the reason that there is significant public concern about the proposed modification or the complex nature of the change requires the more extensive procedures of Class 3.

<u>012.02C1(d)</u> Approve the request, with or without changes, as a temporary authorization having a term of up to 180 days, or

<u>012.02C2</u> Notify the permittee no later than 90 days after receipt of the notification request if he or she extends the time period for making a decision under <u>012.02C1</u>. The director shall make a decision no later than 120 days after receipt of the modification request.

<u>012.02D</u> For Class 2 modifications, if the Director fails to make one of the decisions specified in <u>012.02C1</u> of this section by the 120th day after receipt of the

modification request, the permittee is automatically authorized to conduct the activities described in the modification request for up to 180 days, without formal action by the Department. The authorized activities must be conducted as described in the permit modification request and must be in compliance with all appropriate standards of Chapter 22. The Director may approve, with or without changes, or deny the modification request during the term of the temporary or automatic authorization of this section. Such action cancels the temporary or automatic authorization.

<u>012.02E</u> Within 7 days of the date of an automatic or temporary authorization under this section, the permittee must send a notification to persons on the facility mailing list, and make a reasonable effort to notify other persons who submitted written comments on the modification request, that:

<u>012.02E1</u> The permittee has been authorized temporarily to conduct the activities described in the permit modification request, and

<u>012.02E2</u> Unless the Director acts to give final approval or denial of the request by the end of the authorization period, the permittee will receive authorization to conduct such activities for the life of the permit.

<u>012.02F</u> If the permittee fails to notify the public by the date 50 days prior to the end of the temporary or automatic authorization, the effective date of the permanent authorization will be deferred for 50 days after the permittee notifies the public.

<u>012.02G</u> Except as provided in <u>012.02l</u> of this section, if the Director does not finally approve or deny a modification request before the end of the automatic or temporary authorization period or reclassify the modification as a Class 3, the permittee is authorized to conduct the activities described in the permit modification request for the life of the permit unless modified later under this chapter. The activities authorized under this paragraph must be conducted as described in the permit modification request and must be in compliance with all appropriate standards of Chapter 22.

<u>012.02H</u> In making a decision to approve or deny a modification request, including a decision to issue a temporary authorization or to reclassify a modification as a Class 3, the Director must consider all written comments submitted to the Department during the public comment period and must respond in writing to all significant comments in his or her decision.

<u>012.021</u> With the written consent of the permittee, the Director may extend indefinitely or for a specified period the time periods for final approval or denial of a modification.

<u>012.02J</u> The permittee may perform any construction associated with a Class 2 permit modification request beginning 60 days after the submission of the request unless the Director establishes a later date for commencing construction and informs the permittee in writing before day 60.

<u>012.02K</u> For Class 3 modifications listed in Appendix V of this section, the permittee must:

012.02K1 Submit a modification request to the Director that:

<u>012.02K1(a)</u> Describes the exact change to be made to the permit conditions and supporting documents referenced by the permit;

012.02K1(b) Identifies that the modification is a Class 3 modification;

012.02K1(c) Explains why the modification is needed; and

<u>012.02K1(d)</u> Provides the applicable information required by Chapter 13, <u>012</u> Chapter 12, <u>001.04C</u> through <u>001.04F</u>.

<u>012.02K2</u> Send a notice of the modification request to all persons on the facility mailing list maintained by the Department in accordance with Chapter 15, <u>006.01</u> and must publish this notice in a major local newspaper of general circulation. This notice must be mailed and published within 7 days before or after the date of submission of the modification request, and the permittee must provide to the Director evidence of the mailing and publication. The notice must include:

<u>012.02K2(a)</u> Announcement of a 60-day comment period, and a name and address of a Department contact to whom comments must be sent:

<u>012.02K2(b)</u> Announcement of the date, time, and place for a public meeting on the modification request, in accordance with <u>012.02K4</u>;

<u>012.02K2(c)</u> Name and telephone number of the permittee's contact person;

<u>012.02K2(d)</u> Name and telephone number of a Department contact person;

<u>012.02K2(e)</u> Location where copies of the modification request and any supporting documents can be viewed and copied; and

<u>012.02K2(f)</u> The following statement: "The permittee's compliance history during the life of the permit being modified is available from the Department contact person."

<u>012.02K3</u> Place a copy of the permit modification request and supporting documents in a location accessible to the public in the vicinity of the permitted facility.

<u>012.02K4</u> Hold a public meeting no earlier than 15 days after the publication of the notice required in paragraph <u>012.02K2</u> of this section and no later than 15 days before the close of the 60-day comment period. The meeting must be held to the extent practicable in the vicinity of the permitted facility.

<u>012.02K5</u> Provide the public at least 60 days to comment on the modification request. The comment period will begin on the date the permittee publishes the notice in the local newspaper. Comments should be submitted to the Department contact identified in the notice.

<u>012.02L</u> For a Class 3 modification, after the conclusion of the 60-day comment period, the Director must grant or deny the permit modification request according to the permit modification procedures of this chapter. In addition, the Director must consider and respond to all significant written comments received during the 60-day comment period.

<u>012.02M</u> Other modifications. In the case of modifications not explicitly listed in Appendix V, the permittee may submit a Class 3 modification request to the Department, or he or she may request a determination by the Director that the modification should be reviewed and approved as a Class 1 or Class 2 modification. If the permittee requests that the modification be classified as a Class 1 or 2 modification, he or she must provide the Director with the necessary information to support the requested classification.

<u>012.02N</u> The Director shall make the determination described <u>012.02M</u> of this section as promptly as practicable. In determining the appropriate class for a specific modification, the Director shall consider the similarity of the modification to other modifications in Appendix V and the following criteria:

<u>012.02N1</u> Class 1 modifications apply to minor changes that keep the permit current with routine changes to the facility or its operation. These changes do not substantially alter the permit conditions or reduce the capacity of the facility to protect human health or the environment. In the case of Class 1 modifications, the Director may require prior approval.

<u>012.02N2</u> Class 2 modifications apply to changes that are necessary to enable a permittee to respond, in a timely manner, to:

<u>012.02N2(a)</u> Common variations in the types and quantities of the wastes managed under the facility permit, or

012.02N2(b) Technological advancements, and;

<u>012.02N2(c)</u> Changes necessary to comply with new regulations, where these changes can be implemented without substantially changing design specifications or management practices in the permit.

<u>012.02N3</u> Class 3 modifications substantially alter the facility or its operation.

<u>012.020</u> Temporary authorization. Upon request of the permittee, the Director may, without prior public notice and comment, grant the permittee a temporary authorization in accordance with this subsection. Temporary authorizations must have a term of not more than 180 days.

<u>012.0201</u> The permittee may request a temporary authorization for:

<u>012.02O1(a)</u> Any Class 2 modification meeting the criteria in <u>012.02O4(b)</u> of this section, and

<u>012.02O1(b)</u> Any Class 3 modification that meets the criteria in <u>012.02O4(b)(1)</u> or <u>(2)</u> of this section; or that meets the criteria in <u>012.02O4(b)(3)</u> through <u>(b)(5)</u> of this section and provides improved management or treatment of a hazardous waste already listed in the facility permit.

012.02O2 The temporary authorization request must include:

<u>012.02O2(a)</u> A description of the activities to be conducted under the temporary authorization;

<u>012.02O2(b)</u> An explanation of why the temporary authorization is necessary; and

<u>012.02O2(c)</u> Sufficient information to ensure compliance with Chapter 21.

<u>012.0203</u> The permittee must send a notice about the temporary authorization request to all persons on the facility mailing list maintained by the Department in accordance with Chapter 15, <u>006.01</u>. This notification must be made within 7 days of submission of the authorization request.

<u>012.0204</u> The Director shall approve or deny the temporary authorization as quickly as practical. To issue a temporary authorization, the Director must find:

<u>012.02O4(a)</u> The authorized activities are in compliance with the standards of Chapter 21.

<u>012.02O4(b)</u> The temporary authorization is necessary to achieve one of the following objectives before action is likely to be taken on a modification request:

<u>012.02O4(b)(1)</u> To facilitate timely implementation of closure or corrective action activities;

<u>012.02O4(b)(2)</u> To allow treatment or storage in tanks or containers, or in containment buildings in accordance with Chapter 20.

<u>012.02O4(b)(3)</u> To prevent disruption of ongoing waste management activities;

<u>012.02O4(b)(4)</u> To enable the permittee to respond to sudden changes in the types or quantities of the wastes managed under the facility permit; or

<u>012.02O4(b)(5)</u> To facilitate other changes to protect human health and the environment.

<u>012.0205</u> A temporary authorization may be reissued for one additional term of up to 180 days provided that the permittee has requested a Class 2 or 3 permit modification for the activity covered in the temporary authorization, and:

<u>012.02O5(a)</u> The reissued temporary authorization constitutes the Director's decision on a Class 2 permit modification in accordance with <u>012.02C1(d)</u> of this section, or

<u>012.02O5(b)</u> The Director determines that the reissued temporary authorization involving a Class 3 permit modification request is warranted to allow the authorized activities to continue while the Class 3 modification procedures of this section are conducted.

<u>012.02P</u> Public notice and appeals of permit modification decisions.

<u>012.02P1</u> The Director shall notify persons on the facility mailing list within 10 days of any decision under this section to grant or deny a Class 2 or 3 permit

modification request. The Director shall also notify such persons within 10 days after an automatic authorization for a Class 2 modification goes into effect under Sections <u>012.02D</u> or <u>012.02G</u>.

<u>012.02P2</u> The Director's decision to grant or deny a Class 2 or 3 permit modification request or an automatic authorization under this section may be appealed in accordance with Title 115 and Nebraska Revised Statute 81-1509.

012.02Q Newly regulated wastes and units.

<u>012.02Q1</u> The permittee is authorized to continue to manage wastes listed or identified as hazardous under Chapter 3, or to continue to manage hazardous waste in units newly regulated as hazardous waste management units, if:

<u>012.02Q1(a)</u> The unit was in existence as a hazardous waste facility with respect to the newly listed or characterized waste or newly regulated waste management unit on the effective date of the final rule listing or identifying the waste, or regulating the unit;

<u>012.02Q1(b)</u> The permittee submits a Class 1 modification request on or before the date on which the waste or unit becomes subject to the new requirements;

<u>012.02Q1(c)</u> The permittee is in compliance with the applicable standards of Chapter 7 and Chapter 22;

<u>012.02Q1(d)</u> The permittee also submits a complete Class 2 or 3 modification request within 180 days of the effective date of the rule listing or identifying the waste, or subjecting the unit to Title 128 management standards;

O12.02Q1(e) In the case of land disposal units, the permittee certifies that each such unit is in compliance with all applicable requirements of Chapter 22 of this chapter for groundwater monitoring and financial responsibility on the date 12 months after the effective date of the rule identifying or listing the waste as hazardous, or regulating the unit as a hazardous waste management unit. If the owner or operator fails to certify compliance with all these requirements, he or she will lose authority to operate under this section.

<u>012.02Q2</u> New wastes or units added to a facility's permit under this subsection do not constitute expansions for the purpose of the 25 percent capacity expansion limit for Class 2 modifications.

<u>012.02R</u> Permit modification list. The Director must maintain a list of all approved permit modifications and must publish a notice once a year in a State-wide newspaper that an updated list is available for review.

<u>012.02S</u> Combustion facility changes to meet 40 CFR part 63 MACT standards. The following procedures apply to hazardous waste combustion facility permit modifications requested under Appendix V, section L(9) of this Title.

<u>012.02S1</u> Facility owners or operators must have complied with the Notification of Intent to Comply (NIC) requirements of 40 CFR 63.1210 that were in effect prior to October 11, 2000, (see 40 CFR Part 63 Revised as of July 1, 2000) in order to request a permit modification under this section.

<u>012.02S2</u> If the Director does not approve or deny the request within 90 days of receiving it, the request shall be deemed approved. The Director may, at his or her discretion, extend this 90 day deadline one time for up to 30 days by notifying the facility owner or operator.

<u>012.03</u> Permit modifications shall not be used to extend the term of a permit beyond the expiration date.

<u>012.04</u> If the Director tentatively decides to modify or revoke and reissue a permit, under Sections <u>012.01</u> and <u>012.02K</u>, he or she shall prepare a draft permit under Section <u>002</u> of this Chapter above incorporating the proposed changes. The Director may request additional information and, in the case of a modified permit, may require the submission of an updated application. In the case of revoked and reissued permits, the Director shall require the submission of a new application.

# 013 Expiration and renewal of permits.

<u>013.01</u> If the permittee wishes to continue to treat, store or dispose of hazardous wastes after the expiration date of the hazardous waste permit, the permittee must file for reissuance of the existing permit at least 180 days prior to the expiration date of the permit.

<u>013.02</u> A renewal application shall consist of the same information required in the original hazardous waste facility permit application, which can consist of a recertification of the original application, unless the Department requires additional information.

<u>013.03</u> Prior to renewal, the permittee shall be in compliance with or have complied with all the terms, conditions, requirements, and schedules of compliance of the expiring or expired permit.

- <u>013.04</u> Public notice and public participation procedures for renewal of the permit shall be those specified in this Chapter.
- <u>014</u> Duration of permits, expiration and continuation of permits.
  - 014.01 Permits shall be effective for a term:
    - <u>014.01A</u> Not to exceed 5 years for commercial hazardous waste management facilities; and
    - <u>014.01B</u> Not to exceed 10 years for all other facilities.
  - <u>014.02</u> The Director may issue any permit for a duration of less than the full allowable term under this section.
  - <u>014.03</u> Each permit for a land disposal facility shall be reviewed by the Director five years after the date of permit issuance or reissuance and shall be modified as necessary, as provided in Section <u>012</u>.
  - <u>014.04</u> The conditions of an expired permit continue in force until the effective date of a new permit if:
    - <u>014.04A</u> The permittee has submitted a timely application under the applicable sections of Chapters 13 and 14, which is a complete application for a new permit; and
    - <u>014.04B</u> The Director, through no fault of the permittee, does not issue a new permit with an effective date on or before the expiration date of the previous permit.
  - 014.05 Permits continued under this Section remain fully effective and enforceable.
  - <u>014.06</u> When the permittee is not in compliance with the conditions of the expiring or expired permit, the Director may choose to do any or all of the following:
    - <u>014.06A</u> Initiate enforcement action based upon the permit which has been continued;
    - <u>014.06B</u> Issue a notice of intent to deny the new permit under Chapter 15, <u>002.03</u>. If the permit is denied, the owner or operator would then be required to cease the activities authorized by the continued permit or be subject to enforcement action for operating without a permit;
    - 014.06C Issue a new permit under Chapter 15, with appropriate condition; or
    - <u>014.06D</u> Take other actions as authorized by these regulations.

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<u>015</u> Termination of permits. The permit may be terminated during its term or a renewal application may be denied in accordance with the conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 270.43, which are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference. If the Director tentatively decides to terminate a permit under this section, he or she shall issue a notice of intent to terminate. A notice of intent to terminate is a type of draft permit which follows the same procedures as any draft permit prepared under Section <u>002</u> of this chapter.

<u>016</u> Permit denial. The Director may, pursuant to the public notice and public participation procedures specified in Sections <u>006</u> and <u>007</u> of this Chapter, deny the permit application either in its entirety or as to the active life of a hazardous waste management facility or unit only.

- $\underline{001}$  The requirements of this Chapter apply to generators who are regulated under Chapters 9 (Small Quantity Generator) or 10 (Large Quantity Generator).
  - $\underline{001.01}$  The generator must take precautions to prevent accidental ignition or reaction of ignitable or reactive waste. This waste must be separated and protected from sources of ignition or reaction. While ignitable or reactive waste is being handled, the generator must confine smoking and open flame to specially designated locations. "No Smoking" signs must be conspicuously placed wherever there is a hazard from ignitable or reactive waste.
  - $\frac{001.02}{\text{or }10}$  Where specifically required by Chapters 9 (Small Quantity Generator) or  $\frac{10}{10}$  (Large Quantity Generator), the storage of ignitable or reactive waste, and the mixture or commingling of incompatible waste, or incompatible waste and materials, must be conducted so that it does not:
    - $\frac{001.02A}{\text{violent}}$  Generate extreme heat or pressure, fire or explosion, or  $\frac{1}{\text{violent}}$  reaction;
    - $\underline{001.02B}$  Produce uncontrolled toxic mists, fumes, dusts, or gases in sufficient quantities to threaten human health;
    - $\underline{001.02C}$  Produce uncontrolled flammable fumes or gases in sufficient quantities to pose a risk of fire or explosion;
    - $\underline{\text{001.02D}}$  Damage the structural integrity of the device or facility containing the wastes; or
    - $\frac{001.02E}{environment}$ . Through other like means threaten human health or the
  - $\underline{001.03}$  Hazardous waste must not be placed in an unwashed container or tank that previously held an incompatible waste or material unless Section  $\underline{001.02}$  of this Chapter is complied with.
  - $\underline{001.04}$  Incompatible wastes, or incompatible wastes and materials must not be placed in the same container, tank, surface impoundment, pile, land treatment area, landfill, cell, or chemical, physical and biological treatment process or equipment unless Section  $\underline{001.02}$  of this Chapter is complied with.
- 002 Specific.
  - 002.01 Containers.
    - $\underline{002.01A}$  Containers holding ignitable or reactive waste must be located at least fifteen meters (50 feet) inside the property line.
    - $\underline{002.01B}$  The storage container holding a hazardous waste that is incompatible with any waste or other materials stored nearby in other containers, piles, open tanks, or surface impoundments must be

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separated from the other materials or protected from them by means of a dike, berm, wall, or other device.

 $\underline{002.01C}$  The generator must use a container made of or lined with materials which will not react with, and are otherwise compatible with, the hazardous waste to be stored, so that the ability of the container to contain the wastes is not impaired.

## 002.02 Tanks.

 $\underline{\tt 002.02A}$  Ignitable or reactive waste must not be placed in a tank system unless:

 $\frac{002.02A1}{\text{immediately after placement in the tank system so that:}$ 

 $\underline{002.02 \text{Al}(a)}$  The resulting waste, mixture, or dissolved material no longer meets the definition of ignitable or reactive waste under Chapter 3, Sections 007 and 009; and

002.02A1(b) Section 001.02 of this Chapter is complied with; or

 $\frac{002.02A2}{\text{from any}}$  The waste is stored in such a way that it is protected from any materials or conditions that may cause the waste to ignite or react; or

002.02A3 The tank is used solely for emergencies.

<u>002.02B</u> The storage of ignitable or reactive waste in covered tanks must comply with the requirements for the maintenance of protective distances between the waste management area and any public ways, streets, alleys or an adjoining property line that can be built upon as required in Tables 2-1 through 2-6 in Title 153 of the State Fire Marshal's Office, - <u>National Fire Protection Association's</u> (NFPA's), 30 - "Flammable and Combustible Liquids Code"(1996).

- Chapter 17 PREPAREDNESS FOR AND PREVENTION OF ACCIDENTS
- $\underline{001}$  Applicability. The requirements of this Chapter apply to generators who are regulated under Chapters 9 (Small Quantity Generators) or 10 (Large Quantity Generators).
- $\frac{002}{\text{constructed}}$  Design and operation of generator sites. Generator sites must be designed, constructed, maintained, and operated to minimize the possibility of a fire, explosion, or any unplanned sudden or non-sudden release of hazardous waste or hazardous waste constituents to air, soil, or surface water which could threaten human health or the environment.
- $\underline{003}$  Required equipment. All generator sites must be equipped with the following, unless it can be demonstrated to the State Fire Marshal that there are no hazards at the facility which could require a particular kind of equipment specified below:
  - 003.01 An internal communications or alarm system capable of providing immediate emergency instruction (voice or signal) to facility personnel;
  - $\frac{003.02}{\text{local}}$  A device capable of summoning external emergency assistance from local law enforcement agencies, fire departments, or state or local emergency response teams, such as a telephone (immediately available at the scene of operations) or a hand-held two-way radio;
  - $\underline{003.03}$  Portable fire extinguishers, fire control equipment (including special extinguishing equipment, such as that using foam, inert gas, or dry chemicals), necessary safety equipment, control equipment, and decontamination equipment; and
  - $\frac{003.04}{\text{or foam}}$  Water at adequate volume and pressure to supply water hose streams, or foam producing equipment, or automatic sprinklers, or water spray systems.
- $\overline{004}$  Testing and maintenance of equipment. All facility communications or alarm systems, fire protection equipment, safety equipment, spill control equipment, and decontamination equipment, where required, must be tested and maintained on an annual basis or as determined necessary by the State Fire Marshal to assure its proper operation in time of emergency.
- 005 Access to communications or alarm system.
  - $\underline{005.01}$  Whenever hazardous waste is being handled all employees involved in the operation shall have immediate access to an internal alarm or emergency communication device, either directly or through visual or voice contact with another employee, unless the State Fire Marshal has ruled that such a device is not required under Section 003 of this Chapter.
  - $\underline{005.02}$  If there is ever just one employee on the premises during operation, that employee shall have immediate access to a device capable of summoning external emergency assistance, such as a telephone (immediately available at the scene of operation), or a hand-held two-way radio, unless the State Fire

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Marshal has ruled that such a device is not required under Section  $\underline{003}$  of this Chapter.

- $\overline{006}$  Required aisle space. The generator must maintain aisle space to allow the unobstructed movement of personnel, fire protection equipment, spill control equipment, and decontamination equipment to any area of facility operation in an emergency, unless it can be demonstrated to the State Fire Marshal that aisle space is not needed for any of these purposes.
- 007 Arrangements with local authorities.
  - $\underline{007.01}$  The generator must attempt to make the following arrangements, as appropriate for the type of waste handled and the potential need for the services of these organizations:
    - <u>007.01A</u> Arrangements to familiarize police, fire departments and <u>emergency</u> response teams with the layout of the site, properties of hazardous waste handled at the site and associated hazards, places where site personnel would normally be working, entrances to roads inside the facility, and possible evacuation routes;
    - 007.01B Where more than one police and fire department might respond to emergencies, agreements designating primary emergency authority to a specific police and fire department, and agreements with any others to provide support to the primary emergency authority;
    - $\underline{007.01C}$  Agreements with state emergency response teams, emergency response contractors, and equipment suppliers; and
    - $\underline{007.01D}$  Arrangements to familiarize local hospitals with the properties of hazardous waste handled at the facility and the types of injuries or illnesses which could result from fires, explosions, or releases at the site.
  - $\underline{007.02}$  Where state or local authorities decline to enter into such arrangements, the generator must document the refusal.

- Chapter 18 CONTINGENCY PLAN AND EMERGENCY PROCEDURES
- $\underline{001}$  Applicability. The requirements of this Chapter apply to generators regulated under Chapter 10 (Large Quantity Generators).
- 002 Purpose and implementation of contingency plan.
  - $\underline{002.01}$  Each generator must have a contingency plan for the site designed to  $\underline{\text{minimize}}$  hazards to human health or the environment from fires, explosions, or any unplanned sudden or non-sudden release of hazardous waste or hazardous waste constituents to air, soil, or surface water.
  - $\underline{002.02}$  The provisions of the plan must be carried out immediately whenever there is a fire, explosion, or release of hazardous waste or hazardous waste constituents which could threaten the environment or human health.
- 003 Content of Contingency Plan.
  - $\underline{003.01}$  The Contingency Plan must describe the emergency procedures personnel must take to comply with Sections  $\underline{002}$  and  $\underline{007}$  of this Chapter, in response to fires, explosions or any unplanned sudden or non-sudden release of hazardous waste or hazardous waste constituents to air, soil, or surface water at the site.
  - $\underline{003.02}$  If the generator has already prepared a Spill Prevention Control, and Countermeasures Plan (SPCC) in accordance with the regulations of the Department, or some other emergency or contingency plan, the plan need only be amended to incorporate hazardous waste management provisions that are sufficient to comply with the requirements of these regulations.
  - $\underline{003.03}$  The plan must describe arrangements agreed to by local police and/or fire departments, hospitals, contractors and state and local emergency response teams to coordinate emergency services, pursuant to Chapter 17,  $\underline{007}$ .
  - $\underline{003.04}$  The plan must list names, addresses and phone numbers (office and home) of all persons qualified to act as emergency coordinator (as defined in Section  $\underline{006}$  of this Chapter) and this list must be kept up to date. Where more than one person is listed, one must be named as primary emergency coordinator and others must be listed in the order in which they will assume responsibility as alternates.
  - $\underline{003.05}$  The plan must include a list of all emergency equipment at the site (such as fire extinguishing systems, spill control equipment, communications and alarm systems (internal and external) and decontamination equipment), where this equipment is required. This list must be kept up to date. In addition, the plan must include the location and a physical description of each item on the list, and a brief outline of its capabilities.
  - $\frac{003.06}{\text{is a possibility that evacuation could be necessary.}}$  This plan must describe signal(s) to be used to begin evacuation, evacuation routes, and

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- alternate evacuation routes (in cases where primary routes could be blocked by releases of hazardous waste or fires).
- $\frac{004}{\text{rev}}$  Copies of Contingency Plan. A copy of the contingency plan and all revisions to the plan must be:
  - 004.01 Maintained at the site; and
  - $\overline{004.02}$  Submitted to the Director, the State Fire Marshal (for new construction only), all local police and/or fire departments, hospitals and state and local emergency response teams that may be called upon to provide emergency services.
- $\underline{005}$  Amendment of Contingency Plan. The contingency plan must be reviewed and immediately amended, if necessary, whenever:
  - 005.01 The plan fails in an emergency;
  - $\underline{005.02}$  The site changes in its design, construction, operation, maintenance or other circumstances in a way that materially increases the potential for fires, explosions or releases of hazardous wastes or hazardous waste constituents, or changes the response necessary in an emergency;
  - 005.03 The list of emergency coordinators changes;
  - 005.04 The list of emergency equipment changes; or
  - 005.05 Applicable regulations are revised.
- <u>006</u> Emergency coordinator. At all times there must be at least one employee either on the site premises or on call (i.e., available to respond to an emergency by reaching the site within a short period of time) with the responsibility for coordinating all emergency response measures. This emergency coordinator must be thoroughly familiar with all aspects of the contingency plan, all operations and activities at the site, the location and characteristics of waste handled, the location of all records within the site, and the site layout. In addition, this person must have the authority to commit the resources needed to carry out the contingency plan.
- 007 Emergency procedures.
  - $\underline{007.01}$  Whenever there is an imminent or actual emergency situation, the emergency coordinator (or his designee when the emergency coordinator is on call) must immediately:
    - $\underline{007.01A}$  Activate internal alarms or communication systems, where applicable, to notify all personnel; and
    - $\underline{007.01B}$  Notify appropriate state or local agencies with designated response roles if their help is needed.
  - $\underline{007.02}$  Whenever there is a release, fire or explosion, the emergency coordinator must immediately identify the character, exact source, amount and areal extent of any released materials. This may be done by observation or review of site records or manifests and, if necessary, by chemical analysis.

- $\overline{007.03}$  Concurrently, the emergency coordinator must assess possible hazards to human health or the environment that may result from the release, fire, or explosion. This assessment must consider both direct and indirect effects of the release, fire, or explosion (e.g., the effects of any toxic, irritating, or asphyxiating gases that are generated, or the effects of any hazardous surface water runoff from water or chemical agents used to control fire and heat-induced explosions).
- $\frac{007.04}{\text{release}}$  If the emergency coordinator determines that there has been a  $\frac{1}{100}$  release, fire or explosion which could threaten human health or the environment outside the site boundaries, findings must be reported as follows:
  - <u>007.04A</u> If the assessment indicates that evacuation of local areas may be advisable, the emergency coordinator must immediately notify appropriate local authorities and be available to help such authorities decide whether local areas should be evacuated; and
  - $\overline{007.04B}$  The emergency coordinator must immediately notify either the government official designated as the on-scene coordinator for that geographical area (in the applicable regional contingency plan), or National Response Center (using their 24-hour toll free number ((800) 424-8802) and the Department ((402) 471-4545) in accordance with the Department's Emergency Response Plan, and, if there is danger of fire occurring or explosion, the State Fire Marshal. The report must include:
    - 007.04B1 Name and telephone number of the reporter;
    - 007.04B2 Name and address of site;
    - $\underline{007.04B3}$  Time and type of incident (e.g., release, fire);
    - $\frac{007.0484}{\text{known}}$  Name and quantity of material(s) involved, to the extent
    - 007.04B5 The extent of injuries, if any; and
    - $\frac{007.04B6}{\text{outside}}$  The possible hazards to human health or the environment, outside the site boundaries.
- $\underline{007.05}$  During an emergency, the emergency coordinator must take all reasonable measures necessary to ensure that fires, explosions and releases do not occur, recur, or spread to other hazardous waste at the site. These measures must include, where applicable, stopping processes and operations, collecting and containing released waste, and removing or isolating containers.
- $\underline{007.06}$  If the site stops operations in response to a fire, explosion or a release, the emergency coordinator must monitor for leaks, pressure buildup, gas generation, or ruptures in valves, pipes or other equipment, wherever this is appropriate.
- $\underline{007.07}$  Immediately after an emergency the emergency coordinator must  $\overline{provide}$  for treating, storing, or disposing of recovered waste, contaminated soil or surface water, or any other material that results from a release, fire or explosion at the site.

 $\frac{007.08}{\text{of the}}$  The emergency coordinator must ensure that, in the affected area(s)

 $\underline{007.08A}$  No waste that may be incompatible with the released material is treated, stored, or disposed of until cleanup procedures are completed; and

 $\frac{007.08B}{\text{cleaned}}$  All emergency equipment listed in the contingency plan is  $\frac{1}{100}$  and fit for its intended use before operations are resumed.

 $\frac{007.09}{\text{that requires implementing the contingency plan.}}$  Within 15 days after the incident, a written report on the incident must be submitted to the Director, and, if there was fire and/or explosions, to the State Fire Marshal, also. The report must include:

 $\underline{007.09A}$  Name, address and telephone number of the generator;

007.09B Name, address and telephone number of the site;

007.09C Date, time and type of incident (e.g., fire, explosion);

007.09D Name and quantity of material(s) involved;

007.09E The extent of injuries, if any;

 $\frac{007.09F}{\text{or the environment, where this is applicable;}}$  An assessment of actual or potential hazards to human health

 $\frac{007.09G}{\text{resulted}}$  Estimated quantity and disposition of recovered material that resulted from the incident.

 $\underline{007.10}$  The generator must notify the Director, and appropriate State and  $\overline{10ca1}$  authorities, that the site is in compliance with Section  $\underline{007.08}$  of this Chapter before operations are resumed in the affected area(s).

- Chapter 19 PERSONNEL TRAINING
- $\underline{001}$  Personnel training. The requirements of this Chapter apply to generators regulated under Chapter 10 (Large Quantity Generators).
  - $\underline{001.01}$  Facility personnel must successfully complete a program of classroom instruction or on-the-job training that teaches them to perform their duties in a way that ensures compliance with the requirements of these regulations. The generator must ensure that this program includes all the elements described in the document required under Section 004.03 of this Chapter.
  - $\underline{001.02}$  This program must be directed by a person trained in hazardous waste management procedures, and must include instruction which teaches personnel hazardous waste management procedures (including contingency plan implementation) relevant to the positions in which they are employed.
  - $\underline{001.03}$  At a minimum, the training program must be designed to ensure that personnel are able to respond effectively to emergencies by familiarizing them with emergency procedures, emergency equipment, and emergency systems including where applicable:
    - <u>001.03A</u> Procedures for using, inspecting, repairing, and replacing emergency and monitoring equipment;
    - 001.03B Key parameters for automatic waste feed cut-off systems;
    - 001.03C Communications or alarm systems;
    - 001.03D Response to fires or explosions;
    - 001.03E Shutdown of operations.
- $\underline{002}$  Such personnel must successfully complete the program required in Section  $\underline{001}$  of this Chapter within six months after the date of their employment or assignment or to a new position. Employees hired after the effective date of these regulations must not work in unsupervised positions until they have completed the training requirements of Section 001 of this Chapter.
- $\frac{003}{\text{required}}$  Personnel must take part in an annual review of the initial training required in Section  $\frac{001}{\text{constant}}$  of this Chapter.
- $\underline{004}$  The generator must maintain the following documents and records at the site:
  - $\underline{004.01}$  The job title for each position related to hazardous waste management, and the name of the employee filling each job;
  - $\underline{004.02}$  A written job description for each position listed under  $\underline{004.01}$  of this Chapter. This description may be consistent in its degree of specificity with descriptions for other similar positions in the same company location or bargaining unit, but must include the requisite skill, education, or other qualifications, and duties of personnel assigned to each position;

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 $\underline{004.03}$  A written description of the type and amount of both introductory and continuing training that will be given to each person filling a position listed under Section 004.01 of this Chapter;

004.04 Records that document that the training or job experience required under Sections 001, 002, and 003 of this Chapter have been given to, and have been completed by, facility personnel.

 $\underline{005}$  Training records on personnel must be kept for three years after termination of employment. Personnel training records may accompany personnel transferred within the same company.

- Chapter 20 LAND DISPOSAL RESTRICTIONS (LDR)
- 001 Purpose, scope and applicability.
  - $\underline{001.01}$  This Chapter identifies hazardous wastes that are restricted from land disposal and defines those limited circumstances under which an otherwise prohibited waste may continue to be land disposed.
  - $\underline{001.02}$  Except as specifically provided otherwise in this Chapter or Chapters 2 and 3, the requirements of this Chapter apply to persons who generate or transport hazardous waste and owners and operators of hazardous waste treatment, storage, and disposal facilities.
  - 001.03 Restricted wastes may continue to be land disposed as follows:
    - $\underline{001.03A}$  Where persons have been granted an extension to the effective date of a prohibition by EPA, with respect to those wastes covered by the extension;
    - $\underline{001.03B}$  Where persons have been granted an exemption from a prohibition pursuant to a petition under 40 CFR 268.6 by EPA, with respect to those wastes and units covered by the petition;
    - $\underline{001.03C}$  Wastes that are hazardous only because they exhibit a hazardous characteristic, and which are otherwise prohibited under this Chapter, or 40 CFR Part 148, are not prohibited if the wastes:
      - $\underline{001.03C1}$  Are disposed into a nonhazardous or hazardous injection well as defined under 40 CFR 144.6(a); and
      - $\underline{001.03C2}$  Do not exhibit any prohibited characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Chapter 3,  $\underline{005}$  through  $\underline{010}$  at the point of injection.
    - $\overline{001.03D}$  Wastes that are hazardous only because they exhibit a hazardous characteristic, and which are otherwise prohibited under this Chapter, are not prohibited if the wastes meet any of the following criteria, unless the wastes are subject to a specified method of treatment other than DEACT in Section  $\underline{009}$ , or are D003 reactive cyanide:
      - $\underline{001.03D1}$  The wastes are managed in a treatment system which subsequently discharges to waters of the U.S. pursuant to a permit issued under section 402 of the Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. \$1342); or
      - $\underline{001.03D2}$  The wastes are treated for purposes of the pretreatment requirements of Section 307 of the Clean Water Act (33 U.S.C. §1317); or

- $\underline{001.03D3}$  The wastes are managed in a zero discharge system engaged in Clean Water Act-equivalent treatment as defined in 40 CFR 268.37(a), as incorporated by reference in Section 008; and
- $\underline{001.03D4}$  The wastes no longer exhibit a prohibited characteristic at the point of land disposal (i.e., placement in a surface impoundment).
- $\underline{001.04}$  The requirements of this Chapter shall not affect the availability of a waiver under Section 121(d)(4) of the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation, and Liability Act of 1980 (CERCLA) (42 U.S.C. §9621).
- $\underline{001.05}$  The following hazardous wastes are not subject to any provision of this Chapter:
  - <u>001.05A</u> Waste generated by small quantity generators of less than 100 kilograms of non-acute hazardous waste or less than 1 kilogram of acute hazardous waste per month, as defined in Chapter 8;
  - $\frac{001.05B}{10,007}$ ; Waste pesticides that a farmer disposes of pursuant to Chapter
  - $\frac{001.05C}{1984}$  Wastes identified or listed as hazardous after November 8,  $\frac{1}{1984}$  for which EPA has not promulgated land disposal prohibitions or treatment standards;
  - <u>001.05D</u> De minimis losses of characteristic wastes to wastewaters are not considered to be prohibited wastes and are defined as losses from normal material handling operations (e.g. spills from the unloading or transfer of materials from bins or other containers, leaks from pipes, valves or other devices used to transfer materials); minor leaks of process equipment, storage tanks or containers; leaks from well-maintained pump packings and seals; sample purgings; and relief device discharges; discharges from safety showers and rinsing and cleaning of personal safety equipment; rinsate from empty containers or from containers that are rendered empty by that rinsing; and laboratory wastes not exceeding one per cent of the total flow of wastewater into the facility's headworks on an annual basis, or with a combined annualized average concentration not exceeding one part per million in the headworks of the facility's wastewater treatment or pretreatment facility.
- $\underline{001.06}$  Universal waste handlers and universal waste transporters (as defined in Chapter 25) are exempt from Section  $\underline{005}$  and  $\underline{014}$  for the hazardous wastes listed below. These handlers are subject to regulation under Chapter 25.
  - 001.06A Batteries as described in Chapter 25, 002;
  - 001.06B Pesticides as described in Chapter 25, 003;
  - 001.06C Mercury-containing items as described in Chapter 25, 004; and
  - 001.06D Lamps as described in Chapter 25, 005.

- <u>001.06E</u> Electronic items as described in Chapter 25, <u>006</u>.
- $\underline{002}$  Definitions applicable in this Chapter. When used in this Chapter the following terms have the meanings given below:
  - $\underline{002.01}$  "Halogenated organic compounds" or "HOCs" means those compounds having a carbon-halogen bond which are listed under 40 CFR Appendix III, as incorporated by reference in Section 015.
  - $\underline{002.02}$  "Hazardous constituent or constituents" means those constituents listed in Appendix I of this Title.
  - <u>002.03</u> "Land disposal" means placement in or on the land, except in a corrective action management unit or staging pile, and includes, but is not limited to, placement in a landfill, surface impoundment, waste pile, injection well, land treatment facility, salt dome formation, salt bed formation, underground mine or cave, or placement in a concrete vault, or bunker intended for disposal purposes.
  - $\underline{002.04}$  "Nonwastewaters" are wastes that do not meet the criteria for wastewaters in Section 002.06.
  - $\underline{002.05}$  "Polychlorinated biphenyls" or "PCBs" are halogenated organic compounds defined in accordance with 40 CFR 761.3.
  - $\underline{002.06}$  "Wastewaters" are wastes that contain less than 1% by weight total organic carbon (TOC) and less than 1% by weight total suspended solids (TSS).
  - 002.07 "Debris" means solid material exceeding a 60 mm particle size that is intended for disposal and that is: A manufactured object; or plant or animal matter; or natural geologic material. However, the following materials are not debris: Any material for which a specific treatment standard is provided in Section 009 through 012, namely lead acid batteries, cadmium batteries, and radioactive lead solids; Process residuals such as smelter slag and residues from the treatment of waste, wastewater, sludges, or air emission residues; and Intact containers of hazardous waste that are not ruptured and that retain at least 75% of their original volume. A mixture of debris that has not been treated to the standards provided by Section 011 and other material is subject to regulation as debris if the mixture is comprised primarily of debris, by volume, based on visual inspection.
  - 002.08 "Hazardous debris" means debris that contains a hazardous waste listed in Chapter 3, 011 through 018, or that exhibits a characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Chapter 3, 005 through 010. Any deliberate mixing of prohibited hazardous waste with debris that changes its treatment classification (i.e., from waste to hazardous debris) is not allowed under the dilution prohibition in Section 003.
  - $\underline{002.09}$  "Underlying hazardous constituent" means any constituent listed in Section  $\underline{012}$ , Table 12, Universal Treatment Standards, except fluoride, selenium, sulfides, vanadium, and zinc, which can reasonably be expected to

be present at the point of generation of the hazardous waste at a concentration above the constituent-specific UTS treatment standards.

- $\underline{002.10}$  "Inorganic metal-bearing waste" is one for which EPA has established treatment standards for metal hazardous constituents, and which does not otherwise contain significant organic or cyanide content as described in Section  $\underline{003.03A}$ , and is specifically listed in 40 CFR Part 268 Appendix XI, as incorporated by reference in Section 021.
- <u>002.11</u> "Soil" means unconsolidated earth material composing the superficial geologic strata (material overlying bedrock), consisting of clay, silt, sand, or gravel size particles as classified by the U.S. Natural Resources Conservation Service, or a mixture of such materials with liquids, sludges or solids which is inseparable by simple mechanical removal processes and is made up primarily of soil by volume based on visual inspection. Any deliberate mixing of prohibited hazardous waste with soil that changes its treatment classification (i.e., from waste to contaminated soil) is not allowed under the dilution prohibition in Section 003.
- 003 Dilution prohibited as a substitute for treatment.
  - 003.01 Except as provided in Section 003.02, no generator, transporter, handler, or owner or operator of a treatment, storage, or disposal facility shall in any way dilute a restricted waste or the residual from treatment of a restricted waste as a substitute for adequate treatment to achieve compliance with Section 009 through 014, to circumvent the effective date of a prohibition in 40 CFR Subpart C, as incorporated by reference in Section 008, to otherwise avoid a prohibition in 40 CFR Subpart C, or to circumvent a land disposal prohibition imposed by this Chapter.
  - $\underline{003.02}$  Dilution of wastes that are hazardous only because they exhibit a characteristic in treatment systems which include land-based units which treat wastes subsequently discharged to a water of the United States pursuant to a permit issued under Section 402 of the Clean Water Act (CWA), or which treat wastes in a CWA-equivalent treatment system, or which treat wastes for the purposes of pretreatment requirements under Section 307 of the CWA is not impermissible dilution for purposes of this section unless a method other than DEACT has been specified in Section  $\underline{009}$  as the treatment standard, or unless the waste is a D003 reactive cyanide wastewater or nonwastewater.
  - $\underline{003.03}$  Combustion of the hazardous waste codes listed in 40 CFR Part 268 Appendix XI, as incorporated by reference in Section  $\underline{021}$ , is prohibited, unless the waste, at the point of generation, or after any bona fide treatment such as cyanide destruction prior to combustion, can be demonstrated to comply with one or more of the following criteria (unless otherwise specifically prohibited from combustion):
    - $\underline{003.03A}$  The waste contains hazardous organic constituents or cyanide at levels exceeding the constituent-specific treatment standard found in Section 012;

- $\underline{003.03B}$  The waste consists of organic, debris-like materials (e.g., wood, paper, plastic, or cloth) contaminated with an inorganic metal-bearing hazardous waste;
- $\underline{003.03C}$  The waste, at point of generation, has reasonable heating value such as greater than or equal to 5000 BTU per pound;
- $\frac{003.03D}{a}$  The waste is co-generated with wastes for which combustion is a required method of treatment;
- $\underline{003.03E}$  The waste is subject to Federal and/or State requirements necessitating reduction of organics (including biological agents); or
- 003.03F The waste contains greater than 1% Total Organic Carbon (TOC).
- <u>003.04</u> It is a form of impermissible dilution, and therefore prohibited, to add iron filings or other metallic forms of iron to lead-containing hazardous wastes in order to achieve any land disposal restriction treatment standard for lead. Lead-containing wastes include D008 wastes (wastes exhibiting a characteristic due to the presence of lead), all characteristic wastes containing lead as an underlying hazardous constituent, listed wastes containing lead as a regulated constituent, and hazardous media containing any of the aforementioned lead-containing wastes.
- $\underline{004}$  The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 268.4, pertaining to the treatment surface impoundment exemption, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- $\underline{005}$  Testing, tracking, and recordkeeping requirements for generators, treaters, and disposal facilities.

## 005.01 Requirements for generators:

005.01A A generator of hazardous waste must determine if the waste has to be treated before it can be land disposed. This is done by determining if the hazardous waste meets the treatment standards in Section 009, 011, or 013. This determination can be made in either of two ways: testing the waste or using knowledge of the waste. If the generator tests the waste, testing would normally determine the total concentration of hazardous constituents, or the concentration of hazardous constituents in an extract of the waste obtained using test method 1311 in "Test Methods for Evaluating Solid Waste, Physical/Chemical Methods," EPA Publication SW-846, as referenced in Chapter 1, depending on whether the treatment standard for the waste is expressed as a total concentration or concentration of hazardous constituent in the waste's extract. In addition, some hazardous wastes must be treated by particular treatment methods before they can be land disposed and some soils that are contaminated by such hazardous wastes. These treatment standards are also found in Section 009, and are described in detail in Section 010, Table 10. These wastes, and soils contaminated with such wastes, do not need to be tested (however, if they are in a waste mixture, other wastes with concentration level treatment standards would have to be tested). If a generator determines they are managing a waste or soil contaminated with a waste, that

displays a hazardous characteristic of ignitability, corrosivity, reactivity, or toxicity, they must comply with the special requirements of Section  $\underline{006}$  in addition to any applicable requirements in this section.

<u>005.01B</u> If the waste or contaminated soil does not meet the treatment standard: With the initial shipment of waste to each treatment or storage facility, the generator must send a one-time written notice to each treatment or storage facility receiving the waste, and place a copy in the file. The notice must include the information in column "<u>005.01B</u>" of the Table 8, Generator Paperwork Requirements, of this Title. No further notification is necessary until such time that the waste or facility change, in which case a new notification must be sent and a copy placed in the generator's file.

 $\underline{005.01B1}$  For contaminated soil, the following certification statement should be included, signed by an authorized representative:

I certify under penalty of law that I personally have examined this contaminated soil and it [does/does not] contain listed hazardous waste and [does/does not] exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste and requires treatment to meet the soil treatment standards as provided by Title 128, Chapter 20, Section 013.03.

 $\underline{005.01C}$  If the waste or contaminated soil meets the treatment standard at the original point of generation:

<u>005.01C1</u> With the initial shipment of waste to each treatment, storage, or disposal facility, the generator must send a one-time written notice to each treatment, storage, or disposal facility receiving the waste, and place a copy in the file. The notice must include the information indicated in column "<u>005.01C</u>" of Table 8, Generator Paperwork Requirements Table, of this Title, and the following certification statement, signed by an authorized representative:

I certify under penalty of law that I personally have examined and am familiar with the waste through analysis and testing or through knowledge of the waste to support this certification that the waste complies with the treatment standards specified in Chapter 20, Sections <u>009</u> through <u>013</u>. I believe that the information I submitted is true, accurate, and complete. I am aware that there are significant penalties for submitting a false certification, including the possibility of a fine and imprisonment.

 $\underline{005.01C2}$  For contaminated soil, with the initial shipment of wastes to each treatment, storage, or disposal facility, the generator must send a one-time written notice to each facility receiving the waste and place a copy in the file. The notice must include the information in column  $\underline{005.01C}$  of Table 8, Generator Paperwork Requirements Table, of this Title.

 $\underline{005.01C3}$  If the waste changes, the generator must send a new notice and certification to the receiving facility, and place a copy in their files. Generators of hazardous debris excluded from the definition of hazardous waste under Chapter 2, Section 007.02 are not subject to these requirements.

005.01D For reporting, tracking and recordkeeping when exceptions allow certain wastes or contaminated soil that do not meet the treatment standards to be land disposed: There are certain exemptions from the requirement that hazardous wastes or contaminated soil meet treatment standards before they can be land disposed. These include, but are not limited to case-by-case extensions under 40 CFR 268.5, disposal in a no-migration unit under 40 CFR 268.6, or a national capacity variance or case-by-case capacity variance under 40 CFR Part 268 subpart C, which is incorporated by reference in Section 008.01 of this Chapter. If a generator's waste is so exempt, then with the initial shipment of waste, the generator must send a one-time written notice to each land disposal facility receiving the waste. The notice must include the information indicated in column "005.01D" of Table 8, Generator Paperwork Requirements Table, of this Title. If the waste changes, the generator must send a new notice to the receiving facility, and place a copy in their files.

 $\underline{005.01E}$  If a generator is managing and treating prohibited waste or contaminated soil in tanks, containers, or containment buildings regulated under Chapter 9, Sections  $\underline{007}$  and  $\underline{008}$ , or Chapter 10, Sections  $\underline{004}$  and  $\underline{005}$  to meet applicable LDR treatment standards found at Section  $\underline{009}$ , the generator must develop and follow a written waste analysis plan which describes the procedures they will carry out to comply with the treatment standards. (Generators treating hazardous debris under the alternative treatment standards of Section  $\underline{011}$ , however, are not subject to these waste analysis requirements.) The plan must be kept on site in the generator's records, and the following requirements must be met:

 $\frac{005.01F}{\mathrm{soil}}$  If a generator determines that the waste or contaminated  $\frac{005.01F}{\mathrm{soil}}$  is restricted based solely on his knowledge of the waste, all supporting data used to make this determination must be retained on-site in the generator's files. If a generator determines that the waste is restricted based on testing this waste or an extract developed using the test method 1311 in "Test Methods for Evaluating Solid Waste, Physical/Chemical Methods," EPA Publication SW-846, as referenced in Chapter 1, and all waste analysis data must be retained on-site in the generator's files.

005.01G If a generator determines that he is managing a prohibited waste that is excluded from the definition of hazardous or solid waste or is exempted from this Title, under Chapter 2, 003 through 013, or Chapter 7, 001 through 006, subsequent to the point of generation (including deactivated characteristic hazardous wastes managed in wastewater treatment systems subject to the Clean Water Act (CWA) as specified at Chapter 2, 008.02 or that are CWA-equivalent, or are managed in a an underground injection well regulated by the Safe Drinking Water Act (SDWA)), he must place a one-time notice describing such generation, subsequent exclusion from the definition of hazardous or solid waste or exemption from Title 128 regulation, and the disposition of the waste, in the facility's on-site files.

 $005.01 \mathrm{H}$  Generators must retain on-site a copy of all notices, certifications, waste analysis data, and other documentation produced pursuant to this section for at least three years from the date that the waste that is the subject of such documentation was last sent to on-site or off-site treatment, storage, or disposal. The three year record retention period is automatically extended during the course of any unresolved enforcement action regarding the regulated activity or as requested by the Director. The requirements of this paragraph apply to solid wastes even when the hazardous characteristic is removed prior to disposal, or when the waste is excluded from the definition of hazardous or solid waste under Chapter 2, 003 through 013, or Chapter 7, 001 through 006, or exempted from this Title, subsequent to the point of generation.

 $\underline{005.01I}$  If a generator is managing a lab pack containing hazardous wastes and wishes to use the alternative treatment standard for lab packs found at Section 010.02:

 $\underline{005.0111}$  With the initial shipment of waste to a treatment facility, the generator must submit a notice that provides the information in column " $\underline{005.011}$ " in Table 8, Generator Paperwork Requirements Table of this Title, and the following certification. The certification, which must be signed by an authorized representative and must be placed in the generator's files, must say the following:

I certify under penalty of law that I personally have examined and am familiar with the waste and that the lab pack contains only wastes that have not been excluded under appendix IV to 40 CFR part 268 as incorporated by reference in Section 016, and that this lab pack will be sent to a combustion facility in compliance with the alternative treatment standards for lab packs at Section 010.02. I am aware that there are significant penalties for submitting a false certification, including the possibility of fine or imprisonment.

- $\underline{005.0112}$  No further notification is necessary until such time that the wastes in the lab pack change, or the receiving facility changes, in which case a new notice and certification must be sent and a copy placed in the generator's file.
- $\underline{005.0113}$  If the lab pack contains characteristic hazardous wastes (D001-D043), underlying hazardous constituents (as defined in Section 002.09 need not be determined.
- $\frac{005.0114}{\text{in Sections 005.01F}}$  The generator must also comply with the requirements
- 005.01J Small quantity generators with tolling agreements pursuant to Chapter 9, 007.06 must comply with the applicable notification and certification requirements of Section 005.01 for the initial shipment of the waste subject to the agreement. Such generators must retain on-site a copy of the notification and certification, together with the tolling agreement, for at least three years after termination or expiration of the agreement. The three-year record retention period is automatically extended during the course of any unresolved enforcement action regarding the regulated activity or as requested by the Director.
- $\underline{005.02}$  The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 268.7(b), pertaining to testing requirements for treatment facilities, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- $\underline{005.03}$  The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR 268.7(c), pertaining to land disposal facilities, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- $\underline{005.04}$  Generators or treaters who first claim that hazardous debris is excluded from the definition of hazardous waste under Chapter 2,  $\underline{007.02}$  (i.e., debris treated by an extraction or destruction technology provided by Table 11, Alternative Treatment Standards for Hazardous Debris, of this Title, and debris that the Director has determined does not contain hazardous waste) are subject to the following notification and certification requirements:
  - $\frac{005.04 \text{A}}{\text{must be}}$  A one-time notification, including the following information, must be submitted to DEQ:
    - $\underline{005.04\text{Al}}$  The name and address of the Subtitle D facility receiving the treated debris;

- $\frac{005.04A2}{\text{generated}}$  A description of the hazardous debris as initially generated, including the applicable EPA Hazardous Waste Numbers(s); and
- <u>005.04A3</u> For debris excluded under Chapter 2, <u>007.02A</u>, the technology from Table 11, Alternative Treatment Standards for Hazardous Debris, used to treat the debris.
- $\underline{005.04B}$  The notification must be updated if the debris is shipped to a different facility, and, for debris excluded under Chapter 2,  $\underline{007.02A}$ , if a different type of debris is treated or if a different technology is used to treat the debris.
- $\underline{005.04C}$  For debris excluded under Chapter 2,  $\underline{007.02A}$  of this chapter, the owner or operator of the treatment facility must document and certify compliance with the treatment standards of Table 11, Alternative Treatment Standards for Hazardous Debris, of this Title, as follows:
  - $\underline{005.04C1}$  Records must be kept of all inspections, evaluations, and analyses of treated debris that are made to determine compliance with the treatment standards;
  - $\underline{005.04C2}$  Records must be kept of any data or information the treater obtains during treatment of the debris that identifies key operating parameters of the treatment unit; and
  - <u>005.04C3</u> For each shipment of treated debris, a certification of compliance with the treatment standards must be signed by an authorized representative and placed in the facility's files. The certification must state the following: "I certify under penalty of law that the debris has been treated in accordance with the requirements of 40 CFR 268.45. I am aware that there are significant penalties for making a false certification, including the possibility of fine and imprisonment."
- $\underline{005.05}$  Generators and treaters who first receive from EPA or an authorized state a determination that a given contaminated soil subject to LDRs as provided in Section  $\underline{013.01}$  no longer contains a listed hazardous waste and generators and treaters who first determine that a contaminated soil subject to LDRs as provided in Section  $\underline{013.01}$  no longer exhibits a characteristic of hazardous waste must:
  - $\underline{005.05A}$  Prepare a one-time only documentation of these determinations  $\underline{including}$  all supporting information; and,
  - $\underline{005.05B}$  Maintain that information in the facility files and other records for a minimum of three years.
- 006 Special rules regarding wastes that exhibit a characteristic.
  - $\underline{006.01}$  The initial generator of a solid waste must determine each EPA Hazardous Waste Number (waste code) applicable to the waste in order to determine the applicable treatment standards under Sections 009 through

- $\overline{014}$ . For purposes of this Chapter, the waste will carry the waste code for any applicable listed waste (Chapter 3,  $\overline{011}$  through  $\overline{017}$ ). In addition, where the waste exhibits a characteristic, the waste will carry one or more of the characteristic waste codes (Chapter 3,  $\overline{005}$  through  $\overline{010}$ ), except when the treatment standard for the listed waste operates in lieu of the treatment standard for the characteristic waste, as specified in Section  $\overline{006.02}$ . If the generator determines that their waste displays a hazardous characteristic (and is not D001 nonwastewaters treated by CMBST, RORGS, or POLYM of Section  $\overline{010}$ , Table  $\overline{10}$ , the generator must determine the underlying hazardous constituents (as defined at Section  $\overline{002.09}$ ) in the characteristic waste.
- 006.02 Where a prohibited waste is both listed under Chapter 3, 011 through 017, and exhibits a characteristic under Chapter 3, 005 through 010, the treatment standard for the waste code listed in Chapter 3, 011 through 017 will operate in lieu of the standard for the waste code under Chapter 3, 005 through 010, provided that the treatment standard for the listed waste includes a treatment standard for the constituent that causes the waste to exhibit the characteristic. Otherwise, the waste must meet the treatment standards for all applicable listed and characteristic waste codes.
- $\underline{006.03}$  In addition to any applicable standards determined from the initial point of generation, no prohibited waste which exhibits a characteristic under Chapter 3,  $\underline{005}$  through  $\underline{010}$  may be land disposed unless the waste complies with the treatment standards under Sections  $\underline{009}$  through  $\underline{012}$ .
- 006.04 Wastes that exhibit a characteristic are also subject to Section 005 requirements, except that once the waste is no longer hazardous, a one-time notification and certification must be placed in the generators or treaters files and sent to the Department of Environmental Quality. The notification and certification that is placed in the generators or treaters files must be updated if the process or operation generating the waste changes and/or if the Subtitle D facility receiving the waste changes. However, the generator or treater need only notify the Department of Environmental Quality on an annual basis if such changes occur. Such notification and certification should be sent to the Department of Environmental Quality by the end of the calendar year, but no later than December 31.
  - $\underline{006.04A}$  The notification must include the following information:
    - $\underline{006.04 \text{Al}}$  The name and address of the Subtitle D facility receiving the waste shipment; and
    - $\underline{006.04A2}$  A description of the waste as initially generated, including the applicable EPA hazardous waste code(s), treatability group(s), and underlying hazardous constituents (as defined in Section  $\underline{002.09}$ ), unless the waste will be treated and monitored for all underlying hazardous constituents. If all underlying hazardous constituents will be

treated and monitored, there is no requirement to list any of the underlying hazardous constituents on the notice.

 $\underline{006.04B}$  The certification must be signed by an authorized representative and must state the language found in 40 CFR 268.7(b)(4), as incorporated by reference in Section 005.02.

 $\underline{006.04B1}$  If treatment removes the characteristic but does not meet standards applicable to underlying hazardous constituents, then the certification found in 40 CFR 268.7(b)(4)(iv), as incorporated by reference in Section 005.02, applies.

- 007 Surface impoundment exemptions.
  - $\underline{007.01}$  The conditions and requirements found in 40 CFR 268.14, pertaining to exemptions for newly identified or listed wastes managed in surface impoundments, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- 008 Prohibitions on land disposal.
  - $\underline{008.01}$  The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 268, Subpart C, pertaining to prohibitions on land disposal, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- 009 Applicability of Treatment Standards.
  - $\underline{009.01}$  A prohibited waste identified in Table 9, Treatment Standards for Hazardous Wastes, of this Title may be land disposed only if it meets the requirements found in the table. For each waste, the table identifies one of three types of treatment standard requirements:
    - $\underline{009.01A}$  All hazardous constituents in the waste or in the treatment residue must be at or below the values found in Table 9 for that waste ("total waste standards"); or
    - $\underline{009.01B}$  The hazardous constituents in the extract of the waste or in the extract of the treatment residue must be at or below the values found in the table ("waste extract standards"); or
    - $\underline{009.01C}$  The waste must be treated using the technology specified in Table  $\underline{10}$ , Technology Codes and Description of Technology-Based Standards.
  - <u>009.02</u> For wastewaters, compliance with concentration level standards is based on maximums for any one day, except for D004 through D011 wastes for which the previously promulgated treatment standards based on grab samples remain in effect. For all nonwastewaters, compliance with concentration level standards is based on grab sampling. For wastes covered by the waste extract standards, the test Method 1311, the Toxicity Characteristic Leaching Procedure found in "Test Methods for Evaluating Solid Waste, Physical/Chemical Methods", EPA Publication SW-846, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 1, must be used to measure compliance. An exception is made for D004 and D008, for which either of two test methods may be used: Method 1311, or Method 1310B, the Extraction Procedure Toxicity Test. For

wastes covered by a technology standard, the wastes may be land disposed after being treated using that specified technology or an equivalent treatment technology approved by the Administrator under the procedures set forth in 40 CFR 268.42(b). (The provisions of Chapter 26, 001.04 do not apply to 40 CFR 268.42(b).)

- $\underline{009.03}$  When wastes with differing treatment standards for a constituent of concern are combined for purposes of treatment, the treatment residue must meet the lowest treatment standard for the constituent of concern.
- $\underline{009.04}$  Notwithstanding the prohibitions specified in Section  $\underline{009.01}$ , treatment and disposal facilities may demonstrate (and certify pursuant to 40 CFR 268.7(b)(5), as incorporated by reference in Section  $\underline{005.02}$ ) compliance with the treatment standards for organic constituents specified by a footnote in the table "Treatment Standards for Hazardous Wastes" in this section, provided the following conditions are satisfied:
  - $\underline{009.04A}$  The treatment standards for the organic constituents were established based on incineration in units operated in accordance with the technical requirements of Chapter 21,  $\underline{015}$ , or based on combustion in fuel substitution units operating in accordance with applicable technical requirements;
  - <u>009.04B</u> The treatment or disposal facility has used the methods referenced in Section 009.04A to treat the organic constituents; and
  - $\underline{009.04C}$  The treatment or disposal facility may demonstrate compliance with organic constituents if good-faith analytical efforts achieve detection limits for the regulated organic constituents that do not exceed the treatment standards specified in this section by an order of magnitude.
- $\underline{009.05}$  For characteristic wastes (D001-D043) that are subject to treatment standards in Table 9, Treatment Standards for Hazardous Wastes, and are not managed in a wastewater treatment system that is regulated under the Clean Water Act (CWA), that is CWA equivalent, or that is injected into a Class I nonhazardous deep injection well, all underlying hazardous constituents (as defined in Section  $\underline{002.09}$ ) must meet Universal Treatment Standards, found in Table 12 of this Title prior to land disposal as defined in Section  $\underline{002.03}$ .
- $\overline{009.06}$  The treatment standards for F001-F005 nonwastewater constituents carbon disulfide, cyclohexanone, and/or methanol apply to wastes which contain only one, two, or three of these constituents. Compliance is measured for these constituents in the waste extract from test Method 1311, the Toxicity Characteristic Leaching Procedure found in "Test Methods for Evaluating Solid Waste, Physical/Chemical Methods", EPA Publication SW-846, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 1. If the waste contains any of these three constituents along with any of the other 25 constituents found in F001-F005, then compliance with treatment standards for carbon disulfide, cyclohexanone, and/or methanol are not required.
- $\underline{009.07}$  Prohibited D004-D011 mixed radioactive wastes and mixed radioactive listed wastes containing metal constituents, that were previously treated by stabilization to the treatment standards in effect at that time and then

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put into storage, do not have to be re-treated to meet treatment standards in this section prior to land disposal.

 $\underline{009.08}$  Effective September 4, 1998, the treatment standards for the wastes specified in Chapter 3 as Hazardous Waste Numbers P185, P191, P192, P197, U364, U394, and U395 may be satisfied by either meeting the constituent concentrations presented in Table 9, or by treating the waste by the following technologies: combustion, as defined by the technology code CMBST at Section  $\underline{010}$ , Table 10, for nonwastewaters; and, biodegradation as defined by the technology code BIODG, carbon adsorption as defined by the technology code CARBN, chemical oxidations as defined by the technology code CHOXD, or combustion as defined as technology code CMBST at Section 010, Table 10, for wastewaters.

- <sup>2</sup> CAS means Chemical Abstract Services. When the waste code and/or regulated constituents are described as a combination of a chemical with its salts and/or esters, the CAS number is given for the parent compound only.
- Concentration standards for wastewaters are expressed in mg/l and are based on analysis of composite samples.
- <sup>4</sup> All treatment standards expressed as a Technology Code or combination of Technology Codes are explained in detail in Section <u>010</u> and Table 10, Technology Codes and Descriptions of Technology-Based Standards.
- Except for Metals (EP or TCLP) and Cyanides (Total and Amenable) the nonwastewater treatment standards expressed as a concentration were established, in part, based upon incineration in units operated in accordance with the technical requirements of Chapter 21, 015, or Chapter 22, 015, or based upon combustion in fuel substitution units operating in accordance with applicable technical requirements. Debris treaters should refer to the safety precautions specified in Material Safety Data Sheets for various acids to avoid applying an incompatible acid to a particular debris/contaminant combination. For example, concentrated sulfuric acid may react violently with certain organic compounds, such as acrylonitrile.

<sup>8</sup>The demonstration "Equivalent Technology" under 40 CFR 268.42(b) must document that the technology treats contaminants subject to treatment to a level equivalent to that required by the performance and design and operating standards for other technologies in this table such that residual levels of hazardous contaminants will not pose a hazard to human health and the environment absent management controls.

<sup>9</sup>Any soil, waste, and other nondebris material that remains on the debris surface (or remains mixed with the debris) after treatment is considered a treatment residual that must be separated from the debris using, at a minimum, simple physical or mechanical means. Examples of simple physical or mechanical means are vibratory or trommel screening or water washing. The debris surface need not be cleaned to a "clean debris surface" as defined in note 3 when separating treated debris from residue; rather, the surface must be free of caked soil, waste, or other nondebris material. Treatment residuals are subject to the waste-specific treatment standards for the waste contaminating the debris.

 $\overline{012.01}$  Table 12 - Universal Treatment Standards identifies the hazardous constituents, along with the nonwastewater and wastewater treatment standard levels, that are used to regulate most prohibited hazardous wastes with numerical limits. For determining compliance with treatment standards for underlying hazardous constituents as defined in Section  $\underline{002.09}$ , these treatment standards may not be exceeded. Compliance with these treatment standards is measured by an analysis of grab samples, unless otherwise noted in the following Table 12.

  - 013.02 Prior to land disposal, contaminated soil identified by paragraph 013.01 of this section as needing to comply with LDRs must be treated according to the applicable treatment standards specified in paragraph 013.03 of this section or according to the Universal Treatment Standards specified in Section 012 applicable to the contaminating listed hazardous waste and/or the applicable characteristic of hazardous waste if the soil is characteristic. The treatment standards specified in paragraph 013.03 of this section and the Universal Treatment Standards may be modified through a treatment variance approved in accordance with Chapter 5, 006.
  - 013.03 Treatment standards for contaminated soils. Prior to land disposal, contaminated soil identified by paragraph 013.01 of this section as needing to comply with LDRs must be treated according to all the standards specified in this paragraph or according to the Universal Treatment Standards specified in Section 012.
    - 013.03A All soils. Prior to land disposal, all constituents subject to treatment must be treated as follows:
      - 013.03A1 For non-metals except carbon disulfide, cyclohexanone, and methanol, treatment must achieve 90 percent reduction in total constituent concentrations, except as provided by paragraph 013.03A3 of this section.
      - 013.03A2 For metals and carbon disulfide, cyclohexanone, and methanol, treatment must achieve 90 percent reduction in constituent concentrations as measured in leachate from the treated media (tested according to the TCLP) or 90 percent reduction in total constituent concentrations (when a metal removal treatment technology is used), except as provided by paragraph 013.03A3 of this section.
      - 013.03A3 When treatment of any constituent subject to treatment to a 90 percent reduction standard would result in a concentration less than 10 times the Universal Treatment

Standard for that constituent, treatment to achieve constituent concentrations less than 10 times the universal treatment standard is not required. Universal Treatment Standards are identified in Section 012, Table 12.

- $\underline{013.03B}$  Soils that exhibit the characteristic of ignitability, corrosivity or reactivity. In addition to the treatment required by paragraph  $\underline{013.03A}$  of this section, prior to land disposal, soils that exhibit the characteristic of ignitability, corrosivity, or reactivity must be treated to eliminate these characteristics.
- $\underline{013.03C}$  Soils that contain nonanalyzable constituents. In addition to the treatment requirements of paragraphs  $\underline{013.03A}$  and  $\underline{013.03B}$  of this section, prior to land disposal, the following treatment is required for soils that contain nonanalyzable constituents:
  - $\underline{013.03C1}$  For soil that contains only analyzable and nonanalyzable organic constituents, treatment of the analyzable constituents to the levels specified in paragraphs 013.03A and 013.03B of this section; or,
  - $\underline{013.03C2}$  For soil that contains only nonanalyzable constituents, treatment by the method(s) specified in Section  $\underline{010}$  for the waste contained in the soil.
- $\overline{013.04}$  Constituents subject to treatment. When applying the soil treatment standards in paragraph  $\overline{013.03}$  of this section, constituents subject to treatment are any constituents listed in Section  $\overline{012}$ , Table 12, Universal Treatment Standards that are reasonably expected to be present in any given volume of contaminated soil, except fluoride, selenium, sulfides, vanadium, zinc, and are present at concentrations greater than ten times the universal treatment standard. PCBs are not a constituent subject to treatment in any given volume of soil which exhibits the toxicity characteristic solely because of the presence of metals.
- $\underline{013.05}$  Management of treatment residuals. Treatment residuals from treating contaminated soil identified by paragraph  $\underline{013.01}$  of this section as needing to comply with LDRs must be managed as follows:
  - $\underline{\text{O13.05A}}$  Soil residuals are subject to treatment standards of this section;
  - 013.05B Non-soil residuals are subject to:
    - $\underline{013.05B1}$  For soils contaminated by a listed hazardous waste, the RCRA Subtitle C standards applicable to the listed hazardous waste; and
    - $\underline{013.05B2}$  For soils that exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste, if the non-soil residual also exhibits a characteristic of hazardous waste, the treatment standards applicable to the characteristic hazardous waste.

- 014 Prohibitions on storage of restricted wastes.
  - $\underline{014.01}$  Except as provided in this section, the storage of hazardous wastes restricted from land disposal under 40 CFR Subpart C, as incorporated by reference in Section  $\underline{008}$  is prohibited, unless the following conditions are met:
    - $\underline{014.01A}$  A generator stores such wastes in tanks, containers, or containment buildings on-site solely for the purpose of the accumulation of such quantities of hazardous waste as necessary to facilitate proper recovery, treatment, or disposal and the generator complies with the requirements in Chapters 9, Sections  $\underline{007}$  and  $\underline{008}$  or Chapter 10, Sections  $\underline{004}$  and  $\underline{005}$ , and Chapters 21 and 22.
    - $\underline{014.01B}$  An owner/operator of a hazardous waste treatment, storage, or disposal facility stores such wastes in tanks, containers, or containment buildings solely for the purpose of the accumulation of such quantities of hazardous waste as necessary to facilitate proper recovery, treatment, or disposal and:
      - 014.01B1 Each container is clearly marked to identify its
        contents and the date each period of accumulation begins;
      - $\overline{014.01B2}$  Each tank is clearly marked with a description of its contents, the quantity of each hazardous waste received, and the date each period of accumulation begins, or such information for each tank is recorded and maintained in the operating record at that facility. Regardless of whether the tank itself is marked, an owner/operator must comply with the operating record requirements specified in 40 CFR 264.73, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 21,  $\overline{005}$ , or 40 CFR 265.73, as incorporated by reference in Chapter 22,  $\overline{005}$ .
    - $\underline{014.01C}$  A transporter stores manifested shipments of such wastes at a transfer facility for 10 days or less.
  - $\underline{014.02}$  An owner/operator of a treatment, storage or disposal facility may store such wastes for up to one year unless the Agency can demonstrate that such storage was not solely for the purpose of accumulation of such quantities of hazardous waste as are necessary to facilitate proper recovery, treatment, or disposal.
  - $\underline{014.03}$  A owner/operator of a treatment, storage or disposal facility may store such wastes beyond one year; however, the owner/operator bears the burden of proving that such storage was solely for the purpose of accumulation of such quantities of hazardous waste as are necessary to facilitate proper recovery, treatment, or disposal.
  - $\overline{014.04}$  If a generator's waste is exempt from a prohibition on the type of land disposal utilized for the waste (for example, because of an approved case-by-case extension under 40 CFR 268.5, an approved 40 CFR 268.6 petition, or a national capacity variance under 40 CFR Part 268, Subpart C, as incorporated by reference in Section  $\overline{008.01}$ ), the prohibition in Section 014.01 does not apply during the period of such exemption.

- $\underline{014.05}$  The prohibition in Section  $\underline{014.01}$  does not apply to hazardous wastes that meet the treatment standards specified under 40 CFR 268.41 and 268.43, Section  $\underline{010}$  of this Chapter, or the treatment standards specified under the variance in 40 CFR 268.44, or, where treatment standards have not been specified, is in compliance with the applicable prohibitions specified in 40 CFR 268.32, as incorporated by reference in Section 008.
- $\underline{014.06}$  Liquid hazardous wastes containing polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs) at concentrations greater than or equal to 50 ppm must be stored at a facility that meets the requirements of 40 CFR 761.65(b) and must be removed from storage and treated or disposed as required by this Chapter within one year of the date when such wastes are first placed into storage. The provisions of Section  $\underline{014.03}$  do not apply to such PCB wastes prohibited under § 40 CFR 268.32 as incorporated by reference in Section  $\underline{008}$  of this Chapter.
- $\frac{014.07}{\text{not apply}}$  The prohibition and requirements in Section  $\frac{014}{\text{a}}$  of this Chapter do not apply to hazardous remediation wastes stored in a staging pile approved pursuant to 40 CFR 264.554.
- $\underline{015}$  The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 268, Appendix III, pertaining to the list of halogenated organic compounds regulated under 40 CFR 268.32 (as incorporated by reference in Section  $\underline{008}$  of this Chapter), are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- <u>016</u> The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 268, Appendix IV, pertaining to wastes excluded from lab packs under the alternative treatment standards of Chapter 20, Section <u>010.02</u>, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- $\underline{017}$  The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 268, Appendix VI, pertaining to recommended technologies to achieve deactivation of characteristics in Chapter 20, Section  $\underline{010}$ , are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- $\underline{018}$  The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 268, Appendix VII, pertaining to the effective dates of surface disposed wastes regulated in the land disposal restrictions, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.
- $\overline{019}$  The conditions and requirements of 40 CFR Part 268, Appendix VIII, pertaining to the national capacity land disposal restrictions for underground injection control wastes comprehensive list, are hereby adopted and incorporated herein by reference.

- Title 128 Department of Environmental Quality
- Chapter 21 STANDARDS FOR OWNERS AND OPERATORS OF HAZARDOUS WASTE TREATMENT, STORAGE, AND DISPOSAL FACILITIES
- $\underline{001}$  Applicability. The standards in this Chapter apply to owners and operators of all facilities which treat, store, or dispose of hazardous wastes, except as specifically provided otherwise in this Chapter or Chapters 2, 3 and 25.
  - $\underline{001.01}$  This Chapter applies to the owner or operator of a POTW which treats, stores or disposes of hazardous waste only to the extent they are included in a hazardous waste permit-by-rule granted under Chapters 12 through 15.
  - 001.02 The requirements of this Chapter do not apply to:
    - $\overline{001.02A}$  The owner or operator of a facility permitted, licensed or registered by DEQ to manage municipal or industrial solid waste, if the only hazardous waste the facility treats, stores or disposes is excluded from regulation under Chapter 8;
    - $\underline{001.02B}$  The owner or operator of a facility managing recyclable materials described in Chapter 7,  $\underline{002}$  and  $\underline{003}$  (except to the extent that the requirements of this Chapter are referred to in Chapter 7,  $\underline{007}$ ,  $\underline{011}$  and  $\underline{012}$ );
    - $\underline{001.02C}$  A generator accumulating waste on-site in compliance with Chapter 9, 006 and 009 or Chapter 10, 004 and 005;
    - $\underline{001.02D}$  A farmer disposing of waste pesticides from the farmer's own use in compliance with Chapter 10, 007;
    - $\underline{001.02E}$  The owner or operator of a totally enclosed treatment facility, as defined in Chapter 1;
    - $\underline{001.02F}$  The owner or operator of an elementary neutralization unit or a wastewater treatment unit as defined in Chapter 1; provided that if the owner or operator is diluting hazardous ignitable (D001) wastes (other than the D001 High TOC Subcategory defined in Chapter 20 or reactive (D003) waste, to remove the characteristic before land disposal, the owner/operator must comply with the requirements set out in 40 CFR 264.17(b), as incorporated by reference in Section  $\underline{002}$  of this Chapter.
    - $\overline{001.02G}$  A person engaged in treatment or containment activities during immediate response to: a discharge of hazardous waste; an imminent and substantial threat of a discharge of hazardous waste; or a discharge of a material which, when discharged, becomes a hazardous waste, except:
      - <u>001.02G1</u> A person who continues or initiates hazardous waste treatment or containment activities after the immediate response is over is subject to all applicable requirements of this Chapter;

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- $\frac{001.02G2}{\text{by this}}$  An owner or operator of a facility otherwise regulated by this Chapter must comply with all applicable requirements in Sections 003 and 004 of this Chapter.
- $\underline{001.02H}$  A transporter storing manifested shipments of hazardous waste in containers meeting the requirements of Chapter 10,  $\underline{003.01A}$  at a transfer facility for a period of 10 days or less.
- $\underline{001.02I}$  The combining of absorbent material and waste in a container provided that these actions occur at the time waste is first placed in the container and Chapter 16 and Chapter 9,  $\underline{006.03}$  or Chapter 10, 004.01Al are complied with.
- $\underline{001.03}$  The requirements of this Chapter apply to owners or operators of all facilities which treat, store or dispose hazardous waste referred to in Chapter 20.
- 001.04 The requirements of Sections 002, 003, and 004 of this Chapter and 40 CFR 264.101 do not apply to remediation waste management sites. (However, some remediation waste management sites may be a part of a facility that is subject to a traditional RCRA permit because the facility is also treating, storing or disposing of hazardous wastes that are not remediation wastes. In these cases, Sections 002, 003, and 004 of this Chapter, and 40 CFR 264.101 do apply to the facility subject to the traditional RCRA permit.) Instead of the requirements of Sections 002, 003, and 004 of this Chapter, owners or operators of remediation waste management sites must:
  - $\underline{001.04A}$  Obtain an EPA identification number by applying to the Director using EPA Form 8700-12;
  - 001.04B Obtain a detailed chemical and physical analysis of a representative sample of the hazardous remediation wastes to be managed at the site. At a minimum, the analysis must contain all of the information which must be known to treat, store or dispose of the waste according to this Chapter and Chapter 20, and must be kept accurate and up to date;
  - $\overline{001.04C}$  Prevent people who are unaware of the danger from entering, and minimize the possibility for unauthorized people or livestock to enter onto the active portion of the remediation waste management site, unless the owner or operator can demonstrate to the Director that;
    - $\underline{001.04C1}$  Physical contact with the waste, structures, or equipment within the active portion of the remediation waste management site will not injure people or livestock who may enter the active portion of the remediation waste management site; and
    - $\frac{001.04C2}{\text{livestock}}$  Disturbance of the waste or equipment by people or livestock who enter onto the active portion of the remediation waste management site, will not cause a violation of the requirements of this Chapter;
  - $\underline{001.04D}$  Inspect the remediation waste management site for malfunctions, deterioration, operator errors, and discharges that may be causing , or may lead to, a release of hazardous waste constituents to the environment, or a threat to human health. The owner or operator must conduct these inspections often enough to identify problems in time to correct them before they harm human health or the environment,

- and must remedy the problem before it leads to a human health or environmental hazard. Where a hazard is imminent or has already occurred, the owner/operator must take remedial action immediately;
- $\underline{001.04E}$  Provide personnel with classroom or on-the-job training on how to perform their duties in a way that ensures the remediation waste management site complies with the requirements of this Chapter, and on how to respond effectively to emergencies;
- $\underline{001.04F}$  Take precautions to prevent accidental ignition or reaction of  $\overline{\text{ignitable}}$  or reactive waste, and prevent threats to human health and the environment from ignitable, reactive and incompatible waste;
- $\underline{001.04G}$  For remediation waste management sites subject to regulation under Sections  $\underline{009}$  through  $\underline{015}$  and Section  $\underline{018}$  of this Chapter, the owner/operator must design, construct, operate, and maintain a unit within a 100-year floodplain to prevent washout of any hazardous waste by a 100-year flood, unless the owner/operator can meet the demonstration of 40 CFR 264.18(b);
- $\underline{001.04H}$  Not place any non-containerized or bulk liquid hazardous waste in any salt dome formation, salt bed formation, underground mine or cave;
- $\underline{001.04I}$  Develop and maintain a construction quality assurance program for all surface impoundments, waste piles and landfill units that are required to comply with 40 CFR 264.221(c) and (d), 264.251(c) and (d), and 264.301(c) and (d) at the remediation waste management site, according to the requirements of 40 CFR 264.19;
- <u>001.04J</u> Develop and maintain procedures to prevent accidents and a contingency and emergency plan to control accidents that occur. These procedures must address proper design, construction, maintenance, and operation of remediation waste management units at the site. The goal of the plan must be to minimize the possibility of, and the hazards from a fire, explosion, or any unplanned sudden or non-sudden release of hazardous waste or hazardous waste constituents to air, soil, or surface water that could threaten human health or the environment. The plan must explain specifically how to treat, store and dispose of the hazardous remediation waste in question, and must be implemented immediately whenever a fire, explosion, or release of hazardous waste constituents which could threaten human health or the environment;

  - $\frac{001.01\text{H2}}{\text{by this}}$  An owner or operator of a facility otherwise regulated by this Chapter must comply with all applicable requirements in Sections 003 and 004 of this Chapter.

In the event of a discharge of hazardous waste, the person responsible for the waste at the time of the discharge shall immediately:

    - 001.02B4 Location of discharge as specific as possible including nearest town, city, highway or waterway;
    - $\underline{001.02B5}$  Description contained on the manifest and the amount of waste discharged;
    - 001.02B6 Cause of discharge; and
    - $\frac{001.02B7}{\text{health and the environment.}}$  Emergency action taken to minimize the threat to human
- <u>002</u> Emergency orders. If a discharge of hazardous waste requires immediate removal to protect human health or environment (as determined by the Director) an emergency order may be issued pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. §81-1507(4) (Supp. 1983) holding in abeyance the manifest and recordkeeping requirements of these regulations until the discharged hazardous waste no longer presents an immediate hazard to human health or the environment (as determined by the Director).
- $\underline{003}$  Discharge clean-up. The person responsible for the waste at the time of discharge shall clean up all the discharged hazardous waste or take such action as may be required by the Director so that such waste, or contaminated soil, surface water or other material no longer presents a hazard to human health or the environment.

The corresponding fee payment based upon the fee assessment schedule below, shall be submitted with the fee report. The Director shall remit any money collected from fees to the State Treasurer who shall credit the entire amount thereof to the General Fund.
- 002 Fee assessment.
  - $\underline{002.01}$  Hazardous waste treated or incinerated at hazardous waste management facilities shall be subject to the following fee rate:
  - \$.06 per cubic foot (\$1.62 per cubic yard) or \$.00096 per pound.
  - $\underline{002.02}$  Hazardous waste disposed at hazardous waste disposal facilities shall be subject to the following fee rate:
  - \$.70 per cubic foot (\$18.90 per cubic yard) or \$.0112 per pound.
  - $\underline{002.03}$  When multiple management activities occur at the same facility, the operator shall be assessed the management fee having the highest rate of the management activities involved.
  - $\underline{002.04}$  When exact volumes are unavailable, the following conversion factors shall be used:
  - 1 cubic foot = 7.5 gallons
    1 cubic foot = 28.3 liters
  - 1 cubic foot =  $2.3 \times 10^{-5}$  acre feet

- 002 Applicability--batteries.
  - 002.01 Batteries covered under Title 128, Chapter 25.
    - <u>002.01A</u> The requirements of this chapter apply to persons managing batteries, as defined in <u>008</u>, except those listed in <u>002.02</u> of this chapter.
    - <u>002.01B</u> Spent Lead-acid batteries which are not managed under Title 128, Chapter 7 are subject to management under this chapter.
  - <u>002.02</u> Batteries not covered under Title 128, Chapter 25. The requirements of this chapter do not apply to persons managing the following batteries:
    - <u>002.02A</u> Spent lead-acid batteries that are managed under Title 128, Chapter 7.
    - <u>002.02B</u> Batteries, as defined in <u>008</u> that are not yet wastes under Title 128, Chapter 2, including those that do not meet the criteria for waste generation in <u>002.03</u> of this chapter.
    - <u>002.02C</u> Batteries, as defined in <u>008</u>, that are not hazardous waste. A battery is a hazardous waste if it exhibits one or more of the characteristics identified in Title 128, Chapter 3, 005 through 010.
  - 002.03 Generation of waste batteries.

<u>002.03A</u> A used battery becomes a waste on the date it is discarded.

<u>002.03B</u> An unused battery becomes a waste on the date the handler decides to discard it.

003 Applicability -- pesticides.

<u>003.01</u> Pesticides covered under Title 128. Chapter 25. The requirements of this chapter apply to persons managing pesticides, as defined in <u>008</u>, meeting the following conditions, except those listed in paragraph <u>003.02</u> of this chapter:

<u>003.01A</u> Recalled pesticides that are:

<u>003.01A1</u> Stocks of a suspended and canceled pesticide that are part of a voluntary or mandatory recall under FIFRA Section 19(b), including, but not limited to those owned by the registrant responsible for conducting the recall; or

<u>003.01A2</u> Stocks of a suspended or canceled pesticide, or a pesticide that is not in compliance with FIFRA, that are part of a voluntary recall by the registrant.

<u>003.01B</u> Stocks of other unused pesticide products that are collected and managed as part of a waste pesticide collection program.

<u>003.02</u> Pesticides not covered under Title 128, Chapter 25. The requirements of this chapter do not apply to persons managing the following pesticides:

<u>003.02A</u> Recalled pesticides described in <u>003.01A</u> of this chapter and unused pesticide products described in <u>003.01B</u> of this chapter, that are managed by farmers in compliance with Title 128, Chapter 10, <u>007</u>.

<u>003.02B</u> Pesticides not meeting the conditions set forth in <u>003.01</u> of this chapter. These pesticides must be managed in compliance with the hazardous waste regulations in Title 128, Chapters 1 through 24.

<u>003.02C</u> Pesticides that are not wastes under Title 128, Chapter 2, <u>003</u> including those that do not meet the criteria for waste generation in <u>003.03</u> of this chapter or those that are not wastes as described in 003.04 of this chapter; and

<u>003.02D</u> Pesticides that are not hazardous waste. A pesticide is a hazardous waste if it is listed in Title 128, Chapter 3, or if it exhibits one or more of the characteristics identified in Title 128, Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>.

003.03 When a pesticide becomes a waste.

<u>003.03A</u> A recalled pesticide described in <u>003.01A</u> of this chapter becomes a waste on the first date on which both of the following conditions apply:

<u>003.03A1</u> The generator of the recalled pesticide agrees to participate in the recall; and

<u>003.03A2</u> The person conducting the recall decides to discard the pesticide.

<u>003.03B</u> An unused pesticide product described in <u>003.01B</u> of this chapter becomes a waste on the date the generator decides to discard it.

<u>003.04</u> Pesticides that are not wastes. The following pesticides are not wastes:

<u>003.04A</u> Recalled pesticides described in <u>003.01A</u> of this chapter provided that the person conducting the recall:

<u>003.04A1</u> Has not made a decision to discard the pesticide. Until such a decision is made, the pesticide does not meet the definition of "solid waste" under Title 128, Chapter 2, <u>003</u>; thus the pesticide is not a hazardous waste and is not subject to hazardous waste requirements, including this Chapter 25. This pesticide remains subject to the requirements of FIFRA; or

<u>003.04A2</u> Has made a decision to use a management option that, under Title 128, Chapter 2, <u>003</u>, does not cause the pesticide to be a solid waste (i.e., the selected option is use (other than use constituting disposal) or reuse (other than burning for energy recovery), or reclamation). Such a pesticide is not a solid waste and therefore is not a hazardous waste, and is not subject to the hazardous waste requirements including Chapter 25. This pesticide, including a recalled pesticide that is exported to a foreign destination for use or reuse, remains subject to the requirements of FIFRA.

<u>003.04B</u> Unused pesticide products described in <u>003.01B</u> of this chapter, if the generator of the unused pesticide product has not decided to discard them. These pesticides remain subject to the requirements of FIFRA.

004 Applicability -- mercury-containing items.

<u>004.01</u> Mercury-containing items covered under Title 128, Chapter 25. The requirements of this chapter apply to persons managing mercury-containing items, as described in <u>008</u> except those listed in 004.02 of this chapter.

<u>004.02</u> Mercury-containing items not covered under Title 128, Chapter 25. The requirements of this chapter do not apply to persons managing the following mercury-containing items:

<u>004.02A</u> Mercury-containing items that are not yet wastes under Title 128, Chapter 2. Section <u>004.03</u> of this chapter describes when mercury-containing items become wastes.

<u>004.02B</u> Mercury-containing items that are not hazardous waste. A mercury-containing item is a hazardous waste if it exhibits one or more of the characteristics identified in Title 128, Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>.

004.03 Generation of waste mercury-containing items.

<u>004.03A</u> A used mercury-containing item becomes a waste on the date it is discarded.

<u>004.03B</u> An unused mercury-containing item becomes a waste on the date the handler decides to discard it.

# 005 Applicability -- Lamps.

<u>005.01</u> Lamps covered under Title 128, Chapter 25. The requirements of this part apply to persons managing lamps as described in <u>008</u>, except those listed in paragraph <u>005.02</u> of this chapter.

<u>005.02</u> Lamps not covered under Title 128, Chapter 25. The requirements of this chapter do not apply to persons managing the following:

<u>005.02A</u> Lamps that are not yet wastes under Title 128, Chapter 2. Section <u>005.03</u> of this chapter describes when lamps become wastes.

<u>005.02B</u> Lamps that are not hazardous waste. A lamp is a hazardous waste if it exhibits one or more of the characteristics identified in Title 128, Chapter 3.

005.03 Generation of waste lamps.

005.03A A used lamp becomes a waste on the date it is discarded.

<u>005.03B</u> An unused lamp becomes a waste on the date the handler decides to discard it.

# 006 Applicability -- Electronic Items.

<u>006.01</u> Electronic items covered under Title 128, Chapter 25. The requirements of this part apply to persons managing electronic items as described in <u>008</u>, except those listed in section <u>006.02</u> of this chapter.

<u>006.02</u> Electronic items not covered under Title 128, Chapter 25. The requirements of this chapter do not apply to persons managing the following:

<u>006.02A</u> Electronic items that are not yet wastes under Title 128, Chapter 2. Section 006.03 of this chapter describes when electronic items become wastes.

<u>006.02B</u> Electronic items that are not hazardous waste. An electronic item is a hazardous waste if it exhibits one or more of the characteristics identified in Title 128, Chapter 3.

006.03 Generation of electronic items.

<u>006.03A</u> A used electronic item destined for disposal becomes a waste on the date it is discarded.

<u>006.03B</u> A used electronic item destined for recycling becomes a waste on the date the recycler determines that the item cannot be resold, donated, repaired, or refurbished, or determines that he/she cannot directly reuse or sell useable parts from the item.

<u>006.03C</u> An unused electronic item becomes a waste on the date the handler decides to discard it.

007 Applicability--household and conditionally exempt small quantity generator waste.

<u>007.01</u> Persons managing the wastes listed below may, at their option, manage them under the requirements of this chapter:

<u>007.01A</u> Household wastes that are exempt under Title 128, Chapter 2, <u>009</u>, and are also of the same type as the universal wastes defined at Title 128, Chapter 25, <u>008</u>; and/or

<u>007.01B</u> Conditionally exempt small quantity generator wastes that are exempt under Title 128, Chapter 8, and are also of the same type as the universal wastes defined at Title 128, Chapter 25, <u>008</u>.

<u>007.02</u> Persons who commingle the wastes described in <u>007.01A</u> and <u>007.01B</u> of this chapter together with universal waste regulated under this chapter must manage the commingled waste under the requirements of this chapter.

008 The following definitions are for the purposes of Chapter 25.

<u>008.01</u> "Battery" means a device consisting of one or more electrically connected electrochemical cells which is designed to receive, store, and deliver electric energy. An electrochemical cell is a system consisting of an anode, cathode, and an electrolyte, plus such connections (electrical and mechanical) as may be needed to allow the cell to deliver or receive electrical energy. The term battery also includes an intact, unbroken battery from which the electrolyte has been removed.

<u>008.02</u> "Destination facility" means a facility that treats, disposes of, or recycles a particular category of universal waste, except those management activities described in <u>012.01</u>, <u>012.03</u>, <u>012.04</u>, <u>023.01</u>, <u>023.03</u>, and <u>023.04</u> of this chapter. A facility at which a particular category of universal waste is only accumulated, is not a destination facility for purposes of managing that category of universal waste.

<u>008.03</u> "Electronic item" means electronic equipment that contains one or more electronic circuit boards or other complex circuitry, including but not limited to computer monitors, televisions, central processing units (CPUs), laptop computers, printers, terminals, keyboards, mainframes, stereo equipment, telephones, and recording/playback devices. Electronic items include components and subassemblies or other parts derived from the disassembly of electronic devices. While many waste electronic items do not fail the toxicity characteristic leaching procedure test for heavy metals if left intact, individual components generated by disassembly may fail the toxicity characteristic leaching procedure test. "Electronic items" does not include discarded household appliances as defined by Title 132 – Integrated Solid Waste Management Regulations, Chapter 1, <u>034</u>.

- 008.04 "FFDCA" means Federal Food Drug and Cosmetic Act (21 U.S.C. §301 et seq).
- <u>008.05</u> "FIFRA" means the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (7 U.S.C. 136-136y).
- <u>008.06</u> "Lamp", also referred to as "universal waste lamp", is defined as the bulb or tube portion of an electric lighting device. A lamp is specifically designed to produce radiant energy, most often in the ultraviolet, visible, and infra-red regions of the electromagnetic spectrum. Examples of common universal waste electric lamps include, but are not limited to, fluorescent, high intensity discharge, neon, mercury vapor, high pressure sodium, and metal halide lamps.
- <u>008.07</u> "Large quantity handler of universal waste" means a universal waste handler (as defined in this section) who accumulates 5,000 kilograms or more total of universal waste (batteries, pesticides, mercury-containing items, lamps, or electronic items, calculated collectively) at any time. This designation as a large quantity handler of universal waste is retained through the end of the calendar year in which 5,000 kilograms or more total of universal waste is accumulated.
- <u>008.08</u> "Mercury-containing item" means any electrical, mechanical, or medical product or component (excluding batteries and lamps) which contains elemental mercury and the elemental mercury is necessary for its operation where the mercury acts as a conductor of temperature, pressure, or electricity, or acts as a weight damper. The mercury must be housed within an outer metal, glass, or plastic casing. Mercury-containing devices include but are not limited to; barometers, sphygmomanometers, electrical switches and relays, gauges and flow regulators, manometers, bow stabilizers, thermometers, thermocouples, and mercury-filled pumps.
- 008.09 "OSHA" means Occupational Safety and Health Act 29 U.S.C §651 et seq).
- <u>008.10</u> "Pesticide" means any substance or mixture of substances intended for preventing, destroying, repelling, or mitigating any pest, or intended for use as a plant regulator, defoliant, or desiccant, other than any article that:
  - 008.10A Is a new animal drug under FFDCA section 201(w), or
  - <u>008.10B</u> Is an animal drug that has been determined by regulation of the Secretary of Health and Human Services not to be a new animal drug, or
  - <u>008.10C</u> Is an animal feed under FFDCA section 201(x) that bears or contains any substances described by <u>008.08A</u> or <u>008.08B</u> of this chapter.
- <u>008.11</u> "Small quantity handler of universal waste" means a universal waste handler (as defined in this section) who does not accumulate 5,000 kilograms or more total of universal waste (batteries, pesticides, mercury-containing items, lamps, or electronic items, calculated collectively) at any time.
- <u>008.12</u> "Thermostat" means a temperature control device that contains metallic mercury in an ampule attached to a bimetal sensing element, and mercury-containing ampules that have

been removed from these temperature control devices in compliance with the requirements of <u>012.03B1</u> through <u>012.03B8</u> or <u>023.03B1</u> through <u>023.03B8</u> of this chapter.

<u>008.13</u> "Universal waste" means any of the following hazardous wastes that are subject to the universal waste requirements of Title 128, Chapter 25.

- 008.13A Batteries as described in Title 128, Chapter 25, 002;
- 008.13B Pesticides as described in Title 128, Chapter 25, 003;
- 008.13C Mercury-containing items as described in Title 128, Chapter 25, 004; and
- 008.13D Lamps as described in Title 128, Chapter 25, 005.
- <u>008.13E</u> Electronic items as described in Title 128, Chapter 25, <u>006</u>.

# 008.14 Universal Waste Handler:

## 008.14A Means:

008.14A1 A generator of universal waste; or

<u>008.14A2</u> The owner or operator of a facility, including all contiguous property, that receives universal waste from other universal waste handlers, accumulates universal waste, and sends universal waste to another universal waste handler, to a destination facility or to a foreign destination.

# 008.14B Does not mean:

<u>008.14B1</u> A person who treats (except under the provisions of <u>012.01</u>, <u>012.03</u>, <u>012.04</u>, <u>023.01</u>, <u>023.03</u> or <u>022.04</u> of this chapter) or disposes of, or recycles universal waste; or

<u>008.14B2</u> A person engaged in the off-site transportation of universal waste by air, rail, highway, or water, including a universal waste transfer facility.

- <u>008.15</u> "Universal waste transfer facility" means any transportation-related facility including loading docks, parking areas, storage areas and other similar areas where shipments of universal waste are held during the normal course of transportation for ten days or less.
- <u>008.16</u> "Universal waste transporter" means a person engaged in the off-site transportation of universal waste by air, rail, highway, or water.
- <u>009</u> Small Quantity Handlers of Universal Waste. Sections <u>009</u> through <u>018.03</u> of this chapter define standards for small quantity handlers of universal waste.
- 010 Prohibitions. A small quantity handler of universal waste is:
  - 010.01 Prohibited from disposing of universal waste; and

<u>010.02</u> Prohibited from diluting or treating universal waste, except by responding to releases as provided in <u>015</u> of this chapter; or by managing specific wastes as provided in <u>012</u> of this chapter.

<u>011</u> Notification. A small quantity handler of universal waste is not required to notify EPA of universal waste handling activities.

# 012 Waste Management.

<u>012.01</u> Universal waste batteries. A small quantity handler of universal waste must manage universal waste batteries in a way that prevents release of any universal waste or component of a universal waste to the environment, as follows:

<u>012.01A</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste must contain any universal waste battery that shows evidence of leakage, spillage, or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions in a container. The container must be closed, structurally sound,

compatible with the contents of the battery, and must lack evidence of leakage, spillage, or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

<u>012.01B</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste may conduct the following activities as long as the casing of each individual battery cell is not breached and remains intact and closed (except that cells may be opened to remove electrolyte but must be immediately closed after removal):

012.01B1 Sorting batteries by type;

012.01B2 Mixing battery types in one container;

012.01B3 Discharging batteries so as to remove the electric charge;

012.01B4 Regenerating used batteries;

<u>012.01B5</u> Disassembling batteries or battery packs into individual batteries or cells;

<u>012.01B6</u> Removing batteries from consumer products; or

012.01B7 Removing electrolyte from batteries.

<u>012.01C</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste who removes electrolyte from batteries, or who generates other solid waste (e.g., battery pack materials, discarded consumer products) as a result of the activities listed above, must determine whether the electrolyte and/or other solid waste exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Title 128, Chapter 3 <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>.

<u>012.01C1</u> If the electrolyte and/or other solid waste exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste, it is subject to all applicable requirements of Title 128,

Chapters 1 through 24. The handler is considered the generator of the hazardous electrolyte and/or other waste and is subject to the requirements of Title 128, Chapters 8, 9, and 10.

<u>012.01C2</u> If the electrolyte or other solid waste is not hazardous, the handler must manage the waste in any way that is in compliance with applicable federal, state or local solid waste regulations.

<u>012.02</u> Universal waste pesticides. A small quantity handler of universal waste must manage universal waste pesticides in a way that prevents releases of any universal waste or component of a universal waste to the environment. The universal waste pesticides must be contained in one or more of the following:

<u>012.02A</u> A container that remains closed, structurally sound, compatible with the pesticide, and that lacks evidence of leakage, spillage, or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions; or

 $\underline{012.02B}$  A container that does not meet the requirements of  $\underline{012.02A}$  of this chapter, provided that the unacceptable container is overpacked in a container that does meet the requirements of  $\underline{012.02A}$  of this chapter; or

<u>012.02C</u> A tank that meets the requirements of 40 CFR part 265 subpart J, except for 40 CFR 265.197(c), 265.200, and 265.201; as adopted by reference by Title 128, Chapter 22, <u>010</u>; or

<u>012.02D</u> A transport vehicle or vessel that is closed, structurally sound, compatible with the pesticide, and that lacks evidence of leakage, spillage, or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

<u>012.03</u> Universal waste mercury-containing items. A small quantity handler of universal waste must manage universal waste mercury-containing items in a way that prevents releases of any universal waste or component of a universal waste to the environment, as follows:

<u>012.03A</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste must contain any universal waste mercury-containing items that shows evidence of leakage, spillage, or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions in a container. The container must be closed, structurally sound, compatible with the contents of the thermostat, and must lack evidence of leakage, spillage, or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

<u>012.03B</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste may remove mercury-containing ampules from universal waste mercury-containing items provided the handler:

<u>012.03B1</u> Removes the ampules in a manner designed to prevent breakage of the ampules;

<u>012.03B2</u> Removes ampules only over or in a containment device (e.g., tray or pan sufficient to collect and contain any mercury released from an ampule in case of breakage);

<u>012.03B3</u> Ensures that a mercury clean-up system is readily available to immediately transfer any mercury resulting from spills or leaks from broken ampules, from the containment device to a container that meets the requirements of Title 128, Chapter 10, 004;

<u>012.03B4</u> Immediately transfers any mercury resulting from spills or leaks from broken ampules from the containment device to a container that meets the requirements of Title 128, Chapter 10, <u>004</u>;

<u>012.03B5</u> Ensures that the area in which ampules are removed is well ventilated and monitored to ensure compliance with applicable OSHA exposure levels for mercury;

<u>012.03B6</u> Ensures that employees removing ampules are thoroughly familiar with proper waste mercury handling and emergency procedures, including transfer of mercury from containment devices to appropriate containers;

<u>012.03B7</u> Stores removed ampules in closed, non-leaking containers that are in good condition;

<u>012.03B8</u> Packs removed ampules in the container with packing materials adequate to prevent breakage during storage, handling, and transportation; and

<u>012.03B9</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste who removes mercury-containing ampules from mercury-containing items must determine whether the following exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Title 128, Chapter 3 <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>:

<u>012.03B9(a)</u> Mercury or clean-up residues resulting from spills or leaks; and/or

<u>012.03B9(b)</u> Other solid waste generated as a result of the removal of mercury-containing ampules (e.g., remaining mercury-containing item units).

<u>012.03B10</u> If the mercury, residues, and/or other solid waste exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste, it must be managed in compliance with all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 1 through 24. The handler is considered the generator of the mercury, residues, and/or other waste and must manage it subject to the requirements of Title 128, Chapters 8, 9, and 10.

<u>012.03B11</u> If the mercury, residues, and/or other solid waste is not hazardous, the handler must manage the waste in any way that is in compliance with applicable federal, state or local solid waste regulations.

- <u>012.03C</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste may drain elemental mercury from open-ended mercury-containing items provided the handler:
  - <u>012.03C1</u> Ensures that the universal waste mercury-containing items are drained only over a containment device (e.g., tray or pan sufficient to collect and contain any mercury released from a device in case of breakage or spill);
  - <u>012.03C2</u> Ensures that the draining operations are performed safely by developing and implementing a written procedure detailing how to safely drain the universal waste mercury-containing items. This procedure must include: the type of equipment to be used to drain universal waste mercury-containing items safely; operation and maintenance of the equipment; segregation of incompatible wastes; proper waste management practices; and waste characterization;
  - <u>012.03C3</u> Ensures that a spill clean-up kit is readily available to immediately clean up spills or leaks of the contents of the universal waste mercury-containing item which might occur during the mercury draining operation;
  - <u>012.03C4</u> Immediately transfers the drained elemental mercury to a container that meets the requirements of Title 128, Chapter 10, <u>004</u>;
  - <u>012.03C5</u> Ensures that the area in which the universal waste mercury-containing items are drained is well ventilated and monitored to ensure compliance with applicable OSHA exposure levels for mercury;
  - <u>012.03C6</u> Ensures that employees are thoroughly familiar with the procedure for draining universal waste mercury-containing items and proper waste handling and emergency procedures relevant to their responsibilities during normal facility operations and emergencies;
  - <u>012.03C7</u> Stores the drained elemental mercury in a closed, non-leaking container that is in good condition; and
  - <u>012.03C8</u> Maintains documentation of the date of accumulation, a description of the item drained, and the amount of elemental mercury drained.
  - <u>012.03C9</u> Does not accumulate over 45 kilograms (almost 100 pounds) of elemental mercury at any one time.
  - <u>012.03C10</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste who drains universal waste mercury-containing items, or who generates other solid waste as a result of draining the mercury-containing items, must determine whether the following exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Title 128, Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>:
    - 012.03C10(a) Mercury or clean-up residues resulting from spills or leaks; and/or
    - <u>012.03C10(b)</u> Other solid waste generated as a result of the draining of elemental mercury (e.g., remaining mercury-containing item units and filters).

<u>012.03C11</u> If the mercury, residues, and/or other solid waste exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste, they must be managed in accordance with all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 1 through 24. The handler is considered the generator of the newly generated hazardous waste and is subject to the requirements of Title 128, Chapters 8, 9, and 10.

<u>012.03C12</u> If the mercury residues and/or other solid waste are not hazardous, the handler may manage the waste in a way that is in compliance with applicable federal, state, or local solid waste regulations.

<u>012.04</u> Universal waste lamps. A small quantity handler of universal waste must manage universal waste lamps in a way that prevents releases of any universal waste or component of a universal waste to the environment, as follows:

<u>012.04A</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste must contain any lamp in containers or packages that are structurally sound, adequate to prevent breakage, and compatible with the contents of the lamps. Such containers and packages must remain closed and must lack evidence of leakage, spillage or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

O12.04B A small quantity handler of universal waste must immediately clean up and place in a container any lamp that is broken and must place in a container any lamp that shows evidence of breakage, leakage, or damage that could cause the release of mercury or other hazardous constituents to the environment. Containers must be closed, structurally sound, compatible with the contents of the lamps and must lack evidence of leakage, spillage or damage that could cause leakage or releases of mercury or other hazardous constituents to the environment under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

<u>012.05</u> Universal waste electronic items. A small quantity handler of universal waste must manage electronic items in a way that prevents releases of any universal waste or component of a universal waste to the environment, as follows:

<u>012.05A</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste must contain any universal waste electronic item in containers that are structurally sound, adequate to prevent breakage, and compatible with the contents of the item. Such containers must lack evidence of leakage, spillage or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

O12.05B A small quantity handler of universal waste must immediately clean up and place in a container any electronic item that is broken, and must place in a container any electronic device that shows evidence of breakage, leakage, or damage that could cause the release of hazardous constituents to the environment. Containers must be structurally sound, compatible with the contents of the electronic item and must lack evidence of leakage, spillage or damage that could cause leakage or releases of hazardous constituents to the environment under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

<u>012.05C</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste may disassemble universal waste electronic items provided the handler:

<u>012.05C1</u> Ensures that the universal waste electronic items are disassembled in a manner designed to prevent the release of any universal waste or component of universal waste to the environment;

O12.05C2 Ensures that the disassembly operations are performed safely by developing and implementing a written procedure detailing how to safely disassemble each universal waste electronic item managed at the site. This procedure must include: the type of equipment to be used to disassemble the universal waste electronic items safely; operation and maintenance of all equipment; segregation of incompatible wastes; proper waste management practices; and waste characterization;

<u>012.05C3</u> Ensures that a spill clean-up kit is readily available to immediately clean up spills or leaks of the contents of the universal waste electronic item which may occur during disassembly operations;

<u>012.05C4</u> Immediately segregates and transfers the disassembled electronic items to containers that meet the requirements of 012.05A and <u>012.05B</u> of this chapter;

<u>012.05C5</u> Ensures that employees are thoroughly familiar with the procedures for disassembling universal waste electronic items, proper waste handling, and emergency procedures relevant to their responsibilities during normal facility operations and emergencies;

<u>012.05C6</u> Maintains a system to ensure compliance with the written disassembling and management procedures;

<u>012.05C7</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste who disassembles universal waste electronic items, or who generates other solid waste as a result of disassembling the electronic items, must determine whether the disassembled electronic item, its components and/or other solid wastes exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Title 128, Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>, or are listed as a hazardous waste identified in Title 128, Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>016</u>;

<u>012.05C8</u> If the disassembled universal waste electronic item or its components exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste, they may continue to be managed as universal waste under this chapter. If the disassembled universal waste item or its components are not managed as universal waste under this chapter, then the handler is considered the generator of the newly generated hazardous waste and is subject to all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 8, 9, and 10. The newly generated hazardous waste must be managed in accordance with all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 1 through 24. If the disassembled universal waste electronic items or components become newly generated hazardous waste, the hazardous waste must be contained in containers that meet the requirements of Title 128, Chapter 10, <u>004</u>;

<u>012.05C9</u> If the disassembled universal waste electronic item, its components, and/or other solid waste are not hazardous, the handler must manage the waste in a

way that is in compliance with applicable federal, state, and local solid waste regulations.

<u>013</u> Labeling/marking. A small quantity handler of universal waste must label or mark the universal waste to identify the type of universal waste as specified below:

<u>013.01</u> Universal waste batteries (i.e., each battery), or a container in which the batteries are contained, must be labeled or marked clearly with any one of the following phrases: "Universal Waste--Battery(ies), or "Waste Battery(ies)," or "Used Battery(ies);"

<u>013.02</u> A container, (or multiple container package unit), tank, transport vehicle or vessel in which recalled universal waste pesticides as described in Title 128, Chapter 25, <u>003.01A</u> are contained must be labeled or marked clearly with:

013.02A The label that was on or accompanied the product as sold or distributed; and

013.02B The words "Universal Waste-Pesticide(s)" or "Waste-Pesticide(s);"

<u>013.03</u> A container, tank, or transport vehicle or vessel in which unused pesticide products as described in Title 128, Chapter 25, <u>003.01B</u> are contained must be labeled or marked clearly with:

<u>013.03A1</u> The label that was on the product when purchased, if still legible;

<u>013.03A2</u> If using the labels described in <u>013.03A1</u> of this chapter is not feasible, the appropriate label as required under the Department of Transportation regulation 49 CFR part 172;

<u>013.03A3</u> If using the labels described in <u>013.03A1</u> and <u>013.03A2</u> of this chapter is not feasible, another label prescribed or designated by the waste pesticide collection program administered or recognized by a state; and

013.03B The words "Universal Waste-Pesticide(s)" or "Waste-Pesticide(s)".

<u>013.04</u> Universal waste mercury-containing items, i.e., each mercury-containing item, or a container in which the mercury-containing items are contained, must be labeled or marked clearly with any one of the following phrases: "Universal Waste – Mercury-containing Item(s)," or "Waste Mercury-containing Item(s)," or "Used Mercury-containing Item(s)."

<u>013.05</u> Universal Waste lamps, i.e., each lamp, or a container in which the lamps are contained, must be labeled or marked clearly with any one of the following phrases: "Universal Waste--Lamps" or "Waste Lamps" or "Used Lamps".

<u>013.06</u> Universal waste electronic items. Each universal waste electronic item or a container in which universal waste electronic items are contained must be labeled or marked clearly with any one of the following phrases: "Universal Waste – Electronic Item(s)," or "Waste Electronic Item(s)," or "Used Electronic Item(s)." The name of the electronic item may be substituted for the words "Electronic Item(s)" (e.g., "Universal Waste – Monitor(s)" or "Waste Circuit Boards").

## 014 Accumulation time limits.

<u>014.01</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste may accumulate universal waste for no longer than one year from the date the universal waste is generated, or received from another handler, unless the requirements of <u>014.02</u> of this chapter are met.

O14.02 A small quantity handler of universal waste may accumulate universal waste for longer than one year from the date the universal waste is generated, or received from another handler, if such activity is solely for the purpose of accumulation of such quantities of universal waste as necessary to facilitate proper recovery, treatment, or disposal. However, the handler bears the burden of proving that such activity is solely for the purpose of accumulation of such quantities of universal waste as necessary to facilitate proper recovery, treatment, or disposal. A small quantity handler of universal waste must obtain written approval from NDEQ Waste Management Section prior to the one year accumulation time limit if the one year accumulation time limit is to be exceeded.

<u>014.03</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste who accumulates universal waste must be able to demonstrate the length of time that the universal waste has been accumulated from the date it becomes a waste or is received. The handler may make this demonstration by:

<u>014.03A</u> Placing the universal waste in a container and marking or labeling the container with the earliest date that any universal waste in the container became a waste or was received:

<u>014.03B</u> Marking or labeling each individual item of universal waste (e.g., each battery, mercury-containing item, lamp, or electronic item) with the date it became a waste or was received;

<u>014.03C</u> Maintaining an inventory system on-site that identifies the date each universal waste became a waste or was received;

<u>014.03D</u> Maintaining an inventory system on-site that identifies the earliest date that any universal waste in a group of universal waste items or a group of containers of universal waste became a waste or was received;

O14.03E Placing the universal waste in a specific accumulation area and identifying the earliest date that any universal waste in the area became a waste or was received; or

<u>014.03F</u> Any other method which clearly demonstrates the length of time that the universal waste has been accumulated from the date it becomes a waste or is received.

<u>015</u> Employee training. A small quantity handler of universal waste must inform all employees who handle or have responsibility for managing universal waste of the proper handling and emergency procedures appropriate to the type(s) of universal waste handled at the facility.

016 Response to releases.

- <u>016.01</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste must immediately contain all releases of universal wastes and other residues from universal wastes.
- <u>016.02</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste must determine whether any material resulting from the release is hazardous waste, and if so, must manage the hazardous waste in compliance with all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 1 through 24. The handler is considered the generator of the material resulting from the release, and must manage it in compliance with Title 128, Chapters 8, 9, and 10.

## 017 Off-site shipments.

- <u>017.01</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste is prohibited from sending or taking universal waste to a place other than another universal waste handler, a destination facility, or a foreign destination.
- <u>017.02</u> If a small quantity handler of universal waste self-transports universal waste off-site, the handler becomes a universal waste transporter for those self-transportation activities and must comply with the transporter requirements of <u>031</u> through <u>037</u> of this chapter while transporting the universal waste.
- <u>017.03</u> If a universal waste being offered for off-site transportation meets the definition of hazardous materials under 49 CFR parts 171 through 180, a small quantity handler of universal waste must package, label, mark and placard the shipment, and prepare the proper shipping papers in accordance with the applicable Department of Transportation regulations under 49 CFR parts 172 through 180;
- <u>017.04</u> Prior to sending a shipment of universal waste to another universal waste handler, the originating handler must ensure that the receiving handler agrees to receive the shipment.
- <u>017.05</u> If a small quantity handler of universal waste sends a shipment of universal waste to another handler or to a destination facility and the shipment is rejected by the receiving handler or destination facility, the originating handler must either:
  - 017.05A Receive the waste back when notified that the shipment has been rejected, or
  - <u>017.05B</u> Agree with the receiving handler on an alternative destination facility to which the shipment will be sent.
- <u>017.06</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste may reject a shipment containing universal waste, or a portion of a shipment containing universal waste that he has received from another handler. If a handler rejects a shipment or a portion of a shipment, he must contact the originating handler to notify him of the rejection and to discuss reshipment of the load. The handler must:
  - 017.06A Send the shipment back to the originating handler, or
  - <u>017.06B</u> If agreed to by both the originating and receiving handler, send the shipment to a destination facility.

- <u>017.07</u> If a small quantity handler of universal waste receives a shipment containing hazardous waste that is not a universal waste, the handler must immediately notify NDEQ of the illegal shipment, and provide the name, address, and phone number of the originating shipper. NDEQ will provide instructions for managing the hazardous waste.
- <u>017.08</u> If a small quantity handler of universal waste receives a shipment of non-hazardous, non-universal waste, the handler must manage the waste in any way that is in compliance with applicable federal, state or local solid waste regulations.
- <u>018</u> Tracking universal waste shipments. A small quantity handler of universal waste is not required to keep records of shipments of universal waste.
- <u>019</u> Exports. A small quantity handler of universal waste who sends universal waste to a foreign destination other than to those OECD countries specified in 40 CFR 262.58(a)(1) (in which case the handler is subject to the requirements of 40 CFR part 262, subpart H) must:
  - <u>019.01</u> Comply with the requirements applicable to a primary exporter in 40 CFR 262.53, 262.56(a)(1) through (4), (6), and (b) and 262.57 as incorporated by reference in Title 128, Chapter 9, <u>007.05</u>.
  - <u>019.02</u> Export such universal waste only upon consent of the receiving country and in conformance with the EPA Acknowledgment of Consent as defined in 40 CFR 262 subpart E as incorporated by reference in Title 128, Chapter 9, <u>007.05</u>, and
  - <u>019.03</u> Provide a copy of the EPA Acknowledgment of Consent for the shipment to the transporter transporting the shipment for export.
- <u>020</u> Large Quantity Handlers of Universal Waste. Sections <u>021</u> through <u>030.03</u> of this chapter define standards for large quantity handlers of universal waste.
- <u>021</u> Prohibitions. A large quantity handler of universal waste is:
  - 021.01 Prohibited from disposing of universal waste; and
  - <u>021.02</u> Prohibited from diluting or treating universal waste, except by responding to releases as provided in <u>027</u> of this chapter; or by managing specific wastes as provided in <u>023</u> of this chapter.
- 022 Notification.
  - <u>022.01A</u> Except as provided in <u>022.01B</u> and <u>022.01C</u> of this chapter, a large quantity handler of universal waste must have sent written notification of universal waste management to the Department, and received an Identification Number, before meeting or exceeding the 5,000 kilogram storage limit.
  - <u>022.01B</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste who has already notified the Department of his hazardous waste management activities and has received an

Identification Number is not required to renotify under this section. Such Identification Number shall be known as an NDEQ/EPA Identification Number.

<u>022.01C</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste who manages recalled universal waste pesticides as described in Title 128, Chapter 25, <u>003.01A</u> and who has sent notification to EPA as required by 40 CFR part 165 is not required to notify for those recalled universal waste pesticides under this section.

### 022.02 This notification must include:

<u>022.02A</u> The universal waste handler's name and mailing address;

<u>022.02B</u> The name and business telephone number of the person at the universal waste handler's site who should be contacted regarding universal waste management activities;

<u>022.02C</u> The address or physical location of the universal waste management activities:

<u>022.02D</u> A list of all of the types of universal waste managed by the handler (e.g., batteries, pesticides, mercury-containing items, lamps, electronic items);

<u>022.02E</u> A statement indicating that the handler is accumulating more than 5,000 kilograms of universal waste at one time and the types of universal waste (e.g., batteries, pesticides, mercury-containing items, lamps, electronic items) the handler is accumulating above this quantity.

## 023 Waste management.

<u>023.01</u> Universal waste batteries. A large quantity handler of universal waste must manage universal waste batteries in a way that prevents releases of any universal waste or component of a universal waste to the environment, as follows:

<u>023.01A</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste must contain any universal waste battery that shows evidence of leakage, spillage, or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions in a container. The container must be closed, structurally sound, compatible with the contents of the battery, and must lack evidence of leakage, spillage, or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

<u>023.01B</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste may conduct the following activities as long as the casing of each individual battery cell is not breached and remains intact and closed (except that cells may be opened to remove electrolyte but must be immediately closed after removal);

023.01B1 Sorting batteries by type;

023.01B2 Mixing battery types in one container;

- <u>023.01B3</u> Discharging batteries so as to remove the electric charge;
- 023.01B4 Regenerating used batteries;
- <u>023.01B5</u> Disassembling batteries or battery packs into individual batteries or cells;
- 023.01B6 Removing batteries from consumer products; or
- 023.01B7 Removing electrolyte from batteries.
- <u>023.01C</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste who removes electrolyte from batteries, or who generates other solid waste (e.g., battery pack materials, discarded consumer products) as a result of the activities listed above, must determine whether the electrolyte and/or other solid waste exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Title 128, Chapter 3 <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>.
  - <u>023.01C1</u> If the electrolyte and/or other solid waste exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste, it must be managed in compliance with all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 1 through 24. The handler is considered the generator of the hazardous electrolyte and/or other waste and is subject to the requirements of Title 128, Chapters 8, 9, and 10.
  - <u>023.01C2</u> If the electrolyte or other solid waste is not hazardous, the handler must manage the waste in any way that is in compliance with applicable federal, state or local solid waste regulations.
- <u>023.02</u> Universal waste pesticides. A large quantity handler of universal waste must manage universal waste pesticides in a way that prevents releases of any universal waste or component of a universal waste to the environment. The universal waste pesticides must be contained in one or more of the following:
  - <u>023.02A</u> A container that remains closed, structurally sound, compatible with the pesticide, and that lacks evidence of leakage, spillage, or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions; or
  - <u>023.02B</u> A container that does not meet the requirements of <u>023.02A</u> of this chapter, provided that the unacceptable container is overpacked in a container that does meet the requirements of paragraph <u>023.02A</u> of this chapter; or
  - <u>023.02C</u> A tank that meets the requirements of 40 CFR part 265 subpart J, except for 40 CFR 265.197(c), 265.200, and 265.201 as adopted by reference by Title 128, Chapter 22, <u>010</u>; or
  - <u>023.02D</u> A transport vehicle or vessel that is closed, structurally sound, compatible with the pesticide, and that lacks evidence of leakage, spillage, or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

<u>023.03</u> Universal waste mercury-containing items. A large quantity handler of universal waste must manage universal waste mercury-containing items in a way that prevents releases of any universal waste or component of a universal waste to the environment, as follows:

<u>023.03A</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste must contain any universal waste mercury-containing item that shows evidence of leakage, spillage, or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions in a container. The container must be closed, structurally sound, compatible with the contents of the mercury-containing item, and must lack evidence of leakage, spillage, or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

<u>023.03B</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste may remove mercury-containing ampules from universal waste mercury-contiaing item provided the handler:

<u>023.03B1</u> Removes the ampules in a manner designed to prevent breakage of the ampules;

<u>023.03B2</u> Removes ampules only over or in a containment device (e.g., tray or pan sufficient to contain any mercury released from an ampule in case of breakage);

<u>023.03B3</u> Ensures that a mercury clean-up system is readily available to immediately transfer any mercury resulting from spills or leaks from broken ampules, from the containment device to a container that meets the requirements of Title 128, Chapter 10, <u>004</u>;

<u>023.03B4</u> Immediately transfers any mercury resulting from spills or leaks from broken ampules from the containment device to a container that meets the requirements of Title 128, Chapter 10, <u>004</u>;

<u>023.03B5</u> Ensures that the area in which ampules are removed is well ventilated and monitored to ensure compliance with applicable OSHA exposure levels for mercury;

<u>023.03B6</u> Ensures that employees removing ampules are thoroughly familiar with proper waste mercury handling and emergency procedures, including transfer of mercury from containment devices to appropriate containers;

<u>023.03B7</u> Stores removed ampules in closed, non-leaking containers that are in good condition;

<u>023.03B8</u> Packs removed ampules in the container with packing materials adequate to prevent breakage during storage, handling, and transportation; and

 $\underline{023.03B9}$  A large quantity handler of universal waste who removes mercury-containing ampules from mercury-containing items must determine whether the following exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Title 128, Chapter 3,  $\underline{005}$  through  $\underline{010}$ :

<u>023.03B9(a)</u> Mercury or clean-up residues resulting from spills or leaks; and/or

<u>023.03B9(b)</u> Other solid waste generated as a result of the removal of mercury-containing ampules (e.g., remaining mercury-containing item units).

<u>023.03B10</u> If the mercury, residues, and/or other solid waste exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste, it must be managed in compliance with all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 1 through 24. The handler is considered the generator of the mercury, residues, and/or other waste and is subject to the requirements of Title 128, Chapters 8, 9, and 10.

<u>023.03B11</u> If the mercury, residues, and/or other solid waste is not hazardous, the handler must manage the waste in any way that is in compliance with applicable federal, state or local solid waste regulations.

<u>023.03C</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste may drain elemental mercury from open-ended mercury-containing items provided the handler:

<u>023.03C1</u> Ensures that the universal waste mercury-containing items are drained only over a containment device (e.g., tray or pan sufficient to collect and contain any mercury released from a device in case of breakage or spill);

<u>023.03C2</u> Ensures that the draining operations are performed safely by developing and implementing a written procedure detailing how to safely drain the universal waste mercury-containing items. This procedure must include: the type of equipment to be used to drain universal waste mercury-containing items safely; operation and maintenance of the equipment; segregation of incompatible wastes; proper waste management practices; and waste characterization;

<u>023.03C3</u> Ensures that a spill clean-up kit is readily available to immediately clean up spills or leaks of the contents of the universal waste mercury-containing item which might occur during the mercury draining operation;

<u>023.03C4</u> Immediately transfers the drained elemental mercury to a container that meets the requirements of Title 128, Chapter 10, 004;

<u>023.03C5</u> Ensures that the area in which the universal waste mercury-containing items are drained is well ventilated and monitored to ensure compliance with applicable OSHA exposure levels for mercury;

<u>023.03C6</u> Ensures that employees are thoroughly familiar with the procedure for draining universal waste mercury-containing items and proper waste handling and emergency procedures relevant to their responsibilities during normal facility operations and emergencies;

<u>023.03C7</u> Stores the drained elemental mercury in a closed, non-leaking container that is in good condition; and

<u>023.03C8</u> Maintains documentation of the date of accumulation, a description of the item drained, and the amount of elemental mercury drained.

<u>023.03C9</u> Does not accumulate over 45 kilograms (almost 100 pounds) of elemental mercury at any one time.

<u>023.03C10</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste who drains universal waste mercury-containing items, or who generates other solid waste as a result of draining the mercury-containing items, must determine whether the following exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Title 128, Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>:

<u>023.03C10(a)</u> Mercury or clean-up residues resulting from spills or leaks; and/or

<u>023.03C10(b)</u> Other solid waste generated as a result of the draining of elemental mercury (e.g., remaining mercury-containing item units and filters).

<u>023.03C11</u> If the mercury, residues, and/or other solid waste exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste, they must be managed in accordance with all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 1 through 24. The handler is considered the generator of the newly generated hazardous waste and is subject to the requirements of Title 128, Chapters 8, 9, and 10.

<u>023.03C12</u> If the mercury residues and/or other solid waste are not hazardous, the handler may manage the waste in a way that is in compliance with applicable federal, state, or local solid waste regulations.

<u>023.04</u> Universal waste lamps. A large quantity handler of universal waste must manage universal waste lamps in a way that prevents releases of any universal waste or component of a universal waste to the environment, as follows:

<u>023.04A</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste must contain any lamp in containers or packages that are structurally sound, adequate to prevent breakage, and compatible with the contents of the lamps. Such containers and packages must remain closed and must lack evidence of leakage, spillage or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

<u>023.04B</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste must immediately clean up and place in a container any lamp that is broken and must place in a container any lamp that shows evidence of breakage, leakage, or damage that could cause the release of mercury or other hazardous constituents to the environment. Containers must be closed, structurally sound, compatible with the contents of the lamps and must lack evidence of leakage, spillage or damage that could cause leakage or releases of mercury or other hazardous constituents to the environment under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

<u>023.05</u> Universal waste electronic items. A large quantity handler of universal waste must manage electronic items in a way that prevents releases of any universal waste or component of a universal waste to the environment, as follows:

<u>023.05A</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste must contain any universal waste electronic item in containers that are structurally sound, adequate to prevent breakage, and compatible with the contents of the item. Such containers must lack evidence of leakage, spillage or damage that could cause leakage under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

<u>023.05B</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste must immediately clean up and place in a container any electronic item that is broken, and must place in a container any electronic device that shows evidence of breakage, leakage, or damage that could cause the release of hazardous constituents to the environment. Containers must be structurally sound, compatible with the contents of the electronic item and must lack evidence of leakage, spillage or damage that could cause leakage or releases of hazardous constituents to the environment under reasonably foreseeable conditions.

<u>023.05C</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste may disassemble universal waste electronic items provided the handler:

<u>023.05C1</u> Ensures that the universal waste electronic items are disassembled in a manner designed to prevent the release of any universal waste or component of universal waste to the environment:

<u>023.05C2</u> Ensures that the disassembly operations are performed safely by developing and implementing a written procedure detailing how to safely disassemble each universal waste electronic item managed at the site. This procedure must include: the type of equipment to be used to disassemble the universal waste electronic items safely; operation and maintenance of all equipment; segregation of incompatible wastes; proper waste management practices; and waste characterization;

<u>023.05C3</u> Ensures that a spill clean-up kit is readily available to immediately clean up spills or leaks of the contents of the universal waste electronic item which may occur during disassembly operations;

<u>023.05C4</u> Immediately segregates and transfers the disassembled electronic items to containers that meet the requirements of 023.05A and 023.05B of this chapter;

<u>023.05C5</u> Ensures that employees are thoroughly familiar with the procedures for disassembling universal waste electronic items, proper waste handling, and emergency procedures relevant to their responsibilities during normal facility operations and emergencies;

<u>023.05C6</u> Maintains a system to ensure compliance with the written disassembling and management procedures;

<u>023.05C7</u> A small quantity handler of universal waste who disassembles universal waste electronic items, or who generates other solid waste as a result of disassembling the electronic items, must determine whether the disassembled electronic item, its components and/or other solid wastes exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste identified in Title 128, Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>, or are listed as a hazardous waste identified in Title 128, Chapter 3, <u>013</u> through <u>016</u>.

<u>023.05C8</u> If the disassembled universal waste electronic item or its components exhibit a characteristic of hazardous waste, they may continue to be managed as universal waste under this chapter. If the disassembled universal waste item or its components are not managed as universal waste under this chapter, then the handler is considered the generator of the newly generated hazardous waste and is subject to all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 8, 9, and 10. The newly generated hazardous waste must be managed in accordance with all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 1 through 24. If the disassembled universal waste electronic items or components become newly generated hazardous waste, the hazardous waste must be contained in containers that meet the requirements of Title 128, Chapter 10, 004;

<u>023.05C9</u> If the disassembled universal waste electronic item, its components, and/or other solid waste are not hazardous, the handler must manage the waste in a way that is in compliance with applicable federal, state, and local solid waste regulations.

<u>024</u> Labeling/marking. A large quantity handler of universal waste must label or mark the universal waste to identify the type of universal waste as specified below:

<u>024.01</u> Universal waste batteries (i.e., each battery), or a container or tank in which the batteries are contained, must be labeled or marked clearly with the any one of the following phrases: "Universal Waste--Battery(ies)," or "Waste Battery(ies)," or "Used Battery(ies);"

<u>024.02</u> A container (or multiple container package unit), tank, transport vehicle or vessel in which recalled universal waste pesticides as described in Title 128, Chapter 25, <u>003.01A</u> are contained must be labeled or marked clearly with:

024.02A The label that was on or accompanied the product as sold or distributed; and

024.02B The words "Universal Waste--Pesticide(s)" or "Waste--Pesticide(s);"

<u>024.03</u> A container, tank, or transport vehicle or vessel in which unused pesticide products as described in Title 128, Chapter 25, <u>003.01B</u> are contained must be labeled or marked clearly with:

024.03A1 The label that was on the product when purchased, if still legible;

<u>024.03A2</u> If using the labels described in <u>024.03A1</u> of this chapter is not feasible, the appropriate label as required under the Department of Transportation regulation 49 CFR part 172;

<u>024.03A3</u> If using the labels described in <u>024.03A1</u> and <u>024.03A2</u> of this chapter is not feasible, another label prescribed or designated by the pesticide collection program; and

024.03B The words "Universal Waste--Pesticides(s)" or "Waste--Pesticide(s)."

<u>024.04</u> Universal waste mercury-containing items, i.e., each mercury-containing item, or a container in which the mercury-containing items are contained, must be labeled or marked clearly with any one of the following phrases: "Universal Waste – Mercury-containing Item(s)," or "Waste Mercury-containing Item(s)," or "Used Mercury-containing Item(s)."

<u>024.05</u> Universal waste lamps, i.e., each lamp, or a container in which the lamps are contained, must be labeled or marked clearly with any one of the following phrases: "Universal Waste--Lamps," or "Waste Lamps," or "Used Lamps".

<u>024.06</u> Universal waste electronic items. Each universal waste electronic item or a container in which universal waste electronic items are contained must be labeled or marked clearly with any one of the following phrases: "Universal Waste – Electronic Item(s)," or "Waste Electronic Item(s)," or "Used Electronic Item(s)." The name of the electronic item may be substituted for the words "Electronic Item(s)" (e.g., "Universal Waste – Monitor(s)" or "Waste Circuit Boards").

## 025 Accumulation time limits.

<u>025.01</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste may accumulate universal waste for no longer than one year from the date the universal waste is generated, or received from another handler, unless the requirements of 025.02 of this chapter are met.

<u>025.02</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste may accumulate universal waste for longer than one year from the date the universal waste is generated, or received from another handler, if such activity is solely for the purpose of accumulation of such quantities of universal waste as necessary to facilitate proper recovery, treatment, or disposal. However, the handler bears the burden of proving that such activity was solely for the purpose of accumulation of such quantities of universal waste as necessary to facilitate proper recovery, treatment, or disposal. A large quantity handler of universal waste must obtain written approval from NDEQ Waste Management Section prior to the one year accumulation time limit if the one year accumulation time limit is to be exceeded.

<u>025.03</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste must be able to demonstrate the length of time that the universal waste has been accumulated from the date it becomes a waste or is received. The handler may make this demonstration by:

<u>025.03A</u> Placing the universal waste in a container and marking or labeling the container with the earliest date that any universal waste in the container became a waste or was received;

<u>025.03B</u> Marking or labeling the individual item of universal waste (e.g., each battery, lamp, mercury-containing item, or electronic item) with the date it became a waste or was received:

<u>025.03C</u> Maintaining an inventory system on-site that identifies the date the universal waste being accumulated became a waste or was received;

<u>025.03D</u> Maintaining an inventory system on-site that identifies the earliest date that any universal waste in a group of universal waste items or a group of containers of universal waste became a waste or was received.

<u>025.03E</u> Placing the universal waste in a specific accumulation area and identifying the earliest date that any universal waste in the area became a waste or was received; or

<u>025.03F</u> Any other method which clearly demonstrates the length of time that the universal waste has been accumulated from the date it becomes a waste or is received.

<u>026</u> Employee training. A large quantity handler of universal waste must ensure that all employees are thoroughly familiar with proper waste handling and emergency procedures, relative to their responsibilities during normal facility operations and emergencies.

### 027 Response to releases.

<u>027.01</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste must immediately contain all releases of universal wastes and other residues from universal wastes.

<u>027.02</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste must determine whether any material resulting from the release is hazardous waste, and if so, must manage the hazardous waste in compliance with all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 1 through 24. The handler is considered the generator of the material resulting from the release, and is subject to the requirements of Title 128, Chapters 8, 9, and 10.

## 028 Off-site shipments.

<u>028.01</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste is prohibited from sending or taking universal waste to a place other than another universal waste handler, a destination facility, or a foreign destination.

<u>028.02</u> If a large quantity handler of universal waste self-transports universal waste off-site, the handler becomes a universal waste transporter for those self-transportation activities and must comply with the transporter requirements of <u>031</u> through <u>037</u> of this chapter while transporting the universal waste.

<u>028.03</u> If a universal waste being offered for off-site transportation meets the definition of hazardous materials under 49 CFR 171 through 180, a large quantity handler of universal waste must package, label, mark and placard the shipment, and prepare the proper shipping papers in accordance with the applicable Department of Transportation regulations under 49 CFR parts 172 through 180;

- <u>028.04</u> Prior to sending a shipment of universal waste to another universal waste handler, the originating handler must ensure that the receiving handler agrees to receive the shipment.
- <u>028.05</u> If a large quantity handler of universal waste sends a shipment of universal waste to another handler or to a destination facility and the shipment is rejected by the receiving handler or destination facility, the originating handler must either:
  - 028.05A Receive the waste back when notified that the shipment has been rejected; or
  - <u>028.05B</u> Agree with the receiving handler on a destination facility to which the shipment will be sent.
- <u>028.06</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste may reject a shipment containing universal waste, or a portion of a shipment containing universal waste that he has received from another handler. If a handler rejects a shipment or a portion of a shipment, he must contact the originating handler to notify him of the rejection and to discuss reshipment of the load. The handler must:
  - 028.06A Send the shipment back to the originating handler; or
  - <u>028.06B</u> If agreed to by both the originating and receiving handler, send the shipment to a destination facility.
- <u>028.07</u> If a large quantity handler of universal waste receives a shipment containing hazardous waste that is not a universal waste, the handler must immediately notify NDEQ of the illegal shipment, and provide the name, address, and phone number of the originating shipper. NDEQ will provide instructions for managing the hazardous waste.
- <u>028.08</u> If a large quantity handler of universal waste receives a shipment of non-hazardous, non-universal waste, the handler must manage the waste in any way that is in compliance with applicable federal, state or local solid waste regulations.
- 029 Tracking universal waste shipments.
  - <u>029.01</u> Receipt of shipments. A large quantity handler of universal waste must keep a record of each shipment of universal waste received at the facility. The record may take the form of a log, invoice, manifest, bill of lading, or other shipping document. The record for each shipment of universal waste received must include the following information:
    - <u>029.01A</u> The name and address of the originating universal waste handler or foreign shipper from whom the universal waste was sent;
    - <u>029.01B</u> The quantity of each type of universal waste received (e.g., batteries, pesticides, lamps, mercury-containing items, electronic items);
    - 029.01C The date of receipt of the shipment of universal waste.
  - <u>029.02</u> Shipments off-site. A large quantity handler of universal waste must keep a record of each shipment of universal waste sent from the handler to other facilities. The record may

take the form of a log, invoice, manifest, bill of lading or other shipping document. The record for each shipment of universal waste sent must include the following information:

<u>029.02A</u> The name and address of the universal waste handler, destination facility, or foreign destination to whom the universal waste was sent;

<u>029.02B</u> The quantity of each type of universal waste sent (e.g., batteries, pesticides, lamps, mercury-containing items, electronic items);

<u>029.02C</u> The date the shipment of universal waste left the facility.

## 029.03 Records retention.

<u>029.03A</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste must retain the records described in <u>029.01</u> of this chapter for at least three years from the date of receipt of a shipment of universal waste.

<u>029.03B</u> A large quantity handler of universal waste must retain the records described in <u>029.02</u> of this chapter for at least three years from the date a shipment of universal waste left the facility.

<u>030</u> Exports. A large quantity handler of universal waste who sends universal waste to a foreign destination other than to those OECD countries specified in 40 CFR 262.58(a)(1) (in which case the handler is subject to the requirements of 40 CFR part 262, subpart H) must:

<u>030.01</u> Comply with the requirements applicable to a primary exporter in 40 CFR 262.53, 262.56 (a)(1) through (4), (6) and (b) and 262.57 as incorporated by reference in Title 128, Chapter 10, <u>006</u>;

<u>030.02</u> Export universal waste only upon consent of the receiving country and in conformance with the EPA Acknowledgment of Consent as defined in 40 CFR 262 Subpart E as incorporated by reference in Title 128, Chapter 10, <u>006</u>; and

<u>030.03</u> Provide a copy of the EPA Acknowledgment of Consent for the shipment to the transporter transporting the shipment for export.

 $\underline{031}$  Universal Waste Transporters. Sections  $\underline{032}$  through  $\underline{037.02}$  of this chapter define standards for universal waste transporters.

032 Prohibitions. A universal waste transporter is:

032.01 Prohibited from disposing of universal waste; and

<u>032.02</u> Prohibited from diluting or treating universal waste, except by responding to releases as provided in 035 of this chapter.

033 Waste management.

<u>033.01</u> A universal waste transporter must comply with all applicable U.S. Department of Transportation regulations in 49 CFR part 171 through 180 for transport of any universal waste that meets the definition of hazardous material in 49 CFR 171.8. For purposes of the Department of Transportation regulations, a material is considered a hazardous waste if it is subject to the Uniform Hazardous Waste Manifest requirements of Title 128, Chapter 10, <u>002</u>. Because universal waste does not require a hazardous waste manifest, it is not considered hazardous waste under the Department of Transportation regulations.

<u>033.02</u> Some universal waste materials are regulated by the Department of Transportation as hazardous materials because they meet the criteria for one or more hazard classes specified in 49 CFR 173.2. As universal waste shipments do not require a manifest under Title 128, Chapter 10, <u>002</u>, they may not be described by the DOT proper shipping name "hazardous waste, (I) or (s), n.o.s.", nor may the hazardous material's proper shipping name be modified by adding the word "waste".

## 034 Storage time limits.

<u>034.01</u> A universal waste transporter may only store the universal waste at a universal waste transfer facility for ten days or less.

 $\underline{034.02}$  If a universal waste transporter stores universal waste for more than ten days, the transporter becomes a universal waste handler and must comply with the applicable requirements of Sections  $\underline{009}$  through  $\underline{019}$  or  $\underline{020}$  through  $\underline{030}$  of this chapter while storing the universal waste.

## 035 Response to releases.

<u>035.01</u> A universal waste transporter must immediately contain all releases of universal wastes and other residues from universal wastes.

<u>035.02</u> A universal waste transporter must determine whether any material resulting from the release is hazardous waste, and if so, it is subject to all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 1 through 24. If the waste is determined to be a hazardous waste, the transporter is subject to the requirements of Title 128, Chapters 8, 9, and 10.

## 036 Off-site shipments.

<u>036.01</u> A universal waste transporter is prohibited from transporting the universal waste to a place other than a universal waste handler, a destination facility, or a foreign destination.

<u>036.02</u> If the universal waste being shipped off-site meets the Department of Transportation's definition of hazardous materials under 49 CFR 171.8, the shipment must be properly described on a shipping paper in accordance with the applicable Department of Transportation regulations under 49 CFR part 172.

<u>037</u> Exports. A universal waste transporter transporting a shipment of universal waste to a foreign destination other than to those OECD countries specified in 40 CFR 262.58(a)(1) (in which case the handler is subject to the requirements of 40 CFR part 262, subpart H) may not accept a shipment if

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the transporter knows the shipment does not conform to the EPA Acknowledgment of Consent. In addition the transporter must ensure that:

- 037.01 A copy of the EPA Acknowledgment of Consent accompanies the shipment; and
- <u>037.02</u> The shipment is delivered to the facility designated by the person initiating the shipment.
- <u>038</u> Universal Waste Destination Facilities. Sections <u>038.01</u> through <u>040.02</u> of this chapter define standards for universal waste destination facilities.
  - <u>038.01</u> The owner or operator of a destination facility (as defined in <u>008</u> of this chapter) is subject to all applicable requirements of Title 128, Chapters 7, and 12 through 24, and the notification requirements of Title 128, Chapter 4.
  - <u>038.02</u> The owner or operator of a destination facility that recycles a particular universal waste without storing that universal waste before it is recycled must comply with Title 128, Chapter 7, <u>006</u>.
- 039 Off-site shipments.
  - <u>039.01</u> The owner or operator of a destination facility is prohibited from sending or taking universal waste to a place other than a universal waste handler, another destination facility or foreign destination.
  - <u>039.02</u> The owner or operator of a destination facility may reject a shipment containing universal waste, or a portion of a shipment containing universal waste. If the owner or operator of the destination facility rejects a shipment or a portion of a shipment, he must contact the shipper to notify him of the rejection and to discuss reshipment of the load. The owner or operator of the destination facility must:
    - 039.02A Send the shipment back to the original shipper; or
    - <u>039.02B</u> If agreed to by both the shipper and the owner or operator of the destination facility, send the shipment to another destination facility.
  - <u>039.03</u> If the owner or operator of a destination facility receives a shipment containing hazardous waste that is not a universal waste, the owner or operator of the destination facility must immediately notify NDEQ of the illegal shipment, and provide the name, address, and phone number of the shipper. NDEQ will provide instructions for managing the hazardous waste.
  - <u>039.04</u> If the owner or operator of a destination facility receives a shipment of non-hazardous, non-universal waste, the owner or operator must manage the waste in any way that is in compliance with applicable federal or state solid waste regulations.
- 040 Tracking universal waste shipments.

- <u>040.01</u> The owner or operator of a destination facility must keep a record of each shipment of universal waste received at the facility. The record may take the form of a log, invoice, manifest, bill of lading, or other shipping document. The record for each shipment of universal waste received must include the following information:
  - <u>040.01A</u> The name and address of the universal waste handler, destination facility, or foreign shipper from whom the universal waste was sent;
  - <u>040.01B</u> The quantity of each type of universal waste received (e.g., batteries, pesticides, lamps, mercury-containing items, electronic items); and
  - 040.01C The date of receipt of the shipment of universal waste.
- <u>040.02</u> The owner or operator of a destination facility must retain the records described in <u>040.01</u> of this chapter for at least three years from the date of receipt of a shipment of universal waste.
- <u>041</u> Imports. Persons managing universal waste that is imported from a foreign country into the United States are subject to the applicable requirements of this chapter, immediately after the waste enters the United States, as indicated below:
  - <u>041.01</u> A universal waste transporter is subject to the universal waste transporter requirements of Sections 031 through 037 of this chapter.
  - $\underline{041.02}$  A universal waste handler is subject to the small or large quantity handler of universal waste requirements of Sections  $\underline{009}$  through or  $\underline{020}$  through  $\underline{030}$  of this chapter, as applicable.
  - <u>041.03</u> An owner or operator of a destination facility is subject to the destination facility requirements of Sections <u>038</u> through <u>040.02</u> of this chapter.
  - <u>041.04</u> Persons managing universal waste that is imported from an OECD country as specified in 40 CFR 262.58(a)(1) are subject to Sections <u>041.01</u> through <u>041.03</u> of this chapter, in addition to the requirements of 40 CFR part 262, subpart H.
- <u>042</u> Petitions. Petitions to include other wastes under Title 128, Chapter 25 may be submitted in accordance with Sections 042.01 through 043.08 of this chapter.
  - $\underline{042.01}$  Any person seeking to add a hazardous waste or a category of hazardous waste to this chapter may petition for a regulatory amendment under this subpart and Title 128, Chapter 6,  $\underline{001}$ .
  - <u>042.02</u> To be successful, the petitioner must demonstrate to the satisfaction of the Director that regulation under the universal waste regulations of Title 128, Chapter 25 is: appropriate for the waste or category of waste; will improve management practices for the waste or category of waste; and will improve implementation of the hazardous waste program. The petition must include the information required by Title 128, Chapter 6, <u>001.02</u>. The petition should also address as many of the factors listed in Chapter 25, <u>043</u> as are appropriate for the waste or waste category addressed in the petition.

- <u>042.03</u> The Director will evaluate petitions using the factors listed in Chapter 25, <u>043</u>. The Director will grant or deny a petition using the factors listed in Chapter 25, <u>043</u>. The decision will be based on the weight of evidence showing that regulation under Title 128, Chapter 25 is appropriate for the waste or category of waste, will improve management practices for the waste or category of waste, and will improve implementation of the hazardous waste program.
- 043 Factors for petitions to include other wastes under Title 128, Chapter 25.
  - <u>043.01</u> The waste or category of waste, as generated by a wide variety of generators, is listed in Title 128, Chapter 3, <u>011</u> through <u>016</u>, or (if not listed) a proportion of the waste stream exhibits one or more characteristics of hazardous waste identified in Title 128, Chapter 3, <u>005</u> through <u>010</u>. (When a characteristic waste is added to the universal waste regulations of Title 128, Chapter 25 by using a generic name to identify the waste category (e.g., batteries), the definition of universal waste in Title 128, Chapter 25, <u>008</u> will be amended to include only the hazardous waste portion of the waste category (e.g., hazardous waste batteries).) Thus, only the portion of the waste stream that does exhibit one or more characteristics (i.e., is hazardous waste) is subject to the universal waste regulations of Title 128, Chapter 25;
  - <u>043.02</u> The waste or category of waste is not exclusive to a specific industry or group of industries, is commonly generated by a wide variety of types of establishments (including, for example, households, retail and commercial businesses, office complexes, conditionally exempt small quantity generators, small businesses, government organizations, as well as large industrial facilities);
  - <u>043.03</u> The waste or category of waste is generated by a large number of generators (e.g., more than 1,000 nationally) and is frequently generated in relatively small quantities by each generator;
  - <u>043.04</u> Systems to be used for collecting the waste or category of waste (including packaging, marking, and labeling practices) would ensure close stewardship of the waste;
  - <u>043.05</u> The risk posed by the waste or category of waste during accumulation and transport is relatively low compared to other hazardous wastes, and specific management standards proposed or referenced by the petitioner (e.g., waste management requirements appropriate to be added to Title 128, Chapter 25, <u>012</u>, <u>023</u>, and <u>033</u>; and/or applicable Department of Transportation requirements) would be protective of human health and the environment during accumulation and transport;
  - <u>043.06</u> Regulation of the waste or category of waste under Title 128, Chapter 25 will increase the likelihood that the waste will be diverted from non-hazardous waste management systems (e.g., the municipal solid waste stream, non-hazardous industrial or commercial solid waste stream, municipal sewer or stormwater systems) to recycling, treatment, or disposal in compliance with Subtitle C of RCRA.
  - <u>043.07</u> Regulation of the waste or category of waste under Title 128, Chapter 25 will improve implementation of and compliance with the hazardous waste regulatory program; and/or

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<u>043.08</u> Such other factors as may be appropriate.

 $\frac{002}{\mathrm{invalid}}$  If any chapter, subsection, or section of these regulations shall be held  $\overline{\mathrm{invalid}}$ , it shall conclusively be presumed that the Environmental Quality Council would have enacted the remainder of these regulations not directly related to such Chapter, subsection or section.

#### Waste Description:

Ash, bed media, oversized material, and air pollution control residue generated at the Thermal Oxidation Facility (TOF), Kimball County, Nebraska, during the fluidized bed thermal oxidation of hazardous waste listed in:

- (1) Chapter 3, <u>013</u>. Hazardous Waste from Nonspecific Sources (except those wastes numbered F020-F023 and F026-F028);
- (2) Chapter 3, 014. Hazardous Waste from Specific Sources.
- (3) Chapter 3, 015. Acute Hazardous Waste; and
- (4) Chapter 3, 016. Toxic Waste; and

Stabilized ash, bed media, and air pollution control residue generated at the TOF during the fluidized bed thermal oxidation of hazardous waste listed in:

- (1) Chapter 3,  $\underline{013}$ . Hazardous Waste from Nonspecific Sources (except those wastes numbered F020-F023 and F026-F028);
- (2) Chapter 3, 014. Hazardous Waste from Specific Sources;
- (3) Chapter 3, 015. Acute Hazardous Waste; and
- (4) Chapter 3, <u>016</u>. Toxic Waste, generated after September 6, 1994, provided that the owner or operator (owner/operator) meets the following conditions:
  - (1) Verification testing:
    - (A) Initial testing:

For the first thirty (30) operating days during the period designated in the Nebraska Department of Environmental Quality (NDEQ), Hazardous Waste Incinerator and Storage Facility Permit (Permit), NED981723513, at Part VI.G.3. as Post-Trial Burn, excluding oversized material, owner/operator must collect grab samples of mixed ash, bed media, and air pollution control residue (Waste) and composite these samples daily. The daily composite samples must be split and analyzed, respectively, prior to disposal, by owner/operator and by an independent laboratory designated by the Director. An SW-846 Method

1311, Toxicity Characteristics Leaching Procedure (TCLP) analysis, or an alternate method approved by the Director, is required for all hazardous waste constituents listed in (2)(A) and (2) (B), (except that 2,4-D and Silvex need not be analyzed unless they are known to be constituents of hazardous waste fed to the thermal oxidation unit (TOU)), and a total analysis is required for all constituents in (2)(D). An analysis for the concentrations of leachable constituents listed in (2)(C) is required using 0.001 M sodium bicarbonate at pH 8.3 and the SW-846 Method 1311 extraction procedure protocol, or an alternate method approved by the Director, except that Chlordane, 2,4,5-T, diethylstilbestrol and epichlorohydrin need not be analyzed unless they are known to be constituents of hazardous waste fed to the TOU.

If analysis shows that the concentrations of all of the constituents listed in (2)(C) and (2)(D) are equal to, or less than, the corresponding delisting levels, and the concentration of any one of the constituents listed in (2)(A) or (2)(B) is greater than, the corresponding delisting level, the Waste must be stabilized and composited grab samples of the stabilized Waste must be split and analyzed, respectively, prior to disposal, by owner/operator and an independent laboratory designated by the Director. The Multiple Extraction Procedure (MEP) using the TCLP extraction rather than the EP, analysis of the stabilized Waste, using SW-846 Method 1320, must be performed to obtain the leachable concentrations of constituents listed in (2)(A) and (2)(B). A minimum of eight (8) composited grab samples of stabilized Waste, as defined in the Waste Analysis Plan, must be split and analyzed over the thirty (30) day period.

For hazardous waste constituents where the delisting level is less than the Practical Quantitation Limit (PQL) the delisting level will have been achieved if a constituent is not detected provided that the Method Detection Limit (MDL) is less than the delisting level.

The owner/operator must report the results of all available analyses beginning no later than ten (10) days after the Post-Trail Burn commences and continuing at ten (10) day intervals until data from thirty (30) TOF operating days has been reported. For the purposes of this section, operation day means any 24-hour period during which the facility incinerates hazardous waste.

Waste and stabilized Waste for which analysis verifies that the concentrations of all constituents listed in (2) (A), (2)(B), (2)(C), and (2)(D) are equal to, or l less than, delisting levels must be disposed of in a monofill dedicated to the disposal of Waste and stabilized Waste generated at the TOF only and licensed according to the requirements of Title 132 - Integrated Solid Waste

Management Regulations (Title 132), as amended, or it must be managed and disposed of as a hazardous waste in accordance with Title 128 and in accordance with the facility permits.

The Initial Testing period may be extended an additional thirty (3) days as required by the Director in accordance with a written notice provided to owner/operator prior to the end of the Initial Testing period.

During the Initial Testing period, no Waste or stabilized Waste may be disposed of in the owner/operator monofill without the written approval of the Director.

### (B) Subsequent testing:

Once the Initial Testing period has ended, the testing requirements of (1)(A) shall continue except for the verification sampling and analysis by an independent laboratory, and the MEP analysis of Stabalized Waste. Verification by an independent laboratory and MEP analyses may be required by the Director as necessary throughout the operating life of the facility. The owner/operator must nevertheless composite and analyze grab samples collected during the filling of each ash day bin and stabilization, if required, prior to disposal.

### (C) Maintenance reports:

All reports of analyses and results of studies to establish Method Detection Limits must be maintained on the TOF site throughout the operating life of the facility. In addition, a report summarizing analyses must be submitted to the NDEQ within thirty (30) days after the end of each calendar year quarter.

## (2) Delisting Levels:

### (A) Metals:

If the extract concentration of any one of the following constituents is greater than the corresponding delisting level, the Waste must be stabilized until the constituent concentration is less than, or equal to, the corresponding delisting level, or it must be managed and disposed of as a hazardous waste in accordance with Title 128:

(D) Polychlorinated dibenzo-p-dioxins and dibenzofurans:

If the concentration of any one of the polychlorinated dibenzo-p-dioxins and dibenzofurans analyzed by SW-846 Method 8280, or an equivalent method approved by the Director, exceeds the corresponding delisting level, but does not equal or exceed the corresponding permit concentration limits established for waste acceptance, the Waste will be considered a hazardous waste, and it may be re-treated by the TOF thermal oxidation until its concentration is less than, or equal to, the delisting level. Otherwise, it must be managed as hazardous waste in accordance with Title 128.

The concentration of polychlorinated dibenzo-p-dioxins shall be calculated as 2,3,7,8-tetrachlorodibenzo-p-dioxin (2,3,7,8-TCDD) equivalents, using the current EPA-approved method of determining equivalents or using an alternate method approved by the Director. If the EPA modifies its method, owner/operator will be given reasonable time to prepare a transition plan for submittal and approval by the Director.

#### (3) Testing List Amendment:

The owner/operator must monitor EPA health-based standards using the current "Docket Report on Health-Based Levels and Solubilities Used in the Evaluation of Delisting Petitions, submitted under 40 CFR 260.20 and CFR 260.22". If changes are made to the constituent lists and standards, owner/operator must notify NDEQ of these changes on or before the first day of July of each year. The Council may amend the delisting levels, in (2)(A), (2)(B), and (2)(C) to correspond to changed constituents or standards.

#### (4) Data Submittals:

All reports of analyses must be submitted to the Director, NDEQ, P. O. Box 98922, Lincoln, Nebraska 68509-8922 within the time period specified in (1)(A) and (1)(B), respectively. Failure to submit the required reports will be considered by NDEQ to revoke owner/operator exclusion.

All reports of analyses must be accompanied by the following certification statement: "Under civil and criminal penalty of law for the making or submission of false or fraudulent statements or representations, I certify that the information contained in or accompanying this document is true, accurate, and complete. As to those identified sections of this document for which I can personally verify their truth or accuracy, I certify that the information contained in or accompanying this document is true, accurate, and complete. As to those

identified sections of this document for which I cannot personally verify their truth or accuracy, I certify as the company official having supervisory responsibility for the persons who, acting under my direct instructions, made the verification that this information is true, accurate, and complete. In the event that any of this information is determined by NDEQ in its sole discretion to be false, inaccurate or incomplete, and upon conveyance of this fact to the company, I recognize and agree that this exclusion of wastes will be void as if it never had effect or to the extent directed by NDEQ and that the company will be liable for any actions taken in contravention of the company's RCRA and CERCLA obligations premised upon the company's reliance on the void exclusion."

(5) Petition for Renewal of the Exclusion:

When the design capacity of the permitted monofill is attained, owner/operator must petition the Environmental Quality Council (EQC) for a new exclusion based on a new site, or it must manage the Waste and Stabilized Waste as hazardous waste in accordance with Title 128.

(6) Disposal of Waste and Stabilized Waste:

Waste and Stabilized Waste generated at the TOF during the thermal oxidation of hazardous waste must be disposed of at the permitted monofill licensed permitted according to Title 132, as amended, or it must be managed as hazardous waste in accordance with Title 128. Any deviation from these requirements and the terms of the permit to operate the owner/operator monofill, will void this exclusion.
